Mayoral Report 1959 MRS MATILDA THOMPSON MBE

On the 7th of April 1959, the City of Ballaarat lost one of its most outstanding personalities in the passing of Mrs W D Thompson. Ballaarat citizens had been aware that Mrs Thompson had been in indifferent health for some short while and that she had been confined to hospital. Her death, however, was received as a shock to very many people. Mrs Thompson's death concluded a life which had been marked by outstanding service and Citizenship. She was deeply loved in very many spheres of public activity not the least being in the hearts of the former Service-men of this City and District. She was an untiring worker for patriotic activities and wherever help could be given to others. She was a very



generous lady and her passing was deeply felt by all who knew and loved her.

The Council decided as a tribute to her life of service to the community that an appropriate area in the Ballaarat Botanical Gardens should be set aside as a memorial corner to the late Mrs Thompson and this suggestion has been endorsed by Service Organisations.

With the death yesterday of Mrs. W. D. Thompson, Ballarat lost a citizen who was both an institution and a well-loved personality.

Mrs Thompson did not only contribute generously to Ballarat's history, but herself will be remembered as a colourful part of that record.

Born almost 88 years ago, on April 28, 1870, as Matilda Louise Clennell, "Tilly", as she became affectionately known, was endowed with unquenchable enthusiasm and ability to inspire loyalty in her associates, and spent her own life working for others.

All her life she lived close to the Lake, of which she was so fond, for "Sunways," her home on Wendouree Parade, was built on the site of the house in which she was born.

An early pupil of the Wendouree School, she was closely associated throughout her life, with the nearby Jubilee Methodist Church, and maintained her interest in all its activities. Her many gifts to public bodies included that of a tennis court for the church.

In 1905 she joined the staff of E. Lucas and Co., and the firm soon felt the impact of her exceptional character and forceful personality.

Rising rapidly, she became its first interstate representative, and made history, nearly 50 years ago, as Australia's first woman commercial traveller.

The next step was a trip abroad, as a buyer for the firm, before she returned to take charge of the staff of 500 girls.

It was during this time that Mrs Thompson conceived the idea which was to make her "Lucas Girls" famous, and to give the city its Avenue of Honor.

The girls made a voluntary tax upon their earnings, and raised money in numerous ways to make the scheme possible.

Between June 3, 1917, and August 16, 1919, 3912 trees were planted in the 14-mile avenue. Mrs Thompson and her "girls" then set about raising another amount for the Arch of Victory. The cost of the avenue and arch totalling £10,600.

Both during and after the First World War, and in the midst of this project, Mrs Thompson was engaged actively in a variety of patriotic work, including the arrangement of suitable welcome home celebrations for returning servicemen.

This activity was recognised by the RSL Federal Executive, which awarded her its Certificate of Appreciation and gold medal, an annual gift to one chosen woman in the Commonwealth. Another recognition of her public-spirited activity was the award of the honor of Member of the Order of the British Empire.

After 45 years in business, Mrs Thompson retired and took a trip abroad, returning to Ballarat in 1933 after five years' travel in 20 different countries. While overseas she became interested in the Bagot-Dtack system of health exercises, and on her return conducted large classes in Ballarat and Victorian country centres.

Profits of these classes were expended on the construction of a roll of honor near the premises of the Ballarat Golf Club, recording the names of the servicemen honored in the Avenue of Honor. Maintaining her interest in physical education and naturopath work, she continued, when no longer able to play an active personal part, to make her home available for these activities, as also a centre of much social and community life.

It will be a long time before another personality of her ability and generosity appears on the Ballarat scene, and the special place which she made for herself in the community is unlikely again to be filled.

At Mrs Thompson's request, there will be no flowers, and the funeral which follows a service at her home this afternoon will be a private one.
