MESSRS. GEORGE HAGUE AND Co. report -Wool.-Preparations for shearing are now becoming general, and we anticipate shortly having the first instalment of the new clip in our store. The first two wool ships have that the intelligence and prudence of the already arrived at our wharves, and others are expected in the course of a week or so. Sheepskins .- We had a large supply, and made a fair clearance as follows :- Butchers' fiesh skins. 48d to 54d each ; superior wellgrown ditto, from 57d upwards; medium skins, 30d to 42d each ; country and station killing, 30d to 46d each, and 3d to 6<sup>2</sup>/<sub>4</sub>d per pound; lambskins 6d to 22d each, and 2d to 4d per pound. Hides .--- The extreme depression noted in our last report still prevails. and the only descriptions that excite any animation whatever are prime beavies well taken off and in good condition. Tallow .-The improved tone of the home market lias had a beneficial effect on prices here, and notwithstanding the high rates ruling for freight, shinders have again come forward more freely, and we have been able to place some considerable lines at full quotations. ## AN AWFUL VENGEANCE.

Last night in Heard county, near Albania, occurred one of the most norrible instances of popular indignation. Jesse Waldrop was burned to ashes.

Alabama, Dr. John Mitchell, a prominent young physician, married Carrie Knight, formed for her beauty and accomplishments. On the 29th of June, in the joy of their koneymoon, Dr. Mitchell was walking up the road near his country home, when he beheld what almost paralysed him with horror. His lovely wife lay before him a ghastly corpse. Her throat was cut from ear to ear, and her body torn with the awful clutches of her murderer. It was discovered that she had been violated and murdered. The neighborhood was at once allame with excitement. and search for the guilty was begun. Jesse Waldrop had not long been in the country, bat there had followed him rumors of his bad character. He was seen on the road near where the corpse was found on the day of the murder. In the death struggle the murderer had bitten his victim severely on. the cheek and left signs that one of his front teeth was out. Waldrop had this peculiarity. With these evidences search for him was begun at once, and it was found that he had fled. Trained bloodhounds were obtained, and from the scene of the murder they tracked him several miles into Georgia. Here the pursuing party heard that Waldrop had passed. Gradually tracing him they arrived at Nownan, thirty miles from Atlanta, where a ferryman described a man who had crossed the night before, and the pursuers knew that Waldrop could not be far away. At midnight on the 3rd the party reached a house where they learned a man calling himself Owen had stopped. They demanded to be shown to his room ; rapping at it, Waldron came out. He was seized and after a desperate resistance, bound. He denied all knowledge of the erime, and was taken to jail, though the fury of the crowd demanded his instant death.

Next day circumstances were collected so strongly and presented to him that trembling with fear, he confessed all, and. after detailing his damning story, told of a life of crime which few police annals can equal. He confessed to having five living wives. When he confessed, passion rose so high that he was about to be swung, when someone suggested that he ought to die on the scene of his crime, and that hanging was too good for him. Accordingly he was left in gaol until the night hefore last, when fifty men, armed, but not disguised, went there and demanded him. The jailer gave him up, and the procession i started. All along the route people came out to look at the prisoner and demanded that he should die. 





### A FOREIGNER ON "SHOUTING."

The following letter has been addressed to the editor of the "Age":---

Sir,-Knowing the great interest you take in the welfare and progress of the colony, I cannot but point out to you as an ex-foreigner, the great drawback, loss of money, inconvenience resulting from the general and indiscriminate use and abuse of "shouting." During the time given to me to sojourn in this colony I have more than once noticed that "shouting" has become more a had and costly habit than a matter of real friendship and respect, as it was no doubt intended to be. I am sure that the loss consequent on this habit does not fall on the working men, who earn a great deal more than anywhere else in the world, nor on the richer classes who have no other chance to show their good disposition to their fellow creatures, but on those men (and there are tens of thousands of such) who have to live with their families at the rate of from 6s to 10s per diem. The indispensable or casual meeting of friends, or merely acquaintances, is tantamount to a loss of from 20 to 30 per cent. of their earnings. nearly the rate of a dollar per word. To spend a couple of shillings per day in this way is the least that can happen to any man who has, or must make, friends or acquaintances. I think it would not be one of the most impossible things to form a league which would have for its object the putting down of such a superfluous, ruinous, and insincere method of depriving your friend and his family of one-fifth or fourth of his income, and of a great part of his health. Total abstinence, temperance, and all such societies will never or hardly ever, succeed in preventing the use of stimulating drinks for many reasons-Firstly, that according to my ideas there is nothing more consoling to mind and body than to enjoy a glass of beer, whine, whisky, or brandy in a moderate way, and without being compelled to do it perhaps with people whom you do not care for, or who probably do not care for you, and at hours when you feel, or ought to feel, the least disposed or ready to do it. It is true that habit becomes second nature, how many cases of people becoming almost drunkards, ruining themselves, their health, and their families, are to be attributed to the obnoxious system of "shouting." I can tell you from experience that, contrary to anything I wished for, and did like during the whole course of my life, I am in constant dread of making new or casual friends, as it usually implies that I will have to swallow a lot of more or less cool drink that my new friend will "shout" for; or, which is worse, that I will have to swallow and shout for in return. Under the circumscances I think the formation of a league, every member of which would make it a point of obligation neither to accept nor offer a "shcut," would have a most beneficial effect on his health and pockets. A small

## GARDENING FOR SEPTEMBER.

KITCHEN GARDEN .-- This is the busiest month in the year for seed-sowing; most of Bronchial Troches." 

President, of the United States, has, in accordance with the constitution, succeeded to the position rendered vacant by the death of General Garfield, and has to-day taken the oath of office, and assumed the functions of President of the Republic: Public confidence has been assured by the promptitude with which the Executive acted.

Her Majesty the Queen and H.R.H. the Prince of Wales have conveyed through the British Minister at Washington their deep regret at the calamity which has overtaken the American nation, and their warm symucthy with Mrs. Garfield in the affliction which has befallen her.

Earl Granville, the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, telegraphed to the secretary of State (Senator Blaine) expressing the great concern of the British Government at the misfortune which has befallen the Republic by the death of its President, and their sympathy with Mrs. Garfield.

(REUTER'S TELEGRAMS.)

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.

It is officially intimated that the following programme will be observed in connexion with the removal of the remains of the late President Garfield from Long Branch, where he died on Monday last, to the place of inter-ment :-- To-day (Wednesday) the body will be brought to Washington by train, and will lie at the White House for three days. A coroner's inquest will be held on Friday, the 23rd. and on the following morning the remains will be taken to Cleveland, Ohio, where the funeral will take place, with much ceremony, on Monday next.

NEW YORK, Sept. 21. News from all parts of the country testifies to the deep sorrow which has been occasioned by the death of the late President.

Business has been almost universally sugpended in this and the other large citics of the United States, and general mourning is observed among all classes of the com munity.

LONDON, Sept. 22. Her Majesty the Queen has ordered that the Court shell wear mourning for one week as a mark of deep respect for the memory of the late Prsident Garfield.

This graceful act on the part of Her Majesty is quite unprecedented, the British Court never having worn mourning for a deceased President of the United States. or other than a high Royal personage.

A post mortem examination was made yesterday on the body of the late President, and the following particulars have now been made public by his medical attendants as the result of their investigation :---

The second ball which was fired by the assassin Guiteau first struck the ribs, two or three of which were fractured. The ball thence passed to the backbone. Being by this time nearly spent, it lodged below the pancreas, or gland secreting the juices of the liver. In this it became encysted, or enclosed as in a vesicle, and there it remained, all efforts to remove it during life proving ineffectual.

The immediate cause of death, however, has been ascertained to have been rupture of the mesenteric artery.




