The Reform Bill was pushed through committee in the Assemby on Tuesday without any effort in less than an hour. The only amendments were suggested by Mr. Fisher who wished a clause introduced prohibiting the employment of canvassers and cars at elections, and who also took exception to the arrangement of the provinces or districts. Mr. Bent also commented upon the absurdity of placing Branswick, which is on one side of the city, and Brighton, which is on the other, in the same division. Mr. Berry said he was with Mr. Fisher in desiring to restrict expenses at elections, but the matter should be dealt with in a measure applicable to both Houses. As to the provinces he deprecated any alteration of the bill. The sample of gold is improving as injury to the inmates of the carriage, but the second exploded with terrible effect, inflicting mortal injuries upon the Emperor, and killing and wounding a number of Imperial suite. The Emperor was shockingly mangied. One leg was torn from the body, and he received other serious injuries. Surgical aid was immediately procured, but it was of no avail-His Majesty, after lingering for an hour, sank, and died. A number of the guards, officers, and police who surrounded the carriage were killed, and several others were wounded. The Grand Duke Michael was amongst the wounded The shock caused by the explosion was so great that the windows of houses situated at great distances from the scene were shattered. The assassin has been

A SENSATIONAL BALLOON ASCENT.

secured, and admitted his guilt.

Lestrange's balloon ascent from the outer Domain, Sydney on Tuesday night proved a sensational affair. About 10,000 people were in the vicinity during the inflation of the balloon, which occupied a considerable time. The balloon was well filled with gas, and an ascent was attempted at half-past 9. Owing to the bad quality of the gas, however, the balloon would not rise with the car attached. After repeated attempts, the crowd of people got very impatient, and Lestrange decided to ascend without the car, which was accordingly done, the aeronaut taking his place in the netting at the bottom of the balluon. An ascent was made apparently to a height of about a mile, the balloon bearing in a south-easterly direction, but there was very little wind. After being 10 minutes in the air, the balloon began to descend towards Hyde-park, but suddenly went eastward, and lodged on the top of a house in Palmer-street, Woolloomooloo. Great numbers of people watched its progress, and when it reached the earth a large crowd congregated in the street, Lestrange succeeded in getting clear of the balloon, and had no sooner reached the ground when in some way or other the balloon suddenly exploded and became a mass of flame. Some little damage was done to the roof of When the gas exploded the crowd were panicstricken, and there was a general stampede. but no accident of any moment is reported. The gas is supposed to have ignited by communication with a gas jet in the house .-'Argus" telegram.

After deducting for seed and home consumption, the quantity available for export is estimated at 137,500 tons, being 134,000 tons less than last year, and less in value £1,500,000.

A startling discovery (says the "Hamilton Spectator") in connection with the hitherto unaccountable spread or outbreak of fires on properties at various places at almost the same time, was made on Saturday at Penshurst, on the occasion of the furious bushfire raging there on that day. While Mr. Hutton and an army of beaters were at work extinguishing the fire on the boundary of their properties, they were amuzed on observing a large tare dash out from the middle of a burning patch across the three chain road, which had so far kept the fire in check, and with her coat all aflame, entered the thick grass in the opposite paddock, which in less time than it takes to record the incident, was burning furiously. The idea which formerly existed, that the fur on the living animals would not carry flame, is now dispelled, and a grave cause for alarm must naturally be created amongst landed proprietors.



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



The Reform Bill was disposed of in the Assembly on Wednesday evening. The proceedings in the Lower House consisted for the most part of the discussion of an important point of order. Si. Bryan O'Loghlen gave notice of his motion that the Ministerial bill and the Council bill be referred to a joint committee. On applying to the Speaker for information whether the motion would be in order after the reading, the hon, member was informed that the motion could not be put at all, inasmuch as it was substantially the same as one which had been negatived on the second reading of the measure. The Speaker's ruling was given unexpectedly before discussion, and the Ministerial members endeavoured to prevent the Opposition members speaking to the point, on the grond that the ruling once given could not be challenged. Mr. Kerferd, to render discussion possible, moved, proforma, that the ruling be disagreed with. The Opposition contended that, as a matter of fact, Mr. Murray Smith's amendment was never put, having been set aside by a previous formal question. Further, they urged that time was the essence of the first motion, and that it did not follow that because the House objected to a conference at the one stage it should object at another. Mr Wrixon pointed out that when the House decides not to read a bill a second time on one day it can still read the measure a second time on some future occasion. The Speaker adhered to his ruling, however, and the motion for disagreeing with him was withdrawn. WATERLOO. The half-yearly general meeting of this compuny was held on Friday, the 18th inst., at the Commercial Hotel. Mr. James Prentice occupied the chair, and there were 3,900 shares rethe past six months. Mr. D. Cochran, one of the board, is empowered to inspect the works occasionally, and to take charge of the gold from the tributors. He receives £1 per week for his services. GARDENING FOR MARCH.

KITCHEN GARDEN .- Sow cabbage, cauliflower, early horn carrot, brocoli, lettuce, peas, radish, spinach, and turnip. Kidney cotatoes may still be planted. Earth up celery. Top-dress asparagus beds with salt or seaweed. If new strawberry beds are required, plant runners as soon as you can obtain them; three-your-old beds should be destroyed.

FLOWER GARDEN .- Dahlias, hellyhocks, liliums, and Pompon crysanthemums will now be in their prime; liquid manure will prolong and enhance the beauty of these flowers; dead blooms must be picked off, or the plants will be impoverished. This is the best month to sow bardy annual and perennial flower seeds. Prepare your ground for planting shrubs, ornamental trees, etc.; if not already trenched, get it done at once. Herbaceous plants can be divided, and planted where wanted; carnations and pinks may still be propagated by cuttings under a bell glass.
