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

BALLARAT WHOLESALE PRODUCE MARKET.

MESSRS. C. VAUGHAN AND Co., reporc :---Very little grain has come forward this week. We placed a fair sample of up country wheat at 4s 3d, bags in. There is not much doing in flour, but prices are hardening. Oats are without any special business. Cape and English barley not in much demand. Good dry peas are enquired for, and large lines. could be placed at quotations. The demand tor grass seed is limited. A large quantity of hay and wheaten sheaves, especially the latter, came forward on Tuesday and to-day, and all found buyers, but at a slightly reduced price. Only a moderate supply of potatoes is coming forward. We have up country buyers for good red-skin potatoes in good condition. We quote: - Oats, Is Sd to 28 Northern wheat, 4s 3d to 4s 4d; flour, L9 5s; Cape barley, 1s 9d to 2s; peas, 1s 9d to 2s; manger hay, L3 to L3 5s; sheaves, L1 15s to L2 5s; straw, 20s to 30s; potatoes, L1 15s, bags in; bran, 81d to 9d; pollard, 9d to 10d; rye-grass seed, 3s 6d to 5s; bone dust, L6 to L7.

ARARAT PRODUCE MARKET.

A quiet week has been experienced in the produce market since our last report and prices are without material alteration. GARDENING FOR JUNE.

KITCHEN GARDEN .- Trenching and draining being finished, all sorts of fruit trees and vines may now be planted and pruning finished. Where the soil is poor, use bone latter generally produces a strong crop of peas, onions, carrots, parsnips, lettuce and materials for salad.

FLOWER GARDEN.-Finish planting. Sow down lawns and croquet grounds. Hardy Attend to edgings, such as rosemary, box and thrift, clipping the former and filling up any vacancies. Get a frame ready for a few early balsams, celosias and other tender subjects.

FARM.—Sow barley, rye, oats, wheat, tares and grasses. Lucerne should not be sown in this nor the two following months, as it is very tender when young. Mangolds, beet, and carrots may be stored, if the ground is required. New ground may be broken up, which would be all the better to lie fallow all the summer.

THE KELLY GANG.

A "Herald" telegram from Rutherglen, dated the 17th inst., says :-- A Kelly scare on a small scale has been raging here during the last few days, and people are still very much dissatisfied with what they regard as want of Minimum number of men) For the first six months, 6 prompt action on the part of the police. The particulars are that two or three days ago the manager of the branch bank at Corowa was returning from Chiltern with a considerable amount of money in his possession. When near Christmas Town, a small collection of houses, consisting of a butcher's shop, a small publichouse, and several huts, situated about half-way between Chiltern and Rutherglen, he passed four men riding two abreast, the first two about 100 yards ahead of the others. All four were heavily armed. It struck the manager at the time that they were the Kellys, and therefore he was afraid to a pear as if taking particular notice, but simply bade them good morning as he passed, and as soon as he was out of range he galloped off as fast as he could. On reaching Rutherglen he immediately reported the matter to the police, but could give no precise description, stating that he was so much afraid of being recognised as the bank manager, and so fearful that he might betray his suspicions, that he could not take any particular notice, beyond simply observing that all four were heavily armed. The police made enquiries, and found that no body of their men was out patrolling in that direction at the time. Search was immediately instituted, and communication opened up with all the adjacent police stations, but up to the present no trace of the four men has been found. A miner living near Christmas Town, however, has been found, who so far corroborrates the bank manager, that he says he saw the manager gallop away after passing the four horsemen. The lour men drew up under a tree, and appeared to enter into consultation, and after talking a few minutes they returned to the read and rode off swiftly in the direction of Extent of ground applied) the house of Byrne's mother. Notwithstanding all the exertions of the police, the four men, whether they were the Kellys or not, cannot be found. The authorities have every reason to believe that the men seen were none other than the outlaws, but Superin endent Hare persistently discredits the idea, and has ordered only two police from Rusherglen to continue the search. People here naturally ask under the circumstances, "Where are the black trackers?" It is certain that the men met by the Corowa bank manager were heavily armed, and that no police were out at the time in the locality. The subsequent movements of the suspected men support the idea that they were the bushrangers. The pursuit is being continued by the police from Rutherglen, Waligunyah, Chiltern, and Wangaratta.



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
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BALLARAT WHOLESALE PRODUCE MARKET.

ARARAT PRODUCE MARKET.

Consequent upon the slight firming of value in wheat reported in our last issue a good many small parcels have been brought in and changed hands at 3s 11d to 4s for fair milling samples. From Horsham we learn that no transactions of any importance have taken place in this grain for the past week, though the price is given at the various, stations alon: the line at 3s 9d to 3a 10d per bushel. At St. Arnaud wheat is firm at 3s 101d, whilst at Avoca 3s 11d is given, and at Landsborough 3s 10d to 4s, with flour at the last two named places at L9 per ton. At Warrnambool good wheat is quoted 4s to 4s 3d; at Hamilton the price being 3s 9d, and flour L10. In the metropolitan market breadstuffs are without alteration, and transactions are restricted to the supply of actual wants. Sales of flour are being made at L9 5s to L9 7s 6d, wheat being steady at 4s 4d to 4s 5d per bushel. At Ararat flour is steady at L9 10s, but little business is excited at that figure, and there seems but small chance of any material alteration taking place for some time. Oats are very quiet, and at 1s 9d per bushel sales are exceedingly limited. Deliveries of Warrnambool potatoes have been slow, and the loads that came in met a ready market at our figures. At Warrnambool potates are firm at 30s to 32s 6d per ton. Hay is without alteration, and owing to the scarcity of green feed a good demand exists for carrots, the market being fairly supplied at 2s 6d. In dairy produce good fresh butter is unusually scarce, and is worth Is per Ib; inferior is, however, very plenitful and commands a reduced rate; the same remark also applies to potted butter, prime being saleable at 10d per lb. THE REFORM BILL DIVISION. (From the "Argus") The country is once more plunged into 64 political crisis, as the second reading of the Service Reform Bill was negatived at a quarter to 3 o'clock this (Friday) morning by 43 votes to 41. The debate excited great public, interest. The approaches to the galleries of the Assembly were thronged, and not a fifth of the visitors could obtain admission. The great hall was crowded with politicans who eagerly devoured the news from within, and inside the House the scene was equally busy. The negotiations which it was known were in progress caused a general ferment, and caucuses and consultations were going on simultaneously in the Ministers' room, in the apartments of their supporters, and in . the Opposition lobbies. The speakers up to midnight were-Messrs. Laurens, Fincham, and Bilson, and Mr. M Kean and Mr. Bolton againsts the bill, Mr. Murray Smith for, and Mr. H. R. Williams neutral. Mr. M Kean, . to the great irritation of members, spoke for nearly two hours, quoting well-worn passages of Mayand Todd on constitutional practice at length. He blocked out the Premier. whose speech was anxiously expected. Mr. Bowman followed against the measure, and provoked a scene with Mr. Gaunson, and the hands of the clock were within a few minutes to- 1: o'clock, when Mr. Service rose. The Premier spoke with unwonted spirit to a crowded House. He declared that the proposal of Ministers was not to disfranchise any portion of the community, but to enfranchise a very large portion of the community. Their

efforts vill receive approbation in every part of the British empire, and it is the very perversity of party spirit to turn round and accuse the Government of disfranchising electors. The great evil to be dealt with is that of deadlocks. No bill is complete which does not grapple with that evil, and hence the elimination clause and the provision that the Council shall not reject an Appropriation Bill, the bill thus taking away from the Council the great power of rejecting the Appropriation Bill now exercised, and limiting it to a suspensive veto with regard to particular items. It is untrue, says Mr. Service, that the elimination clause was unknown to the country... It was stated by him at Maldon as far back as 16th May, 1879, and was freely commented upon by the Opposition press. At the same time, if any better machinery could be devised to secure the same end Ministers would adopt it. And they would certainly leave hon. members to dispose of such a question as whether the two Houses at the joint sitting; should, or should not, have power to amend the bills before them. Mr. Service warned the House that another deadlock might occur to-morrow, and besought hon, members to endeavor to set aside the danger. In reply to Mr. Williams, the Premier added that he must adhere to the elimination clause unless a better way of averting deadlocks could be

In replying to the Premier, Mr. Berry contended that the Liberal party had always dcsired that the nowers of the Council should-be-defined first, and that it should be popularised afterwards. And the Government proposed a sham and not a genuine popularising of the Council, and above all they transferred financial power from the Lower House to the Upper. With this speech from the Opposition leader the long drawn-out discussion terminated.

" VALUE OF OATMEAL.

Oatmeal is a food of great strength and nutrition, having claims to be better known and more widely used than it is at present. Of much service as a brain food, it contains phosphorous enough to keep a man doing an ordinary amount of brain work in good health and vigor, 'All medical authorities unite in the opinion that, eaten with milk, is a perfect food, and having all requisites for the development of the system, it is a preeminently useful food for growing children and the young generally. Oatmeal requires much cooking to effectually burst its starch sells, but when it is well cooked it will thicken sells, but when it is well cooked it will thicken liquid much more than equal its weight in wheaten flour. The oats of this country are superior to those grown on the Continent and the southern part of England, but certainly found alike on the tables of the rick and the poor-in the morning the porridge and in the evening the traditional cake. The two principal ways of cooking oatmeal are porridge and cake (bannock) which I will describe. First, then we will commence with a recipe for porridge:—To three pirts of boiling water add a level teaspoonful of salt and a pint of coarse meal, stirring while it is being slowly poured in; continue sticring until the meal is diffused through the water-about eight or ten minutes. Cover it closely then, and place it where it will simmer for an hour; avoid stirring during the whole of that time. Serve hot, with as little messing as possible, accompanied with milk, maple symp, or sugar and cream. To make oatmeal cake, place in a bowl a quart of meal, add to it as much cold water as will form it into a soft, light dough, cover it with a cloth fifteen minutes to allow it to swell, turn out the dough and give it a vigorous kneading. Cover it with a cloth a few minutes and proceed at once to roll it out to an eighth of an inch in thickness; cut it in five pieces and partly cook them on a griddle, then finish them by toasting in front of a fire .- " Dublin Farm."

GARDENING FOR JUNE.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Trenching and draining being finished, all sorts of fruit trees and vines may now be planted and pruning finished. Where the soil is poor, use bone dust in preference to stable manure, as the latter generally produces a strong crop of weeds. Make good sowing of broad beans, peas, onions, carrots, parsnips, lettuce and inaterials for salad.

FLOWER GARDEN.-Finish planting. Sow down lawns and croquet grounds. Hardy annuals and perennials may still be sown. Attend to edgings, such as rosemary, box and thrift, clipping the former and filling up any vacancies. Get a frame ready for a few early balsams, celosias and other tender subjects.

FARM. Sow barley, rye, oats, wheat, tares and grasses. Lucerne should not be sown in this nor the two following months, as it is very tender when young. Mangolds, beet, and carrots may be stored, if the ground is required. New ground may be broken up, which would be all the better to lie fallow all the summer.

The "Grocer" of the 24th April says, in reference to an importation of some Australian fruit into England :- "On April 13 the steamship Lusitania brought over from Adelaide (South Australia) to London a consignment of apples in 100 small boxes of about three quarters of a bushel each. This is the first arrival of the kind that has ever taken place. The fruit, which was tough, arrived in fair condition as regards not being decayed after such a long voyage, and at auction realised 6s. per box, which, of course, could hardly pay for the cost of bringing them here; but if their importation could be inade a success, arrivals of apples, from the Antipodes would be very welcome, especially as, being shipped in December and January, they would be ready to hand here in spring-a most opportune period for their consumption before the English season commences."





GARDENING FOR JUNE.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Trenching and draining being finished, all sorts of fruit trees and vines may now be planted and pruning finished. Where the soil is poor, use bone dust in preference to stable manure, as the latter generally produces a strong crop of weeds. Make good sowing of broad beans, peas, onions, carrots, parsnips, lettuce and inaterials for salad.

FLOWER GARDEN.—Finish planting. Sow down lawns and croquet grounds. Hardy annuals and perennials may still be sown. Attend to edgings, such as rosemary, box and thrift, clipping the former and filling up any vacancies. Get a frame ready for a few early balsams, celosius and other tender subjects. FARM -Sow barley, rye, oats, wheat, tares

and grasses. Lucerne should not be sown in this nor the two following months, as it is very tender when young. Mangolds, beet, and carrott may be stored, if the ground is required. New ground may be broken up, which would be all the better to lie fallow all the summer.

The "Grocer" of the 24th April says, in reference to an importation of some Australian fruit into England :- "On April 13 the steamslip Lusitania brought over from Adelaide (South Australia) to London a consignment of apples in 100 small boxes of about three quarters of a bushel each. This is the first arrival of the kind that has ever taken place. The fruit, which was tough, arrived in fair condition as regards not being decayed after such a long voyage, and at auction realised 6s. per box, which, of course, could hardly pay for the cost of bringing them here; but if their importation could be made a success, arrivals of apples, from the Antipodes would be very welcome, especially as, being shipped in December and January, they would be ready to hand here in spring-a most opportune period for their consumption before the English season commences.




