There was a good supply of grain in the market on Tuesday, and the demand was a little slack, causing the price of wheat to recede slightly. Oats, however, remained substantially at existing quotations. Hay and straw had a fair supply, with no alteration in prices. Pota-toes advanced 5s. per ton. The following were the ruling prices: —Flour, £10 10s. to £10 15s. per ton; pollard, Is. 5d. per bushel; bran, Is. 3d.; wheat, 4s. 7d. per bushel; bran, 1s. 4s.; peas, 4s.; English barley, 5s. to 5s. 6d.; Cape do., 3s. 10d. to 3s. 10d.d.; district potation. toes, L2 10s. to L3 per ton; manger hay, L5 5s. to L4 10s.; sheaves, L2 10s. to L3; oater straw, 30s. to 35s.; wheaten do., 25s.—"Star."

MESSRS, EVERINGHAM, GREENFIELD AND CO.

Wheat is very saleable, and one or two large transactions have taken place at prices ranging from 4s. 6d. to 4s. 8d. The action of the Railway Department, however, of raising rates 150 per cent. on grain, flour, and other produce on the Maryborough to Ballarat line will have a very prejudicial effect on the market for the sime being. Oats are in fair supply at late rates; prices range from 3s. 10d. to 4s. 1d. Barley, Cape and English, are both wanted; Cape at 3s. 10d. to 4s.; English, 5s. to 5s. 2d. Hay-The supply has slightly fallen off, and prices remain about the same; manger, £45s. to £415s.; sheaves, £2 15s. to £3; straw, wheaten, 22s. 6d. to 27s. 6d.; oaten, 30s. to 40s. Potatoes are less plentiful, and the market has slightly recovered, prices ranging from £2 10s. to £3, quality being variable.

### ARARAT PRODUCE MARKET.

No change has occurred in the price of wheat and oats since the date of our last report; the same prospects still obtain and the demand does not appear to have increased. There is no distinct change in the figures given for flour, but the tendency is upward, though we have not heard of large parcels being offered at quotations. Potatoes are plentiful; hams and bacon, and fresh and potted butter are scarce. We quote as under :-- Wheat, 4s. to 4s. 3d. per bushel oats, 4s. to 4s. 3d. per bushel; pollard, 1s. 3d. per bushel; bran, 1s. 2d. per bushel; barley, none; flour, L10 15s. to L11 per ton; potatoes, L4 per ton; fresh butter, 1s. 3d. per lb.; potted do., Is. per lb.; cheese, 7d. to 8d. per lb.; hams, 3d. to 10d. per lb.; bacon, 9d. to 10d. per lb.; eggs, 1s. 2d. per dozen; hay, L4 to L4 10s. per ton; chaff, 4s. 6d. to 5s. per cwt.—"Advertiser."

### BALLARAT LIVE STOCK MARKET.

Tilley, Ondit, bullocks from £8 to £10; cows at £7; 6 head for firmers at market rates. Fat Sheep-30 merinc wethers, extra weights and 7s.; 332 cross-bred wethers for Mr. H. Dobson, Burrumbeet, to 13s. 3d., averaging 11s. 3d.; 300 merino wethers for Mr. T. O. Crichton, Ascot, at 10s. 6d .; 1000 merino wethers and ewes F. O. Robertson, Burnside station, at 7s. and 5s. respectively; 359 wethers and ewes for various owners, at from 5s. to 9s. 9d. Fat Lambs-112 for Messrs. A. Taylor and J. Forrest, at from 4s. 7d to 9s. Store Stock-We have, during the past week, placed several lots of sheep under offer; also one or two small lots of cattle, and anticipate reporting business in our next. There is still a good demand for 4 and 6-tooth wethers, and also for young ewes in lamb, but not many good sheep are in the market at present. Horses-We yarded about 60 head on Saturday, chiefly well-bred horses. There was a large attendance of buyers, including some for the Indian market, and prices ruled very satisfactory throughout, one well-bred weight-carrying hack of Mr. Chalk's selling to £45.

The following rebuke and threatened action by a judge at home may supply a useful hint for adoption here:—The "York Herald" says that Mr. Justice Denham startled assize-court blackguardism, at Warwick, by an outburst of judicial indignation. Suppressed tittering reached his ear from the gallery whilst a witness was reluctantly speaking indelicate language, his lordship exclaimed in a tone of a Christian country? Having threatened to have one man arrested who had been laughing at every indelicate expression, his lordship added, "Let us have decency in courts of justice. One does not come to be amused by filth which one is obliged to extract on cases that disgrace the country.".

Some time ago (says the "Telegraph") the Minister of Lands, under certain conditions, vested the control of Lake Burrumbeet, near Ballarat, and the surrounding reserve, under the control of the Ballarat and Riponshire Councils. Yesterday Mr. Baird, representing the Ballaratshire Council, and Mr. Tompkins. on behalf of the Ripon local body, applied to Mr. Casey for permission to lease the lake to a gentleman for ten years, who would during that period stock it with fish. They remarked that at present there were no fish beyond a few cod in the lake, and if the concession were granted, the lake in ten years would not only be a source of great sport to the inhabitants of the district, but would supply the district with fish. They further observed that the interests of the public would be observed in regard to the land surrounding the lake, the terms of the lease being most stringent. Mr. Casey said that a matter of such importance should not be hastily dealt with, and that he would well weigh the application before arriving at a decision.

The City Coroner, Dr. Youl, has an aversion to colonial beer, and at the inquest held on the body of Mr. Jenkins, he stated that it was sure to poison those who drank it. The Engineer reported as follows:-I have the honor to report that having examined the pieces of road referred to in the memorial from the inhabitants of Sailor's Gully, I beg to state that the piece of road between Patterson's and Springthorpe's requires clearing and forming, and a crossing constructed through the creek. The sideling ground at the foot of the range is very slippery and bad to travel over, especially in the winter, and requires cutting down and gravelling. The embankment that you are asked to fence on the dividing range between Sailor's Gully and Beaufort, would admit only of a very narrow roadway, if a fence is erected on both sides. The Reform Company, Snake Valley, have not impaired the road, under which they had permission to mine. I, therefore, recommend their sureties be relieved of further responsibility With respect to the injury sustained by Mr. Hugh Arthur, through Contractor Ercole taking stone from land rented by him, I believe, that, as Mr. Arthur is renting the land, he can only The fences have been made good, and the injury to the grass would not amount to half-an-acre In reference to Mr. Sutherland's claim for £10 damages for stone being removed from his land by the same contractor, I find that stones have been taken in small patches from several parts of the paddock by previous contractors, and in the present instance they have been got in several places, and in some instances, from the sides of the holes previously made. It is, therefore, very difficult to form an estimate of the quantity of land disturbed, but I should think that all that Ercole has interfered with would not exceed a few perches. In reference to Mr. Prince's request that some work should be done in Raglan beg to state that the improvements suggested would be of considerable advantage to the township. Cr. Beggs and your Engineer visited the piece of road that Mr. Maulchaey and others petitioned to have made, and we find that to make the road passable in winter it should be formed, and a metalled crossing made, and about half-a-mile of deep drains cut; the cost of which would probably be from £30 to £40.

better late than never is the maxim. During the past month complaints have reached us through different up country newspapers of the scarcity of water, yet on Stockyard Hill we have scarcely felt the want. Lake Goldsmith has held its own in defiance of the dry summer, and now that perch have, I have been informed placed in i', we may look forward in a year or two to have some sport.

I have heard of several emus having been seen in the ranges between Stockyard Hill and Beaufort, one having been killed measuring 7 feet 6 inches from toes to beak, no doubt these birds have been driven south for want of water, and as they have not been seen in this district for years, we can form an idea of the state of the country north, there is not the slightest doubt, but those parties who are selling out and going up country after land will be glad to return again, and when it does occur they will have to pay enormous rents for farms, purchase will be out of the question when the land once

passes out of their hands. The recent rains have clothed the face of the earth with luxuriant grass, especially where the late fires were, or where the ground has not been broken up, the kangaroo grass has sprung up quite green and fresh looking.

There is no doubt but that the action taken by the Riponshire Council in converting Lake Goldsmith into a common, will be one of the finest schemes thought of, as at the present time the lake is overrun with horses and cattle to such an extent that they are, I may say starving, not only that, but whenever they set their longing eyes on anything of a green appearance, fences will not keep them out, such a state would not exist if the farmers had to pay commonage fees. Most of the owners of cattle at present running on the lake have plenty of grass in their paddocks, but so long as their cattle don't die on the lake they would not think

I am sorry to find by "Sentinel's" last letter in your journal, that he intends leaving the district, I believe that, whoever he is, he has exerted all his energies while in the district for the good of that community, and I may say that his letters have always given me the greatest pleasure to read, as I could always find food for thought and study in each of them. # Wreck of the s. s. Gothenburg.

117 PASSENGERS AND CREW MISSING.

Brisbane, Wednesday. The steamer Leichardt, which has arrived from Cooktown, reports that at daylight last Thursday she picked up a boat containing four men, which had been washed away from the steamer Gothenburg, which struck on the previous evening on the Barrier reef, southwest of Flinders Passage, during a heavy gale, accompanied by lightning and blinding rain. The Gothenburg, which was from Port Darwin, had on board eighty-five passengers, a crew of thirty six, and 3000 oz. of gold on freight. The vessel was wrecked in lat. 108° 17' 30" and long. 148° 40', The Leichardt sent a boat to the wreck, and found not a soul left. There was a lady's plaid shawl, a comforter, and a mattress hanging to the yard-arm. According to the Philadelphia correspondent of the "New York Graphic," there is now in course of construction in that city a machine, which, if the claims of its inventor, John W. Keeley, prove to be within the bounds of its capabilities, will awaken the interest of every civilised creature upon the globe, and mark a epoch in human progress. It has been connearly fourteen years of repeated trial and failure. This machine is nothing less than a contrivance for the application of an alleged new motion-a new principle of motive power as far superior to steam as steam was superior to wind and water power. A number of gentlemen in Philadelphia and in Worcester have contributed money to further the construction of the machine, and in New York John C. Cisco, Israel Corse,-Hatch, of the firm of Fisk and Hatch, and others, are said to have advanced considerable sums of money on condition of receiving the exclusive right to dispose of the machine in certain prescribed territories. The new apparatus is in the house of the inventor, John W. Keeley, No. 1810, Master-street. It is so nearly completed to his satisfaction that a model for deposit in the Patent Office at Washington has been begun, and will soon be finished. But the most marvellous statement is yet to be made. Mr. Keely claims that in the machine now at his residence he has developed the enormous pressure of seven thousand pounds to the square inch. When it is remembered that steam boilers are only subjected to a strain of from thirty to perhaps two hundred pounds per square inch, according to the purposes for which they are constructed, a proper sense of this leap upwards to seven thousand pounds will be realised. Mr. Keely asserts that with only two gallons of water he would be able to draw a train of cars from Philadelphia o San Francisco and back again. The water, it is stated by a friend of Mr. Keely, would be used over and over, something as steam utilised in a condensing engine. Incredible as this claim is, the inventor further declares that he obtains this vast power without the use of fuel, without the use of chemicals of any kind, and without the use of electricity or magnetic currents. On the 10th instant a test of the apparatus in its unfinished state was made in the presence of ten gentlemen; among them were experts, necessarily among the personal friends of the inventor. These three gentlemen were Wn H. Rutherford, chief engineer in the United States Navy, J. Snowden Bell, a mechanical engineer, and an associate in the office of Charles B. Collier, on Chesnut and Seventh-Streets, who is Mr. Keeley's attorney, em ployed to take out the necessary patents and a Mr. Boechtel, a metal worker, who i a friend and neighbor of inventor, Mr. Collier, last Friday evening, finished writing a report of the test, to which all three attached their names. This document was intended it is said, exclusively for the satisfaction o those persons who were pecuniarly interested, and was jealously withheld from the inspection of all others, in order not to awaken the attention of mechanics and others in this country or elsewhere, who might make an improper use of any knowledge they might gain. It was feared, for example, that in England, where an introducer of a new contrivance may obtain a patent, some general claim might be filed that would entril a lawsuit or other difficulties unforescen. All who were present are very reticent as to what took place, but all claim to be perfectly well assured by what they saw of the succesof the discovery. Careful inquiry made in the various quarters elicited certain interesting information that may be relied on, as far as it goes. It is claimed that no one knows the principle upon which the machine has been constructed except Mr. Keeley. It was placed in a shed in the yard, the entrance to which was closed by a door strongly made and securely locked. Its shape was not revealed, but it was capable of holding about 14 gallons of water. Reports in Philadelphia represent it to be spherical in its general contour. The inventor in order to show that there were no chemicals in the water to be used, and that none had been enclosed in the machine, drew water from a hydrant near by, from which he himself first and afterwards all the others, drank freely. Some of his hydrant water was put into the machine and shaken up. It was then allowed to drain out through a cock at the bottom; where glasses were again filled and again drunk. The water had not been changed in taste by its passage through the compartments of the apparatus. Then Mr. Keeley poured in a quantity of water from the hydrant and closed up the opening. "Instantaneously." to use the words of those present, "there was developed a pressure of

the machine dangerous, as liable to explode but the answer made is that a much higher pressure may be put upon the wall of a small vessel than on those of a large one, and that only a small machine will be necessary in most cases, owing to the great vigor of the new motor. Besides this the absence of a large boiler and accompanying coalbins will allow the walls of the new machine to be, made of any desired thickness and still give structed at considerable expense, and after it the advantage of lightness and convenience over its clumsier rival now in use. The Garden.-Warch.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Cabbage, cauliflower, lettuce, spinach, and turnips should be sown Early potatoes may be planted largely. Celery and leeks to be transplanted into renches. Dig up any vacant ground, in eadiness for autumn cropping; the soil is pulverised and sweetned by exposure to the atmosphere. Cabbage and cauliflower plants should be planted largely. If dry, water as last month.

FLOWER GARDEN.-Proceed with propagation of favourite plants by layering, cuttings, or otherwise. Plant'at the end of the month t few hyacinths, tulips, anemones, ranunculi, and narciss, for early blooming. Sow stocks. larkspur, mignonette, &c. Take care that camelias, azaleas, rhododendrons, and the like plants, de not suffer from want of water. Climbers must be regulated, the strongergrowing kinds cut back, and others neatlytied up. All decayed flower stems or leaves to be removed; walks to be kept neat and orderly.

FARM.—The plough will be in active use his month, unless the weather is very unavourable. Sow turnips for sheep-alse sats. Cane barley, rye, and tares, for green ced. Continue the use of the horse-hor mongst drilled crops. Look to your manure reap, collect everything that is convertible nto manure, and, when thoroughly rotted, art on to your land.

He says, if taken in excess, colonial beer is poisonous, and liable from the materials with which it is made, to generate fusil oil and escetic acid; and, forthwith, a number of these gentlemen rush into print shewing that their ale contains no deleterious ingredients, that it is manufactured from the best materials, and is the most healthy beverage in existence. Does it not look as if "the cap fitted" them a so. So far from censuring the Doctor, it appears to me they ought to thank him for enabling them to bring themselves so prominently before the public. Talking of beverages, I heard a rather good story of Dr. Bleasdale. As every one knows, the learned and Reverend Doctor is a great authority on wines, etc., and at a conversation, at which he was present, it was stated that he (the Doctor) if blind-folded could not distinguish what wine he was tasting. He denied this, and agreed to try the experiment. First one was given, and then another, and so on in every case the correct answer being returned. At last some one handed him a glass of water. Sipping at it, he hesitated, then sipping again said he had never before met with a wine of that character, and considered it very insipid.

To one ignorant of the workings of thejudicial mind as represented by the Sandridge magistrates, it is inconceivable why Mr. Goldspink should have been so heavily fined for horsewhipping a lawyer's clerk, who sent him a threatening letter avowedly to extort money, and followed up that letter by attempting to carry out his threats. The question now is, who among the residents of this district, whose social position gives them the influence to act with effect, will take this important matter in hand, and have prepared a proper representation of the claims of Beautort, ready for presentation when Mr. Smythe is making his journey in this district? In the course of these letters I have more than once called upon the men of this town to take active measures in matters that I conceived to be of importance to the district; and these appeals have in some cases been refused on the ground of needlessness. A refusal to act in the present case on the ground of such a plea, cannot possibly hold good in the mind of any right thinking man; and anyone having the Wangler's Hotel, Sailor's Gully, power conferred by social position to act, and witholds his assistance, refuses to perform a duty that by all the received and acknowledged rules of social life, may fairly be expected of him. The question may seem at first to be one of importance; but on a nearer inspection this will be found not to be the case. Let those who take this important public business in hand, draw uside from such opposition if met with, as would be done from any other pest, and proceed with that steadiness, firmness, and determination that is the principle element and source of all successes.



Garibaldi has written to his son Menotti, reiterating his refusal to accept the national grant voted by the Italian Chamber. He has also refused to accept a present from some English friends.

Mr. Thomas Faed, R.A., has just been elected honorary member of the Vienna Royal Academy, and his election has been approved by the Emperor of Austria.

The Rev. A. Newdigate, vicar of Kirkhal lam, Derbyshire, has signified in a letter to the Vicar of Ilkeston his determination to relinquish his living, and to join the Church of Rome.

The first two of the 38-ton guns issued to the Royal Navy for service were shipped at the Royal Arsenal, Woolwich, on board the steamship Lord Panmure, for conveyance to Portsmouth, whence they will be transferred to the turret ship Thunderer.

Messes. Bass and Co., according to their annual custom, have distributed the following presents among their Burton employés, numbering about 2,700 clerks, managers, men, and boys :- 20,500lb. of beef, 100 turkeys, 250 geese, 20 couples of ducks and fowls, 20 brace of pheasants, and 20 hares.

Don Carlos has written letters to Lord Beaumont and Mr. John de Havilland, ap pointing the former his Charged' Affaires in Great Britain, with authority to constitute committee; and the latter Brigadier-general in the Carlist army, and his military representative in England.

Severe gales and floods have lately caused great damage at the Cape of Good Hope. Nine vessels are known to have been wrecked on the coast, and the injury done to public works, besides that sustained by private property on land, will involve a loss of

£350,000. The Grand Duke Nicholas Constantnovitsch has left for the Imperial Palace of Orianda, in the Crimea, accompanied by Dr. Tehechoff. His disease, which is softening of the brain, is stated to have shown itself during the Khiva campaign, in which the Grand Duke took part.

The Boulogue correspondent of the "Times" writes :- "The Prefect of the Pas-de-Calais has issued an arrete empowering M. Michel Chevalier, his colleagues and agents, to take possession of any lands in the commune of Ferques and three adjoining communes which they may require for carrying out works in connection with the projected Channel tunnel. The arrete further provides that any claims for indemnity which cannot be amicably settled between the owners of property and the company's agents shall be referred to the Conseil de Prefecture for arbitration."

M. Ledru Rollin was buried on Monday at Pere la Chase, and the funeral was attended by an enormous crowd, estimated, according to some authorities, at 50,000 people, including many workmen. All the deputies of the Left and Extreme Left were present, but there was no military escort or official deputation from the Assembly on account of its being a civil burial. Only one speech was delivered over the grave, but there were repeated shouts of "Long live the Republic! Long live Universal Suffrage!" The police did not allow the procession to pass through the streets of Paris, and no remarkable incident is reported.

A terrible story of a maniacziś reported from Charente Inferieure. Last week the police of Gernozac were informed that a madman had shut himself up in a fonely house, from whence he fired upon the passers by. The brigadier, accompanied by two gendarmes, went out at once to arrest him. They found the madman by his door, armed with a doublebarrelled gun. He warned them that if they approached he would fire, and did so, breaking the brigadier's wrist, and blinding one of his men. The other, supposing him now disarmed, sprang forward and received a revolver bullet in the heart. Summoned by telegraph, all the magistrates of the neighborhood arrived, with the captain of gendarmes, and a large force of policemen. All day the siege lasted. Shut up in his house, the madman dared any to approach, firing at the lest movement. At last the magistrates ordered fire to be put to the house. It was done, but the poor maniac would not yield. He was burnt

To many a household Christmas-day must come round in the years of the future as an anniversary associated with the loss by death of friends

or relatives, or the lingering tortures mutilated persons, and shattered health of those not killed outright. Thirty-seven per sons have been killed, twenty-two danger ously injured (of whom six will not probably recover), 131 have been more or less seriously hurt, and about 140 have been badly bruised cut, and shaken from causes beyond their own control. There have been thirty-four "accidents," of which no fewer than twenty three were cillisions. Four collisions were due to the breaking of coupling chains and the trains running down inclines without the the engine. And of the twenty-three col lisions no less than eight were caused dis tinctly by the custom of shunting when a train is due. The railway companies have had their time of grace, and we are promised in some respects at least a new regime for 1875. A trial which has just taken place in the riminal court of the Dardanelles shows that the belief in witchcraft still exists very generally in the East. Five individuals of Avios-Strati, singled out from amongst the primates of the island, have been tried for cruelty to witches, and the case was clearly proved. The defence set up was that the people of Ayios-Strati had been worked up to apitch of uncontrollable fury by the preaching of a fanatical caloyer, and that they would infallibly have killed the woman whom the priest denounced as having caused the des ruction of their crops. The accused pleaded that as the island contains neither a military nor a police force, they, in conjuction with the Turkish mudir, interfered to save the lives of the supposed witches. This could only be done by promising to inflict severe punishments on the objects of the public in dignation. The above explanation was accepted as an extenuating plea, and the primates were sentenced to only six months' imprisonment. The Turkish mudir, who was equally culpable, has not even been called before the court, and the fines arbitrarily imposed on the husbands of the witches have not been refunded. Some of the leading citizens of Scrauton have received threatening letters, roughly illustrated with pen and ink sketches of coffins, death's head and cross-bones, &c. No complaints are ever entered, and the authorities never make

The Garden.—March.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Cabbage, cauliflower, ettuce, spinach, and turnips should be sown. Early potatoes may be planted largely. Celery and leeks to be transplanted into trenches. Dig up any vacant ground, in readiness for autumn cropping; the soil is pulverised and sweetned by exposure to the atmosphere. Cabbage and cauliflower plants should be planted largely. If dry, water as last month.

FLOWER GARDEN .- Proceed with propagation of favourite plants by layering, cuttings, or otherwise. Plant at the end of the month a few hyacinths, tulips, anemones, ranunculi, and narciss, for early blooming. Sow stocks, larkspur, mignonette, &c. Take care that Billions Complaints Blotches on the Skin camelias, azaleas, rhododendrons, and the like plants, de not suffer from want of water. Climbers must be regulated, the strongergrowing kinds cut back, and others neatly tied up. All decayed flower stems or leaves to be removed; walks to be kept neat and

FARM.—The plough will be in active use this month, unless the weather is very unfavourable. Sow turnips for sheep-also oats, Cape barley, rye, and tares, for green feed. Continue the use of the horse-hoe amongst drilled crops. Look to your manure heap, collect everything that is convertible into manure, and, when thoroughly rotted, cart on to your land.
