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COMMERCIAL.

BALLARAT PRODUCE MARKET.

There was small supply of produce brought into the market on Thursday. The following are our quotations:—Oats, 3s. 3d. to 3s. 3d.; wheat, 5s. 3d.; flour, L12; Cape barley, 3s. 3d.; peas, 3s. 9d. to 4s.; mangel hay, L6; sheaves, L4 5s. to L4 10s.; wheaton, straw, L1 15s.; oatens do., L2 10s. to L2 12s.; potatoes, L5 5s. to L5 12s.; carrots, L2 10s.; bone-dust, L6 10s. to L7; rye-grass, 6s. to 7s.; bran, 1s. 3d.; pollard, 1s. 4d.

ARARAT PRODUCE MARKET.

As nearly all local wheat has now been carted in, transactions in this staple are exceedingly limited, and quotations may be regarded as merely nominal, as no parcels are changing hands. In the Wimmera district but little wheat remains in the growers' hands and prices are given at 5s 4d per bushel, whilst in the metropolitan market quotations are 6s 1d to 6s 2d, and there are no sellers of flour at under L12 10s. Locally flour is firmly held at up to L12 10s, and as stocks are light, and in view of a firm market, both at Melbourne and Ballarat, there is little prospect of an easement in values. Oats have strengthened a trifle and fair feeding samples are saleable at 2s 10d per bushel. Hay, too, owing to the fact that supplies are getting short, has risen a little and is quoted at L3 7s 6d, and L3 10s for sheaves and trussed. Potatoes have been well supplied from Ballarat, and a lot of Warramboul that came in at the end of the week sold readily at L7 per ton. In dairy produce fresh butter is plentiful at 9d to 10d. per lb, and good poted is worth from 7d to 8d. Eggs are very plentiful at 9d per dozen. We quote:—Wheat, 3s 3d; oats, 2s 8d to 2s 10d; pollard, 1s 6d; bran 1s 5d; barley, 3s 9d; maize, whole, 4s 9d; do. crushed, 5s; flour, L12 10s; potatoes, Warramboul, L7; Ballarat, L6 2s 6d; fresh butter, 10d to 11d; poted butter, 9d to 10d; lams, 10d; bacon, 8d; cheese, 6d; eggs, 9d; hay, sheaves, L3; russels, L3 5s; straw, wheaton, L1 10s; oatens, L2; chaff, 4s; onions, 18s; carrots, L3 6s; peas, 4s 3d.—Ararat Advertiser.

GEELONG STATION PRODUCE MARKET.

Messrs. GEORGE SYMOND AND Co. report the following sales:—Wool.—The London wool sales concluded on the 26th instant. The tone at the close was weak and halting, and prices show an average decline of about 2d per lb. on the closing rates of the June sales for crossbreds, good scored, and combing wools, other sorts have been sold at a depreciation in value, as compared with last year, at an average of from ten to fifteen per cent. 38,000 bales have been withdrawn and held over till the next series, the date of opening of which has not as yet been fixed. The new clip is coming to hand quickly, and as far as we can ascertain, in very good condition. We have sold a quantity of old bales and bags during the week, at fair average prices, one lot of 22 bales, scored crossbreds, sold to 13d per lb, 1sts and 2nds. The demand for all merino sorts continues good. Sheepskins.—There was a large attendance of local buyers at our sale on Tuesday, but owing to the bad news received from the home market at the closing of the London sales, operations were of a very limited nature, and bidings were most spiritless throughout. We had a large and good supply to hand, especially station skins, and bidings for these lots were better, and enabled us to clear out at fairly satisfactory prices, viz:—Crossbreds, from 24d to 42d; and merinos, from 41d to 6d; all others suffered a decline from 6d to 9d per skin. Butchers' crossbreds, we quote to 52d; merinos to 53d; lambskins to 11d. Hides.—We offered at our sale on Tuesday, a fair supply of medium class hides. There was a good attendance of local buyers, and bidings were animated throughout. We cleared out all in store at the following rates:—Medium weight hides, to 2s; best to 34d; and calf-skins to 2d. Tallow.—This market continues firm at late rates, with a good demand both for shipping and local requirements. We have disposed of our usual supply during the past week, and herewith append a list of prices obtained:—Mixed tallow, from L18 to L23; beef to L25 10s; and best mutton, to L27. Rough and rendered fat, for which there is a good demand, from 14d to 24d.

GEELONG WOOL AND STATION MARKET.

Messrs. GEORGE HAGUE AND Co., report the following sales:—Wool.—The August-September series of the London Wool Sales concluded on Friday last, with prices in favor of buyers. The tone of the market was weak throughout, and crossbred, good scored and combing wools show an average decline of about 2d per lb. on the closing rates of the June sales, while all other sorts show a fall of from 10 to 15 per cent. This is not very encouraging news to receive about the time our season commences in this colony; but we think, from the large orders that are known to be out, and the number of English, American, and Continental buyers that are on the way here, we will have good competition in our local market; and as home and foreign manufacturers are anxious to have the first pick of our colonial wools, we think prices will rule better in proportion here than they have been doing in London during the past year, and we believe it will be to the advantage of growers to accept the rates offering in the colony rather than run the risk of shipping. Shearings has now commenced in earnest, and consignments of the new clip are arriving in town daily. The samples we have already seen are well grown and in fair condition, and there is every appearance of a good clip. We have sold some lots of the new clip, which find ready buyers in our local factories, who also take freely all fellow-growers' scored parcels coming to hand:—Sheepskins.—We had a full attendance of buyers at our sale to-day, who bid with spirit for every lot. We submitted a good supply, for merino sorts the competition was exceedingly animated, while all other descriptions met with a fair demand. Hides.—We have no change to report in this market. Prime heavies are in good demand, but hides of this class are very scarce, the bulk of the supply coming to hand being light and medium sorts for which the demand is not at all brisk. Tallow.—There is still a firm market for all descriptions, and the supply at present is not at all equal to the demand.

The majority which Mr. Berry obtained on Thursday night on the second reading of the Reform Bill we do not by any means consider in the light of a victory, or an expectation that this most noxious measure will ever become law. On the contrary we draw large measures of hope of its ultimate defeat from its apparent success on the division which has been taken on the second reading. And for these reasons: It is well-known and has been clearly avowed by many Ministerial supporters that there are members voting with the Government who are opposed to many of the provisions of the bill, and they have threatened to vote against the third reading if considerable amendments are not made when the bill is in committee. Such amendments as are suggested must totally—or nearly so—destroy the radical character of the measure, and Mr. Berry, if he has any respect for himself and the consistency which should mark the statesman—after the opinions he has enunciated—must rather abandon the measure altogether than make such changes in its provisions as are suggested. And yet Mr. Berry is already trimming on the vital principles which he believes, or professes to believe, are involved in this famous measure. When tackled by Mr. Service, who in a trenchant speech denounced the bill, he intimated that the sixth clause would be so recast that it shall come into force only when an appropriation or supply bill has been rejected by the Upper House. "But," says the Chief Secretary, "a nominee Upper House I will insist on." What does Mr. Berry mean by this? Does he imagine that dust which he is scattering broadcast will reach the people's eyes, and so blind them to their own interests that they cannot see through the machinations of a man whom they did adore for his style and leader. An amendment of the sixth clause forsooth! A power which gave absolute power over finance to the majority in the Assembly, and which is to be recast so that the Council—under the mere pretence so-called—shall have control over the general distribution of finance. "I will insist," says Mr. Berry, "on a nominee Upper House," but who reading such an assertion can do otherwise than reason that Mr. Berry is doing anything else than trying to blind the devil in the dark? He knows that under his nominating system he places in the hands of the nominating power supremacy in the Government, since, though it may not be brought about just now, it must ultimately come about that the nominee Upper House will be merely the serfs of the Government of the day, or, as Mr. Service wisely remarks, "a Council of crawlers." But there is something consoling—and this is our other reason—in the contemplation of the fact that even if the third reading be carried and the bill remitted to the Upper House, it will be at once rejected, and then the country will have an opportunity of pronouncing upon it. And surely the country, in giving its opinion on this destructive measure, will speak out freely and say that the cardinal principles of the bill—the destroying of a controlling chamber, the giving to a practically irresponsible Assembly supreme control of the purse, and the establishment of that un-English *plébiscite*, the mal-pronunciation of which we may be pardoned for saying the followers of Mr. Berry so much *skite*—are detrimental to the best interests of those who have to deal with it. We have held that the Assembly supposed to express the will of the people, should have the control of the purse, and so we still hold, but at the same time we maintain that there should be some veto power if that Assembly should run riot against the best interests of the country. We never asked that the Council should have power to alter or amend money bills, but only that they should have the power of veto, and that power we think the electors of this fair land will accord them. Do we indeed desire to cut the painter and declare ourselves as evincing willingness to abandon the monarchical constitutions; the grandest institution in the world, and our mother home? To such a course will we be rapidly tending if the people of the country abandon the privileges of their national birthright and give themselves body and bones up to Mr. Berry and his bill, which, as we have said before, he never dreamed of passing and never had any desire to pass. The bill was introduced as a political quib; reform was demanded, and the existing *ette* Government did not know how to procure it, and hence Mr. Berry and his tail

in the Government brought out a measure which could only captivate the Andrews in the House and which he well knew would never mislead the reflecting portion of the community.

"Mickoy Free."—Your letter is in type, but is unavoidably held over till next week. Verily we have to go from home to learn news. Last week a Ballarat contemporary stated that Messrs. Wotherspoon's branch establishment at Waterloo was almost ready for occupation, whilst the facts are that there is not any of the timber on the ground yet wherewith to build the premises. Yesterday another Ballarat contemporary stated that there are a number of men unemployed at Beaufort owing to the scarcity of water at the woolsheds for the purpose of sheep-washing. The Messrs. Beggs, of Eurambone, cannot get the number of men necessary to commence shearing operations, and as to water being scarce we can state positively that there is enough and to spare. It was also stated in the same journal that several firemen from Ararat and Stawell were present at the first brigade demonstration on Thursday, which is purely a stretch of the imagination, as all the visiting firemen that were present were three members of the Ballarat City Brigade and one from the Ballarat.

At the invitation of the members of the Beaufort Brass Band a large number of young people, together with a few older in years, met at the Societies' Hall, on Monday night, and enjoyed a thorough pleasant evening. The object was principally to give the young people a chance of learning to trip the light fantastic, and with the aid of a few "old stagers" good progress was made. The members of the band supplied the music, and a very enjoyable evening's amusement was indulged in by those present, thanks to the consideration and forethought of a few more prominent members of the band.

The five brigade demonstration was not a financial success, a fact that is to be deplored, as the brigade are in debt, and it was hoped that the proceeds of the concert would have assisted in liquidating it instead of making the debt still larger. However, it is the intention of the brigade to get up another entertainment at an early date.

MELBOURNE.
(FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.)
Thursday.
The course of crime, like that of true love, never does run smooth. Strikingly has this been illustrated in the case of a couple of men who have this week been arrested for coining and uttering base money, and they are in duration vile, and may shortly expect to receive the due reward of their misdeeds. The counterfeit coins were cleverly executed, but the law does not fully appreciate this kind of ingenuity, and so their plant was seized, and they themselves shut up in goal. Among other things that were seized was a full "kit" of unshrinking implements, so it is clear that the men intended to take to the road had their designs not been nipped in the bud. The prevalence of crime is due to the want of employment; men must live, and if they cannot do so honestly they must do it dishonestly. We may assume that the new, or comparatively new, industry in this colony is not a very paying one, and so I suppose it will never become fully acclimatized amongst us.
The trial of the Provincial and Suburban Bank directors is slowly proceeding, but each day's trial clearly shows that if the bank had suspended operations 12 months ago it would have been better for all parties.
The hon. the Premier has been very ill, so ill in fact that fears were entertained as to whether he would ever recover. It is hoped that a little rest will make him in a fit state to attend to his duties again. The fact is his nervous system has been thoroughly upset. The political troubles of the past two years have been too much for him. Mr. Berry is getting on in years, and is not well able to stand the perpetual anxiety which is part and parcel of the premiership. Although having no sympathy for his political creed, I hope that he will soon recover and enjoy a measure of health and strength.

REUTERS TELEGRAMS.
LONDON, Oct. 8.
The death is announced of Earl Clanwilliam, G.C.B., at the age of 84.
The late Earl was an Irish peer, and sat and voted in the House of Lords under the title of Baron Clanwilliam.
Alluding to agitation in Ireland by the tenant farmers and others, Stafford Northcote, in a speech at Dublin, strongly expressed his disapproval of the movement, which he declared would be productive of no good.
The tenders for the new Tasmanian five per cent loan of £65,000 were opened to-day. The amount offered was £260,000, and the prices tendered varied from L100 to L102 1/2.
The Board of Trade returns of exports for the month of September have just been published; and they show a decided improvement on the returns of the last few months.
BERLIN, Oct. 8.
The elections for the Prussian Parliament, which are now completed, have resulted in the return of a majority of Conservative candidates.
MADRID, Oct. 7.
The Spanish Government had determined to make a strong effort to suppress the insurrection in Cuba, and the reinforcements of troops which were sent out for that purpose have been landed on that island.
VIENNA, Oct. 8.
The new session of the Legislature of Austro-Hungary has been opened by the Emperor to-day, who in his speech on the occasion congratulated the Parliament that the relations between Austro-Hungary and the other European powers are of a friendly character.

PARLIAMENTARY BUSINESS.
(Abridged from the "Argus")
The Legislative Council held a long sitting on Wednesday in committee on the bill introduced by Sir Charles Sladen to alter the constitution of the Council. The 4th clause in the bill, proposing that there should be 12 provinces in the colony, returning altogether 42 members, was, after discussion, adopted. The fifth clause, proposing eight members for the Central Province, four for the North Eastern, and three for each of the other provinces, was also agreed to, and the consideration of the succeeding clauses up to No. 16 was postponed. Clause 16, proposing the qualification of membership to be landed property of the annual value of £150, was adopted, as were also clauses 17, 18, and 19, referring to declarations to be made by members. Clause 20, which proposed to allow certain persons who had been judges, responsible Ministers, members of Parliament, heads of departments, and lawyers or medical men practising for various lengths of time named, to be eligible as members of the House, even though they had not the property qualification required of other persons, evoked a long discussion, and was eventually struck out on a division by 12 votes to 9. The next clause debated was the 24th, which fixed the qualification of freehold electors in shires at £15, and in any other municipal district at £25. An amendment was proposed to the clause by Dr. Dobson, making the ratepayers roll the basis of qualification for electors, but it was negatived without a division. Mr. Cuthbert objected to the proposal in the same clause giving selectors who had not paid for their lands the same right to vote as men who had paid for theirs, and moved as an amendment the striking out of the proposal, but at the suggestion of Sir Charles Sladen he withdrew the amendment, on the understanding that he would have an opportunity of bringing the subject forward again when the bill was recommitted.

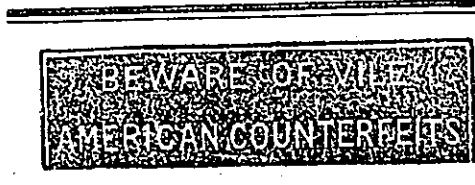

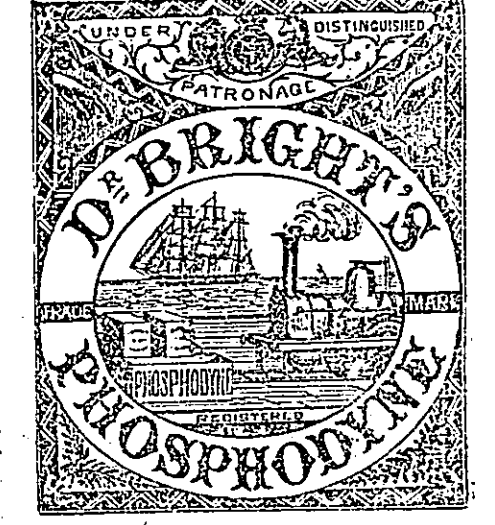

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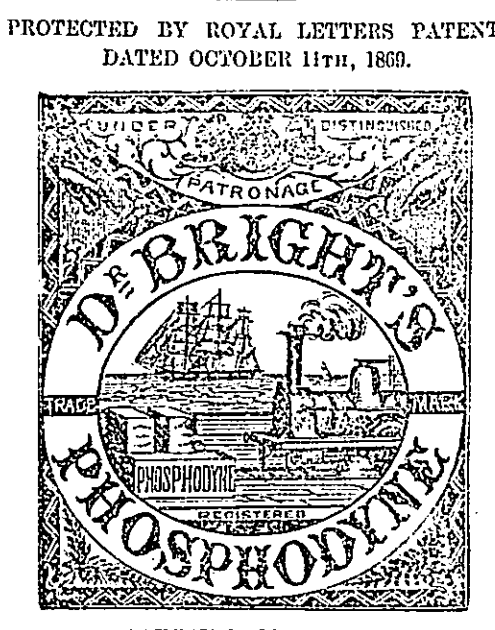

LARGE FARMING A PRECARIOUS BUSINESS.

The following figures are given by a San Francisco correspondent of a Philadelphia paper, as evidence that farming on a gigantic scale is profitable neither to the country nor to the farmer. He says:—"The largest wheat producer in California, or in the world is Dr. H. J. Glenn. He was formerly from Monroe County Missouri. He is a man of great enterprise and energy. His ranch lies in Colus County, and comprises 60,000 acres, nearly all arable land. He has this year 45,000 acres in wheat, at a low calculation, will produce 900,000 bushels. His wheat will sell for 85 cents per bushel, or 765,000 dols. Dr. Glenn has been farming ten years, and one would suppose he ought to have a handsome sum to his credit in bank; but what with a failure of crops—which occurs two years in every five—and the enormous interest he pays on his loans, he is said to owe a round million of dollars. Last year his credit was bad, so he had no crop. Now, with his splendid crop in prospect he will probably get out. The Dalrymples, of St. Paul, who ten years ago were the largest farmers of wheat in Minnesota, raising as much as 400,000 bushels in a single year, went to the wall. Another large wheat raiser is Dr. M. Reavis, whose land lies on the borders of Calusa and Butte counties. He is also from Monroe County, Missouri, and has an unpretending little estate of 15,000 acres, 13,000 of which are in wheat, which he thinks will average this year thirty bushels, or 390,000 bushels. He also is hard pressed, and I am told is paying 9 per cent. on a couple of hundred thousand dollars of borrowed money. If farmers raising half a million to a million bushels of wheat cannot get out of debt, it might be well to enquire what is the use of having so much land? The truth is that from the frequent failure of crops in California and the waste that attends on large operations of that kind, farming on a gigantic scale in this portion of the Pacific coast must be considered a failure. North of this, in Oregon and Washington territories, there is no failure of the harvest; farming operations are carried on on a smaller scale, and consequently the farmers, while not rolling in wealth, are all well to-do."

A NEW RELIGION.

A new religion has sprung up in the United States, involving tremendous issues to the entire civilized world. It seems that a Presbyterian minister named Groves recently appeared at large in Texas, proclaiming that he had visions and revelations from on high. At first he spoke "an unintelligible jargon, in which deep pits, horrid beasts that devour one another, and green-colored monkeys constituted a lively back and fore ground." The reverend gentleman soon discovered that a travesty of Ezekiel did not much impress the matter-of-fact Texans, whereupon he condescended to their weakness and spoke plainly, saying that a mighty conflict between Catholicism and Protestantism was at hand, and that Europe and the United States were the horned beasts which would eat each other up. Upon this appalling "platform" he soon made converts, among them a reverend brother named Goodnight, with whose help Mr. Groves is now preparing a declaration of principles. The declaration, according to latest reports, is much wanted, since, in the absence of its authority, the two shepherds and their flock are not free from divergent opinions—above all to the identity of Antichrist. Mr. Groves believes that the Pope is Antichrist; Mr. Goodnight sees him in Mahomet; but among the people a growing conviction obtains that he is General Grant. They even go so far as to sketch out a programme of the General's future operations in that capacity. Being elected President in 1880, he will by a coup d'etat make himself military dictator and emperor. Civil war will follow, but the General's old lack serving him, he will beat down his enemies, defy law and religion, and then lead his victorious hosts against Europe. By what means the army is to cross the Atlantic does not appear, but having crossed, thrones will crumble before it and princes wait in the anteroom of its leader. Lastly, the General will proclaim himself the Supreme Being, and then be hurled to destruction by a greater Power preparatory to the Millennium. A Trans-Atlantic journal opines from this that "there will be some fun in the world during the next ten years." Nobody seems to have suggested that General Grant, who will soon land at San Francisco, should be taken care of, on the principle that "prevention is better than cure."

MADE RICH IN A YEAR.

Lieut.-Gov. Tabor, of Colorado, is one of the newly-arisen millionaires. If a reward were offered for a man worth 3,000,000 dol. nobody would pick him out on Broadway. He was a poor Vermont boy who drifted West, and when the diggings were found, about twenty years ago, around Oro City, he moved there and kept a little store. He had no early advantage, and seemed doomed to remain for life on the summits of the Rocky Mountains with about 1000 dols. of stock under his roof. Two cobblers came along a year ago a little poorer than himself, and wanted food. He gave them what is called a "grub stake" that is, a barrel of flour and a bag of bacon, saying—"You might as well work if I am to feed you. Go dig somewhere for ore?" These two men found the Little Pittsburg Mine within a few weeks, by which one of them received 262,000 dols. another 325,000 dols. and Tabor has already had more than 1,000,000 dols. out of the property, besides being in the consolidation. He is a modest, unassuming man, who has not changed his habits in the least. The discovery, however, made him Lieutenant Governor of the State.

At the Corowa police court on Tuesday, a man named Jeffrey created a scene after a verdict in a debt case being recorded against him. Before paying the amount he told the Bench the verdict was "the biggest swindle ever perpetrated." He was immediately ordered into custody, but expressed his regret and was liberated. He then handed a cheque to the Bench in liquidation of the verdict, upon which was written, "Pay swindle or bearer." This was considered an aggravation of the previous insult, and the man was sentenced to 24 hours in the lock-up for contempt of court.

LABEL BY POSTAL CARD.

An action for damages for a libel circulated by means of a postal card was heard in the County Court on Thursday, the plaintiff being Thomas Smith Cooke, of Emerald-hill, and the defendant Henry Bradley, of Smith-street, Collingwood, tobaccoist. It appeared from the evidence that the plaintiff had owned the defendant's libel for goods sold and delivered, and that on the 19th August last, defendant sent through the post one of the ordinary postal cards with the following words upon it—"Your wife was very saucy when I called for balance of account. I wish to give you one more chance. If it is not paid by 9 a.m. on Friday I will issue summons. You will either pay or go to prison.—H. BRADLEY." These words were held to be libellous, and defendant claimed £49 damages for injuries caused by them. The defence was that the plaintiff had suffered no injury, as the card had only been seen by the post office people, and gave a verdict for plaintiff for £5 damages and 25 costs, stating that the damages were so low because the case was the first of the kind which had been heard before him, and that if any similar cases appeared in future he would give higher damages, because sending such messages was calculated to defeat the objects for which postal cards were established.

Mr. Patterson (says the "Argus") has taken a rigorous step to discourage the practice of gambling among the public servants, which has often proved so baneful to young men. He has issued a minute to the employees of the Public Works and Post and Telegraph departments, to the effect that any officer in either of those departments, who may engage in betting on horse racing or gambling transactions will not be eligible for promotion, or be considered fit to remain in the service.

GARDENING FOR OCTOBER.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—If the season has been so wet as to have retarded the sowing of all the seeds recommended last month, they should be got in as soon as a sufficiently dry bed can be got for them; but on no account attempt the sowing of seeds in mud as they will be almost sure to perish in the ground, and the seedmen be accused of vending worthless seeds. Early sorts of cabbage, cauliflowers, leeks, and onions, should be planted out, and seeds sown of carrots and parsnips, melons, cucumbers, gourds, tomatoes, vegetable marrows, &c. In dry weather keep surface open by stirring with Dutch hoe.

FLOWER GARDEN.—All the tender annuals may now be sown, as balsams, cockscombs, rhodanthes, zinnias, &c. Fill up vacancies. Prepare ground for dahlias and hollyhocks, and get a few early ones planted out. Attend to hedges and fences, as after the winter rains all the fences should be looked to and made secure.
