

# BALLARAT WHOLESALE MARKET.

The supply of grain on Tuesday was very small, and there was a large demand, causing the prices to be firmer. It was stated that numbers of intending purchasers of oats were unable to obtain a supply; and wheat also was scarce, farmers apparently hanging back. The relative proportion of the price of wheat and flour in Melbourne, as compared with the price of wheat and flour in Ballarat, is the subject of much comment with the millers, salesmen, and others. In Melbourne the wheat is about 4s. 6d. per bushel, while flour may be quoted at L11 10s. per ton (bags back); and in the Ballarat market the wheat is 4s. 10d. per bushel, while the best flour may be quoted at L11 per ton, and in some instances lower. There seems to be a feeling that the price of wheat and flour must come down, so as to get into proper relationship with Melbourne prices. There was a good supply of hay and straw in the local market on Tuesday. The following were the quotations in the various sorts of produce :- Flour, L11 to L11 15s. per ton; pollard, 1s. 7d. per bushel; bran, 1s. 4d.; wheat, 4s. 10d.; onts, 4s. 6d.; pens, 4s. 5d.; English barley, 5s.; Cape do., 3s. 10d.; district potatoes, L3 5s. to L4 5s. per ton; Geelong do., L4 10s. to L5; manger hay, L4; sheaves, L2 10s. to L2 15s.; oaten straw, 35s.; wheaten do., 25s. to 30s.--"Star."

We are really not a whit more independent than our friends "at home," and are as ready to bow before the strong hand and imperious will. All our boasted freedom is only a "delusion and a snare." Therefore, let us cease "blowing," avoid attempting to impose on the outside world, and instead, try to carry curselves with more manliness, thus

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not only maintaining our own self respect, but earning the esteem of our fellow citizens. Everyone clothed with power is inclined to tyrannise, as in this instance, either for selfish surposes, or to gratify feelings of hatred or revenge for real or imaginary wrongs, and it is only by united and persistent resistance that from the fact that they meet good cricketers, a courteous secretary, and gentlemanly club. The this spirit can be checked and annihilated. It was the practice some short time back to laud American institutions, and in almost every attempt at legislation, the endeavor with certain parties was to mould our laws to those of the United States. 

Barley sells readily at late rates, for Cape; 3s. 9d. to 3s. 11d. ; English is better, and commands 5s. to 5s. 2d. Hay has been fully supplied, but all to hand has been cleared by a slight concession to buyers; manger, L4 to L4 15s.; sheaves, L2 10s. to L3. Strav is only wanted moderately, and the supply has been above requirements; price, wheaten, 22s. 6d. to 25s.; oaten, 30s. to 40s. The supply of potatoes has fallen off, and the market is now settled at L2 10s.
