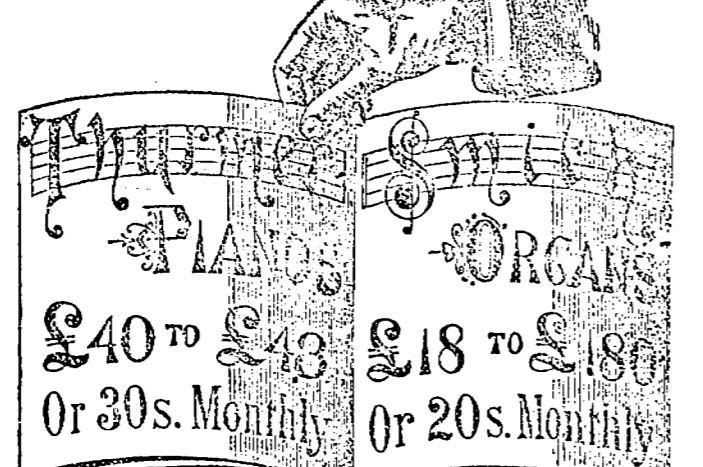

MUNICIPAL ELECTION.—Monday last was nomination day for the elections for the Shire of Ripon. In the east and west ridings respectively, Mrs Oddie and Lewis were returned unopposed; but in the north riding there were two candidates' names given in, viz., Messrs. A. Andrews, the retiring councillor, and M. Flynn, a gentleman who has on several previous occasions been defeated. Although the time allowed is short, both aspirants for municipal honors and their friends have been doing a quiet energetic personal canvass, and each feels confident of success.

MINUTES. The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

CORRESPONDENCE. From Mrs Gemmill, offering to take £10 without prejudice as compensation for damage to her property through the cutting of a drain, as a final offer.—Referred to north riding members.

From Shire of Maffra forwarding copies of minutes and proceedings of Conference of Municipalities on the question of Government subsidy.—Received.

From D. Mulcahy with reference to his personal application at last meeting, asking that a fence be erected by the Council. Cr Russell moved that the application be not entertained. Cr Murray seconded. Cr Thomas said that after seeing the place he thought it was not as dangerous as made out. He did not think Mr Mulcahy had any claim. Cr Austin supported the motion. Cr Cushing said there was a mistake in Mr Mulcahy's letter. The Council had not given permission to Mr Mulcahy's predecessor to remove the fence they erected. Cr Oddie said that any liability of the Council had been previously paid. Cr Murray said the Council having once put up the fence, if there was any claim at all, it was that the Council should insist upon the fence being replaced. The motion was carried.

From the Municipal Association re Group Conference—No action. From Railway Department in reply to Council's request to do certain works. The department will pay half of the cost of raising the bank of Jackson's reservoir.—Received.

Mrs Palmer and Mr Huss applied for a remission of their rates.—Granted on the motion of Cr Thomas, seconded by Cr Beggs.

From Mr McIntosh, asking that he be allowed to withdraw his tender. Cr Oddie moved that Mr McIntosh be allowed to withdraw upon the forfeiture of his deposit of £8 1s. He was not in favor of establishing a precedent, as it might result in collusion. Cr Beggs seconded. Cr Cushing moved that the tender be allowed to withdraw on forfeiture of half of his deposit. Cr Andrews seconded the amendment. Cr Thomas said that in certain cases a man might make a mistake in quantities. Cr Andrews said that Mr McIntosh was the kind of man whom the Council should encourage to tender and he should be treated the same as others. Cr Oddie said they were not dealing with one man but with contractors as a body. Cr Russell said it was rather hard on the other contractors who perhaps had made up their minds at the lowest price, that the withdrawal should be allowed.

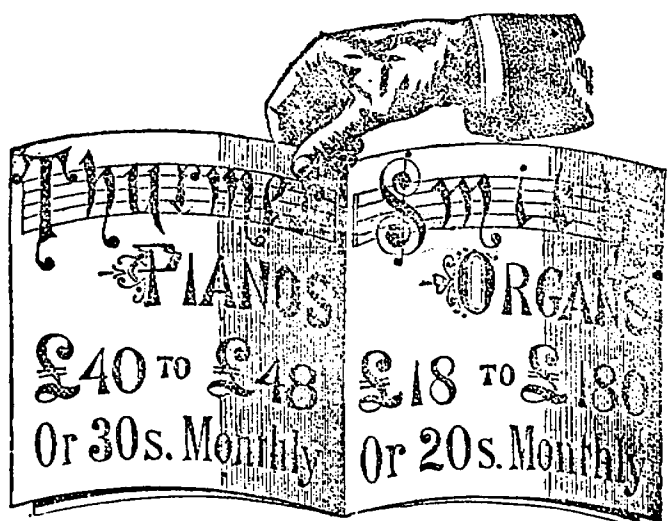

Raglan. (FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.) Many residents here desire a change in the mail service in reference to the time of starting from Beaufort. Under the present arrangements the Melbourne papers reach subscribers a day late, and letters are also delayed. By altering the time so that the mail may start after the morning train from Melbourne arrives, the daily papers would reach the town on the day of publication, and letters both from the down and up lines would be delivered on the day of arrival, instead of as at present remaining in Beaufort a day and night. The people seem inclined no longer to lag behind the times, and why should they when they might enjoy the privileges of rapid communication? It is hoped the councillors for the north riding and the member for the district will take note of this and make an effort to confer on the community the advantages which others enjoy who live a far greater distance from the main line than the Raglan folk. The change indicated would no doubt be appreciated by the people of Waterloo and surrounding district and thus a numerous population would be benefited.

Many readers will be glad to know that Mrs Wilcox who was with a serious accident on Saturday night is slowly improving, though not yet out of danger. Their buggy came in contact with a stump whilst descending a hill at a rapid rate between Main Lead and there home, and both she and Mr Wilcox were thrown a considerable distance. Municipal Election. SHIRE OF RIPON. The annual election for councillors and auditors for the Shire of Ripon took place on Thursday last. For the east and west ridings there were no contests, Messrs T. R. Oddie and Wm. Lewis respectively being returned without opposition. For the north riding two candidates were in the field, viz:-the retiring councillor, Mr Albert Andrews, and Mr M. Flynn. From the beginning of the contest, the canvass on both sides was persistently conducted, and was rightly estimated by us last week, the polling resulted in a very narrow majority for the winner. At every polling booth in the riding considerable excitement prevailed, and bets were freely made as to the result. With the exception of Waterloo, there was no great difference between the number of votes polled for the respective candidates, and at this booth Mr Flynn gave his opponent a beating by two to one. Prior to the Middle Creek returns coming to hand, Mr Andrews held a majority of 18 votes; but it was estimated that if every thing went right, Mr Flynn would have won by a couple or three votes. As things turned out, however, the polling was a tie, 23 votes being recorded for each candidate. Mr Andrews therefore won the seat by 18 votes majority. The following is the result of the polling at each booth:-

Majority for Mr Andrews 18. FOR AUDITOR. For auditor the poll was taken throughout the shire and resulted in even in a closer contest, Mr Nicoll having polled exceedingly well in the east riding, obtaining a majority of nearly 5 to 1 on Mr Humphreys, who in turn had the lead in the north and west ridings. Some mistake occurred in telephoning the figures from Waterloo on the night of the election, and owing to this the result of all returns gave Messrs Nicoll and Humphreys a tie. Yesterday morning

the official returns came to hand, and an error was discovered in the total polled by the latter. Mr Nicoll polled exceedingly well throughout the north riding, and in the Beaufort booth obtained 105 votes against Mr Humphreys' 145 and Mr Nicoll's 84. He also polled well at Waterloo and Raglan, where he got respectively 49 and 31 against 25 and 20 for Mr Nicoll. He also ground, however, in the east and west ridings, and fell back to third place. A point has been raised among the voters of testing it by law, respecting the legality of certain votes that have been recorded. Some ratepayers have voted in each riding, and it is stated by the defeated candidates and their friends that these ratepayers were their friends to vote as they did, although the Act read clearly enough to the contrary, and perhaps it is a matter that should be clearly tested it is not our duty to comment upon it; but at least the question be brought before the Supreme court, the decision will be anxiously looked for. The result of the polling gives Mr Humphreys the retiring auditor, a majority of 5 votes over the next candidate as will be seen by the subjoined table:-

Moved by Mr Topper, seconded by Mr Humphreys-That the correspondent write to the department, re the Travalla school and reserve, that seeing that the department do not intend to remove the present school building, but to repair the same, the board would recommend the leasing of that portion of the reserve applied for by W. Heath, at 4s per acre, on the terms mentioned as to giving up possession. Carried.

Moved by Mr Humphreys, seconded by Mr Charlton-That the board support the application of Mr Eddy, head teacher Main Lead school, to the department re rent of residence. Carried.

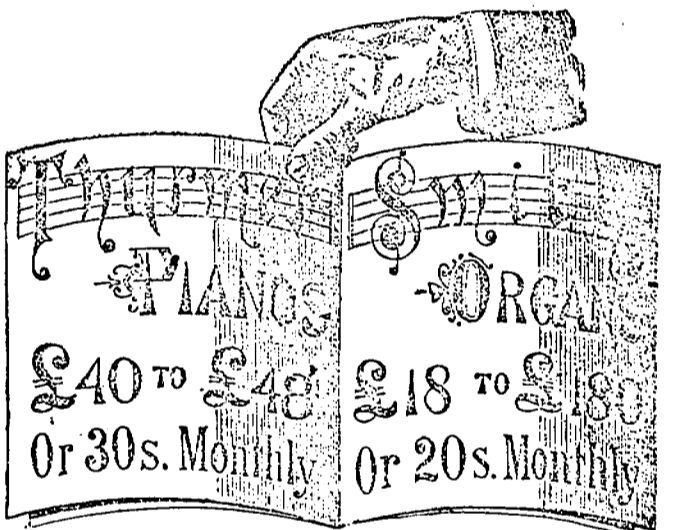

Donald Cameron, herdsman, gave evidence to having seen defendant driving cattle on the Ballarat and Ararat road. When asked defendant asked him if he was in charge, and he said "Yes." He also said that Mr S. Blakely, of Horsham, was the owner. Took defendant's name and address.

Mr J. W. Browne gave evidence to the effect that Messrs Cumming, Thomas, Andrews, and witness were the managers of the common by virtue of their offices as councillors of the Shire of Ripon and members of the Ararat Mining Board. The summons was issued against defendant under the 129th section of the Land Act 1884, providing that notice shall be given at least 12 hours and not more than 24 hours before travelling cattle.

Summary of European News.

(FROM THE ARGUS.) At a banquet given in Berlin in honor of the Emperor of Austria, the Emperor William proposed the health of the Imperial guest. He declared that the German people and army would maintain the alliance with Austria even at the cost of war.

The Senatorial High Court has come to a decision with regard to the charges against General Boulanger. By a majority of 206 votes the general was found guilty of conspiracy against the Republic, and by 198 votes of treason.

The trial of General Boulanger and his adherents—Count Dillon and M. Henri Rochefort—before the Senatorial High Court, has resulted in General Boulanger, who had previously been convicted of treason and conspiracy against the Republic, being found guilty of embezzling the public funds.

In the House of Commons on Tuesday night, Mr Samuel Smith, the Gladstonian member for Fifehire, gave notice of a motion for the rejection of the Western Australian Enabling Bill.

On account of the lateness of the season and the consequent absence of many of the supporters, the Ministry, who are endeavoring to carry their Title Bill through the House of Commons, have on several occasions had very small majorities.

FEEDING OF LAYING HENS.—Hens fed on a regular diet will not lay as many eggs as if they were fed on a variety of grains. A very wholesome diet for fowls during cold weather, and excellent for producing eggs, is found in a warm mixture of boiled potatoes, middlings, ground oats or barley meal, with dry mustard, pepper or ginger, mixed for breakfast; scraps from the table, boiled vegetables, pieces of meat and screenings for dinner, the screenings being scattered through the loose chaff or dry leaves on the hen house floor; give the fowls exercise; oats and buckwheat or corn and barley for supper.

quite aware that the Papacy without Rome is the Papacy decapitated; and he is not likely to sanction such a step without something more serious than a shout over Giordano Bruno's monument, and an outbreak of ill-humor on the part of Signor Crispi.

The Servian Ministry is said to have delivered a speech to the assembly on the frontier between Serbia and Bulgaria. This singular proceeding has engaged the attention of the Bulgarian Cabinet, which has addressed a remonstrance on the subject to Belgrade. The little kingdom of Servia appears to be in a state of great agitation, and from one moment to another some untoward event may be expected. King Milan's Government was far from being a model one, but at any rate it was better than the anarchy and disorder now reigning in the country. It is just possible that King Milan's resignation was not so much of a freak as it was supposed to be at the time. He probably wished to show that the Servian peasantry was not fit for the elaborate machinery of a Parliamentary Government, and that it would result in anarchy and disorder. King Milan, it is said, will soon return to Belgrade, and will make his appearance on the political stage as regent for his son. In that case Parliamentary Government in Servia will no doubt receive its quietus for a considerable period.

It appears that the meteoric stone found in Savoy, and acquired by Baron Nordenskiöld for the National Museum, at Stockholm, fell on April 6, and that its fall was accompanied by a red flash like lightning and a thunder-like detonation. It weighs 11 kilograms, and had made a hole 30 centims. in depth; but having recoiled it, lay on the level ground at the edge of the hole. The colour is greyish-black, and the fracture greyish-white. From a hasty analysis made by Herr A. Windhast, of Kelsingburg, the chief mass appears to consist of manganese, in which are yellow and grey particles of metal. The meteorite seems to have been in a red hot state, being covered with a glazed coating of fused metal half a millimetre in thickness.

The plan of voting in Assemblies by means of the electric current, and thus avoiding the time lost in making divisions, has been before the French Chamber of Deputies, and a report on that subject was presented by M. Montant. In that report the advisability of employing a machine which would indicate not only the total votes "pour" or "contre" a measure, that is to say the "yes" and "noes," but also the number of abstentions from voting, as distinct from the number of absentees. Such an apparatus has now been devised by M. Le Genozion. On every desk in front of a member is placed a small box fitted with two handles, which the member works when registering his vote. The right handle registers his "yes," the left his "no," and both moved simultaneously indicate his abstention from voting. The results are printed by means of electro-magnets in a register, and are visible at a glance. Provision is made for a member to recall and correct his vote during a time allowed for the purpose.

On July 4th, at 2 p.m., took place at the Ile des Cygnes, on the Pont de Grenelle, Paris, the inauguration of the reduced statue of "Liberty Enlightening the World." The President of the Republic, who had accepted the invitation to be present, made his appearance punctually, accompanied by M. Spuller, Minister of Foreign Affairs, M. Chautemps, President of the Municipal Council, the American Minister, Mr. Whitelaw Reid, General W. B. Franklin, United States Commissioner-General, Dr. Thomas W. Evans, the staff of the American Legation, and many other representatives of the American colony, both resident and transient. M. Chautemps thanked the people of the United States for their generous gift. He recalled the many facts which are the cause of a close union between the two sister Republics, and closed by comparing the establishment of the freedom of the human mind and body—1776 for the Americans, and 1789 for the French. Next Mr. Whitelaw Reid made a few friendly feelings existing between the two countries; but he addressed his countrymen in his mother tongue, recalling the sincere friendship existing between the two great Republics, and the fact that the children of both countries unitedly contended for the principle of liberty on the battle-field. His words profoundly impressed the audience, more especially the French element present, as was shown by the demonstration made after the orator descended from the tribune. M. Spuller, the Minister of Foreign Affairs, then mounted the tribune, and recalled the great services rendered to both countries by the establishment of the Republican Government. He said that the two countries were united during the past by services rendered by the one to the other, thereby laying the foundation of the Republic principle as the bond of their union. When President Carnot left he was heartily cheered by all present. At the close of the ceremony, all the invited guests were seated at the Hotel de Ville, where a sumptuous lunch was supplied. Decapitated boats had been placed at the disposal of the invited guests to reach the City Hall. During the lunch the American National Hymn was played by the hand of the Garde Republicain. A grand reception was given by the American Minister. The guests of the Exhibition were brilliantly entertained during the whole evening, and the Eiffel fireworks were sent up, and an electric crowd witnessed the French and American National Day. It is many years since the festival in Paris.

Summary of European News.

(FROM THE ARGUS.) LONDON, Aug. 21. The Emperor William of Germany visited Strasbourg yesterday and met with a splendid reception from the inhabitants. The stevedores' labourers and all the ship hands have joined the dock labourers, who are on strike. Shipping business in London is absolutely at a standstill, and it is uncertain whether the mail steamers will be able to keep their engagements. The dock companies are generally condemned for illiberality towards their employees. Queen Natalie of Servia has postponed her visit to Belgrade, in consequence of ill-health. H.M.S. Sultan, which was wrecked in March last, near Malta, has been raised, and is now afloat. Mr. F. A. Devic has been gazetted consul-general in Melbourne for the Netherlands. The organ for the Sydney Centennial hall will be shipped by the steamer Gulf of Venice on the 29th inst. A violent outbreak of anger against England has been manifested by the French press in consequence of an attack of the British embassy at Berlin being present at a dinner given at Mars-la-Tour, near Metz, by the officers of the regiment of German Dragon Guards of which the Queen was lately appointed honorary colonel, and also because Her Majesty recently presented Prince Bismarck with her portrait. Sir James Ferguson, the Under-Secretary for Foreign Affairs, has been persistently asked in the House of Commons whether an alliance has been concluded between England and Germany, and he has several times existence of any such treaty. He admits, however, that the Emperor William, during his recent visit to Osborne, had conversations with the Queen on the subject. The German press is writing of England in a very friendly tone.

Things in General.

NOTED BY A. GROWLER. We much-abused cockatoos are to be sat upon again by a wise and discreet (save the mark!) majority of Parliamentary representatives. We are prettily fattened out now—what we shall be like in the near future, Goodness knows. My wife was only saying to me the other day, "I want a new dress." "Can't have it just now—I have other expenses to meet. Got to keep rabbits down, put up wire netting fences, buy a new reaping machine, and raise the mortgage on the growing crop before I can call a penny my own; and if the price of grain next year doesn't come up to 5s per bushel, how am I to do it? The duty on machines is to be raised to 35 per cent, and gettings is, 20 per cent, is too much, as it is." "But you needn't buy an imported machine, my dear, and the difference in the price would buy me two dresses and a bunnet to match." "You don't know what you are talking about, my dear! I'd never refuse you anything, and you know that, if I could afford it; but I can't. You don't understand how this protective policy works. It takes money out of my pocket, clothes off your back, and the profits go to those who make money hand over fist—not to produce a cheaper article of as good quality as the imported, but raise the price of inferior articles. You buy colonial made boots. Is there any difference in the price between them and the English make of the same class? Which wears the longest? Which are the most comfortable?" "Oh, the English, of course, and the difference is not much, if anything." "Just so; the same with farming machinery—except that in very many instances the colonial article is not so good as the English or American, and the price is the same. If the duty were 50 per cent, the price of the colonial made machines would go up too. The fact of the matter is, farming is to be crushed out. We cannot be protected. It does not pay to crop our land; it does not pay to raise stock; it would not pay to touch dairying unless on a large scale, and we can't afford the first outlay; bacon curing the same; poultry—does the quantity of eggs you get from 50 fowls say you for the food, and trouble you take over the comfort of your hens?" "But isn't the Government going to put a duty on eggs, and won't that duty raise the price?" "Perhaps they will put the duty on; perhaps the price will go up; perhaps in a little it will cost twice as much as we would get from selling the eggs to keep down the taxes—Bah! my dear, I see it's no use trying to argue with a woman. I think I'll sell the blooming farm and take a pug."

"A pug? Gracious! What on earth would you do in a pug? And, besides, suppose you happen to take a public-house, you might have to shut it up, if they decided by vote, you know." "Well, I'd get compensation for that—one must get money out of the Government, and that's as good a way as any other." "Then, suppose you did get the money, what would you do with it?" "Blow it, Mary, do shut up, and let me think the matter over. Perhaps it wouldn't be a bad idea to start a small dairy and cheese factory, ham and bacon curing establishment, or something of that sort." My wife left me, to attend to the kettle, which had fallen over on the fire. But really, it does seem annoying that we farmers are to be crushed out of existence to serve the ends of Melbourne. They talk about the agriculturalist being the backbone and sinew of the country. Isn't this a logical argument in favor of protecting that backbone—or the Premier—do if he had no backbone? Why, he'd be a doubled up and ruined man in no time. And my friends, the sooner we farmers make up our minds for one thing or the other, and go in for it heart and soul with the intention of carrying it through—protection to all or free ports to everybody—the sooner we shall impress upon our legislators that we are the backbone of the country, and will not be crushed out of existence.

Summary of European News.

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Intercolonial Postal Notes.

The postal authorities have completed arrangements for the establishment of a system of intercolonial postal notes between this colony and South Australia. The system is one which will enable small amounts to be sent from one colony to the other at a lower rate than by money order, the charges on the issue being as follows:—

On notes of the value of 1s and 1s 6d.	s. d.
" " " 2s and up to 5s 0 0	
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An additional face equal to the original fee, will be collected by the paying office. The system will be brought into operation on the 1st February. In accordance with the resolution adopted at the late Postal Conference, arrangements will be made to establish the system with New South Wales, Queensland, Tasmania, Western Australia, and New Zealand.

Aug. 22. In connection with the strike of the London dock labourers, there are now 30,000 men out of work. The strike and consequent difficulty of obtaining labour prevents the departure of the New Zealand Shipping Co's R.M.S. Ruapehu, which was to leave to-day for Hobart and Wellington.

The United States authorities have seized the British sealer Pathfinder and Minnie in Behring Sea, for illegally fishing, and have searched several other British sealing vessels.

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The overtures for peace made by the Abyssinian general, Ras-Aloula, have been rejected by the Italians, who are now in pursuit of him.

A company has been formed for the purpose of erecting in England a building similar to the Eiffel Tower in Paris.

Mr. James Mansergh, civil engineer, who is proceeding to Melbourne to advise on a scheme of drainage for Melbourne and the suburbs, sails for Australia on Saturday next, via America.

P. F. Slavin, the Australian champion, has offered to box Jim Smith, the English pugilist, for £1000 a-side.

Parisian Letter.

(FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.)

Paris, July 20.

An amusing and true story has come from Toulon about bugs, which are the cause of the sinking of the torpedo boat Conclaurine. The numbers of these nauseous insects that swarm in every corner of the boat seem to be endless.

The celluloid, of which the Conclaurine is built, seems to be their favourite haunt, for all the surfaces of that material were black with bugs. The ordinary insect powders were powerless, and on the advice of the Maritime Prefect, the Minister of Marine, Admiral Krantz, gave orders for the Conclaurine to be sunk and kept under salt water for three days.

The International Show of breeding stock was opened a few days ago. There are 2146 bulls, heifers, or cows, 651 sheep, 316 pigs, and 2613 poultry and pigeons. Switzerland, Holland, England, and Belgium are represented by pure bred stock of their respective breeds.

A young agriculturist from Le Mans has just met with a serious mishap. He brought to Paris to the Agricultural Show an enormous pig, with which he hoped to gain a valuable prize. On the morning of his arrival in the capital the animal, excited by some cause, "turned against him and rent him on the leg, to such effect that he had to be taken to the hospital. A strict watch has been set over the animal, and has been separated from the others of its species, lest it should be suffered from rabies.

The Paris Municipal Council at its sitting the other day voted 1000 francs for the congress on the subject of demography and siphonography, which is to be held in August.

The "Long-Life Elixir," which Dr. Brown Séguin has tried upon himself, has created a stir in medical circles. At the last sitting of the French Biological Society, M. Varioz gave the results of several experiments which confirm the value of M. Brown Séguin's. He stated that he had injected the precious liquid into the veins of three patients, who experienced the most salutary effects from the treatment.

A serious accident occurred the other day at the ascent of a balloon from the grounds of the new Bastille. The arrangements for starting the balloon, which had been made, and as soon as it was inflated it struck so violently against the scaffolding of a circus in course of construction that one of the ribs sustaining the car broke, the car upset and its occupants fell a distance of some 20 yards to the ground. Captain Meyer, the manager of the ascent, had his leg broken, and his two colleagues, Signor Rezzio and a Paris journalist, were seriously injured. The balloon, relieved of its weight of too solid flesh, rose with immense rapidity, and has not since been heard of.

The other night the first serious accident happened on the Décauville steeps in the Exhibition grounds. One of the guards in trying to save a couple from being run over, was himself caught and by the engine and thrown against the track, but was rescued in season, escape being effected. The poor fellow had two ribs broken and was otherwise injured, but is expected to recover.

The Pazo de Juros, near the Tuodiers, has come to grief:—at all events temporarily so. It seems that a few days ago the manager allowed the famous matador, Lagarriga, to display

himself in small boxes, each box containing a portrait of a popular actor or actress, and is supplied with monthpieces for each cigarette the packet contains.

WONDERS OF THE POLAR WORLD.—A copy of this work has reached us from the National Publishing Company, Sydney. It is very instructive, and deals with Arctic exploration, advantage having been taken by the editor of the accounts of voyages and discoveries recorded by a large number of explorers, prominent amongst whom may be mentioned Commander Schley, Lieutenants Danenhorn and Greeley. The work abounds in thrilling incidents occurring during the travels of these brave men, is nicely printed, and is very useful in a home library. Mr H. Deick, M.A., the editor, has successfully accomplished the task of compiling a work which may be found invaluable to lovers of historical records. The book is nicely bound.

RAINFALL.—One hundred and twelve points of rain fell on Thursday night. The showers were heavy, and almost a repetition of the floods of a few weeks back was the result. Several residents of Waterloo road complain of the waters of the creek having again found their way into their premises, and are anxious to know when the clearing out process is to be taken in hand.

RIFLE CLUB TURN-OUT.—On Saturday last the muster of the local rifle club was a success, no less than 31 out of 34 affiliated put in an appearance. All four targets were brought into use, and the highest score of the day, viz., 122, Mr J. McEae being next with 121; Mr Allison third with 120; there were two scores of 112; one of 111; one of 109; one of 108; two of 106. The average scoring for the 31 men was a trifle over 80 per man. To-day the monthly match for August will be fired. The ranges are 400, 500, and 600 yards.

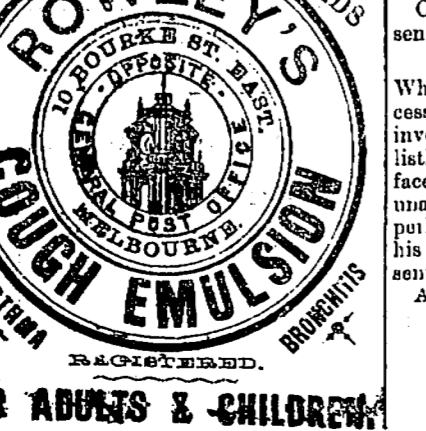

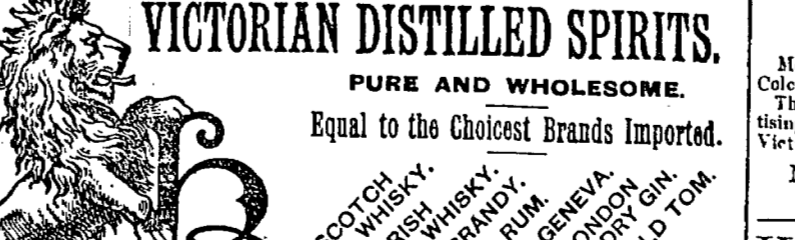
