

A party of platelayers at work near the Bushey Station of the London and North-Western Rullway on the morning of September 13 made a discovery which naturally excited considerable alarm. 



TERRIBLE ACCIDENT, TO A TRAIN IN AMERICA.

The New York papers of the 13th ult publish accounts of a terrible accident which occurred on the previous day to an excursion sionists, and they were expected back at ten p.m. At about 9 p.m. news came that the Chute rear train had run into the other, and that many persons had been killed and injured. the interval between them being only two minutes, a violation of the rule of the company requiring a difference of not less than five minutes between sectional trains. 
