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

PARLIAMENTARY BUSINESS.

The Legislative Assembly was the scene of much excitement on Thursday evening, consequent upon the final debate upon the Reform Bill taking place. The galleries were crowded. and large numbers of would-be visicors were unable to obtain admittance, and there was tangible evidence of the activity of the canvass. for votes which was proceeding. The discussion, however, was not on the motion for the third reading of the Reform Bill, but on Mr. Munro's amendment to substitute an elective Chamber (based on a £10 ratepayer's franchise) for the nominee Upper House proposed by the Government. The hon, member argued that the Carlton contest was a condemnation of nominesism. Mr. Berry replied at length, and with warmth, and claimed Carlton as a liberal victory. No liberal, said the hon. gentleman, could vote for the other candidate, and Mr. Munro had played fast and loose about the plebiscite, and thereby obtained votes | to the unacclimatised. The system should first on false pretences. At half-past 12 o'clock, the Speaker having been 12 hours in the chair. asked for an adjournment, and business was resumed at 1 o'clock. THE EMBASSY VOTE

The "South Australian Advertiser" on this grave subject remarks:- "In looking at this case it is difficult to describe the conduct of the Ministers concerned in moderate language. At the very least it is wholly unjustifiable. The sum was granted for a specific purpose, and the public has a right to know how far it has been legitimately employed. It was not in the nature of a free gift to the persons who were intrusted with it, nor was there anything in the wording of the vote, to entitle either Mr. Berry or Mr. Pearson to convertany balance which might have remained, after paying the cost of the excursion, to their own use and still less to reserve a portion of it for further use after the service for which it was voted had been completed. Most persons would be curious to know what course Mr. Berry would adopt towards any public servant who had retime; nor is it likely that he would be satisfied with the intimation that the 'account must be considered as closed.' To us in South Australia who are strange to Berry principles and tactics, the proceeding would be regarded as a scandalous maladversion, and no Minister would be allowed to act here as Mr. Berry has done. A subordinate office would be prosecuted without mercy if he dared to refuse to account for money entrusted to him. Mr. Berry, however, is a responsible Minister, and his notion of responsibility is that he is above the law, and can do with public property just however, used with good effect. Any closeas he pleases. He has taken the money belonging to an office which was not filled, and divided it with his colleagues. EXTAORDINARY PREDICTION..

(From the "Medical Review." A number of astronomers engaged in observing the sun during the last eclipse agree that its condition appears to have recently undergone a great change, and Professor Lockyer inclines to the opinion that the changes must have a very serious result. Observers were surprised to find that the once more demonstrated by the marked being now despaired of. decrease of magnetic activity during the same period. The disappearance of sun spots and the disappearance of hydrogen from the corona means that solar activity and solar heat have decreased. Now the decrease of solar heat means in its earlier stage an increase of heat on the earth; for gases thrown out by the sun when in a state of activity, and which act as a shield to protect the earth, disappear as the heat decreases. According to this view the sun is taking precisely the course which must end in the burning up of the earth at a comparitively early period. But the beavens are said by some well informed persons to indicate, on much more proximate evidence, that we are rapidly approaching what will be one of the most perilous and malific periods of the earth's history. Since the commencement of the Christianaera the perihelia of the four great planets of the solar system-Jupiter, Uranus, Saturn, and Neptune-have not been conicidental. But this is about to occur, and in the language of Knapp (who has traced the history of the greatest epidemics that ever afflicted the human race to the perihelia of these planets) there will soon be times of great pestilence. Some superb specimens were shown at the mechanics' fair last fall and attracted much attention. The process of chonising wood is comparitively simple and has been described as follows :- The wood is first stained with a decoction of logwood, which may be purchased from any druggist or dealer in dyestuffs. It is dissolved in cold water until all has been taken up that the water will hold. Application to the wood is made freely with a large soft bristle brush, and the surface is rubbed with a cloth to prevent the formation of a gummy coat thereon. After the article has been left to dry for a few hours the second application which consists of vinegar in which a quantity of nails or clean fillings have been soaked for several days, is also freely laid on with a brush. 



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

THE REFORM BILL DIVISION.

We extract the following from one of those capitally written articles, headed "Above the Speaker," which appeared in Monday's

The (1th of May members may claim now to know something about Parliamentary life. They will be a long time in the House before they pass through contests and scenes more severe than those of last week. There is nothing in the world more exciting than a test division well worked up, close and uncertain to the last, and big with the fate of parties and the future of the country-and of such a character were the divisions of Friday morning. The end of a Cup race is nothing to the strain. The nearest approach, or the thing better, is when the line is formed for the charge, and the general rides down to to recapitulate our previous remarks ansay a few last words to the men who have the hill and the foe in front of them. THE events of the past two weeks have seem to presage what the country has long stood in need of-the collapse of the Berry administration. The first decisive blow was struck when the hon. James Munro was returned to the seat in Parliament which he had voluntarily vacated, and this was speedily followed the same night by the pronounced defeat which the Government sustained in the division on the sixth clause of the Reform Bill. But the final blow was given on Friday morning-the trumpet sounded defeat-when on the third reading of the Reform Bill the Government measure was lost. The election of Mr. Munro was peculiarly significant, from the fact that the hon, gentleman had been for the greater part of the time since the 11th of May, 1877, a thick and thin supsaid of him until the now strangled bantling -the Reform Bill-was brought to light, when he, taking exception to the principles of the sixth clause and the nominee Upper House, left Berry, and took to himself an innecting of his constituents, and at this meet ing he gave reasons for his opposition to the bill, which did not satisfy his hearers, who carried a motion in favor of the Berry scheme. At this of course the Ministerial party became jubilant, but Mr. Munro was equal to the occasion, and at once resigned his seat with a view to recontesting it before the whole constituency. The result of this clearly showed that not only was the meeting, which favored Berry's scheme, not representative of the whole constituency, but that Mr. Munro's principles were upheld, and this by 157 supporters more than he had severely felt by the law-abiding portion of when Berrydom ruled the land in 1877. Such a result can only be regarded as a substantial victory for the party which holds to good government by Parliamentary institutions and a reasonable controlling power over the public funds. It is not necessary for us now tagonistic to the three cardinal principles of the Reform Bill-the sixth clause, nominee Upper House, and plebiscits-for these we have referred to at length ere now, and so we may pass to the division on the sixth clause. It will be remembered that this clause met with such opposition in the House that it should be re-east, and long enough it took, goodness knows, before Sir Bryan O'Loghlen brought it down, but when he did, as we pointed out at the time, it was only the original principle under a specious guise -a sort of blinding the devil in the dark, which Sir Bryan's countrymen understand so well-and accordingly when it came on for debate the question was hotly contested. CURIOUS DISCOVERY.

On Saturday a discovery of a very curious nature was made in an old claim situated near the staughteryards at Back Creek. 

BALLARAT PRODUCE MARKET

There was a fair supply of produce brought into the market yesterday. A change will, however, in all probability, be made this week, as a parcel is now under offer from Horsham at 5s. 3d. per bushel, which landed here would cost 5s. 6d., and therefore this may be regarded as the opening rate. Stripping is being pushed on all over the Wimmera district, and a few loads have been carted into Murton and Lubeck, good samples being readily saleable at 5s. 2d. to 5s. 3d. at the former place. At St. Arnaud new wheat was brought in on Wednesday last, and was disposed of at 5s. and 5s. 3d, and the crops in that district are yielding more heavily than was expected. Several large firms have sent out agents, but at present they show no disposition to operate targely, it being generally welleven that the yield all over the Wimmera district will be heavy, and that prices must recede. In the Melbournemarket new wheat from the Echuca district is selling at 5s. 6d. to 5s. 7d, and prime old is wanted at 6s. 3d. per bushsl, flour being in fair request at L12 15s. Locally flour is firm at L13 10s, and pollard, which is exceedingly scarce, sells readily at 1s. 9d. Oats are without much busines, and a little new barley is coming in at 3s. 6d. New hay is being brought forward loose at L2 10s. whilst small lots of old are in demand at L3. Warrnambool potatoes are a little easier, quotations being L5 10s., Ballarat varieties L4. Dairy produce is without alteration. THE NEW STAMP DUTIES.

The stamp duties came into operation on Thursday last, 18th inst., and the required portion of the bill most affecting the general heavy one, and likely, owing to the cheapness public and to which therefore their attention of transport, to be in the market unusually is particularly directed, is that all cheques, no matter what amount, must have a penny stamp attached, and a stamp of the same value must be placed on all receipts amounting to £5 and upwards. All bills of exchange or promissory notes must also be stamped, the minimum charge being 6d., where the note drawn does not exceed £25. We subjoin the schedule of the new stamp duties for

the information of our readers :-Bills of exchange, cheque, etc., payable on demand, 1d.; bills of exchange, and promissory notes of any other kind whatsoever (except a bank-note), negotiated in Victoria: -When the amount for which the bill is drawn does not exceed £25, 6d.; exceeding £25 and under £50, 1s.; exceeding £50 and under £75, 1s 6d.; exceeding £100 for every £50 or fractional part thereof, 1s; provided

or promissory note shall be £10. Receipt of discharge amounting to £2, or

upwards, 1d. Conveyance or transfer on sale of any real property-For the first £50, nil; for every additional £50 or fractional part thereof, 5s.; land under the Transfer of Land Statute, same as above, 5s.; annual license to be taken out by any person, firm or company who carry on fire or marine insurance or guarantee business, 30s. per cent. on gross annual premiums, but not less than £50.

Exemprions. Drafts between banks-usedsolely for clearing accounts between such Cheques drawn on any public acbanks. count. Drafts or orders on behalf of Her Majesty, savings banks; cheques by officers such society. Any government or municipal debentures; receipt or payment on behalf of Receipts for money deposited in bank not a lable check to the rush of emigration which fixed deposit, charitable institution, building has lately seized upon the miners. or friendly society, assurance company, or savings bank. SPARROWS V. LOCUSTS.

The "Ararat Advertiser" correspondent, writing under date of, 1st December, says :-I see by a late issue of the "Advertiser" that the sparrrows are troubling you, and that the best means to get rid of them is a problem to be solved by some of your townsfolk. Could you not at the same time give us a few useful hints re the locusts, or as we hear them sometimes called the grasshoppers? Could you not send us your surplus sparrows to eat our locusts? for I find that they do not confine themselves to grain and frult, but eat vast quantities of insects. I have just been reading an account of a meeting to form a sparrow club for the purpose of getting rid of that "cheeky" customer, and among those assembled was the parson of the parish, who was opposed to the destruction of these birds. Previous to coming to the meeting he shot several of the aforesaid thieves that trequented his garden, and brought them with him ready opened and showed the contents of their crops to the meeting, which turned out to be a few grains of corn and hundreds of different kinds of grubs, insects full grown, and such like, and the meeting in the end almost unanimously voted in favor of protecting in place of destroying the little rogues. The plague of locusts is getting very serious year by year, and if it goes on much longer this part of Riverina, I am afraid, will have to be given up to them. Our Deniliquin paapers contain suggestions as to what to do to meet the case, but they seem to me to be about as feasible as trying to bail out the ocean with a teacup. We are petitioning the Parliament to stop the cheeting or destroying of the native birds, under the impression that the remedy lies, in the larkspar, as it is said the "hoppers" eat it and die in thousands. Our folks had some of that worderful plant in the garden, and year more or less, but this year they are a man. caution. Thousands of acres are bare and blackened worse than any fire could blacken them, for, the fire, though dreadful, passes on after it has burnt up the grass; not so, however, this plague, but it remains month after month eating out the roots, and if a shower of rain falls and a few green tafts show themselves they are nibbled off again. I don't know how far their ravages extend north beyoud Huy, but from here to there ill semblance of feed is gone.





SIE,-Mr. Berry, in his recent Beaufort neech, and in illustrating the advantages of protectionist over a free trade policy, instauced the failure of the harvest in England, and the necessity of placing a duty on cern to protect the English farmer. In other words Mr. Berry advocates a tax of about ten millions sterling to keep up the price of wheat in England. I would like to ask Mr. Beiry, if such a tax were imposed, out of whose pocket would it come. A rich man would pay no more than a laborer, with his 16s. or 20s. per week, and though the former would scarcely feel its effects, the poor man with a large family would suffer from an insufficiency of food. Now, Sir, this is a sample of our Chief Secretary's statemanship, and shows with what little wisdom we are governed, and to my mind is an evidence of the grinding policy of a protectionate Ministry, and the ills of that policy on the working classes of this country, for on a larger scale per head it is in this country what he would do in England. Were any member of Parliament in England to make such a proposition as that of Mr., Berry's he-would be deemed, a lunatic, and yet this man is allowed to rule and drag down this fair land of ours. You are aware that three years ago he said give me 50 supporters, and I will reduce the expenditure of the country by £400,000, and make this colony a paradise for the working man. The country gave him 60, and lo the result; taxes increased by the sum of £500,000, work more scarce; and wages lower. The Noumea correspondent of the "Sydney Morning Herald," writing on December 4, gives the following particulars of this event:-

The dull routine of Noumean existence was broken this evening by the painful intelli-gence that between 4 and 5 p.m. some convicts had escaped from Isle Nou in a schooner, the captain of which they murdered. Inquiry has resulted in the following information :---

The Moudewai, cutter, 35 tons, owner and Government to take provisions, etc., to Poya -scene of the revolt to the north of Bouruil -having completed taking in cargo, all but some bags of lime, proceeded for these to-day to the Government lime-kiln at the south end Point Sud, of Isle Nou, going alongside the small quay there for the purpose of shipping the lime. At the time stated the convicts rushed the vessel, first pitching the surveillant guarding them off the quay into the sea, but without injuiring him; attacked the master, Boutmy, killing him instantaneously by almost cutting off his head with an axe. The black crew of three flung themselves into the sea, and thus, through one of them succeeding in swimming across the narrowentrance of the harbour, was the lamentable news brought to Noumen. It is supposed that two natives are drewned. Immediately on getting possession of the vessel, the felous, of whom there are 15, made all sail before a stiff breeze, passing boldly through the harbour and by the shipping, dead before the wind, every stitch set. Of course they concealed themselves in passing, so as to excite no suspicion. Thanks to the speedy arrival of the native, the alarm was quickly given in Noumea, and soon corroborated from Isle Non. " Quinze condamnes evade dans la Moudewai -patron assassine." With all possible speed steam was got up in the steam transport Dives, and on board the little steamer Loyalty, but it was dusk ere the former could start in pursuit, and the latter needed still more time. In the meantime, however, chase had been given first by the Constantine, 25ton coaster, master, Gasper, ex-sailor of the French navy, who, so soon as he became aware of the fact, made and carried into execution his plans for the chase. Calling upon the vessel nearest him for such arms as they, could supply and a few volunteers, Gasper started in the tracks of the murderers, and at 6 p.m. was reported from the semaphore as being in their wake, distant only three or four miles. 
