

At Nhill, where the average is set down by experienced men at eighteen bushels to the acre, wheat commands only 2s 5d per bushel. The charges for delivery at Horsham amount to 1s per bushel, and 3s 5d is the price given there. THE LATE RAILWAY COLLISION.

The following is the report of the departmental board appointed by the Minister of Railways to inquire into the cause of the recent collision :-

Railway Department,

Melbourne, 1st February, 1881. Sir,-We have the honour to report that, n accordance with our instructions, we have inquired into the cause of the collision which occurred at Beaufort on 26th ult.

The rapidity with which holes of 18 inches deep were bored in Malmabury bluestone was surprising, compared with hand labor. It is certainly the most efficient and reliable rock-drilling machine in the market. It is self-evident that, protected at is by all its working parts being enclosed (which is not the case with other inventious for similar purposes, exhibited by foreign manufacturers). it must be much less liable to get out of order, when we remember to what clouds of dust and grit it is exposed in mining operations. Its simplicity also renders it much less liable to get out of order, and much more easily to be renaired than more complicated Rock Drills. Also the clip, or coupling of jacket to column, being made of tough steel, it is lighter, takes less room, thereby holes in drives can always be bored to advantage, i.e., can be placed "flat," only having one nut to loosen to disconnect drill from column, enabling the drill to be placed in position for boring very quickly. GARDENING FOR FEBRUARY.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Cabbage, cauliflower, lettuce, spinach, and turnips should be sown. Early potatoes may be planted largely. Celery and leeks to be transplanted into trenches. Dig up any vacant ground in readiness for autumn cropping; the soil is pulverised and sweetened by exposure to the atmosphere. Cabbage and cauliflower plants should be planted largely. If dry, water as last month.

FLOWER GARDEN.-Proceed with the propagation of favorite plants by layering cuttings, or otherwise. Plant at the end of the month a few hyacinths, tulips, anemones, ranunculi, and narcissi for early blooming. Sow stocks, larkspur, mignonette, etc. Take care that camellias, azaleas, rhododendrons, and the like plants do not suffer from want of water. Climbers must be regulated, the stronger growing kinds cut back, and others neatly tied up. All decayed flower stems or leaves 5s., 10s., 15s., and £1 per share respectively, on orderly.

THE FARM.-The plough will be in active use this month, unless the weather is very unfavorable. 

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

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Cabbage, cauliflower lettuce, spinach, and turnips should be sown. Early potatoes may be planted largely. Celery and leeks to be transplanted into trenches. Dig up any vacant ground in readiness for autumn cropping; the soil is pulverised and sweetened by exposure to the atmosphere. Cabbage and cauliflower plants should be planted largely. If dry, water as last month. FLOWER CARDEN.—Proceed with the propagation of favorite plants by layering cuttings, or otherwise. Plant at the end of the month a few hyacinths, tulips, anemones, ranunculi, and narcissi for early blooming. Sow stocks, larkspur, mignonette, etc. Take care that camellias, azaleas, rhododendrons, and the growing kinds cut back, and others neatly tied up. All decayed flower stems or leaves to be removed; walks to be kept neat and

very unfavorable. Sow turnips for sheepalso oats, Cape barley, rye, and tares for green feed. Continue the use of the horse-noe amongst drilled crops. Look to your manure heap; collect everything that is convertible into manure, and, when thoroughly rotted, cart on to your land.







Salt should not be applied to such lands as border on the sea or in any way affected by the spray of the ocean. Coarse salt should be mixed with the compost heap and not applied directly to the plants. Asparagus, naturally a native of the seashore, will require large quantities of salt. This should only be applied, however, when the shoots are growing. At any other time it will injure the roots.

Such medical aid as could be summoned could give but little relief, and two days after the occurrence six of the wedding guests were dead. Robert Dale, the bride's brother, died next day. Mike May, a relative of the groom, died in a few hours. Albert Gallagher and Miss Mattie Lovelace, well-known young people, died next day. Two young girls, Emma Peters and Kate Lowey, died within four hours. Colonel Dale and his wife were very low, and their death was momentarily expected. The cause of the tragedy was the use of arsenic instead of salt in seasoning the chickens. Colonel Tale purchased a quantity of arsenic a day or two before to kill crows, and carelessly left it in the kitchen. A blundering servant mistook it for salt, and hence the fatal results.

KILKENNY CATS.

The story has been so long current that it has become a moverb-"as quarelsome as the Kilkenny cats" - two of the cats in which city are asserted to have fought so long and so furieusly that nought was found of them but two tails. The correct version of this saving is this :- During the revellion which occurred in Ireland in 1798, Kilkenny was garrisoned by a regiment of Hessian soldiers, whose custom it was to tie, together, in one of their barrack rooms, two cats by their respective tails, and then to throw them face to face across a line generally used for drying clothes. The cats naturally became infuriated, and scratched each other in the abdomen until death ensued to one or both of them. The officers were made acquainted with these barbarous acts of cruelty, and resolved to put an end to them. For this purpose an officer was ordered to inspect each barrack-room daily, and report its state. The soldiers, determined not to lose the daily torture of the cats, generally employed one of their comrades to watch the approach of the officer. On one occasion he neglected his duty, and the officer was heard ascending the stairs while the cats were undergoing their custowary torture. One of the troopers seized a sword from the arm-rack, and with a single blow, divided the tails of the two cats. The cats escaped through the open windows of the room, which was entered instantly afterwards by the officer, who inquired what was the cause of the two bleeding cats' tails being suspended on the line, and was told in reply that two cats had been fighting in the room; that it was found impossible to separate them, and they fought so desperately that they had devoured each other up, with the excephad devoured each other

GARDENING FOR FEBRUARY.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Cabbage, cauliflower, lettuce, spinach, and turnips should be sown. Early potatoes may be planted largely. Celery and leeks to be transplanted into trenches. Dig up any vacant ground in readiness for autumn cropping; the soil is pulverised and sweetened by exposure to the atmosphere. Cabbage and cauliflower plants should be planted largely. If dry, water as last month.

FLOWER GARDEN.-Proceed with the propa gation of favorite plants by layering cuttings, or otherwise. Plant at the end of the month a few hyacinths, tulips, anemones, ranunculi, and narcissi for early blooming. Sow stocks, larkspur, mignonette, etc. Take care that camellias, uzaleas, rhododendrons, and the like plants do not suffer from want of water. 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
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

COMMERCIAL.

ARARAT PRODUCE MARKET.

Wheat has come forward in considerable quantities during the past week, and a good many sales are reported at last week's rates, 3s 4d to 3s 6d, the latter for " bags in." In a number of cases farmers, however, declined business at present rates, preferring to hold for an improved market : consequently a considerable portion of that brought in has been stored. From what we can learn, however, the prospects of any material strengthening in values is remote. Tonnage is scarce in Hobson's Bay, notwithstanding that two vessels, the Hesperus and Leonard, have been chartered in Adelaide. Their cargoes await their arrival. Prices in the metropolis are still 3s 11d for prime milling, shipping parcels being worth 4s to 4s 03d. Steady sales of flour are made at LS 10s to LS 12s 6d. We learn by cable advices that in the English market a steady trade is being done, but as the severity of the American winter must now be almost spent, it will not be long before a heavy influx of grain will take place from that country, and a decline in prices will most probably result. In the Wimmera district, grain continues to pour in to the various railway stations in immense quantities. In Horsham the market is firm at 3s 5d to 3s 51d for good samples. At Stawell, prices are about 11 in advance of this rate. At Donald prime samples of new wheat, in new sacks, command 3s 1d per bushel. At St. Arnaud wheat remains unaltered at 3s 5d per bushel. Wheat sells at Warrambool at 3s 10d to 4s per bushel; flour being worth L10 per ton, and oats 1s 6d to 1s 9d per bushel; and at Hamilton wheat is quoted at 3s to 3s 8d. Locally, flou has had a moderate sale for trade purposes at our prices. A good deal of business has been done in oats, which may be quoted at 2s, at which one parcel of a hundred bags of prime were disposed of. Some inferior lots were sold as low as Is 10d, but good feeding samples are worth our figure. Potatoes are a trifle easier, the supply for the week having been large. There is a good demand for hav and values are strengthening. GARDENING FOR FEBRUARY.


