MR. ARCHIBALD FORBES ON THE EGYPTIAN WAR.

ADELAIDE, Wednesday.

Mr. Archibald Forbes's third lecture was delivered at the town-hall this evening before the largest audience of the series. Referring to the Egyptian war, Mr. Forbes said that Germany would have had a crushing army of trained soldiers ready in three days, Arabi, instead of standing defiant, would have been allowed no time to take breath, far less to construct earthworks. Cess pursuits would have made him a fugitive instead of the commander of a retreating army, and in a couple of days he would have been hanging from a tree, and Egypt would have been restored to quiet, and German pickets posted from Alexandria to the first cataract of the Nile. The situation showed a marked contrast between the German soldiery system and the military supineness of England. It was three weeks since Arabi was driven from Alexandria by the guns of the British fleet. To-day he was besieging Alexandria, while the English were there awaiting tardy reinforcements. Prompt action would have made the insurrection expire almost in a week; inaction had allowed it to grow till it had assumed alarming proportions .- "Argus"

THE CRISIS IN EGYPT.

The "Argus" of Thursday last supplies the

following interesting items:-The telegrams.

recently received are as important as any that have come to hand during the crisis. They are of a political complexion. Military events are, of course, deferred until the arrival of the British troops, the concentration of which is proceeding but slowly. There is now tolerably conclusive evidence that France will take no legal part in the conflict, and it would appear also as if the Egyptian party, of which Arabi is the head, is resolved upon hazarding a struggle. The Freycinet Ministry, it will be seen, has suffered an overwhelming defeat in the Assembly upon its. programme of co-operation with England fordefence of the Suez Canal, and, if necessary, for providing for the good government of Egypt. Surprising as the event is, it must be admitted that the Paris correspondents of the leading London papers have foreshadowed the decision, though no one anticipated such a majority as 450 to 75. The assertion is that the arming of France as a nation, together with the free and untrammelled representation of the local districts, has effected something of a revolution in the position of France as regards any aggressive war. The peasants do not desire that the lives of their sons. should be jeopardised in a great struggle. They do not wish the reserves called out in which they would have to serve themselves. 0 A campaign in Egypt does not at first sight include these events, but there is a nervous dread that a war in Egypt may imply a collision with the Porte, and that behind the Porte may stand Germany. There is nothing, it is averred, which the population would more disapprove of than an unnecessary conflict with the great military power which is credited with watching its opportunity for another dash at Paris. Without saving somuch, the correspondence from Paris leads. up to the conclusion that the French people have not sufficient confidence in their armies, nor, above all, in their commanders, to risk a war with Germany. They have instinctively adopted the views expressed by Mr. Archibald Forbes in his lectures, that Germany, in men, 0 in material, and in leaders, is still the domin-0 ant power. In so many words, the French as a people are cowed. What we are actually 0 told is that electors of the Republic desire peace, and peace at almost any, price, and the decision of the Assembly supports this view. 5 0 0 And it must be remembered, that the confidential reports of the prefects made to Louis. Napoleon, on the eve of the fatal Franco-Prussian war show that even then these officers declared, with a surprising unanimity, that the country population cared nothing about the issue, and was content to devote itself to the cultivation of its farms.

> With regard to the telegrams referring to the action of the Porte, it must be remembered that Turkish diplomacy was said by a man who was its master-the late Lord Dallingto have two weapons-(1) delay, (2) lying. The English Government, no doubt, have present offer of the Porte to land troops in Egypt. The Porte could have landed troops three months ago, and suppressed the disturbance without difficulty, if it had been in earnest. And the condition that the English. troops should be first withdrawn from Alexandria at once aronses suspicion. After the Europeans had left it might be found that the Turkish troops would not act against, Arabi, and the law of necessity might be pleaded in favor of making terms with that eader very favorable to the Porte. The Porte naturally desires more power over Egypt and more tribute. It objects on principle to the Control. A large party in England are probably opposed to any further riveting of the Turkish chain upon the subject country. "The Times" would be writing with a full knowledge of the situation as regards France and Turkey when last week it. urged the Gladstone Government to re-establish the Control itself, but to make it English, and to place Tewfik on the throne under a British protectorate. ### PARLIAMENTARY ITEMS.

The Assembly on Tuesday evening was again absorbed with the Phænix Company's engines. Mr. Berry moved his amendment, prohibiting the Government from buying engines outside of the colony, but in doing so he said that if a genuine case of emergency could be established he and the members acting with him would be willing to purchase in the open market. Sir Bryan O'Loghlen, and subsequently Mr. Bent, declared that the case was one of emergency, inasmuch as every local foundry was full of work, and the department could not get the engines it wants. No one would undertake to deliver a solitary engine under 10 months, and the department wants engines now. It is conducting its business with 158 sound engines, 19 "buswinckers," and 8 cripples, and this number is inadequate, and must wholly fail to meet the wants of the coming harvest season. Mr. Bent produced a mass of departmental reports to show that special goods trains have to be continually refused on the Victorian lines, and that thus the department loses money, and the public is greatly injured. He reiterated his statement that the engines are so pushed that many of them are in a dangerous condition, more especially upon the Hobson's Bay line. Justice to the farmer and considerations of public safety demand, says Mr. Bent, that every effort should be made to obtain a few engines pending the commencement of the delivery from the local makers. There were numerous speakers and the debate went over the old lines. The only new feature was a general complaint from the Ministerial members that the Government had not acted in so purely an administrative a matter on their own responsibility, instead of asking the House for instructions. Mr. Francis concurred in this view, and said that be should vote so as to leave the responsibility with the Ministry. At half-past eleven the House divided, with the result that Mr. Berry's amendment was negatived by a majority of 31 to 21. The Government is thus left free to order such engines as it con siders are necessary to supplement the delivery of the local firms. Mr Bent insists that the present inability

BALLARAT WHOLESALE PRODUCE MARKET.

There was a fair market on Thursday. We quote as follows :- Barley-English, 5s 6d; Cape barley, 43 8d; wheat, 6s 9d; oats. 3s 10d to 4s; sheaves, L4 15s to L5 10s; manger hay, L6 5s to L6 10s; potatoes, L4 15s; straw, 50s to 55s; peas, 4s to 4s, 7d; bran, 1s 9d; pollard, 1s 9d; bonedust, L6 10s; flour, L14 10.

### ARARAT PRODUCE MARKET.

We have not heard of a single sale of wheat during the past week, but the figure quoted, 6s 2d, may be regarded as a firm quotation. Flour has again hardened a little, L14 to L14 5s are the current rates. A few small sales have been made at these figures, and we have heard of one ten ton lot of upcountry flour being purchased at L14, landed here. Wheat is quoted at Horsham at 6s to 6s 6d, but only a few bags have come in during the week. An advance to 6s 4d has taken place at St. Arnaud, there being nothing offering even at that figure, whilst at Douald 6s 2d is quoted. At Avoca the price for wheat has strengthened to 6s 6d. flour being worth L13 5s to L14, whilst at Almost every week evidence accumulates Landsborough 5s 6d is quoted for wheat, and that what is called Liberalism is synonymous L14 15s for flour. In this district oats are in fair demand at last week's rates and a few sales take place. We have heard of one lot ot 30 bags changing hands at 4s, and 4s 11d was reached for a really prime sample. Pollard is scarce at 1s Sd, and bran difficult to obtain at Is Sad. The price of both has been high all during the year in consequence of the drought compelling owners of cattle to purchase for feed. This fact has induced millers their offal, and though may have good stocks of flour, both bean and pollard are very short. The quantity of flour on hand and the high price of wheat checks further sales being made to keep the mills running. No Warrnambool potatoes have come in during the week and any brought forward would be readily taken up at L5 10s-an advance on late rates. 



GARDENING FOR AUGUST.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—This month will close the season for planting fruit trees, etc., so that all diligence must be used. August is the chief month for sowing seeds of various kinds, such as cabbages, cauliflower, leek, lettuce, onions, parsley, parsnip, peas, radish, spinach, salsify, and scorzonera. If frames are obtainable, make up hot-beds for early cucumhers, melons, vegetable marrows, etc. Tomatoes may be sown in pots in a frame for planting out in October. Plant out Jerusalem artichokes and main crop of potatoes. Plant out cabbages, cauliflowers, leeks, onions.

FLOWER GARDEN.-If the manuring and digging of the flower garden be not completed before now, it should be attended to at once. Tall growing annuals will require tving up. Propagate fuchias, chrysanthen ums and climbers from cuttings. Re-pot plants commencing growth and wanting pot-room. Dahlias for early flowering may be started in a little bottom heat; seed nemophilas, larkspurs, clarkias, etc., may be transplanted if too thick.

FARM .- Potatoe planting may be commenced new, but September is the principal month for getting in the main crops. English barley can still be sown. Oat and wheat crops should be rolled. Prepare land for sorgums, beet, and mangold crops.



FATAL MINING ACCIDENT.

On Tuesday afternoon last an accident A coroner's inquest on the body was held at Hutton's Hotel, Waterloo, on Thursday,

before Mr. J. C. Thomson, district coroner.

Mr. U. Stewart, Mining Inspector, was present. The following evidence was taken :-William Cone deposed: I was working with deceased at the Hobart Pasha Company's claim on Tuesday. We commenced work at 8 a.m. At the time of the accident deceased was working in the face of washdirt, and I was trucking. When I left deceased to go out with the truck deceased was taking out a boulder from the face, about the middle of the cap. When I was about 30 feet from the face I thought I heard something falling, but on looking back I saw that the light, was burning as usual. I then went on to the shoot with the truck. On returning to the face, I found that the light was out. I called out "Ted" (deceased's name) twice, but received no answer. I then went and got a candle, and returned to the face, when I found four sets of timber had fallen, and a large quantity of dirt down also. I then ran for a miner named John Gass, and he came back. with me to where the ground had fallen in. We both then set to work to extricate detimber. ### A REMARKABLE STORY.

A remarkable story, the "Standard" says, has to be added to the long list of curious and exciting narratives connected with the Nihilist cause. The St. Petersburg correspondent of the "Voltaire" guarantees the authenticity of the following facts, which are said to have materially increased the anxiety felt in the Russian capital for the Czar's safety. Shortly after the opening of the Moscow Exhibition, which was recently inaugurated by the Grad Duke Valdimir, a young man demanded an audience of the chief said to have materially increased the anxiety of police, at St. Petersburg. He refused to state his errand to any of the subordinate officials, so after being carefully searched, he was admitted to the presence of the General. Here he stated at once that he was sent by the Revolutionary party, and explained his mission in the following terms :- "The Emperor is prevented from going to Moscow by his fear of our schemes. His dread will cease to be justified whenever he grants a constitution. Then he need fear no conspiracy, and can go in safety whenever he pleases. It has fallen to my lot to inform you that if the Emperor persists in his reactionary policy nothing can save him. Neither my friends nor myself wish to murdes him treacherously. Alexander III, is warned as was Alexander II. We do not assassinate, but we render justice." At this point of the interview the police officer seemed anxious to call in assistance, but the young Nihilist stopped him, and added, "I do not wish to be subjected the indignity of torture. In coming here I have sacrificed my life. I could have killed you, but we do not commit youth stepped back a few paces, and knocked two large buttons, with which his cuffs were fastened, against his forenead. The buttons, being full of an explosive substance, burst. and inflicted such wounds on the young man that he expired in a few moments, leaving no trace as to his identity. 



### GARDENING FOR AUGUST.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—This month will close the season for planting fruit trees, etc., so the chief month for sowing steds of various kinds, such as cabbages, cauliflower, leek, lettuce, onions, parsley, parsnip, peas, radish, spinach, salsify, and scorzonera. If frames are obtainable, make up hot-beds for early cucumbers, melons, vegetable marrows, etc. planting out in October. Plant out Jerusalem artichokes and main crop of potatoes. Plant out cabbages, caulifiowers, leeks, onions.

FLOWER GARDEN.-If the manuring and digging of the flower garden be not completed before now, it should be attended to at once. Tall growing annuals will require tying up. Propagate fuchias, chrysantheniums and climbers from cuttings. Re-pot plants commencing growth and wanting pot-room. Dahlias for early flowering may be a little bottom heat; seed nemophilas, larkspurs, clarkias, etc., may be transplanted if

FARM.—Potatoe planting may be commenced now, but September is the principal month for getting in the main crops. English barley can still be sown. Oat and wheat crops should be rolled. Prepare land for sorgums, beet, and mangold crops.


