





BALLARAT WHOLESALE PRODUCE MARKET.

There was a good supply of produce in the J market on Thursday, and a fair demand. The following are our quotations :- Barley, English, 3s 3d to 3s 6d; Cape barley, 2s 9d to 3s; wheat, 5s to 5a 2d; oats, 3s 3d to 3s 4d; sheaves, L2 to L2 12s 6d; manger hay, L3 to L3 10s; potatoes, L1 15s; straw. 25s to 30s; peas, 3s 10d; rye-grass, 5s to 6s; bran, 1s 2d; pollard, 1s 4d; bonedust, L6 10z; flour, L11.

ARARAT PRODUCE MARKET.

The breadstuff market has been fairly animated during the week, a number of lots having come in. One parcel of SO hags sold at the beginning of the week for 4s 10d bags returned, and several smaller lots have changed hands at the same figure. Breadstuffs have had little enquiry in Melbourne, sules of flour being inactive at L11 7s 6d to L11 10s. Wheat maintains a firm quotation at 5s 7d for prime, but no transactions are reported. In the Wimmera district and also at Donald and St. Arnaud no change is reported in prices. At Landsborough wheat fetches 5a Id (bags in); whilst flour changes hands at 1.10 15s; bran, 1s 2d per bushel, and pollard, 1s 4d. Holders of flour in this district are holding out for L11 10s per ton, whilst buyers regard L11 5s as full value, and decline to make large purchases at any advance. A good quantity of bran is being sent out of the district, feed being still scarce. One lot of five tons was sent to Melhourne, where 151d is obtained. Pollard is in short supply here. and sells at 1s 4d per bushel. One load of Warrambool potatoes only has come in, for which L3 10s was obtained, but Ballarat varieties are well supplied, and eggs are still plentiful at 6d and 7d. There is a good demand for cheese, and little coming forward. Onions are scarce, and would readily fetch 18s per cwt. The debate on the second reading of the Water Conservation Bill was resumed in the Legislative Assembly on Wednesdaay after private business was disposed of. Mr. M'Coll delivered what, under the circumstances of the occasion. might be considered a speech of moderate length. He objected to the measure because it was founded on the plans of Messrs. Gordon and Black, which he condemned because they would not fit in with the "only true scheme" vet devised for irrigating the dry inland plains. In the hope of convincing the House of the greatness of his faith in the soundness of that scheme, Mr. M'Coll stated that he had vowed never to touch any spirituous liquor until he should be able to dilute it with water from the canal. This solemu announcement was received with very little reverence.

The bill amending and continuing the existing land laws was circulated on Thursday. The maximum size of selectors' holdings is increased to 640 acres. For the future pastoral holdings will be limited in size, and they will be submitted to auction. Special provision is made for the mailee country. which is divided into two districts, the inner and the outer. The inner district, which borders on the agricultural settlements, will

be divided into areas capable of carrying not more than 1,000 sheep ; in the outer district the maximum will be 10,000 sheep. Transfers of leases will be permitted, and there is no provision preventing the same person from holding more than one area. The leases will be submitted to auction, the payment of a premium being expected in addition to the fixed annual rent.

The Legislative Assembly wore a troubled look at the time of its meeting on Thursday. The chamber was noticeably crowded, particularly on the Opposition side, very soon after the Spenker took the chair. It had become known that the Opposition had decided at their caucus on making or supporting an attack on the personnel of the Education commission : but members were in doubt as to what reliance they should place on the rumor that notice of motion was to be given by Mr. Ramsay. Pending the settlement of this interesting question, a skirmish occurred between Mr. Fincham and Sir Charles MacMahon, in regard to the report of the Police Commission, which had the effect of generating a little heat. Mr. Ramsay, in due course, read out his resolution, declaring the commission to be unsatisfactory, and asked the Premier when he would be afforded an opportunity to move it. Sir Bryan O'Loghlen said there would be no difficulty in naming a day if Mr. Ramsay, and also Mr. Berry, as leader of the Opposition, would say whether they meant the motion to be regarded as a vote of want of confidence or not. GARDENING FOR OCTOBER.







The means by which the result was accomplished was by a light piece of rope, which was passed around the front jaw of the mare above the upper teeth, crossed in her mouth, and thus secured back to her neck. It is claimed that no horse will kick or jump when thus secured, and that a 'bucking' horse, after receiving the treatment a few minutes, will quite abandon the habit. A very simple method was also shown by which a kicking horse could be shod. It consisted in connecting the animal's head and tail by means of a rope fastened to the tail and then to the bit, and drawn tight enough to incline the horse's head to one side. This, it is claimed, makes it absloutely impossible for the horse to kick on the side of the rope. At the same exhibition, a borse, which for many years, had to be bound on the ground to be shod, suffered the blacksmith to operate on him without attempting to kick while secured in the manner described."

GARDENING FOR OCTOBER.

KITCHEN GARDEN .--- If season be moist carrots, leeks, onions, and parsnips may still be sown. Sow largely of kidney beans, early turnips, capsicums, tomato, cucumbers, vegetable marrow, pumpkins, melons, and parsley ; also tall-growing varieties of peas--cauliflower, brocoli, and celery; also, sow again for succession. Weeds will grow apace -choose a fine sunny day for hoeing them down, and rake off when withered, to prevent their starting into growth again.

FLOWER GARDEN.-Balsams, cockscombs, globe amaranthus, zinnias, and other tender annuals, should now be sown, if not already done; if sown in pots, and transplanted into flower beds, place in sunny weather an empty flower-pot over the patches of young plants; remove the pots every evening, or the plants will grow up weak and splindling. Climbing plants will be growing fast, and require constant trimming and training. See that flower-beds are kept filled, by turning out large plants in pots.


