

BALLARAT PRODUCE MARKET.

There was a small supply of produce brought into the market on Thursday. The following are our quotations: -Oats, 3s. 2d. to 3s. 3d; wheat, 5s. ARARAT PRODUCE MARKET.

As nearly all local wheat has now been carted in, transactions in this staple are exceedingly limited, and quotations may be regarded as merely nominal, as no parcels are changing hands. In the Wimmora district but little wheat remains in the growers' hands and prices are given at 5s 4d per bushel, whilst in the metropolitan market quotations are 6s 1d to 6s 2d, and there are no sellers of flour at under L12 10s. Locally flour is firmly held at up to L12 10s, and as stocks are light, and in view of a firm market, both at Melbourne and Ballarat, there is but little prospect of an easement in values. Oats have strengthened a trifle and fair feeding samples are saleable at 2s 10d per bushel. Hay too, owing to the fact that supplies are getting short, has risen a little and is quoted at L3 7s 6d, and L3 10s for sheaves and trussed. Potatoes have been well supplied from Ballarat, and a lot of Warrnambool that came in at the end of the week sold readily at L7 per ton. In dairy produce fresh butter is plentiful at 9d to 10d, per lb, and good potted is worth from 7d to 8d. Eggs are very plenti-3d; oats, 2s Sd to 2s, 10d.; pollard, 1s. 6d.; bran 1s. 5d.; barley, 3s. 9d.; maize, whole, 4s 9d; do. crushed, 5s.; flour, L12 10s; potatoes, Warrnambool, L7; Ballarat, L6 2s 6d; to 10d.; hams, 10d.; bacon, 8d; cheese, 6d.; eggs, 9d.; hay, sheaves, L3; trussed, L3 5s.; straw, wheaten, L1 10s; oaten, L2; chaff, 4s.; onions, 18s.; carrots, L3 6s.; peas, 4s. 3d .- " Araiat Advertiser."

GEELONG STATION PRODUCE MARKET

Messes. George Synnott and Co. report the following sales :- Wool.-The London wool show an average decline of about 2d per lb. on the closing rates of the June sales for crossbreds, good scoured, and combing wools, average of from ten to tifteen per cent. 38,000 has not as yet been fixed. The new clip is sold a quantity of old bales and bags during the week, at fair average prices, one lot of 22 bales, scoured crossbreds, sold to 13d per lb., 1sts and 2nds. The demand for all merino sorts continues good. Sheepskins .- There was a large attendance of local buyers at our sale on Tuesday, but owing to the bad news received from the home market at the closing of the London sales, operations were of a very limited nature, and biddings were most spiritless throughout. We had a large and good supply to hand, especially station skius, and biddings for these lots were better, and enabled us to clear out at fairly satisfactory prices, viz: - Crossbreds, from 21d to 43d; and merinos, from 41d to 6d; all others suffered a decline from 6d to 9d per skin. Butchers' crossbreds, we quote to 52d; merinos to 53d; lambskins to 113d. Hides. -We offered at our sale on Tuesday, a fair supply of medium class hides. There was a good attendance of local buyers, and biddings were animated throughout. We cleared out all in store at the following rates :-- Medium weight hides, to 27: best to 31d; and calfskins to 2d. Tallow .- This market continues firm at late rates, with a good demand both for shipping and local requirements. We have disposed of our usual supply during the past week, and herewith append a list of prices obtained :- Mixed tallo v, from L18 to L23; beef to L25 10s; and best mutton, to L27. Rough and rendered fat, for which there is a good demand, from 11d to 21d.

There was never any kind of convulsive seizure, local paralysis, or sign of any further lesion connected with the heart disease; the pulse remained full throughout; the howels were confined. There was well-marked reflex action on touching the conjunctive; the pupils were of moderate size and active to light. No reflex action was obtained on tickling the feet and she seemed quite insensible to pricking or pinching the skin. The temperature remained normal. For three days she was fed by an elastic catheter passed through the nostrils to the pharynx-a proceeding which she made some attempt at resisting. This condition differs from catalepsy in its lifelessness; but for the performance of the organic functions, there is no muscular rigidity, the limbs when raised fall as if lifeless, and, if placed in certain attitudes, are not retained makes the hair charmingly beautiful, as well as fixed as in catalepsy. 

PARLIAMENTARY BUSINESS.

(Abridged from the "Argus")

The Legislative Council held a long sitting on Wednesday in committee on the bill introduced by Sir Charles Sladen to alter the constitution of the Council. The 4th chause in the bill, proposing that there should be 12 provinces in the colony, returning altogether 42 members, was, after discussion, adopted. The fifth clause, proposing eight members for the Central Province, four for the North Eastern, and three for each of the other previnces, was also agreed to, and the considera ion of the succeeding clauses up to No. 16 was postponed. Clause 16, proposing the qualification of membership to be landed property of the annual value of £150, was adopted, as were also clauses 17, 18, and 19, referring to declarations to be made by members. Clause 20, which proposed to allow certain persons who had been judges, responsible Ministers, members of Parliament, heads of departments, and lawyers or medical men practising for various lengths of time named, to be eligible as members of the House, even though they had not the property qualification required of other persons, evoked a long discussion, and was eventually struck out on a division by 12 votes to 9. The next clause debated was the 24th, which fixed the qualification of freehold electors in shires at £15, and in any other municipal district at £25. An amendment was proposed to the clause by Dr. Dobson, making the ratepayers roll the basis of qualification for electors, but it was negatived without a division. Mr. Cuthbert objected to the proposal in the same clause giving selectors who had not paid for their lands the same right to vote as men who had paid for theirs, and moved as an amendment the striking out of the proposal, but at the suggestion of Sir Charles Sladen he withdrew the amendment, on the understanding that he would have an opportunity of bringing the subject forward again when the bill was recommitted.

On Thursday the consideration was resumed of the 24th clause in which it was proposed that the qualification of freehold electors in shires should be a L15 rating, and in other municipalities a L25 rating. The clause was, at the suggestion of Sir Charles Sladen, altered so that the qualification of freeholders should be a L20 rating in all districts. The clause relating to leaseholders, which proposed a L30 rating in shires and a L40 rating in other mnnicipal districts, was altered, also on the suggestion of Sir Charles Sladen, to a L40 qualification in all districts. It was also agreed to alter the clause relating to the qualification of ordinary occupying tenants from L30 in shires and L40 in other municipal districts to L40 in all districts. The debate was opened on clause 39, which proposed a cumulative or distributive vote, and Dr. Hearn presented a number of new clauses to carry out Hare's system of representation, which he intended to propose as an amendment on the 39th clause. It was then agreed, after some discussion, to adjourn the debate on that clause to Tuesday next, and the House adjourned until that day.





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

The case of Lawrence was twice referred to in the Assembly on Thursday. In the first instance, in reply to Mr. Bosisto, the Chief Secretary declined to commit himself to any promise that he would appoint the professional visitors to the lunatic asylums as a board to report on the state of mind of every person charged with murder immediately after the occurrence has taken place. In such cases the Government endeavor to obtain all the skilled information available, and they will continue to do so. In reply to Mr. Richardson, Mr. Berry said that he is by no means of opinion that the country is prepared for the abolition of the death penalty in cases of murder. Mr. Berry holds, however, that juries should have more power in bringing in their verdicts than they now possess, and should be enabled to discriminate between murder of the first and second degree. At present, he says juries are apt to bring in a verdict of wilful murder, and then relieve themselves from the responsibility of their decision by recommending the prisoner to mercy, and thus the Executive is seriously embarrassed.

The Commissioner of Police for South Australia has reported in favor of the bill legalising the totalisator. He says it should be under 'be control of the stewards at races. It has hitherto not interfered with peace and order, and if properly conducted will, no doubt, be highly appreciated by the Government.

The general annual assembly of German Abstainers from Animal Food, or, as they ambitiously name themselves, "The members of the German Association for the Promotion of a Manner of Life in Harmony with Nature," met recently at Eisenach, in Thuringia. A Frankfort advocate of the system actually went so far as to propose the total abolition amongst the members, as an example to the rest of the world, of the use of animal clothing. He contended that furs, leather, and some other materials, were only obtained at the cost of the suffering of the brute creation. He produced a number of articles of clothing manufactured exclusively from the products of the vegetable and mineral kingdoms.

Its top had been broken off, probably at some remote period, and when discovered it was still 240ft, high. The body of the tree where it was broken was 12ft. in diameter, and had two limbs measuring respectively 9ft. and 10ft. in diameter. The trunk measured b low 111ft. This nocient morarch of the forest is called 'Old Moses.' after a mountain near which it stood. It is supposed to be 4,840 years old, and it is the largest tree that has ever been discovered. The section on exhibition is 75ft, in circumference, and 25ft. across. It is capable of holding 150 people in its interior. The interior, as it is now fitted up,-is arranged like a drawing-room. A carpet has been laid down; there is a piano, sofa, tables and chairs, with scenes from California hung around, and people move about quite freely."

MESSRS. GEORGE HAGUE AND CO.'S NEW WOOL STORE.

The corrugated iron building, fronting Victoria-terrace, Western Beach, and which some years since, was occupied by Messrs. C. J. Dennys and Co. as a wool store, has again been put to the same useful purpose by Messrs. Geo. Hague and Co. The firm named took possession of it only in April last, with the object of commencing business as woolbrokers, salesmen, and station produce agents. Although the time has been short, the amount of trade done by the firm since it started has been much beyond the most sanguine expectations, ard it was found necessary to make sundry improvements and additions, costing altogether a sum of £2000, and the store may no v be considered one of the best in the town, and in every way suitable for the business to which it will be confined. The building is 120ft. in length by 80ft, in breadth, and has a frontage to Victoria-terrace; and the property on which it stands extends to Smythe-street in the rear. The store is spacious, and admirably adapted for accommodating everyone connected with the wool trade, and it will recommend itself to the most fastidious of both buyers and sellers of station produce, as there is plenty of room and every requisite for properly carrying on the business. The building consists of a cellar, the whole length of the structure, a large room of similar dimensions immediately above, and then a show room above that. Communication between the cellar and the day. upper flats is obtained by means of a staircase and a hydraulic lift; the latter embraces the latest improvements, and was made by Messrs. Robinson Bros., of Melbourne, and although guaranteed to carry 30cwt., it has with ease raised a weight of two tons to the top storey. It is fitted with patent catches at the sides, so that in case of accident the lift will remain stationary. At the southern end of the floor there is one of Messrs. Humble and Nicholson's patent screw wool-presses, which is raised a couple of feet from the floor by means of a platform, and it is worked from the show room above, and from that place the press is filled with the wool, thus saving time and labor by abolishing the difficult method of filling from the sides. The show room has been elegantly painted, strict attention being paid to providing ventilation and light, the colors on the wall and ceiling being such as to prevent shadows being cast on the wool open for inspection. The cellar is well drained, and is as dry as could be wished, the only want there being an asphalt floor, but this is to be furnished without delay. The rooms are 12 feet in height from floor to ceiling, and are therefore capable of holding large quantities of station produce, and giving buyers an excellent opportunity of inspecting the stuff offered for sale. Splendid new offices have been added to the store, and a complete lavatory attached to them will recommend itself to business men. The approach to the front entrance has been carefully pitched, so that waggons and drays may be drawn up to the platform without the slightest inconvenience. The whole of the outside of the store has been painted with patent refigerating mixture, the effect of which is to temper the heat of the sun, the heat being thus reduced by 15 degrees. Messrs. Hague and Co. have succeeded in working up such an extensive business connection that it has been deemed necessary to lease the old stone store formerly occupied by Messrs. Douglass and Co., a few doors above the wool-warehouse, as a store for sheepskins, hides, tallow, etc. The new firm, we are informed, have received promises of support from woolgrowers in all parts of the Western district, and many customers have also been found in the Riverina district. Mr. G. Hague (who is acting-manager of the firm) has entered the wool business, not as a novice, but as one having an experience Saturday ... dating over 16 years, and his Colonial, Saturday ... English, and American experience in the wool trade generally will, we are assured, be of the greatest value to all concerned. It is somewhat satisfactory to know that since the establishment of the new firm a large amount of business, which was formerly done by firms in Melbourne, has been sent to Geelong. As the wool sales season commences on the 21st October, and Messrs. Hague and Co. have secured all the privileges once maintained by Messrs. Mellish and Co., of Moorabool-street, a prosperous season may be looked forward to by the new firm.-" Geelong



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

But to the stamp duties. We are not by any means disposed to cavil at such a tax, but we do think that the tax on insurance companies is decidedly excessive. No doubt it will prove the means of bringing a large sum to the revenue, but the charge is excessive, and ve trust will be modified when before the House. We are also not in favor of the provision in Section II which provides for a stamp duty on every petty account. Of course this too would be a means of revenue, but as a matter of fact would tax the poor man who pays his fortnightly or monthly bill far more than the wealthy one who can draw his cheque for hundreds, while his less fortunate fellow colonist finds a difficulty in paying cash for pounds. The imposition of a tax on the payment of money will of course fall directly on the person giving such receipt, but experience shows that the burden of all axation lies on the consumer. The man then who owes his baker, or butcher, or greeer, his bill will find himself charged his penny whenever the account runs to £2, and this will occur often in the year, for the poor man's credit is not usually of very long duration, though it may reach the minimum of £2, while the account of his wealthy rival read the regalations aright, the poor man is taxed on every payment fitty times as much as the moneyed man, which, though the amount may be small in the aggregate, is un-




