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

EXTRAORDINARY OUTRAGE BY A BLACKFELLOW.

An extraordinary case of bailing up occured (says the "Ararat Advertiser") at Lexington Station on Wednesday night, when the whole establishment was kept in a state of terror for over three hours, by the attacks of a mad aboriginal known as "Dick." The blackfellow came to the house about five o'clock on Wednesday afternoon, and had an abundant supper given to him by direction of Mr. Bowe, who, with Mrs. Bowe and the female servants, were the only persons in the ferers. THE NEW LAND-TAX BILL.

The "Age" gives the following description of this measure: - "The Government have would arouse public indignation. decided upon having independent valuators, and not relying in any degree whatever upon their officers, or those of the various shire councils. The land will in the first place be assessed by a class of persons to be termed promising to accept suggestions for reforms. classifiers, and their decisions will be reviewed by three officers to be termed land tax commissioners. Powers are conferred upon the classifiers to enter lands and put questions as to grazing capabilities, and penalties are imposed upon persons 'who refuse or neglect to sented, including one from Sandhurst by Sir answer such questions, or knowingly answer John O'Shanassy, and one from Talbot by Mr. the same untilly.' Land capable of carrying Richardson. two sheep or more to the acre must be returned as worth L4 per acre; land capable of carrying three sheep to two acres L3 per acre; land capable of carrying one sheep to the acre, L2 per acre; and not capable of carrying a sheep to the acre as L1 per acre. The commissioners have the right to order a fresh classification of land if it shall appear to them to have been rated too low, and the landowners are permitted to appeal when the assessment is too high. Judicial powers are given to the commissioners and to the registrar of the land tax, and they have the power of levying fines, and awarding cost against frivolous, and groundless appeals, and imprisonment in default of payment. The machinery by which the valuations are to be made, the appeals determined, and the general functions of the commissioners, are similar to those of the income-tax officials in Great Britain, and the land-tax supervisions in the United States of America, and they seem well calculated to do the work efficiently. A list is to be compiled, comprising the name of every owner of a landed estate in Victoria, and any person whose name is on this roll will be liable for payment of the land-tax until he has been removed, after proving to the registrar that he is no longer the owner of the land in virtue of which his name was placed upon the roll. There are provisions by which, in default of the registrar removing him, application may be made to the Supreme Court. Unpaid land-tax may be recovered by distraint from both owner and occupier; but, if from the latter, he can recoup himself by deducting the amount from his rent. In the event of there being no property to distrain upon the land may be either sold outright or let for a term of years, and the proceeds of such sale or lease may be applied to the payment of the land-tax and costs."

PARLIAMENTARY INTELLIGENCE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

LONDON, 24th August. The latest Russian official despatches say that all attacks on Schipka Pass have been repulsed.

The Russians maintained their position, and have been reinforced. Fighting was continued with enormous losses on the side of the Turks, while the loss of the Russians was relatively slight. Many officers were killed. A Russian unofficial despatch says that a victory was gained at Selvi.

A Turkish unofficial despatch states that Mehemet Ali Pasha gained a brilliant victory at Eski Shuma. Mehemet Ali Pasha has been repulsed with

fourteen battallions at Eski Shuma. A Russian official despatch says there was desperate fighting at Schipka on the 23rd. The battle was continuous for 13 hours, during which time the Russians maintained their

ground. The losses were heavy. Sulieman Pasha telegraphs that on the 21st he scaled the heights, and fought for fourteen hours, and retained the conquered positions. He attacked the entrenchments, but was unsuccessful. He however hopes to succeed.

GRAND NORTH-WESTERN CANAL.

A meeting of the Ballarat shareholders in the Grand North-Western Canal Company was held on Monday night, at the Provincial hotel, the Hon. J. B. Humffray in the chair; the business being to receive the secretary's progress report. Mr. Hugh M'Coll reported the result of his late interviews with the Government, which had at last consented to advertise the company's right to survey. By the use of water from this race, for which he paid £1 per annum, he estimated his land to be equal in point of production to five times the extent of ordinary land, and he could raise three crops of maize, hay, &c., in the year. Fifty onions grown in his ground had weighed 52lb., and from four-year-old trees he had taken apples weighing a pound each. The advantages of irrigation, Mr. Ells said, had been first prominently brought under his notice in Califormia, on the banks of the Sacramento river. In reference to the drought in Riverina, Mr. Clapperton, who is well acquainted with that part of the country, stated that 130 bales of wool had been pulled off dead sheep on one station. The want of grass and water was fearful, and he had been credibly informed that if rain did not come soon there would not be a living sheep along the Luchlan and Murrumbidgee. Ninety per cent. of all the working bullocks in that district had perished, and £12 per ton had been paid for twenty miles of freight. The myall trees, Mr. Clapperton said, were in many places being cut down for food. The effect a grand system of irrigation would have upon this state of things was conversation on the company's projects, Mr. Clapperton moved a vote of thanks to Mr. M'Coll, which was seconded by Mr. M'Nee, and carried unanimously, both the mover and chairman speaking in complimentary terms of the energetic secretary. The railway bill has, the last week or two, had a most sethe direct line to Oakleigh, and the Goulbourn Valley line, will inevitably be condemned. The evidence that has been given at the bar of the House in reference to these lines, goes to substantiate the rather extraordinary fact, that, in bringing them forward the Government have not only ignored all the professional advice in the Railway Department, but have positively acted in direct opposition to it. In the Goulbourn Valley line, particularly, the fact that political influence and favoritism have been the means of changing the route from the west to the east side of the river, is manifest to an extent that makes it impossible of denial; and such a fact as this, parent to all political parties, will certainly not add to the well carned reputation of the present political head of the Railway Department. Mr. Berry has been equally unfortunate in his proposal to remove duties from articles of luxury, such as gloves &c., and place an import tax of 9d. per head on sheep and 2s. 6d. on cattle. As a proof of the utter incapacity of Mr. Berry to see what the ultimate result of a measure may be, the shallowness, in fact, of his powers of perception, it may be quoted that he has remarked, that, "this tax cannot effect the consumer, as when the average weight of sheep is taken into consideration, it will be found that it will not amount to a quarter of a farthing a pound." But there are a few little facts in connection with a question of this sort that do not appear to present themselves to a mind of the Berry stamp. USING DYNAMITE ON THE FARM. Dynamite consists of an explosive material more efficient than powder or nitro-glycerine, Some dynamite was employed to raise stumps from their position and hold in the earth. A quantity of earth was removed from the side of a stump and a hole driven below the stump with a crowbar. Into this hole a cartridge of dynamite was pressed by means of a wooden rainrod; then a detonation percussion cap, with a Blackford's fuse attached, was squeezed into a small cartridge or primer of dynamite, and inserted into the hole in contact with the charge. The hole was filled up with loose earth, about a foot length of the fuse being left bare. A match was next applied to the fuse and a sufficient time was taken for the powder to reach the percussion cap, to allow the operators to retire to a safe distance. The Paris correspondent of the "S. M. Herald" writes:—A curious wager has just commenced. "Oh!" replied the latter, "why, of course it began on the 1st January, 1800." 

From Secretary of Lands, writing as follows re protest and statements forwarded to the department against scale of fees for depasturing sheep on the common:—I have the honor to inform the managers of the Beaufort, Raglan, Charlton, and Eurambeen, United Gold Field and Farmers' Common, that Messrs. W. Smith, T. Wilson, S. Chapman, and other butchers, at Beaufort, have forwarded to this office a protest against the scale of fees in clause 3 of the regulations for depasturing sheep on that common as being exorbitant, oppressive and unjust, and they request that such fees be revoked, and the amount fixed at 1s. 4d. per head as previously. The petitioners submit that if the fées be allowed to remain as at present, they will be justified in combining for the purpose of raising the price of meat, and thereby causing the fees to come out of the pockets of the general public. The petitioners, while of the opinion that a high charge should be made for sheep grazing on the common for other than slaughtering purposes, urge that a charge of Ss. per head is tantamount to prohibiting them from using the common. It will be seen from the foregoing, that, consequently, payment of members of Parliament can only be constitutionally carried out by making it the law of the land by a separate Bill, to be submitted to the Council in the usual way, giving them an opportunity of discussing the merits before passing, the same as any other new law. This course, however, it is generally thought, the Government will consider too risky for adoption, determined, as they seem to be, to secure payment for their needy followers.

It is but repeating an old apharism to say that for a Ministry to have what is sometimes called an overwhelming majority, is certainly not tantamount in all cases to an unmixed blessing to them; as experience shows that a time is almost sure to arrive when it becomes unmanageable, and then the "overwhelming" majority simply serves to overwhelm themselves. That which in all probability is a sort of first distant underground rumble of a split up in the great "liberal" party, occurred but last week during the debate on the Land Tax Bill. After some characteristic oratory from Mr. Muuro, Mr. Andrew the member for West Melbourne, said that :- "The country would never have been roused by the Berry tax now before the House; what stirred the country was the cry for a progressive taxa tax to make the holding of the large estates unprofitable—not a tax which was regarded with more favor by the Opposition than by the Ministerial members." AMERICAN SUMMARY. San Francisco, 15th August. The principle topic of the month is the railroad strike in the Eastern and Western states. All along the great lines of railroad the workmen, engineers, and conductors struck work on account of a second reduction of 10 per cent. having been made in their wages; and in addition to refusing to work themselves, prevented by violence the usual railroad traffic. They allowed the passenger and mail trains to proceed, but no freight trains were suffered to move, and the whole business of the interior came to a standstill. Troops were called out; in some instances they sympathised with the rioters, and generally, when they came in conflict with the mob were driven back. The Philadelphia militia, sent to Pittsburg against the strikers, were very roughly handled. Their quarters in the locomotive round-house of the Pennsylvania Central were set on fire, and several were killed in escaping from the burning building. Pittsburg's liabilities for damage committed during the strike will foot-up some 10,000,000dol. So far as the railroads are concerned, comparative quiet has been restored and business resumed, but the miners of Pennsylvania are now making a reign of terror in that state. An attempt was made

ARRIVAL OF THE ENGLISH MAIL.

INDIA AND THE EAST. Ceylon, 24th August.

The persistent famine in Southern India absorbs attention, and the people are expected to be dependent on imported food until January. Rice for export is getting scarce, and in Calcutta and Burmah is exhausted. All the Saigon supplies are required for China, and it will be some weeks before the new crops in Northern India are available. In Ceylon a bag of rice is up to 258. The Viceroy is en route for Madras. The Government do all they can, and private subscriptions will supplement the general fund.

Bishop J. Copleston has excommunicated one if not two Church missionaries. Chinese emigration to Queensland is being

encouraged, if not stopped.

GENERAL SUMMARY.

London, 3rd August .-Her Majesty is at Osborne, in good health. On the 4th ult. the Prince of Wales had a splendid reception from the Royal Artillery men at Woolwich, and on the 15th he was accompanied by the Princess when unveiling a statute of Alfred the Great at Wantage. Their Royal Highnesses are now at Goodwood. Prince Albert Victor, eldest son of the Prince of Wales, had an attack of typhoid fever, but is recovering.

Rev. Mr. Tooth on technical grounds. Mr. Bright unveiled a statute of Richard Cobden in the Bradford Exchange on the 25th. In the afternoon he attended a banquet, and in the evening a public meeting, at which he said that if Russia were not allowed to enter Constantinople it would prolong the

The German Government are laying down subterranean telegraph cables on all the principle lines, substituting them for the ordinary

wires on poles. Continental and home papers have been hoaxed by the alleged discovery, in the Lake of Geneva, of a submerged town stated to be covered with vermillion cement used by the early Gauls. It was supposed to be one of the most interesting archæological discoveries

of the age. The New Bedford, a boat ten feet long, 13 tons register, has arrived in England after a passage of forty-nine days across the Atlantic, from Chatham, Massachusetts, the occupants being the owner and his wife. The boat had to lie to several times in heavy gales.

The "Lancet" has published a protest from 920 physicians, surgeons, and general practitioners against the continuance of grocers' spirit licenses.

Mr. Gladstone has an article in this month's " Nineteenth Century," combatting the proposals for the occupation or annexation of Egypt. The ex-Premier has been visiting into the river. He has sine confessed the Plymouth, Exeter, &c.. and had an enthusiastic reception. Speaking to a crowd of several thousand persons at Mill Bay Pier, he said that the longer he lived the more he saw that it was from liberal policies that we had chiefly, and sometimes almost alone, to hope for any prosecution of public interests.



The show in every respect was, in the opinion of all the judges there, the grandest that has ever yet been held in this country. Thousands of women and children are homeless and perishing for want of shelter, medical attendance, and food. Immediate help is most surely needed. The correspondent speaks very favorably of the conduct of the Turkish regulars, but blames the Government for employing or not controlling the irregulars, who commit the worst excesses.



LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,

Wednesday, 26th September.

Mr. Cuthbert moved the second reading of the Bill to Impose a Tax upon Land. He cited figures to show that the greater portion of the general revenue of Victoria was derived from the poorer classes, not from property. The taxation paid by property in the United Kingdom, the United States, and Victoria were in proportion of 43, 41, and 18. He went on to show that land was deemed in every country, and under every circumstance, a fair and legitimate subject for taxation. In England, from 1692 to 1798, there was a land and he looked upon the system proposed under

Lords that they must not presume to interfere with bills relating to money. The present Legislative Assembly of Victoria was arrayed as one man to support the land tax proposed here, just as the Commons of England in 1692 were allied in favor of a similar tax. In England the Lords withdrew their amendments in deference to the public will, and he hoped that this Council would withdraw all opposition to the bill now under discussion, whatever objection there might be felt to the machinery of the proposed act. The hon. member then explained the various clauses of the act. The act did not propose to interfere with realised estates, or the position of mortgagees or mortgagors. The act would have no effect if it provided that the tax should be apportioned between mortgagee and mortgagor. He was prepared to hear a great deal before the debate closed about the proposed him. commissioners; but if commissioners were not appointed, who could discharge the necessary duties? The hon. member then explained the classification of lands, and said that when there was a deficiency in the revenue it was not unjust or unreasonable to tax the lands of the colony at the rate proposed, and according to the classification indicated. It was true that the commissioners were given power to commit to prison for three months, a power which magistrates and county court judges did not possess, but it should be remembered that the three commissioners had to agree before they could commit anyone to prison. The tax was arbitrary, and would deter immigrants from coming here. Enterprise would be crippled, and to be thrifty would be considered a crime. The tax would corrupt the people, but few would be affected by it. Personally he did not care for the proposed tax. He believed only 15 members of the Legislative Council would be affected by it. He believed in the large estates, which were the great means of distributing wealth throughout the country. 
