

BALLARAT PRODUCE MARKET.

The supply of produce in the market was not quite so plentiful yesterday. The following are our quotations :- Oats, 1s 10d to 2s; wheat, 4s to 4s 2d; flour, L9 10s; Cape barley, 1s6d to 2s; English do.,3s 6d to 4s 6d; peas, 2s; sheaves, L1 10s to L2 5s; hay L2 15, to L3; straw, 25s to 30s; potatoes, L1 5s to L2; bran, 11d tols; pollard Is to 1s 1d; bonedust, L6 10s to L7.

ARARAT PRODUCE MARKET.

Although there is no improvement to be noted in the value of wheat, business has been fairly animated for the past week, a good many parcels having changed hands. One lot of 120 bags, another of 80 and several small ones found buyers at 3s 10d, bags returned, and at this rate prices remain firm. Flour has had only a light demand, only a few small local sales being reported at L9 10s per ton. At Horsham 3s 9d is still quoted for wheat, but little is being brought in. In the Melbourne market wheat maintains former quotations, 4s 3d to 4s 4d, and flour is moving off slowly at L9 7s 6d to L9 10s for trade parcels. At St. Arnaud wheat has still further declined and is now quoted at 3s 7d, with flour at L8 15s to L9 per ton. Wheat is quoted at Warrnambool at 4s and flour at L10 per ton, and at Landsborough wheat is 4s 3d, and flour L9 per tou. In this market oats are still rather slow, even at the present quotations, the only high quotation for this cereal being at Mount Gambier, where 3s 3d is the ruling rate. Potatoes, which are quoted at Warmambool at 22s 6d, have been rather scantily delivered here this week, no doubt owing to the fact that the late rains have made the roads heavy and farmers are engaged at ploughing. Potatoes are howequal to demand, and carrots are selling more freely at 3s per bushel. In dairy produce, fresh butter has been plentiful, but the demand for potted has not been very active. Eggs are very scarce and readily command Is 3d per dozen. GEELONG WOOL AND STATION MARKETS.

MESSRS. GEORGE HAGUE AND Co. report : -Wool.-The second series of the London-Colonial Wool Sales last Tuesday. There was a large attendance of home and foreign buyers, and biddings commenced with great spirit, the eagerness to purchase being most observable among the foreign buyers. The opening prices showed an average advance of about Ild per pound. The latest cable news reports continued animation and improved rates for some descriptions. At present the advance on the closing rates of last series is -Greasy 13d.; fleece, 2d., and scoured 21d. Crossbreds are again attracting a little attention, while extra fine Port Phillip fleece and greasy are searcely any higher than at the close of last sales. We offered a fair catalogue on Tuesday, mostly oddments, and effected a clearance as follows :- Greasy fleece, 7d. to 101d. per pound; greasy lambs, 61d. to 74d.; greasy pieces, 4d. to 61d.; scoured, inferior to medium, 121d. to 181d.; slipe, Sd. to 111d. Grain.—There is a still weaker feeling in the wheat market, and the highest quotations run for prime milling 4s. 3d. to 4s. 1d.; and even at these figures shippers are not to be tempted, and little or no business is doing. Feeding grains are also dull, with no enquiry; while for seed oats we have a good demand, and could place come considerable parcels readily. While Dr. Beard was speaking Mr. Rhodes sat listening to him with the Audiphone against the teeth of his upper jaw, and when Dr. Beard had finished Mr. Rhodes rose, and in the high-pitched voice common to deaf people, said Dr. Beard had stated the case exactly. He himself had been deaf for twenty years, and had tried every form of ear trumpet without benefit. He had fallen into the habit of placing his watch between his teeth and listening to its ticking, and one day it suddenly occurred to him that he could hear articulate language in the same manner. He then began experiments to find a proper medium for conducting sounds to the ear through the teeth, and after two years perfected the Audiphone, which he has since used. Mr. Rnodes then exhibited the Audiphone and explained the manner of its use.

The interesting part of the exhibition was the introduction of a class of deaf mutes from the Washington Heights Asylum. This class included two young ladies, a young girl, two young men and two boys.

One of the two young ladies adjusted the Audiphone with feminine intution, and as she had been deaf since the age of two years, Mr. Rhodes attempted with her the experience between two sounds. He pronounced the letters "A" and "C," at the same time making the corresponding deaf mute signs, and after a moment he blind-folded the young lady. Then he pronounced the same letters, varying their order, and each time she young lady raised her finger and made the deaf mute sign of the letter which had been spoken to her. Then chords were played on a piano and on an organ while the young lady held the Audiphone in her mouth, and it was shown that she could hear the sounds perfectly.

The experiment with the other young lady of the class was very touching. She had been born deaf, and she showed the greatest cagerness when she was given an Audiphone and promished that she should hear. The experiments made with the other young lady of the class were repeated successfully with her, and she was then asked if she had ever heard her own voice. She answered in the negative, and she was instructed by means of signs and by placing her hand on Mr. Rhodes' throat so as to feel the vibrations of the vocal chords how to produce sound. Then she was given a double Audiphone -one in which there are two discs between which the voice is thrown—and she endeavored to make a sound. At first she was unsuccessful, but on the second attempt she made a long, wailing sound which was in strange contrast with the brightness of her face. Her face flushed as she sank into her seat and pulled her veil over her face. The instructor asked her if she had heard her voice, and she answered that she had. She could describe the effect it had upon her only by saying it was "a cur.ous

In spite of his deformity he was able to make himself understood by poculiar movements of the stumps of his arms, and one of the deaf mute young ladys held an Audiphone against his teeth while experiments were made with him. Like the others, the young man was able to hear spoken words and music by means of the Audiphone, although everything was simply a "rumble" to him as to the others. An ingenious test of the relative-and so to speak articulate-powers of hearing of the class was made by Miss Belle Cole, who sang an echo song in which the tones run from very soft to very loud. The deaf mutes were instructed to raise or lower their hands as the sound was more or less intense to them, and it was interesting to watch them as they stood grouped around the piano, upright and rigid, waiting to catch the sound. Then as Miss Cole sang the hands raised and fell, now struck a high note the hand of the young lady who had never before heard her voice shot far above her head.

After this song the audience sang, "Nearer, This DURABLE QUALITY has made the My God, to Thee," and the deaf mutes, who presented a curious sight as they stood facing the people with the Audiphones in their mouths, seemed to enjoy the singing heartily.


GARDENING FOR MAY.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—All permanent crop such as sea-kale, asparagus, rhubarb, et should be attended to, and get a good dressi of well rotted manure. Sow broad bean peas, onions, spinach, lettuce, cress and mu tard. Plant out early sorts of cabbage and cauliflower. Celery may also be planted out with a chance of success. If fruit trees are grown in the kitchen garden, pruning may be proceeded with; after which dig all vacant ground, applying manure where wanted.

FLOWER GARDEN.-All decayed flower stems should be cut down. Take up and store dahlia roots in dry sand. Sow bardy annuals; thin and transplant those sown early, if fit to handle. Divide perennial flower roots. Prane early roses. Plant evergreens. Prepare and plant rose cuttings, geraniums, fuschias, etc., etc. Attend to the clipping of hedges, and prepare ground for fresh plantations where required.

FARM. - Attend to last month's instructions, as to the sowing of grasses, lucerne, etc., The sowing of cereals must now occupy attention, if the weather be suitable and the soil in a state of preparedness to receive the seed; but avoid sowing in wet weather; it is better in all cases to wait until the soil is fit for harrowing without clogging.



FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.

Thursday. The Richmond bench of magistrates were justly severe on some young men who were brought up charged with insulting behaviour in Swan street. It is time that a stop was put to the vagaries of a certain number of youths who nightly congregate in groups round the street corners and insult respectable persons who happen to pass by. So great has the nuisance become that it is not safe for respectable females to traverse the streats after dark. Mr. Lancashire (the Mayor) stated that the bench were determined to nut a stop to the existing evil, and went on to say that neither citizens nor police were free the abuse of these roughs. Richmond is fortunate in having a Mayor and justices who have the courage to execute their duty, and watch zealously the inverest and comfort of the district over which they preside. I am sorry that I cannot say the same of other suburbs, as it too frequently happens that unpaid magistrates do not fully consider the duty they owe to the inhabitants, and either through fear or favor allow too much leniency to the larrikin element. Let us hope that in the future all the suburbs will join hand in hand and do their best to eradicate as far as possible the existing state of things. For my part I strongly advocate the re-appointment of paid magistrates, and until this is done we cannot

hope for any marked improvement. Mr. D. Kinnear Brown, who has for some time back been connected with Victorian journalism, has received the appointment as special correspondent to several leading English and American newspapers during our International Exhibition.

John Bond Phipson, an old colonist and well known for his great ability as a writer, died at the Adelaide Hospital on Tuesday Phipson has unfortunately been greatly addicted to drink. One time he held a good appointment under the South Australian Government, but owing to his irregular habits he was forced to relinquish the position. During a greater part of 1878 he was residing at the Inebriate Asylum some few miles out of Adelaide. One day I met Mr. Phipson. and he informed me that he was determined to reform, and that the Hon. G. Scott, the then Mayor, had promised to pay his passage to England and back if he would refrain from taking intoxicating drink. Unfortunately he was too much enamoured to the use of it, and he was ere long roaming the streets in a beastly state, crying out at the the top of his voice, and making himself a thorough nuisance. The sorrowful part of his life was having married a woman far beneath him in life, and I think it was owing to her in a great measure that he drank. Shortly before his death he had been engaged by the dailies to write some contributions on colonial reminiscences, which were read with deep interest by all old colonists, and those who take an interest in reading the early history of the colonies.

The trustees of any public cemetery are hereby required, notwithstanding the existence of any regulation of such cemetery to the contrary, to afford every possible facility for the speedy interment of the body of any person who shall die of measles or diptheria and the trustees of such cemetery shall provide that there be at all times open and ready for use a sufficient number of public graves.

5. Removal of Nuisances. The occupier of any premises shall not permit any nuisances or matter causing offensive smell to exist thereon; and shall cause all stables, cowsheds, pigsties, manure receptacles, and yards thereon to be efficiently paved and drained, and shall cause all drains on or belonging to such premises to be properly cleansed at least once in every twenty-four hours.

6. Privies and Closets .- All water-closets, earth-closets, and privies shall be kept in an inoffensive and cleanly condition. In any house in which measles or diptheria shall be present the stools of the sick person shall be regularly disinfected by means of chloride of lime or chloride of zinc.

KITCHEN GARDEN. -All permanent crops, such as sea-kale, asparagus, rhubarb, etc., should be attended to, and get a good dressing of well rotted manure. Sow broad heans, peas, onions, spinach, lettuce, cress and mustard. Plant out early sorts of cabbage and cauliflower. Celery may also be planted out with a chance of success. If fruit trees are grown in the kitchen garden, pruning may be proceeded with; after which dig all vacant ground, applying manure where wanted.

FLOWER GARDEN.-All decayed flower stems should be cut down. Take up and store dahlia roots in dry sand. Sow hardy annuals; thin and transplant those sown early, if fit to handle. Divide perennial flower roots. Prune early roses. Plant evergreens. Prepare and plant rose cuttings, geraniums, fuschias, etc., etc. Attend to the clipping of. hedges, and prepare ground for fresh planta-

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COMMERCIAL.

BALLARAT PRODUCE MARKET.

The supply of produce in the market was not quite so plentiful yesterday. The following are our quotations :- Oats, 1s 10d to 2s; wheat, 4s to 4s 2d; flour, L9 5s; Cape barley, Is 10d to 2s; English do., 4s to 4s 6d; peas, 2s; sheaves, L2 to L2 5s; hay L2 to L2 10s; straw, 25s to 30s; potatoes, Lt 5s to L2; bran, 11d to ls; pollard, Is to 1s 1d; bonedust, L6 10s to L7.

ARARAT PRODUCE MARKET.

Business in the produce market has been unusually inactive for the past week. Many farmers are still busily engaged sowing and consequently not a great deal of produce has been carted in, but notwithstanding this the demand has been fully satisfied. The publica tion of the agricultural statistics will have, no doubt, some effect upon the market. In this market but little is doing in wheat, the few local parcels brought in finding business at 3s 10d, whilst northern lots are worth landed 3s 9d, but flour is slow of sale at our figure. In the metropolis wheat is in moderate request at 4s 31d to 4s 41d, and flour has few transactions at L9 5s. At Hamilton wheat is priced 3s 9d, and flour L10 5s; at St. Arnaud 3's 10d is given for wheat, and LS 15s for flour; at Stawell flour has business at L8 12s 6d to L8 15s. Locally oats have a light demand at 1s 9d to 2s, but farmers refuse to operate at any reduction. Owing to the heavy state of the roads potatoes are firm at our figures with every possibility of a further rise. The price for potatoes in the Warrnambool market is still given at 22s 6d per ton. In dairy produce, fresh butter comes in rather slowly, whilst potted is forwarded in excess of wants. Eggs are scarce. A good demand exists for dairy fed pork for bacon curing at from 43d. We quote: -Wheat, 3s 10d bigs returned; oats; new, 1s 9d to 2s; pollard, 1s 1d; bran, 11d; barley, 2s; maize, whole 3s 6d, crushed 4s; flour, L9 10s; potatoes, Warrnambool, L3 5s; Ballarat, L2 10s; fresh butter, 10a; potted butter, Sd; hams, 1s; bacon, 9d, cheese, 6d; eggs, 1s 6d; hay, sheaves, L2; trussed, L2 5s. to L2 10s; straw, 25s to 30s; chaff, 3s; onions, 5s; carrots, 3s; peas, 2s 8d; rye, 5s.—" Advectiser."

GEELONG WOOL AND GRAIN MARKETS.

Messrs. George Hague and Co, report : had the effect of improving prices and as the foreign buyers are purchasing more sparingly, Merino fleece and lambs' wool have gone back to the rates ruling in the February-March series, while crossbreds have dectined cided to close the present series on the Sth proximo. We cleared out a small catalogue on Tuesday as follows :-- Greasy fleece, to 103d.; greasy pieces, to 6d.; greasy pieces, to 63d.; greasy locks. to 31d.; scoured inferior, 93d. to 153d.; slipe, 83d. to 123d. Grain.—In Wheat values remain the same as last quoted, with a very limited demand and a quiet market. Prices have advanced a little at home, but as yet this does not appear to have affected our market here. Prime milling is worth 4s. 2d. to 4s. 3d. Feeding grains are also at a standstill, with no business at all doing. We quote :- Wheat, prime milling, 4s. 2d. to 4s. 3d.; oats, good feed, 2s. to 2s. 2d.; peas, 2s. to 2s. 3d.; Cape barley, 1s. 11d. to 2s. 2d.

MESSES GEORGE SYNNOT and Co. report: -Wool.-During the last week cable news from the London Wool Sales has been rather of a conflicting character; but from private wire news received, we learn that the only fall really worth noticing has taken place in low crossbred sorts, and although the French demand is not as large or animated as it has been during the last week, prices on the whole are satisfactory and the market fairly animated. Considering the large lot offered at these sales, the small quantity passed in must augur well for the forthcoming August series. All lots at the sale to-day met with very spirited competition and realised very high prices. We sold 1st and 2nd crossbred scoured wool, to 1614; scoured Lincoln, to 171d from the local fellmongers; greasy fleece, to 101d. Grain .- This market has been anything but lively during the last week, but as the improved feeling in the English market circulates, we find owners are now less anxious to quit than they were a week ago. PARLIAMENTARY ITEMS.

THE ENGLISH EXECUTIONER.

John Calcraft, who for a great many years officiated as executioner at Newgate and Horsemonger gaols, and also at the principal prisons throughout England, recently died at his residence at Hoxton, Calcraft 10 eived his official appointment as executioner to the Corporation of London, in connection with the gaol at Newgate, in the year 1828, and he had a standing salary of one guinea per week, being allowed, when his services were not required at Newgate, to officiate at any other gaol where the capital sentence was to carried out. In 1874, in consequence of his be advanced age, it was notified to him it would be better for him to resign, and he accordingly did so, after 46 years' service, but his salary was continued to him by the Corporation, During the time he was in office he had to execute some of the most extraordinary criminals, among them were Bishop and Williams, for the murder of an Italian boy in Bethnal church, which created an extraordinary sensation at the time. Calcraft was very retired in his manner and habits, and he was very much averse to giving any information with regard to the number of criminals who had passed through his hands during his long career. He always considered himself to be unfairly dealt with by being compelled to resign his position as an executioner, and was repeatedly heard to say by those who were acquainted with him that he was as well able to perform his duty as ever he was, and nothing appeared to give him greater annoyance than when it was stated in a report of a execution in the newspapers that the culprit appeared to struggle a great deal. GARDENING FOR MAY.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—All permanent crops, such as sea kale, asparagus, rhubarb, etc., should be attended to, and get a good dressing of well rotted manure. Sow broad beans, peas, onions, spinach, lettuce, cress and mustard. Plant out early sorts of cabbage and cauliflower. Celery may also be planted out with a chance of success. If fruit trees are grown in the kitchen garden, pruning may. be proceeded with; after which dig all vacant | Wednesday ... ground, applying manure where wanted.

FLOWER GARDEN.—All decayed flower stems should be cut down. Take up and Wednesday store dahlia roots in dry sand. Sow hardy Wednesday annuals: thin and transplant those sown early, Eriday if fit to handle. Divide perennial flower roots. Friday Prune early roses. Plant evergreens. Pre- Friday pare and plant rose cuttings, geraniums, fuschias, etc., etc. Attend to the clipping of hedges, and prepare ground for fresh plantations where required.

FARM .- Attend to last month's instructions, as to the sowing of grasses, lucerne, etc., The sowing of cereals must now occupy attention, if the weather be suitable and the soil in a state of preparedness to receive the seed; but avoid sowing in wet weather; it is better in all cases to wait until the soil is fit for harrowing without clogging.





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

BALLARAT PRODUCE MARKET.

The supply of produce in the market was not quite so plentiful yesterday. The following are our quotations :- Oats, Is 10d to 2s: wheat, 4s to 4s 2d; flour, L9 5s; P. W. Cape barley, 1s 10d to 2s; English do., 4s to 4s 6d; peas, 2s; sheaves, L2 to L2 5s; hay L3 to L3 103; straw, 25s to 30s; potatoes, L1 5s to L1 7s 6d; bran, 11d to 1s; pollard, 1s to 1s 1d; boundust, L6 10s to L7.)

ARARAT PRODUCE MARKET.

There is little of any consequence to note

in the way of change in the produce market for the past week. The deliveries of wheat have been light, farmes apparently being too busily engaged to bring in stocks. The tone of the market is slightly firmer, this feeling no doubt being induced by the improvement in prices at Horsham, where some fair-sized parcels have been disposed of at 3s. 10d. to 3s. 10dd. for prime samples. Only small parcels have come forward, but as good large stocks are stored, competition has not been great, and prices remain as quoted last week. At Stawell from 3s. 11d. to 4s. per bushel is given for wheat, and flour sells at £8 10s. to £8 15s. At St. Arnaud flour is quoted at LS 10s. to £8 15s. Flour at Hamilton is quoted at £10 per ton, and wheat at 3s. 6d. to 3s. 9d. per bushel. In the metropolitan market flour is moving off quietly at L9 5s. to L9 7s. 6d., and wheat is dull at 4s. 41d. to 4s. 51d. per bushel. Locally flour is moving off pretty freely at L9 10s two or three good large parcels have changed hands at that figure. Oats remain unaltered, and are slow of sale, and barley is almost neglected at 2s. to 2s. 6d. per bushel. In potatoes but a few loads of Warrnambool have come forward, and an enquiry exists at our quotations. At Warrnambool the deliveries have been large, and depressing accounts from Melbourne have made farmers more readily accept the reduced rate of 22s. 6d. per ton. "Pitting" is being carried on extensively, though crops have suffered to some extent to late rains. Hay has a light demand, and a plentiful supply at late rates. Carrots have begun to come in more freely, cwt. on last week's price. In dairy produce fresh butter has been fairly supplied at 10d., whilst potted has a light demand. Eggs continue very scarce. We quote as under :--Wheat, 3s 10d bigs returned; oats, new, 1s 9d to 2s; pollard, 1s 1d; bran, 5s; Ballarat, L2 10s; fresh butter, 10a; potted butter, Sd; hams, 1s; bacon, Sd; cheese, 6d; eggs, 1s 6d; hay, sheaves, peas, 2s 8d; rye, 5s.—" Advectiser."

A destructive tornado occurred in the western states of America. The town of Mansfield, Missouri, was nearly destroyed, only 14 houses being left standing. Seventyeight persons were killed and many injured, and hundreds of families are homeless. The tornado also passed over the north-eastern states, everywhere causing great disaster.

A most determined suicide was committed on Thursday at the South Head, Sydney Harbour, by a woman whose name is un known. Between three and four o'clock that afternoon Captain James Wilson, of the 2nd Infantry Regiment, was walking with a friend along the top of the cliffs in the vicinity of the Signal Hotel, when he observed a woman seated near the edge. Both passed on, and in a few minutes afterwards their attention was attracted by two young men shouting to them to return, and on doing so they were informed that a woman had jumped over the cliff. On looking over they saw the same woman they had before passed caught on a ledge about forty feet from the top, her fall having evidently been broken by some bushes. Captain Wilson at once ran to the signal hotel for a rope, while his companion went as quickly as possible to the life-boat station at the Heads. Shortly afterwards Captain Wilson and the landlord of the Signal hotel returned with a rope, but were too late, for just as they got to the edge of the cliff they heard a thud as of a falting body, and looking over saw that the woman had fallen down the perpendicular face of the rocks, about 105 feet, to the bottom. Subsequently the body, frightfully mangled by the fall on the rocks, was recovered by the pilot steamer. The deceased was apparently about forty years of age, and of respectable appearance. A BRAVE ACT.

About half-past six o'clock a.m. on Tuesday morning last (4th May), a son of Captain B. Stevens, aged fourteen, was bothing opposite Fraser and Tinne's, about 100 yards 1878 out from the beach, when Joyner came along Jany. 1—To Cash ir Bank with the intention of pathing, but afterwards Deer, 31—, Donations... with the intention of bathing, but afterwards changed his mind. While standing on the beach, his attention was attracted to the lad through his cries, and he then saw a shark about a yard behind the boy, making attempts to seize him, while the terrified lad was splashing to drive it away. Seeing the boy's danger, Joiner at once stripped, got a sailor's clasp knife from a bystander, and, leaping into the sea, swam to the youth's assistance. On swimming up to the spot he told young Stevens he would settle the little difficulty with the shark himself. The shark was equally agreeable to the new arrangement, and dived under Joyner with the purpose of attacking him, only to receive a stab in the belly as he passed under for his trouble. In the second artempt the shark got the "cold steel" behind the shoulder. Altering histactics, the shark made a flank movement, with the purpose of seizing Joynor in the ribs or abdomen, but throwing out his arms round the forequarters he jobbed the shark in the Deer, 31-By Sustenance eye with the knife, sending it home to the bilt. The shark sheered off, carrying the knife with him as a souvenir of the little difficulty. Joyner swam ashore, and was subsequently thanked and rewarded by the grateful father of the lad. The Royal Humane Society's medal might very fitly be awarded in such a case, as there is little doubt that young Stevens owes his life to Joyner's gallantry and courage. WILLS, THE LATE CRICKETER.

Some significant warnings are suggested by the tragical death of the Cricketer Wills. Few young men ever began life with more promising omens. He was of well-to-do parents, was educated in one of the great public schools in England, and was intended for one of the learned professions: Cricket, however, and more especially the convival habits so easily generated on the cricket field, became a snare to him. His very skill and the fame it brought destroyed him. The serious business of life was abandoned in favour of what ought to have been a mere recceation; dissipation followed, and at the age of forty-three Wills died a hopeless drunkard and a suicide. Our young men need to keep their sports within limits of sobriety. When they are suffered to encroach on the legitimate occupations of life they become actively mischevious and demoralising; and when they are pervaded by an atmosphere of dissipation they become a mere Dead Sea in which industry, and character, and life itself are swallowed up. Recreations which in themselves are physically healthful become vicious in the highest degree if not thus kept within reasonable limits and charged with a wholesome moral atmosphere. Every wise parent will watch with jealous care his son's recreations. The absurd and growing tendency to glorify cricket, and elevate it into a serious art, has a distinctly unwholesome effect on vast numbers of young men .- "Southern Cross."


