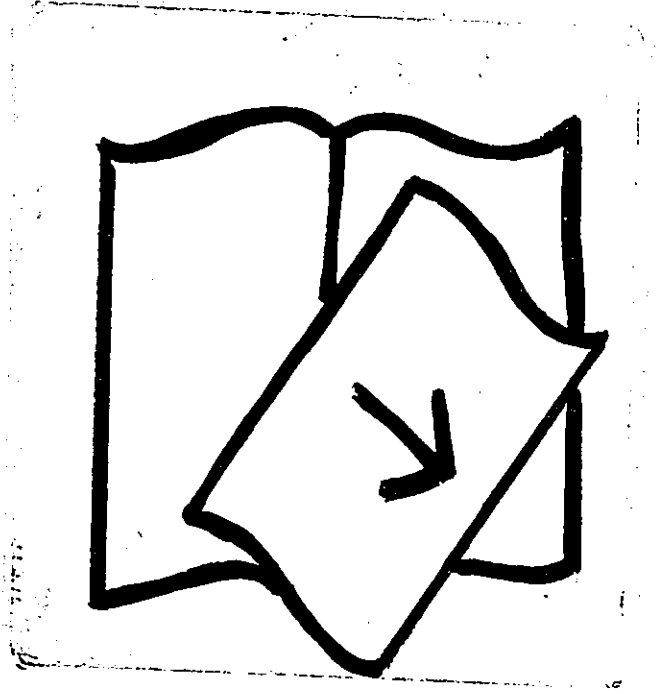

A woman named Elicia McLelland, who has been wandering about the town for the past few days, was brought before Mr. W. A. Jennings, J.P., at the lock-up, on Thursday, on a charge of drunkenness, and fined 5s., or twenty-four hours' imprisonment.

A warrant having been issued for the arrest of W. H. Glenister, a coach-painter, on a charge of neglecting to contribute towards the maintenance of his four children in the Ballarat Benevolent Asylum, he was arrested by Constable Love here on Thursday.

On Tuesday last a serious accident happened to Mr. Gilbert Fisher, of Waterloo. It appears he was racing on horseback with another man, somewhere in the vicinity of the Southern Cross, when he was by some means violently thrown off his horse.

In the Legislative Council on Tuesday Mr. Stinson presented the petition signed in this district against the abolition of Mining Boards, and on Wednesday Mr. Longmore presented a similar petition to the Assembly.

The mysterious disappearance of a box of bar gold, containing 1,250oz., and valued at £5,000, from the ship Tararua, from New Zealand, was reported to the police on Saturday night on the arrival of the vessel along-side the Australian Wharf.

At the Police Court on Saturday (says the "Pleasant Creek News") during the hearing of some applications for the transfer of publicans' licenses, Mr. Alley, the Police Magistrate, spoke in severe terms of the appointment of inspectors of distilleries and publichouses.

An old man of about sixty, named John Akens, sustained an accident under rather peculiar circumstances, which resulted in his death at the Ararat Hospital on Friday last.

The Sorata has at last been successfully floated, and, after some temporary repairs at the Semaphore anchorage, near Adelaide, will be towed to Melbourne for refitting.

The Government have offered a reward of £100 to anyone giving such information as shall lead to the conviction of the party or parties who placed a sleeper across the rails near Sundry, with the evident intention of throwing the train off the line.

The manager of the Sydney coffee palace states that on an average twelve waitresses per annum are married from that institution.

A bootmaker named Francis Jose fell out of a boat in the bay at Geelong on Monday, and was drowned.

A man named George Walker was killed by lightning on Saturday last at Hamilton while engaged in cutting wood.

The Australian Eleven arrived at Adelaide on Monday. They received an enthusiastic reception.

The disqualification of the jockey Ray and the New Zealand horse Mata has been endorsed by the Murrumbidgee Turf Club.

A prisoner in Exeter Gaol committed suicide in an extraordinary manner. After breakfast he was allowed to remain in his cell for some time, and on the warders visiting him they found that he had crawled under the bed, then lifted the end of the bedstead, and allowed it to fall across his throat.

It is stated by Le Figaro that after the execution of Azevedo in September for the murder of the little girl, Luise Den, his remains were conveyed to the anatomical theatre, and subjected to a singular experiment.

The London correspondent of the "Argus" writes under date of October 8th:—"The announcement telegraphed on the arrival of the mail yesterday morning from San Francisco, among other items of news, that Mr. Derry was contemplating the issue of Treasury bills, in anticipation of the revenue, was strongly commented upon amongst colonists and others connected with Australian matters in the city, etc., in the afternoon, and an opinion was widely expressed that had this been known before the late loan was issued, it might have been far less successful than it actually proved."

Pneumo-pneumonia is reported to have made its appearance at Shepparton.

An "Argus" telegram states that the Sydney banks have agreed to reduce the rate of interest on deposits to 2, 3, and 4 per cent. for three, six, and twelve months respectively.

Municipal affairs at Townsville have terminated in a deadlock.

A case of interest to contractors and shire councils came before His Honour Judge Smyth at the late sittings of the County Court at Hamilton, and is thus reported by the "Spectator":—"A general impression prevails amongst contractors that if provided with an order so to do by a surveyor, they can, with impunity, enter upon private land and take away stone required for public purposes."

The Hon. J. G. Francis has not hitherto drawn the payment to which he was legally entitled to as a member of Parliament. He still retains his opinions on the subject of payment of members, though admitting that a good deal may be said on both sides; but as the principle has again been affirmed by Parliament, he does not wish to be singular in declining to accept payment, and intends applying the money so received to purposes, partly of a general character. In pursuance of this intention, Christmas prizes will be given to the various State schools in the Kelly country, and the two gnisuckers are sure to be returned."

BEAUFORT MINING ITEMS.

Beaufort.—At a meeting of shareholders in this company, held on Thursday last (a full report of which will be found in another column), it was decided to let the mine on tribute. A meeting of miners interested is convened for Monday evening next, at the Camp Hotel. Tenders are invited from miners willing to take the mine on tribute, returnable at the company's office on Thursday next.

Homeward Bound.—No. 3 bore was bot-tomed on Tuesday last at 100 feet, with 5 feet of wash, and a splendid prospect of gold was washed from the bottom. No. 4 bore was down 80 feet yesterday evening.

Ballarat and Beaufort Consols.—Rapid progress is being made with the erection of extra machinery at this claim.

South Deception.—The ordinary general meeting of shareholders will be held at the North Star Hotel, Ballarat, on Saturday next, the 27th inst.

New Discovery.—Have been engaged during the greater part of the week in repairing the drives. Two drives still in wash.

Waterloo.—No. 3 crosscut broke into wash at 60 feet on Thursday. No. 1 drive was stopped on Wednesday afternoon, the water being too heavy to make satisfactory progress.

Hourly Pasha.—Yield for five days, 65oz. The new rise in shaft drives will be high enough to start driving to-morrow night. The wash in deep ground is still looking well.

Frasers' Freshhold.—Still engaged in driving across the flat, and the appearance of the country has entirely changed, since last report, having come into a black wash, with blue reef. A few prospects have been tried, with better results than any previously obtained.

New Perseverance.—Three small machines have been washed, yielding about 5oz. of gold. The uphill drive is being continued. Have opened out another crosscut, going south, at a distance of 40 feet from the last one. A crosscut has been opened out at about 64 feet from opening of downhill drive. The wash is looking well. Good progress is being made with the erection of machinery. A postponed sale of forfeited shares will be held to-day, at the George Hotel.

Victory (quartz).—The contractors engaged in breaking down the quartz have been doing some dead work. The stone now coming up is looking well. Will clean up on Wednesday next.

WATERLOO SUNDAY SCHOOL.

The anniversary services of the above school were held on Sunday and Monday last. The Rev. C. Harris preached in the afternoon, and Mr. J. Prentiss officiated in the evening. The church building was crowded to excess on both occasions. On Monday the usual picnic was held opposite the church, the day being a very pleasant one and a great number of people assembled, and all seemed to enjoy themselves. At about 3 o'clock the children (numbering 140) sat down to an excellent tea, which was provided by Messrs. Harris and Robinson in their usual good style. The local brass band discoursed some very nice music during the afternoon. In the evening a public meeting was held in the church, when a large number could not gain admittance. Mr. Leadbeater was voted to the chair, and addresses were given by the Rev. C. Harris, the chairman, and Mr. C. Rankin. The latter, being the superintendent of the school, urged those present to assist in carrying out the good work. The children, assisted by the choir, sang some very choice selections during the evening, and also recited a number of interesting pieces, all of which were greatly enjoyed by those present, and too much praise cannot be given those who tutored the children. Votes of thanks were passed to the ladies and the choir, and singing the Doxology brought the meeting to a close.

THE EXHIBITION.

(FROM OUR OWN REPRESENTATIVE.)

NEW SOUTH WALES.

Excepting Victoria, the New South Wales coat occupies a larger area than that of any other of our colonies.

Space has been allotted to it in two portions of the building, the larger and more important being next to the Victorian section in the main avenue, and the lesser to the right of the organ, under the Fine Art galleries.

The entrance to the larger division is marked by three striking trophies, showing the chief mineral productions of the colony—gold, copper, and tin. Silver and iron are also well represented, but they are either not so plentiful, or cannot be worked to such advantage.

The immense blocks of coal here exhibited, together with piles of kerosene shale, and the manufactured oil, are mainly interesting as showing how liberally nature has dealt with our neighbors in regard to minerals.

The most complete, as well as one of the most valuable and interesting exhibits in this section is the collection of indigenous woods. That these have been deemed worthy of the colony is evident from the amount of space and attention bestowed upon them.

A large cedar pleasure boat is a conspicuous object at the entrance of this court. It is highly ornamented with brass rivets, and well finished; but beyond this there appears to be nothing new.

perfect instrument of to-day by comparing it with the ruder one of days gone by. The fine arts are by no means striking—a few portraits and landscapes in oil, and a number of photographs, none of which possess any special merit.

Notwithstanding all that has been written by a section of our press for the purpose of showing that New South Wales, without the fostering aid of a protective policy, equals, if it does not surpass, Victoria in the extent and quality of its manufactures, one thing is evident, and that is that the New South Wales court does not afford the slightest support to these statements.

BEAUFORT COMPANY.

A special meeting of the above company was held at Thurling's Royal George Hotel, Lydiard street, on Thursday afternoon, 18th November, to consider the future operations of the company. There were about thirty-two shareholders present, representing nearly 7000 shares.

Walker and W. Cotehett were appointed to act as scrutineers at the meeting. The directors' report stated:—"Under the present circumstances, in regard to the affairs of the company, we have thought it advisable to suspend the works at the mine, and call you together to consider future operations. The causes which have led to the stoppage of the works are the want of success in our prospecting operations and the difficulty of getting in calls. With regard to the first reason, the shareholders will have learned from the weekly reports that the ground driven through is very poor. The mining manager will explain everything to you in regard to the works. As to the second reason, namely, the difficulty of getting in calls, you will observe from the statement to be read that the 19th call has not been paid on 1455 shares. The forfeited shares were submitted to public auction on Wednesday, the 10th instant, but were unsaleable for the value of the call. We had therefore a well-grounded fear that the shilling call then due would not be well responded to. This, together with the fact that the creditors were pressing for their money, forced the conviction upon us that to carry on under the circumstances would be neither politic nor just. We were therefore of opinion that the interest of the company and of the creditors would be best served by stopping the works and putting the material in a place of safety, so that the assets could be speedily realised if you should decide on winding up. If you decide otherwise, the material can be replaced in a few hours at a trifling cost. The whole matter is therefore submitted to you for your consideration.—PETER M'WHAKE, Chairman."

The balance-sheet for a period extending from 17th August to 15th November showed receipts amounting to £1019 6s. 7d.; cash advanced, £13 0s. 5d.; total, £1032 7s. Expenditure, £1013 2s.; bank balance, £19 5s.; total, £1032 7s. Assets, £5027 14s. 8d.; liabilities, £898 14s. 3d. A discussion took place regarding the action of the directors in lifting the rails in the mine, several of the shareholders blaming the directors for what they had done. Mr. Thurling explained that the directors had been afraid that the rails, etc., would have been lost had the water risen in the mine. The chairman, in reference to the future operations of the company, suggested that the mine be let on tribute, and that the shilling call be cancelled, and that three monthly calls of sixpence be made to pay off the liabilities. He also suggested boring to the east and west of the shaft. Mr. W. H. Batten made a few remarks, and concluded by moving that the directors be empowered to let the mine on tribute. The plan of the claim was laid on the table, and the manager explained the position of the shaft and workings. Mr. Macaw expressed himself as dissatisfied with the directors for not having proved the ground by boring. The chairman here explained that all the directors had resigned. Mr. Thurling joyfully explained in reference to his resignation that he had received votes of thanks from the directors for what he had done for the company, and then at the next meeting he had been blamed. Mr. Jones seconded Mr. Batten's motion as to letting the mine on tribute, and the motion was carried. With regard to a proposal that the old directors' resignations be accepted, the chairman expressed himself adverse to this, and thought that if the directors resigned in a body it would be difficult to carry on the mine. He replied to a shareholder the chairman said he would be willing to act with the old board, but he would be afraid to begin with an entirely new board. Mr. Thurling then intimated that rather than endanger the company he would be willing to act for a time. Let the meeting appoint new directors, and the old directors would retire one by one, and make way for the new ones. Those of the old directors present then retired from the room. Messrs M'WHAKE, Rule, and Batten afterwards consented to remain in office, and the chairman and Mr. Macaw were recommended by the meeting to the directors to fill the vacancies in the board created by the death of Mr. John Keith and the retirement of Mr. Thurling. The chairman then intimated that the first business of the directors would be to call for tenders for taking the mine on tribute. A hearty vote of thanks to the chair concluded the business. —"Ballarat Star."

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Passengers, Harbours, and Navigation Laws Amendment Bill was passed through committee without amendment.

The following railway lines were authorised by the Assembly on Tuesday:—Horsham to Dimboola, Braunholme to Casterton, Ballarat to Scarsdale, Castlemeane to Maldon, Everton to Myrtleford, Colac to Camperdown, Tallarook to Yea, Footscary to Baeuch Marsh, Traralgon to Heyfield, Morwell to Mirboo, and Hawthorn to Lilydale.

The Assembly spent Wednesday in committee on the Railway Bill, and the lines not previously disposed of were adopted as proposed by the Government.

—Richmond to Alphington, Kensington to Coburg, Caulfield to Frankston, Wodonga to the Murray, and Ballarat to the Ballarat racecourse. Afterward several hon. members submitted new proposals.

Mr. W. Madden, in particular, urged the claims of an extension of the Donald line to the Shepherds, but he was mollified by the assurance of the Minister that the line had been in the schedule originally, and was only omitted because of the want of funds.

Another hon. Mr. Patterson says, will be indispensable, to complete the Gipps Land, the Wimmera, and the Western District communications.

Mr. Hunt pointed out that in the next loan Kilmore ought not to be ignored, but should be granted its line to Heathcote, and the House and the Minister were sympathetic.

The machinery clauses of the bill were adopted without discussion, Mr. Patterson giving a pledge that the deviations, which vary from a quarter of a mile to seven miles, shall not apply to the terminal points.

The bill is to be reported on Tuesday next. The remaining clauses of the Rabbit Bill were disposed of in committee.

The Government went into committee of ways and means on Thursday in order to further deal with the budget proposals. The duty of 6d. per gallon on "animal and vegetable oils" was proposed by the Minister of Customs, who also submitted the following exemptions:—"Bluck oil, coconut oil, cod oil, palm oil, and linseed oil."

Mr. Murray Smith said the tax was a revenue tax, and if the mines and the farmers who would have to pay it were agreeable to such imposts, there was no reason why he and other members should oppose the proposition.

Mr. Kerrot complained, however, that the tax would materially affect the tweed mills, which use a great deal of olive oil, and which have found it impossible to use the colonial article.

A duty of 5s. per gallon on olive oil will not, says Mr. Kerrot, bring about a commercial production here. The committee would not exempt olive oil, however; and moreover, linned oil was struck out of the list of exemptions, and the duty was agreed to without a division.

The increased duty on tobacco of 3s. per lb. was also carried, and progress reported. The Army Discipline Bill, which introduces the permanent Mutiny Act of the House of Commons, was read a second time.

The Assembly met at 4 o'clock on Thursday, in order to commence business at an early hour, but it was nearly 9 o'clock before the Government measures were touched.

A question by Mr. Bolton, whether the sufferers by the Goulburn Valley were to be compensated at once, brought Mr. Woods on his legs with an onslaught upon "The Argus" for its recent comments upon the case.

Mr. Woods says that the train he was in was not the train which caused the fires, and he protested again that the fires were not occasioned by any train at all. The allusion to the train as a "champagne special" was declared by Mr. Woods to involve a disgraceful insinuation, which he repudiated on his own behalf and on that of the "distinguished visitors" who were present on the occasion.

Mr. Gillies said that where Mr. Woods was wrong was in refusing an investigation, and setting the claim aside on his own responsibility. There could be no doubt but that the fires were caused by the specials on the opening day.

Many men had been ruined, and it was cruel to withhold the compensation. Mr. Patterson asserted that the money was due, and ought to be paid; and as Mr. Service promised that the Opposition would support the Government if it met the claim, Mr. Berry gave, the necessary pledge. This matter disposed of, the weary question of how many of the unemployed were put on public works by Mr. Bent, was raised again by Mr. Laurens. Mr. Mirams joined in the fray; Mr. Bent and Mr. Service had explanations to offer; the retort courteous and discourteous was freely given, and in this way the best part of the evening was wasted.
