















scrows being worked in perfect concert, the "continuous break" is worked by a jet of steam from the engine, through the whole length of the train, the connection between the carriages being maintained by flexible tubing, and metal couplings, admitting of the carriages being disconnected or united at will.

I mentioned a few weeks since when Mr. Berry brought forward his motion for appropriating money by the Governor signing warrants on the vote of the Assembly, that "opinions were divided as to whether he would have the courage to handle the weapon he had therein forged; or whether he would not as much fear touching it as the man would the iron he has himself made red hot."

The Eastern, or as it is popularly called, Paddy's Market will now soon be a thing of the past, and the business will shortly be transferred to Victoria-street to admit of the erection of the new market buildings that are to replace the dingy sheds that at present disfigure the east end of Bonite-street.

A number of drovers and gentlemen in charge of travelling stock petitioned the Mayor of Glen Innes, says the "Hamilton Spectator," to set apart a day of humiliation and prayer for rain. The Mayor, Mr. Edward Jones, replied as follows:—"Gentlemen, I have duly received your requisition, signed by gentlemen travelling with stock, who obtain grass in the cheapest manner possible. I decline to hold a public meeting under my auspices, on the ground that it is great presumption to ask the sublime Creator to alter His organized arrangements of what He has created, to suit the convenience, or rather profit, of squatters who have overstocked their runs.—EDWARD JONES, Mayor of Glen Innes."

PARLIAMENTARY INTELLIGENCE.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Wednesday, 6th March.

The following petitions were presented in favor of the policy of the Council during the present crisis:—From Deep Creek and Majorea, by Mr. Campbell; from Beechworth, Wahgunyah and Rutherglen, Rushworth and Bright, by Mr. Anderson; from Kyneton, by Mr. Fraser; from Alexandra and Yackandandah, by Mr. Hight; from Mortlake and Glenore, by Sir C. Slade; from Warrnambool and other districts, by Mr. Simson; from Colac and Egerton, by Mr. Jenner; from Nanaivading, by Mr. Ballour; from Geelong, by Mr. Belcher; from Inverleigh, by the same member; from Walhalla, Maffia, Snow Creek, Chiltern, Mansfield, Ronsay, Wyndham, Drouana, Bacchus Marsh, Heidelberg, Nagambie, and Murchison, by Mr. Bear; from Wedderburn and McIntyre, by Mr. Campbell; from Kangaroo Flat, by Mr. F. Robertson; against payment of members, from Belfast and Western Province and neighborhood, by Sir C. Slade.

Mr. Cutbert announced that the Governor had received a telegram acknowledging receipt of address from this House, dated 27th January.

LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

Tuesday, 5th March.

Mr. Bird asked the Minister of Mines when it was his intention to reduce the amount of business licenses on the goldfields. Major Smith replied that he intended dealing with an amended Mining Statute shortly, and the question asked by the hon. member for Grenville, as well as that tabled by the hon. member, would be included in the bill he intended introducing.

Mr. Zox asked the Chief Secretary whether it was his intention to recommend any remuneration to be awarded to the discharged civil servants in the Education and Railway Departments. Mr. Berry replied that neither of the departments referred to were under the operations of the Civil Service Act.

Mr. Langridge asked the Commissioner of Railways if ex-Ministers of the Crown, no longer members of this House, were allowed to travel on the State railways with the passes issued to them when they were members. Mr. Woods, in answer, said that he had not recalled the tickets of the gentlemen alluded to simply because he felt assured that no gentleman would use such ticket unless he were entitled to do so.

Mr. Nimmo asked the Minister of Education if it were the intention of the Government to re-engage drawing and singing masters for public schools. Major Smith replied that the Government intended re-appointing the principal singing and drawing masters until the masters belonging to the various schools were sufficiently educated in the branches of education alluded to.

Mr. Barr asked the Chief Secretary, in view of the heavy pressure upon the selectors through the drought and other causes, if it were the intention of the Government to take steps for the establishment of a national bank of issue. Mr. Berry replied that the question had occupied the attention of the Government for some time past. He thought that the question of a national bank of issue would be objectionable; but he felt disposed to submit to Parliament a scheme by which a large part of the struggling class of persons, who were seriously hampered by borrowing money at a large interest through the banks, would be relieved.

Mr. Berry moved that in accordance with section 45 of the Constitution Statute the costs, charges, and expenses incident to the collection, management, and receipts of the consolidated revenue shall, during the present financial year, and no longer, be treated as a special Appropriation; that the Treasury shall ascertain the amount of the said costs, charges, and expenses from the 1st July, 1877, to the 28th February, 1878, and that the said amount so ascertained shall be transferred in aid of the Ways and Means Acts 1877-8. In doing so, he read the section referred to. There could be no doubt that the section referred to had not been taken advantage of before this. He did think not but for exceptional circumstances it would be well for the Assembly to take the step he asked the House to take.

refuse to sign the warrants if the motion were passed. If he did so refuse, why are not in a colony possessing constitutional government, but are merely a Crown colony. If the Opposition put the interpretation on the telegram that the Governor could use his own discretion as to signing the warrants, they were nothing but a Crown colony.

Mr. Gillies combated the arguments of the Chief Secretary, and contended that no parallel existed between the present crisis and that at the time of Sir Charles Darling's government. The resolution was not a novel one. He twitted the Government with not adhering to a certain course when they had decided upon one. Some two weeks ago the Government declared their intention of paying on the resolutions passed in committee of supply, but now they changed their tactics.

Mr. Patterson submitted that the resolution was rendered necessary by the action of the Council. A clear line of demarcation was drawn between the Government and the Opposition, and it was the duty of every man to decide on which side he should vote. Sir John O'Shanassy deprecated the action of the Government in proposing a resolution under the 45th section, which had been virtually repealed.

Mr. Mackay was of opinion that the deadlock had been brought about by the Ministry themselves. He maintained that the Upper House had done perfectly right in not passing the Payment of Members Bill with the Appropriation Bill, as they had been asked to pass it under duress.

The Premier, in answering, said that the debate on the whole might have been avoided. There was no hope of the Council being influenced by it. It was still possible for them to restore either of the bills to the paper, but he had no hope that they would do so. He would propose that the House adjourn to Tuesday week instead of the 9th April.

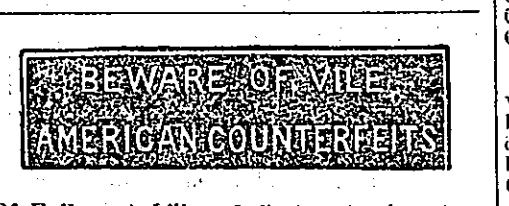

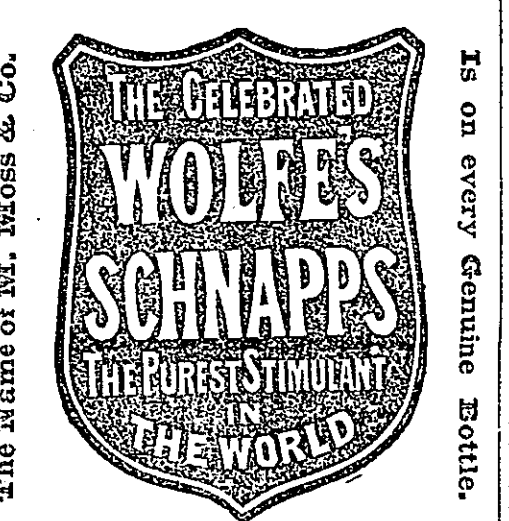

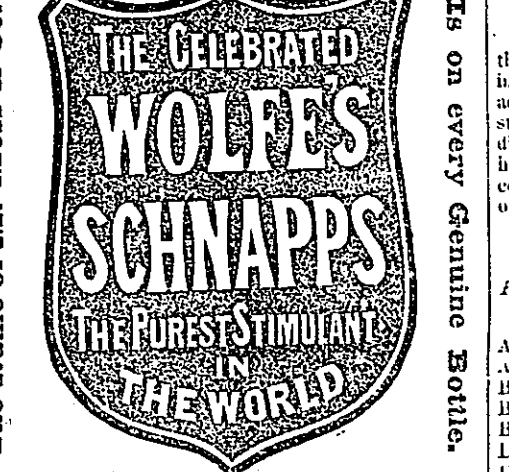
