COMMERCIAL. BALLARAT WHOLESALE PRODUC MARKET.

There was a fair market on Thursday. W quote as follows :- Barley-English, 3s Cape barley, 2s 6d; wheat, 4s 6d; oats, 7d to 2s 8d; sheaves, 1.2 5s to 1.2 15s manger hay, L3 5s to L3 15s; potatoe L2 10s; straw, 30s to 40s; peas, 2s to Sd; bran, 1s 1d; pollard, 1s 3d; bonedus L6 103; flour, L10 5s.

ARARAT PRODUCE MARKET.

A lull has been experienced in wheat in the local market during the past week, only a small quantity having changed hands at last week's quotation, 4s 6d, bags returned, to 4s Sd bags in. Flour has also been inactive, speculation being exceedingly limited. Indeed at the present time buyers are inclined to hold off. Prices are, however, steady at L10 15s per ton. In the Wimmera district As an instance of the truth of the somewhat the wheat market is uncertain. Few sales hackneyed phrase that "evil communications are being made at Horsham, the majority of the farmers preferring to store for lighter prices. The price is now 4s Sd per bushel. At St. Arnaud wheat shows a further depression, and is now quoted at 4s 7d per bushel, with very little coming forward. The Cope-Cope price is 4s 7d; East Charlton, 4s 5d. At Donald there is a marked decline. Last now top rates for wheat, and L10 5s to L10 10s the quotation for flour. At Landsborough there is no change to record, wheat being worth 4s 10d to 4s 11d, and flour L10 5s per ton. We learn from the "Argue" that towards the end of the week breadstuffs have been exceedingly quiet in the Melbourne market, and as holders of wheat are still very firm in their ideas buyers for export do not care to operate ; even the millers showing criminal coavicted, by his own acknowledglittle disposition to purchase at the price asked, though willing enough to supply temporary wants at our quotation of 5s 2d ; we anticipate, however, increased animation with the incoming week, though from the present attitude of sellers we can scarcely look for lower rates. Some off parcels have been sold at 5s ld. Flour is in slow sale. Quotations are maintained at L11 to L11 2s 6d. An occasional parcel is taken up from time to time at L11, but with that exception operations in the market are on the most ordinary scale imaginable. A slightly better feeling is experienced at this place in regard to oats, a few lots of prime having changed hands at 2s Sd per bushel. GARDENING FOR MARCH.

KITCHEN GARDEN .--- Sow cabbage, cauliflower, early horn carrot, brecoli, lettuce, peas, radish, spinach. and turnip. Kidney potatoes may still be planted. Earth up celery, Top-dress asparagus beds with salt or seaweed. If new strawberry beds are required plant runners as soon as you can obtain them; three year-old beds should be destroyed.

FFOWER GARDEN.-Dahlias, hollyhocks, liliums, and Pompon crysantheums will now be in their prime ; liquid manure will prolong and enhance the beauty of these flowers: dead blooms must be picked off, or the plants will be impoverished. This is the best month to sow hardy annual or percunial flower seeds. Prepare your ground for planting shrubs, ornamental trees, etc. ; if not already trenched get it done at once. Herbaceous plants can be divided and planted where wanted : carnations and pinks may still be propagated by cuttings under a bell glass.

FARM .- Ploughing will chiefly occupy the farmer's attention. Plough deep-the extra expense is trifling compared with the benefits derived. In some districts wheat sowing will commance.





GARDENING FOR MARCH.

KITCHEN GARDEN .- Sow cabbage, cauliflower, early horn carrot, brecoli, lettuce, peas, radish, spinach. and turnip. Kidney notatoes may still be planted. Earth up celery. Top-dress asparagus beds with salt or seaweed. If new strawberry beds are required plant runners as soon as you can obtain them; three year-old bods should be destroyed.

FFOWER GARDEN .- Dahlias. hollyhocks, liliums, and Pompon crysantheams will now be in their prime ; liquid manure will prolong and enhance the beauty of these flowers; dead blooms must be picked off, or the plants will be impoverished. This is the best month to sow hardy annual or perennial flower seeds. Prepare your ground for planting shrubs, ornamental trees, etc. ; if not already trenched get it done at once. Herbaceous plants can be divided and planted where wanted ; carnations and pinks may still be propagated by cuttings under a bell glass. FARM .-- Ploughing will chiefly occupy the farmer's attention. Plough deep-the extra

BALLARAT WHOLESALE PRODUCE MARKET.

There was a fair market on Thursday. We quote as follows :-Barley-English, 3s 9d ; Cape barley, 3s 2d; wheat, 5s 2d; oats, 3s ld to 3s 2d; sheaves, L2 15s to L3 10s; manger hay, L4 5s to L4 10s; notatoes, L2 10s; straw, 30s to 40s; peas, 3s to 3s 3d; bran, 1s 6d; pollard, 1s 6d; bonedust, L6 10s; flour, L11 10s.

ARARAT PRODUCE MARKET.

A good deal of activity is still apparent in grain, and notwithstanding a slight fluctuation observed at the beginning of the week prices remain moderately firm at our last quotation 4s 10d, bags returned, to 5s bags in. Although, however, holders do not care to quit parcels at a lower figure than that quoted, there is less desire evinced to lay in. stocks; this being no doubt consequent upon the fact that wheat commands less attention. in Melbourne. The Horsham figure shows: a slight improvement, the price having risen. from 4s 11d and 4s 111 to 5s. The quantity coming forward is not very large. At Dimboola the rush is almost over, the little forward changing hands at 4s 10d. Wheat rsmains firm at St. Arnaud at 5s 1d per bushel;

Cope Cope, 5s; Donald, 4s 11d. At Avoca, wheat now sells at 4s 10d to 4s 11d; flour showing an advance to L10 15s and L11 per ton; and at Landsborough, wheat sells at anticipating a speedy advance. Outs have improved, and good feeding samples can be sold at 2s 10d per bushel. A strong enquiry has sprung up for bran, which has advanced use a liberal quantity of bran in order to preserve the life of their stock, and in the Melbourne market 18d per bushel now rules. Hay is fairly supplied, there being no alteration to report in values. Warrnambool potatoes have come forward in large quantities; indeed, the market has been fairly glutted. We heard of a few loads selling as low as L2 12s 6d per ton. The price has, however, now improved to L2 15s and L3. Fresh and potted butter are somewhat scarce, and readily bring our quotation. A SAD END IN THE BUSH.

Some months ago an old man named Turner, a resident of Muswellbrook, was received into the Sydney Infirmary in a condition of total blindness from cataract of the syes. He was put into the ophthalmic department, and in course of time operated upon with such success that in a few weeks he was able to distinguish objects. He gradually grew better ; and to enable him to return home, the Church of England clergyman at Muswellbrook sent to the institution a cheque for $\pounds 2$ to buy a pair of spectacles and to pay his railway fare. Unfortunately, however, the £2 got in the wrong channel in some way or other, and though the old man got his spectacles, he got no cash, but was sent off with other paupers to the Asylum at Liverpool. Becoming tired of the monotony of the institution, Turner one day left without permission of the authorities, and though inquiries were made as to his whereabouts, nothing could be heard of him. It subsequently transpired, however, that he struck across the bush for his home, pearly 200 miles from Sydney. How he lived is not known, but that he suffered great privations was shown by his emaciated condition on his arrival at Maitland. Here he was treated kindly for a few days, when he again set out for Muswellbrook, and the next that was heard of him was the discovery of his remains suspended from a tree near Branxton. The remains consisted only of the clothes and the bones of the unfortunate man, the body having been eaten by dingoes. The poor fellow was weak and old, and it is supposed that he died of thirst and fatigue without knowing ex-

except that he was trying to reach his home at Muswellbrook. The poor fellow, it is stated, was not altogether sound in his mind, and this may account for his extraordinary manuer of leaving the asylum at Liverpool and wandering away as he did.

NOT GUILTY.

The "London Echo," which is protesting with characteristic plainness of speech against capital punishment, quotes from the German papers the case of a railway porter named Harbaum, who was released from prison on November 28th, after eight years of confinement, and dismissed without a stain upon his character." In 1873 he was condemned to penal servitude for murdering, a child with the fumes of sulphur. The evidence against him seemed to be perfect; the jury thought they had no alternative but to declare him guilty, in spite of his impassioned protestations of innocence. Some benevolent and keen-witted persons, however, were convinced that Harbanin was guiltless, and during the eight years of the martyrdom in prison, have been incessant in their efforts to get at the true facts of the case. They produced such a body of evidence at the last as to compel the authorities to institute a new trial, and the proofs were so convincing that the jury unhesitatingly declared Harbaum insocent. "Who," asks the "Echo;" "is to compensate the poor railway porter for the loss of eight good years of his life, or for the indescribable pangs of an imprisonment so utterly undeserved ? We ask the advocates of the gallows what caustic apology they would have produced if this innocent man had been hurriedly hung eight years ago."

of the schooner Pet by a sperm whale: A sperm whale was seen thirty fathoms off at four p.m. on the 6th inst., and the next moment the monster rushed at the vessel and stove in the starboard bow below the water line. The timbers were at once seen ficating about. The mate immediately cut away the lashing of the boat and pushed her over the rail, which was already level with the water. The crew got in, but the captain appeared dazed, and though begged to dive off to the boat he remained on deck, and was taken down by the suction of the sea. His body did not rise again.

The special fund of £25,000 for the erection of the Anglican Cathedral, required to secure the £5,000 promised by Mr. F. Ormond, has now reached £23,836, with £968 promised, leaving £696 to be made up by the end of the month.

The "Ararat Advertiser" says :-- " Fromone of the carriers who visited Ararat last week with Warrnambool potatoes we gleaned some particulars which illustrate the importance of the potato export trade to that port. He states that no less than five hundred tons of potatoes were brought in on one day and sold for shipment to the Sydney market, together with a stack thirty-three bags long, twenty-five bags broad, and fourteen bags high. Although this quantity was consigned in only four steamers, there were in all thirteen vessels loading potatoes for the neighboring colonies."







CARDENING FOR MARCH.

KITCHEN GARDEN .- Sow cabbage, cauliflower, early horn carrot, brecoli, lettuce, peas, radish, spinach. and turnip. Kidney potatoes may still be planted. Earth up celery. Top-dress asparagus beds with salt or seaweed. If new strawberry beds are required plant runners as soon as you can obtain them; three year-old beds should be destroyed.

FFOWER GARDEN .- Dahlias, hollyhocks, liliums, and Pompon crysantheaps will now be in their prime ; liquid manure will prolong and enhance the beauty of these flowers; dead blooms must be picked off, or the plants will be impoverished. This is the best month to sow hardy annual or perennial flower seeds. Prepare your ground for planting shrubs, ornamental trees, etc. ; if not already trenched get it done at once. Herbaccoous plants can be divided and planted where wanted ; carnations and pinks may still be

propagated by cuttings under a bell glass. FARM .- Ploughing will chiefly occupy the farmer's attention. Plough deep-the extra expense is trifling compared with the benefits derived. In some districts wheat sowing will commence.
