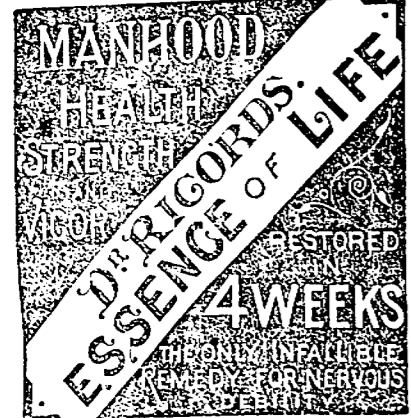

THURSDAY, 4th SEPTEMBER, 1890.

Present: Crs. Murray, the Mayor, Bridges, Beggs, Cushing, Russell, Austin, Odie, Lewis, Andrews.

GARDENING FOR SEPTEMBER. KITCHEN GARDEN.—This is the busiest month in the year for sowing; most of the hardy vegetables may be sown, and towards close of month all the tender sorts. Potatoes of all kinds should be planted for main crops. Make a sowing of peas for succession. Early longpod beans may still be sown in low-lying ground. Sow scarlet runners, dwarf French beans, heart, carrot, cucumber, melon, vegetable marrow, pumpkin, onion, radish, and spinach; mustard and cress should be sown every fortnight; so celery on a hot-bed. Tomatoes and capsicums may be sown in warm situations; if any have been raised in a hot-bed, harden a little and plant out. Plant Chinese yams and sweet potatoes in well-ventilated soil. Fruit trees will require attention; with the finger and thumb displace any superfluous shoots, and, if time can be spared, the blossom buds should be thinned, especially of young trees.

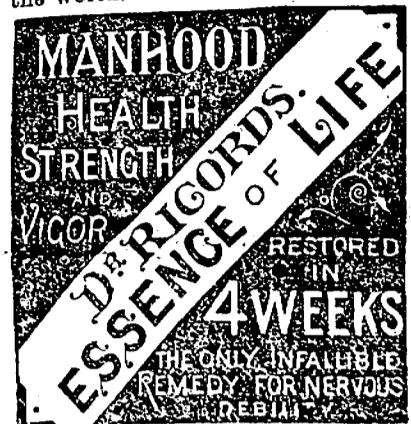

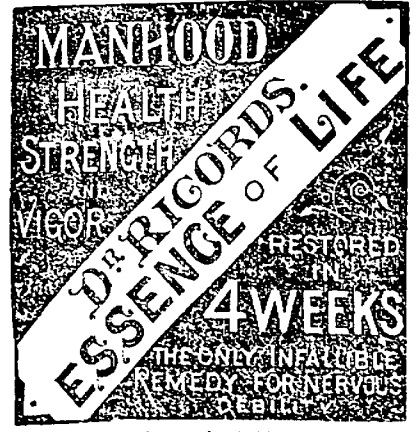

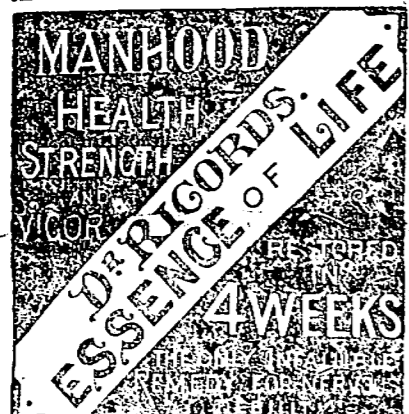

THE TIMBER QUESTION.

All interested in the Mining industry in this district will be pleased to learn that Mr Perrin, the Conservator of Forests, has issued the long-promised conditions under which timber may be cut for mining purposes. This has been a vexed question in this district for a considerable time, and has greatly retarded the development of our mining resources. To such an extent did the industry suffer, that the outlook became alarming, and steps were taken to induce the department to grant some concessions, so as to keep the mines at work. With this object in view Mr Perrin, about twelve months ago, was invited to attend a public meeting at Waterloo, and so impressed was he with the justice of the demands of the miners, that he readily promised to frame special regulations to meet their case. Under this promise proposals were put forth for the mines. Recently, however, the Crown Lands Bill presented a couple of contractors a chance for being in illegal possession of portions of trees, or, in other words, for supplying the Saxon Consols mine at Waterloo with props. They were fined, and although the Bench sympathized with them and a feeling of dissatisfaction existed, but this should now be done away with by the issue of the following conditions:—

1. No timber shall be cut of less diameter than 6 in. at a height of 1 ft. from the ground.

2. Cutting must be done under license obtained from the Registrar and Conservator, in addition to special permit granted by this department.

3. The special permit is only available for Crown lands, not being State forests or timber reserves.

4. No timber shall be cut for firewood purposes.

5. Single trees standing alone must not be cut, and in the case of double trees, one must be allowed to remain, or if selecting from a clump at least one must be left to grow.

6. In no case must saplings under 6 in. in diameter be cut, and in the case of such saplings, the special permit must be obtained from the Registrar and Conservator, in addition to special permit granted by this department.

7. Any person or persons receiving a permit from a contractor under special permit will be required to furnish a quarter a return showing the character and quantity of wood received by them from such contract; also a statement to the best of their belief the timber received had been legally obtained, and was not under 6 in. in diameter, and that generally the whole of the conditions of this permit had been complied with.

Mr T. G. Orle, Crown Lands Bailiff, to whom we are indebted for the information contained in this notice, has received special instructions from Mr Perrin, regarding these regulations. In the first place he was requested to communicate with the two mining companies at Waterloo, and request them to apply to him (Mr Perrin) for a special permit to cut props. Mr Orle is to get the quantity they require weekly, also size, &c., and the number of men required to cut the props for the company. The contractors shall take out the usual license for cutting E. timber on Crown lands, viz. £1 per annum, or 5s quarterly. One day or more, as required, is to be arranged to personally supervise the cutting. The above condition only applies to contractors on local mines, who are not to send away to other places. No red gum or ironbark must be cut on any account.

ADDITIONAL REGULATION UNDER LAND ACT 1890.

The following should prove interesting to many of our readers:—

7A. There may be issued licenses for the exclusive right of stripping and removing bark from wattle trees on lands leased under section 32 of the Land Acts 1884 or 1890. Every such license shall be available for the season commencing on the 15th day of September in any year, and ending on the 15th day of January next following thereafter, and no longer, and shall be subject to the conditions specified hereunder. The fee shall be £2.

CONDITIONS.

1. The holder of this license shall be the lessee under section 32 of the Land Acts 1884 and 1890 of the block referred to herein.

2. The fee shall be payable in advance.

3. This license is only available for block parish of held under section 32 Land Acts 1884 or 1890 by

The pastor of the above-named denomination, the Rev. W. H. Youton, in calling upon Mr Lewis to open the bazaar, spoke of that gentleman having a good friend to them on other occasions of church affairs, and alluded to the wisdom shown in bestowing the honor on him in sense of their gratitude.

Mr Lewis remarked that he had a very pleasing duty to perform and he felt the honor conferred on him. Mr O'Leary is to get the quantity they require weekly, also sizes, &c., and the number of men required to cut these props for the company. The contractors shall take on the usual license for cutting E. timber as on Crown lands, viz., £1 per annum, or 3s quarterly. One day or more, as required, is to be arranged to personally supervise the cutting. The above condition only applies to contractors on local mines, who are not to send away to other places. No red gum or iron-bark must be cut on any account.

ADDITIONAL REGULATION UNDER LAND ACT 1890.

The following should prove interesting to many of our readers:—

7A. There may be issued licenses for the exclusive right of stripping and removing bark from wattle trees on lands leased under section 32 of the Land Acts 1884 or 1890. Every such license shall be available for the season commencing on the 15th day of September in any year, and ending on the 15th day of January next following thereafter, and no longer, and shall be subject to the conditions specified hereunder. The fee shall be £2.

1. The holder of this license shall be the lessee under section 32 of the Land Acts 1884 and 1890 of the block referred to herein.

2. The fee shall be payable in advance.

THE TIMBER QUESTION.

All interested in the Mining industry in this district will be pleased to learn that Mr Perrin, the Conservator of Forests, has issued the long-promised conditions under which timber may be cut for mining purposes.

This has been a vexed question in this district for a considerable time, and has greatly retarded the development of our mining resources. To such an extent did the industry suffer, that the outlook became alarming, and steps were taken to induce the department to grant some concessions, so as to keep the mines at work.

With this object in view Mr Perrin, about twelve months ago, was invited to attend a public meeting at Waterloo, and so impressed was he with the justice of the demands of the miners, that he readily promised to frame special regulations to meet their case. Under this promise props were cut for the mines. Recently, however, the Crown Lands Bailiff prosecuted a couple of contractors a Chute for being in illegal possession of portions of trees, or, in other words, for supplying the Saxon Consols mine at Waterloo with props. They were fined, and although the Bench sympathized with them and imposed a very light penalty, still a feeling of dissatisfaction existed, but this should now be done away with by the issue of the following conditions:—

1. No timber must be cut of a less diameter than 5in. at a height of 1ft. from the ground.

2. Cutting must be done under license obtainable from the Inspector and Paymaster, in addition to special permit granted by this department.

3. The special permit is only available for Crown lands, not being State forests or timber reserves.

4. No timber shall be cut for fire-wood purposes.

5. Single trees standing alone must not be cut, and in the case of double trees, one must be allowed to remain, or if selecting from a clump at least one must be left to grow.

6. In no case must saplings under 5in. be cut under penalty of expulsion from the reserve, and immediate cancellation of the special permit, together with the risk of prosecution.

7. Any person or persons receiving timber from a contractor under special permit will be required to furnish a quarterly return showing the character and quantity of wood received by them from such contract; also a timber reserved for the use of the timber reserved had been legally obtained, and was not under 5in. in diameter, and that generally the whole of the conditions of this permit had been complied with.

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COURT OF MINES, BEAUFORT. FRIDAY, 26th SEPT., 1890.

(Before His Honor Judge Gaunt.) Sidney Hancock and party, plaintiffs, v. Thos. Thompson, instructed respondents. Mr. Finlayson, for the appellants, and Mr. P. S. Barrett, for the respondents.

This case was partly heard on the 8th August last, and adjourned to enable respondents to produce Lindsay's mine's right, he having gone to New South Wales, and this being part of the title to the ground.

Thompson and party had in the first place sued Hancock and party before Mr. Warren Thome on to recover damages for trespass, encroachment, and injury to shaft, and a verdict was given for £54 for the gold that had been taken out of the ground, and £65 for damages to the shaft, with L114s costs.

This was appealed against on the grounds that the damages were excessive. Mr. Barrett intimated that they had failed to find Lindsay, and intended proceeding with the case. As the production of the mine's right was not one of the grounds of appeal, he did not attach much importance to it.

Elizabeth M'Donnell, one of the respondents, deposed to being in possession of the claim with Thompson, Lindsay and Tupper, in February, in which were sunk three shafts. The shaft broken into—the west one—was bottomed at the end of Feb'y. or in March, when they heard Hancock and party driving, resulting in respondents' shaft being driven into by a foot or 18 inches, and the face of their drive falling away. Had opened out a set towards appellant's shaft. Abbott told him they would continue the drive, and he said the respondents would try and stop them, putting in half a set of a drive and costing £138. After trespass commenced had been taken out, their ground gave away at the bottom, caused through the ground being taken out by defendants and not facing their drive on respondents' ground. It is heavy ground. The respondents got 2 dwts. off the bottom of the shaft, but did not wash it. Sank a shaft 30ft. away from the one that caved in; it would not have been safer to go closer. Subsequently got wash at a lower depth, having to sink down in the drive to reach it, and taking perhaps half a shift. Then put in an east drive, and did not succeed in getting the wash. Drove 60ft. in the old shaft had not taken in that 60ft. of driving would not have been necessary.

Witness was severely cross-examined by Mr. Finlayson, but his evidence was not shaken. Henry Ramsay, a miner of 14 years' experience, deposed to examining the shaft on 3rd April and deeming it unsafe to work to the ground the ground settling. George Huse gave evidence as to 5 or 10 dwts. of gold having been obtained from two sets of ground on the bottom of Thompson and party's shaft. A. E. Stuart, a miner of 16 years' experience, deposed that the cause of the collapse was through so much ground having been taken out immediately round the bottom of the shaft and on the east and north side, and that Hancock and party's workings had not been there the shaft would not have collapsed. The rights of the respondents were put in, excepting Lindsay's, Mr. Barrett contending that having been produced before the Warren, and this being a re-hearing, secondary evidence should be sufficient; but if his Honor was against him he would ask him to state a case for that question. His Honor said that it was necessary, but consented to state a case for the Full Court.
