





An occurrence took place in the forest on Saturday, which nearly resulted in the loss of several lives, including that of Mr. Wheeler, M.L.A. A fierce bush fire was raging on one of the ranges from which legs were being obtained for Mr. Wheeler's mill, and that gentleman was riding round to see how matters stood, as he was aware that there were men out with a large bullock team, towards whom the fire was quickly advancing. In following up one of the tracks, he met the team coming down with a heavy log of timber. The fire was rapidly approaching from two points, and an attempt was made to get the team and the waggon out of the way. The "chock," which had been placed in the back wheels had, however, caught against a stump, and all efforts to draw it were fruitless. On came the flames, and the only course left was to release the bullocks, and leave the waggon. This was done, and then ensued a retreat, but the animals became stupid from fear, and it was with the utmost difficulty they were driven into the gully, and the flames being so close behind them, and the smoke so suffocating that the escape of the men was a matter of the greatest difficulty. As soon as these were on their way, Mr. Wheeler, was on horseback, took the track for it, but had not proceeded far when he found that the trees and dead timber on both sides were on fire. His danger was at once apparent. To return was impossible—there was no alternative but to go through the burning timber. The animal was urged with voice and spur, and then ensued an actual race for imminent peril of which can be full recognised only by those who have been near our forest fires. Fortunately both rider and horse emerged from the ordeal with no further harm than a "warming" both inside and out, Search was then made for the other men. when it was found that they had managed to get out of the fire by having luckily crossed its course. On subsequently returning to the waggon for the purpose of obtaining the ironwork, to the surprise of all it was found that beyond being charred in one or two places it was comparatively uninjured, though the bark on the log was still burning .- "Daylesford Advocate."

GARDENING FOR APRIL.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Finish manuring and digging ground ere winter sets in. Take care that young crops of turnips and carrots are kept free from weeds. Continue planting out cabbages, cauliflowers, and celery; the latter would be much benefitted by an occasional pose of guano-water. Sow peas (early varieties), broad beans, onions, parsley, endive, radish, and spinach. Plant potato-onions, shallots, garlic, rhubarb, and horse radish, Earth up celery as required. Look to your herb bed; where necessary, divide the roots, and make fresh plantations. If strawberry runners were not planted last month, let them

FLOWER GARDEN .- This is one of the busiest months in the year; most kinds of evergreens, and ornamental and flowering shrubs, are best transplanted now, and any alterations that are to be made in laying out grounds should be commenced. Take up gladioli, liliums, and other bulbs that have done flowering; store them away in boxes, packed in dry sand. Finish planting hyacinths, tulips, crocuses, narcissi, anemones, ranunculi, ixias, etc. Remove edgings of camomile, thrift, box, and thyme. For new plantations of roses the ground should be trenched and heavily manured; if light soil, some stiff loam should be incorporated with it.



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

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

...123 THE RESIDENCE AREAS ACT

The attention of holders of residence areas under the miner's right is directed to the new Residence Areas Act passed last session, which came into operation on the 1st inst. The 3rd chause of the act states that no person shall be entitled to occupy a residence area unless such area is registered bythe mining registrar (or other proper officer) of the mining district in which such land is situate, and unless such person shall be registered as the holder of such area, and the number of his business license is also registered. No person may hold more than two residence areas, and they must be within ten or husiness license must be taken out for holding must be endorsed by the registrar on the miner's right or business license. If any person parts with the right or license under which his area is registered, his holding will be forfeited. Forfeiture will also take place if at any time after four months from the re gisteration of a residence area it can be shown to the warden that there is no habitable dwelling erected upon the land, and that none has been erected for a period of at least three consecutive months. Holders of residence areas may let, sell, or transfer their ground for 12 months' residence, but no sale or transfer will be valid until registered. Holders registered before the 31st of March will, for the purposes of the act, be regarded as persons who have been in occupation for twelve months. Exclusive possession of the surface is granted to every holder of a residence area, but the Govenor-in-Council has power to issue leases to other persons, entitling them to mine at a depth of not less than 50ft, below the surface.



UTILISATION OF WORN-OUT HORSES.

The utilisation of horses not fit to eat and too old to be of working service in France, is said to be as follows :-- It is shorn of its hair, which serves to stuff cushions and maddles; then it is slaughtered and skinned; the hoofs serve to make combs. Next the carcase is placed cylinder, and cooked by steam at a pressure of three atmospheres; a cock is opened, which allows the steam to be run off; then the remains are cut up, the leg bones are sold to make knife handles, etc., and the coarser, the ribs, the head, etc., are converted into animal black and glue. The first are calcined in cylinders, and the vapours when condensed form the chief source of carbonate of ammonia, which constitutes the base of nearly all ammonical salts. There is an animal oil yielded which makes a capital insecticide and a vermifuge. To make glue the bones are dissolved in muriatic acid, which takes away the phosphate of line; the soft residue retaining the shape of the bone is dissolved in boiling water, cast into squares and dried on nets. The phosphate of lime acted upon by sulphuric acid and calcined with earbon, produces phosphorus for lucifer matches. The remaining flesh is distilled to obtain the carbonate of ammonia, the mass is pounded up with potash, and then mixed with old nails and iron of every description. the whole is calcined and yields magnificent yellow crystals-prussiate of potash, with which tissues are dyed a Prussian blue, and iron transferred into steel; it also forms the basis of evanide of potassium and prussic acid, the most terrible poisons known in

GARDENING FOR APRIL

KITCHEN GARDEN.-Finish manuring and digging ground ere winter sets in. Take care Eurambeer that young crops of turnips and carrots are kept free from weeds. Continue planting out cabbages, cauliflowers, and celery; the latter would be much benefitted by an occasional pose of guano-water. Sow peas (early varieties), broad beans, onions, parsley, endive, radish, and spinach. Plant potato-onions, shallots, garlic, rhubarb, and horse radish. Earth up celery as required. Look to your herb bed; where necessary, divide the roots, and make fresh plantations. If strawberry runners were not planted last month, let them

FLOWER GARDEN .- This is one of the busiest months in the year; most kinds of evergreens, and ornamental and flowering shrubs, are best transplanted now, and any alterations that are to be made in laying out grounds should be commenced. Take up gladioli, liliums, and other bulbs that have done flowering; store them away in boxes, packed in dry sand. Finish planting hyacinths, tulips, crocuses, narcissi, anemones, ranunculi. ixias, etc. Remove edgings of camomile, thrift, box, and thyme. For new plantations of roses the ground should be trenched and heavily manured; if light soil, some stiff loam should be incorporated with it.



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

Although business has been to some extent interfered with by the holidays, a fair amount of breadstuffs has changed hands. The market is still buoyant, and wheat, which at the commencement of last week sold at 5s 4d to 5s 5d, reached 5s 7d on Saturday, and yesterday two parcels sold at 5s 8d, bags returned There is a considerable difference of opinion as to the quantity of wheat remaining in the country, and whilst on one hand there are numbers who freely express a belief that we shall see a short supply for home wants in consequence of over exportation, some large buyers decline to operate at present figures feeling certain that a decline must take place. In this district there are known to be several large growers who have not disposed of their stock, and these express great confidence in a still further hardening of prices. A steady advance has therefore taken place in that market during the past week. No reports are to hand from Horsham, though we are informed that private information has been received that very little wheat is coming forward, that to hand meeting sales at 5s 8d. At St. Arnaud a rising tendency is still apparent, the latest quotation being 5s 9d per bushel, whilst at Donald 5s 5d is the current quotation. Locally flour is worth L13 to L13 5s, and though business is restricted the figure is firm. There is a further advance of one penny per bushel in bran and pollard. and a big demand exists for both. There has been only a bare supply of oats forward, but buvers do not seem inclined to advance on 3s been very scarce and the value has hardened to L3 10s, whilst two small loads have open taken up at L3 15s per ton. Hay is 5s a ton dearer than at the date of last report, sheaves selling at L3 15s and trussed L4 per ton. Straw and chaff have also improved, the latter being saleable at 4s per cwt. 

GARDENING FOR APRIL.

KITCHEN GARDEN .- Finish manuring and digging ground ere winter sets in. Take care that young crops of turnips and carrots are kept free from weeds. Continue planting out cabbages, cauliflowers, and celery; the latter would be much benefitted by an occasional nose of guano-water. Sow peas (early varieties), broad beans, onions, parsley, endive, radish, and spinach. Plant potato-onions, shallots, garlic, rhubarb, and horse radish. Earth up celery as required. Look to your herb bed; where necessary, divide the roots, and make fresh plantations. If strawberry runners were not planted last month, let then be this.

FLOWER GARDEN.—This is one of the busiest months in the year; most kinds of evergreens, and ornamental and flowering shrubs, are best transplanted now, and any alterations that are to be made in laying out grounds should be commenced. Take up gladioli, liliums, and other bulbs that have done flowering; store them away in boxes, packed in dry sand. Finish planting hyacinths, tulips, crocuses, narcissi, anemones, ranunculi, ixias, etc. Remove edgings of camomile. thrift, box, and thyme. For new plantations of roses the ground should be trenched and heavily manured; if light soil, some stiff loam should be incorporated with it.



There was a fair market on Thursday. We quote as follows :-Barley-English, 4s 3d; Cape barley, 3s 9d; wheat, 5s 6d; oats, 3s 10d to 4s; sheaves, L3 10s to L3 15s; manger hay, L4 5s to L4 10s; potatoes, L3: 15s; straw, 55s to 45s; peas, 4s to 4s 3d; bran, 1s 6d; pollard, 1s 6d; bonedust, L6 10s; flour, L13 10s.

ARARAT PRODUCE MARKET:

We have again to chronicle a further rise in wheat in this market. At the date of our last report 5s Sd was the ruling rate per bushel, bags returned. Towards the end of the week sales were made at 5s 10d, and on Saturday an advance was made at 6s., at which figure several sales are reported. A corresponding rise is also observable in flour, sales being made to-day at L13 15s. A good quantity has changed hands, and a fair amount has been sent out of the district. Some who have been holding off in the anticipation of a decline, seem to have abandoned the hope and are laying in small stocks. In the metropolis wheat is firm at 6s Sd per bushel, and flour values are main-tained, sales being effected at L14 5s to L14 15s. A few small parcels have changed hands at Horsham at 6s 1 d and 6s 2d per bushel. At St. Arnaud 6s is now the ruling rate; and 5s 11d prevails at Donald. From Avoca we learn that the value there is 6s, whilst at Landshorough quotations are 5s 9d to 6s; flour L13 per ton. It will thus be seen that the rise is general! Oats are a trifle firmer 3s 6d to 3s 9d. Pollard and bran have again advanced and 1s 7d is now being given. There is a strong demand for Warrnambool week's rates, and as farmers are now engaged ploughing, supplies are somewhat light. Butter has been scarce, and fresh has advanced to 1s 8d, potted finding sales at 1s.4d. Eggs have also improved: We quote: -Wheat, 5s 10d to 6s per bushel, bags returned; oats, 3s to 3s 3d; pollard, is 7d; bran, 1s 7d; Cape barley, 3s 3d; maize, none; flour, L13 15s; Warrnambook potatoes, L4 to L4 10s; Ballarat, L45s; fresh butter, Is 8d; potted butter, 1s 3d; hams, 1s; bacon, 9d; cheese, 6d to 7d; eggs, 1s; hay, sheaves, 75s; hay trussed, L4; straw, 25s; chaff, 4s; English barley, 3s 6d .- "Advectiser." onions, 6s; carrots, 4s 6d; peas, 3s 6d;

Sheepskins.—Buyers were present in large numbers, and we made an entire clearance at first-rate prices; in fact we may quote this sale as one of the best of the season. Hides. -We submitted a splendid lot of hides to the trade to-day, and find prices a little easier than those lately quoted. Tallow .- There is still a good demand for this article. Grain. _A very brisk demand is maintained for all cercals, and sales are easily effected at satisfactory prices. The supply is somewhat short, and some difficulty exists at the present time in actually supplying present wants. We have sold 2000 bags wheat during the last week, at prices varying from 6s to 6s 6d, ex Melbourne wharf. TRAMCARS DRIVEN BY ELEC TRICITY.

On Saturday afternoon, 4th March last says an English paper) some interesting experiments were shown at the carriage works of the North Metropolitan Tramways Com pany, near Leytonstone, with a view of demonstrating that tramears can be driven by the power stored in the Faure batteries. The experiments were conducted by Mr. Radelitfa Ward in a rudely-made car which had been used in similar experiments in Belgium. In this car were placed 90 small boxes contain ing Faure cells, which had been previously charged with a dynamo-machine, worked by a steam-engine at the works. These boxes which were placed under the seats of the car, supplied a current which moved a dynamo-electric machine placed beneath. By means of a cogwheel placed on the axle of the machine working a servies of cog-wheels, the two shafts and the wheels on which the catrested were set in motion, and the car was driven along a tram line at a speed which at times was nearly 10 miles an hour. The power stored in the 90 boxes above mentioned was stated to be sufficient to drive the car, which, with its freight. weighed some 61 tons, for forty miles. GARDENING FOR APRIL.

KITCHEN GARDEN .- Finish manuring and digging ground ere winter sets in. Take care that young crops of turnips and carrots are kept free from weeds. Continue planting out cabbages, cauliflowers, and celery; the latter would be much benefitted by an occasional pose of guano-water. Sow peas (carly varieties), broad beans, onions, parsley, endive, radish, and spinach. Plant potato-onions, shallots, garlie, rhubarb, and horse radish. Earth up celery as required. Look to your herb bed; where necessary, divide the roots, and make fresh plantations. If strawberry runners were not planted last month, let then be this.

FLOWER GARDEN.-This is one of the busiest months in the year; most kinds of evergreens, and ornamental and flowering shrubs, are best transplanted now, and any alterations that are to be made in laying out grounds should be commenced. Take up gladioli, liliums, and other bulbs that have done flowering; store them away in boxes, packed in dry sand. Finish planting hyacinths, tulips, crocuses, narcissi, anemones, ranunculi, ixias, etc. Remove edgings of camomile, thrift, box, and thyme. For new plantations of roses the ground should be trenched and heavily manured; if light soil, some stiff loam should be incorporated with it.





ARARAT PRODUCE MARKET.

The wheat market has shown a good deal

of fluctuation during the week and to-day aneasier feeling is apparent and sales are consegently slow. At the date of our last report wheat was quoted at 6s bags returned, with a rising market, and on Monday and Tuesday 6s 2d was reached. In consequence of ans easier feeling in the Melbourne marketswhere, as millers were pretty well stocked, they declined to operate-prices experienced a fall here of 2d a bushel. Several lots were offered at 6s, but buyers not coming: forward: these were withdrawn and growers: havedetermined not to sell until after sowing. It is probable that not much grain will be carted in during the next few weeks, as farmers will be fully occupied breaking up and preparing ground for the coming season. The present quotation for wheat is 5s 10d, bags returned, to 6s, bags in. In the Wimmera district the supply is restricted, and that forward sells at 6s; the Donald quotation being 6s 01d, andi Cope Cope 6s Id. At St. Arnaud the ruling figure is 6s, but the market is less firm. At Aoca wheat ranges at 6s to 6s 1d; and flour L13 10s to L13 12s 6d per ton : Landsborough quotations being wheat 6s 3d, flour L13 15s. Flour in this district shows a reduction of 5s per ton and now commands L13.10s per ton but there is not a deal of business transacted. Oats have improved and one or two small lots of prime feeding, have realised 3s 6d.. The quotation for ordinary samples is however 3s 3d. Pollard and bran are still very scarce at 1s 7d, and there is now a strong demand for peas with little coming forward at 4s. Potatoes have experienced a great jump up.
Warrnambool varieties being now worth L5 10s. The sudden rise is consequent upon that which has taken place at Warrnambool, where last week nearly 1000; tons changed hands at L3: The marker was, liowever, rushed, the result being a drop on Saturday to L2 10s. Over 3000 tons more have been exported from Warrnambool this season than the previous one. No doubt the rains that have fallen will have the effect of further raising the price here by increasing the difficulties of carting. Alle forwards now are eagerly taken at our figure. There is a good demand for hay, but farmers are disinclined to lose time at present in carting it in. Onions are getting scarce, and now realise 8s. 8d, and eggs are wanted at 1s 4d to 1s 6d per dozen. OPENING OF PARLIAMENT.

The third session of the eleventh Parliament of Victoria was opened on Tuesday, with all the ceremony usually attendant on such an occasion. Whilst the Parliamenthouses remain in their present unfinished condition, with the approaches blocked up by scaffolding and other incumbrances, the proceedings are necessarily robbed of much of their splendour. This, however, could not be avoided. Large numbers of spectators were attracted to witness the speciacle, and 22nd March, I went to the house on account lency the Governor drove up to the entrance of Parliament in his state carriage accom-The proclamation calling Parliament together having been previously read, as soon as His Excellency arrived the Speaker and members of the Legislative Assembly were summoned to the bar.

His Excellency then delivered the following speech :--

MR. PRESIDENT AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL:

Mr. Speaker: And Gentlemen of The LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

I have called you together after a short recess, which, I am happy to say, has been characterised by political quiet and increa sing prosperity, to obtain your early consideration of questions of pressing and prac-

tical importance. The attempt on the life of her Most Gracious Mejesty, which under the blessing of Divine Providence has been so happily frustrated, has evoked a wide-spread expression of feelings of loyalty and thankfulness which have been heartily shared in by Her

Victorian subjects. Although the Empire is at peace with foreign nations, we cannot calculate on the continuance for many years of this happy state of things. Our defences demand ar earnest effort of completion. Legislation will be therefore proposed authorising immediate steps to be taken for that purpose, with the object not only of warding off attacks, but also of preventing any panic arising from a defenceless state of the seaboard.

The importance of water conservation has been further impressed upon all classes by the long-continued drought in the Northern districts. This calamity has necessitated the carriage of water for long distances, at great expense to the country, and has inflicted serious losses on the agricultural classes. A bill will be submitted to you enlarging the powers of the Government as to the expenditure of moneys for the erection of works under the Water Conservation Act of last session, and providing for the principal works in the Northern districts being constructed forthwith at the expense of the state in proportion to the extent of the

Last year the Amending Land Bill was postponed under the exigencies of a short session. The bill will now be re-submitted to you. Its provisions deal comprehensively with the future tenure of the remaining Crown lands of the colony.

The Extension of Railways Bill of last session will! also be laid before you, and I trust that you will be able satisfactorily to dispose of the various practical questions that must arise in its discussion. My advisers also consider that owing to the magnitude which the railway system of this colony has now assumed, the time has arrived for submitting proposals to provide for a more officious eyetem of management of our state tail-

It is considered desirable that, in couse quence of the abolition of pensions, the position of the County Court judges should be placed on a more satisfactory footing. A bill to secure them a better tenure of office will therefore be introduced.

You will be glad to hear that all steps requisite to ensure the proper representation of the colony at the exhibition of wines about to be held at Bordeaux have been daiy taken. Proposals will also be submitted for the duc representation of Victoria at an International Exhibition for all colonies, to be held next year at Amsterdam. Mr. Speaker and Gentlmen of the Legis-

past years. 

RAILWAY REFORM.

The warmest cheers given in the Assembly on Tuesday were accorded to Mr. Bent, when the hon, gentleman gave notice of a bill to provide for the better management of the railways. GARDENING FOR APRIL.

KITCHEN GARDEN.-Finish manuring ar digging ground ere winter sets in. Take car that young crops of turnips and carrots an kept free from weeds. Continue planting or cabbages, cauliflowers, and celery; the latter would be much benefitted by an occasional pose of guano-water. Sow peas (early varieties), broad beans, onions, parsley, endive, radish, and spinach. Plant potato-onions, shallots, garlic, rhubarb, and horse radish. Earth up celery as required. Look to your herb bed; where necessary, divide the roots, and make fresh plantations. If strawberry runners were not planted last month, let them be this.

busiest months in the year; most kinds of evergreens, and ornamental and flowering shrubs, are best transplanted now, and any alterations that are to be unde in laying out grounds should be commenced. Take up gladioli, liliums, and other bulbs that liave done flowering; store them away in boxes, packed in dry sand. Finish planting hyacinths, tulips, crocuses, narcissi, anemones, vanunculi, ixias, etc. Remove edgings of camomile, thrift, box, and thyme. For new plantations of roses the ground should be trenched and heavily manured; if light soil, some stiff loam should be incorporated with it.


