



GARDENING FOR FEBRUARY.



BALLARAT WHOLESALE PRODUCE MARKET.

There was a fair market on Thursday. We quote as follows :- Barley-English, 3s; Cape barley, 2s 6d; wheat, 4s 6d; oats, 2s 7d to 2s 8d; sheaves, L2 5s to L2 15s; manger hay, L3 5s to L3 15s; potatoes, L2 10s; straw, 30s to 40s; peas, 2s to 2s 8d; bran, Is 1d; pollard, 1s 3d; bonedust, L6 10s; flour, L10 5s.

ARARAT PRODUCE MARKET.

A fair amount of business has been transacted in the produce market during the week. Wheat remains as previously quoted, several sales being reported at our prices. There is, however, marked indisposition on the part of growers to quit large parcels at the present rates, they prefering to hold for an advance, which, in view of the rates ruling at the seaboard and up country, they argue must necessarily take place. We have heard of one good parcel of wheat changing hands at the beginning of the week at 4s 4d ex bags, delivered at the Maroona railway station, and two or three transactions at 4s 43d have taken place in the town, bags returned. In the Wimmers district wheat at the beginnning of the week sold at 4s 43d, and at the close it had reached 4s 51d. An advance is noted at St. Arnaud, where last week's pricewas 4s 6d, and the market is now firm at 4s. 61d, with a rising tendency. At Donald, THE acceptance of the Agent-Generalship by the present value. At Avoca, prices remain unchanged at 4s 6d per bushel, for wheat, and L10 per ton for flour. A sudden jump up is observable at Landsborough, where wheat commands 4s 6d to 4s 7d per bushel, and flour L9 10s per ton. Locally flour is quoted at L10 but there is not much speculation at that figure. There is an easier feeling regarding oats, though prices remain unaltered. Peas are now coming in for feeding purposes and there is a good demand at 3s per bushel. Potatoes at the beginning of the week were very scarce, and those in realised as high as L4 5s, but towards the end of the week they were more plentiful and prices receded to L3 our quotations. In dairy produce, fresh butter is very scarce, owing no doubt to the recent hot weather. That brought in meets with a ready sale at 8d to 9d. The market is fairly supplied with potted. THE FATE OF THE JEANNETTE.

The Jeannette, the Arctic steamer fitted out by Mr. Gordon Bennett, of the "New York Herald," and sent by him on an exploring voyage, has been lost. The Jeannotte is a three-masted steam yacht, of about 500 tons burden, and was originally known as the Pandora, being then the property of Sir Atlen Young. She was equipped for her voyage by Mr. Bennet, at an expense of £68,000. Her commander was Captain George W. Delong, of the United States service, and most of her officers and men wers experienced sailors who had been in former Arctic expeditions. She left San Francisco on July 8, 1879, and the last that had been heard of her since she sailed towards the north was on September 3 of the same year. when she was sighted by a whaler steaming in the direction of Warangel Island. In the summer of 1880 the United States Govern ment sent the revenue cutter Corwin to the north, to search for any tidings of the Jeannette, and in June of the present year it sent two steamers, the Rodgers and the Corwin, to renew the search by way of Behring's Straits. A vessel named the Alliance was also sent in the direction of Spitzbergen. Although all these vessels penetrated to high latitude no trace of the Jeannette was discovered. It is now announced from St Petersburg that the Jeannette was surrounded and crushed by the ice on the 23rd June last in lateitude 77 north, longitude 157 east. The crew left the vessel in three boats which about 50 miles from the mouth of the Lens. were separated by violent winds and thick fogs. Boat 3, which Engineer Mellville commanded, arrived on the 29th September at presidents) occupied the chair, and there were the eastern mouth of the Lena, where it was stopped by blocks of ice near the village of Bolonenga. Boat I, also reached the same spot. The men in these boats state that Lieutenant Delong, Dr. Ambler, and 12 other shipwrecked sailors landed at the northern mouth of the Lena, and in a fearful condition, several suffering from frost-bitten limbs. 

Celer and leeks to be transplanted into trenches Dig up any vacant ground in readiness for autumn cropping; the soil is pulverised and sweetened by exposure to the atmosphere Cabbage and cauliflower plants should b planted largely. If dry, water as last month FLOWER GARDEN.-Proceed with the

propogation of favorite plants by layering outtings or otherwise. Plant at the end of the month a few hyacinths, tulips, anemones ranunculi, and narcissi, for early blooming Sow stocks, larkspur, mignonette, etc. Tak care that camelias, azealas, rhododendrons and the like plants, do not suffer from wan of water. Climbers must be regulated, the stronger growing kinds cut back, and other neatly tied up. All decayed flower stems or leaves to be removed; walks to be kept near and orderly.
FARM.—The plough will be in active use

this month unless the weather is very unfavorable. Sow turnips for sheep-also oats, Cape barley, rye, and tares for green feed. Continue use of the horse-hoe amongst drilled crops. Look to your manure heap; collect everything that is convertible into manure, and, when thoroughly rotted, cart to your land,







By the registered excess of births over deaths the colony should have 15,890 more males than it has, but apparently they have

left for other colonies. The females, apparently, have all remained in the colonies, and there are 805 over, more than are accounted for by the births.

Thus the actual increase of both sexes is less by 15,085 than the registered natural in crease.

If we had all the population we should have, according to Mr. Hayter's estimates of births and immigration returns, there would be 67,437 more people in the colony than there are.

There are $90\frac{3}{4}$ females in the colony to every 100 females.

FATAL GUN ACCIDENT.

and the charge to explode. The deceased Melhourne. was a quite hardworking young man, and was well liked by all the men working with him. His parents reside at Ballarat, where his remains were conveyed by train on Thursday evening.

A magisterial enquiry into the circumstances surrounding the affair was held at the Trawalla Hotel on Thursday, before Mr. J. Prentice, J.P., when the following evidence was taken:--

E. W. Halse, blacksmith, Ballarat recognised the body as that of his son. Last saw him alive on Monday, in the forenoon; His age was eighteen years last birthday.

John T. Abbott, miner, residing at Beaufort, deposed: On Wednesday last left Beaufort, in company with deceased, at about 20 minutes to 12, on a shooting excursion to the salt dams at Trawalla. The deceased had the accepted. double-barrelled gun produced with him. After walking about the dams for some time I and deceased were in the act of crossing a fence, composed of a top rail and four wires, Deceased handed the gun over with his right hand. Heard the report of a gun, and on looking round saw the deceased lying on oneside of the fence, and the gun on the other. On examining deceased found the charge hadentered the right side of his head, and deceased's prains were scattered about on the ground. spoke to him but he did not reply. Next called the assistance of Messrs. F. Trompf and P. O'Brien who were also shooting about a quarter of a mile away. Told them what had happened, and then assisted in bringing, the body to the Trawalla Hotel. Then, went to Beanfort and reported the matter to the police. The accident occurred at about 7 o'clock in the evening. Could not say whether the gun was at half-cock or fullcock at the time of the accident. Crosse-xamined by the deceased's father: Deceasedborrowed the gun from Mr. James White, of Berufort, who told deceased that the hammers were not very safe, as they were loose, and also cautioned him to be very careful! in handling it.

Frederick W. Trompf, miner, residing at Beaufort, deposed: On Wednesday went to the salt dams at Trawalla on a shooting excursion. At about 7 o'clock in the evening the last witness came running over to me, saying that Herbert (deceased) had shot himself. Went at once to where deceased was lying, and saw the gun on the opposite side of the fence. Deceased did not speak, but sighed twice. Saw where the charge h tered deceased's head, and also saw the brains lying on the ground close by. Heard the discharge of the gun, but there was nothing unusual about the sound. About ten minutes elapsed from the time I heard the report until I arrived at the spot where the deceased was lying. Cross-examined by deceased's father: When I picked up the gun I found the charge in the right barrel had exploded. Did not think the gun safe, and had it been mine would not have lent it in its present

The evidence of P. Q'Brien was also taken, but it was for the most part a repetition of the testimony given by the previous

The magistrate returned a verdict of accidental death.



GARDENING FOR FEBRUARY.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Cabbage, cauliflower, lettuce, spinach, and turnips should be sown. Early potatoes may be planted largely. Gelery and leeks to be transplanted into trenches. Dig up any vacant ground in readiness for autumn cropping; the soil is pulverised and sweetened by exposure to the atmosphere. Cabbage and cauliflower plants should be planted largely. If dry, water as last month.

FLOWER, GARDEN, -Proceed, with the propogation of favorite plants by layering cuttings or otherwise. Plant at the end of the month a few hyacinths, tulips, anemones, ranunculi, and narcissi, for early blooming. Sow stocks, larkspur, mignonette, etc. Take care that camelias, azealas, rhododendrons, and the like plants, do not suffer, from want of water. Climbers must be regulated, the stronger growing kinds cut back, and others neatly tied, up. All decayed flower stems or leaves to be removed; walks to be kept neat and orderly.







GARDENING FOR FEBRUARY.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Cabbage, cauliflower, lettuce, spinach, and turnips should be sown. Early potatoes may be planted largely. Celery and leeks to be transplanted into trenches. Dig up any vacant ground in readiness for autumn cropping; the soil is pulverised and sweetened by exposure to the atmosphere. Cabbage and cauliflower plants should be planted largely. If dry, water as last month.

FLOWER GARDEN .- Proceed with the propogation of favorite plants by layering cuttings or otherwise. Plant at the end of the month a few hyacinths, tulips, anemones, ranunculi, and narcissi, for early blooming. Sow stocks, larkspur, mignonette, etc. Take care that camelias, azealas, rhododendrons, and the like plants, do not suffer from want of water. Climbers must be regulated, the stronger growing kinds cut back, and others neatly tied up. All decayed flower stems or leaves to be removed; walks to be kept neat

FARM.—The plough will be in active use this month unless the weather is very unfavorable. Sow turnips for sheep-also oats, Cape barley, rye, and tares for green feed. Continue use of the horse-hoe amongst drilled crops. Look to your manure heap; collect everything that is convertible into manure, and, when thoroughly rotted, cart to your


