

Their losses during the various unsuccessful assaults amounted to 30,000 men.

Chefket Pasha has successfully supplied Plevna from Orchanie.

The Russian Generals are blamed for not attacking the least-defended parts of Plevna. At the taking and re-taking of the Gravitza redoubt, General Skobeloff and his men fought with great determination and furv.

General Skobeloff thinks he might have taken the position if he had been reintorced. Since this affair the Russian tactics have been changed on the Lom.

Mr. Anderson moved that an address be presented to his Excellency the Governor respectfully intimating the desire of this House to be afforded an opportunity of considering the question of payment of members by bill, as heretofore, pointing out that the inclusion of a sum for the payment of members in the Appropriation Bill might make such a procedure the instrument of enabling one branch of the Legislature to coerce with the other, and requesting that his Excellency may therefore refuse to authorise such a procedure.

Mr. Cuthbert thought that such an important alteration had been made in his motion byjthe hon, member since he had given neti e of it, that he thought be should give further notice.

The President said that if any hon, member objected to the alteration it could not be made. Ultimately the motion was moved in its original form on the understanding that Mr. Campbell would move an amendment embodying the proposed alteration.





FRIENDLY SOCIETIES.

The fourth report of the English Royal Commission states that in England and Wales alone there are 32,000 Friendly Societies (with their branches) registered and unregistered, having a total membership of 4,000,000 of persons : and there is good reason to suppose that there are at least as many moremaking in all 8,000,000-interested in the promised benefits of the societies. Their accumulated funds amount to over L11,000,000 sterling. By other authorities the estimated numbers of the classes indirectly interested in the societies are stated to be even larger than those given in the report. The Manchester Unity comprises within itself (in England and Wales) about one-ninth of the above number of societies; and according to a recent report of that unity, its average income during the last five years has been L560,000, and its average sickness and death payments have annually amounted, during the same period, to near L400,000, whilst the estimated present value of its promised benefits was, on a recent valuation of a large proportion of the lodges of this great order, nearly L11,000,000.





insertion on the general roll, must be effected before the 1st December, 1877.

Ratepayers whose names have been omitted from the ratepayers' rolls, should take electors' rights before the above date.

Owners of freehold property of the value out of L50, or yearly value of L5, may take out electors' rights in any electoral district in which they have got such property, and, as well as the tenant, to be enrolled as voters. Persons having such freehold properties in different electoral districts may be enrolled

and entitled to vote in all of them. Residents for twelve months in the colony and three months in any district, may take out electors' rights and be enrolled as voters. Electors who have changed their place of residence, or lost their electors' rights, may

procure a transfer or substituted right. Personal application must in all cases be made to the registrar, and a shilling fee stamp provided by the applicant.

No one can vote by virtue of an elector's right unless he produce the same at the time

THE BRAINS OF CRIMINALS.

Professor Benedict, of Vienna, has lately made some interesting researches into the subject of the characteristics of the brains of criminals. He has so far examined the brains another. of sixteen criminals, all of which, on comparison with the healthy brain, he finds to be abnormal. Not only has he found that these brains deviate from the normal type and approach towards that of lower animals, but he has been able to classify them, and with them the skulls in which they were contained, in three categories. 



Before negotiating with a merchant, before engaging with a confidential clerk; before employing a barrister, a careful man makes enquiries as to their standing, their length of occupancy or residence; and, in the case of a legal adviser, both as to his legal qualifications and as to his capabilities of transacting the individual business he consults him upon. Strange to say, however, in the selection of a medical man, the sufferer frequently omits these necessary precautions, and without regard to fitness, qualification, experience, and ability for the par-ticular ailment requiring treatment, he consults the learest man, whose experience and practice, perhaps,
