Hodgson was driving a team of bullocks yoked to a threshing machine engine belonging to Mr. J. Ross, J.P., of Waterloo. It appears that he was sitting on the pole and fell off, the wheel of the engine going over his body and killing him on the spot. A magisterial inquiry was held at Bailknap on Saturday, when the verdict of accidental death was returned. Deceased was a single man, about 32 years of age.

Colonel Snee visited Beaufort on Wednesday, his object being to complete arrangements for the formation of a cadet corps at the State school. He, however, came considerably before his appointed hour, and being in a hurry to depart, could not wait till the boys were in readiness, but decided to fulfil all that was required by correspondence. The force of the collision smashed a large glass chemist's bottle, which Mr. Troy made good. The runaway was eventually caught outgated in a tree-guard near the Methodist church, the harness and vehicle escaping.

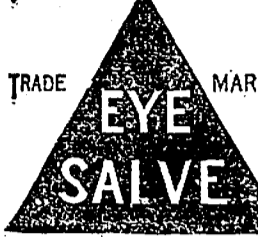

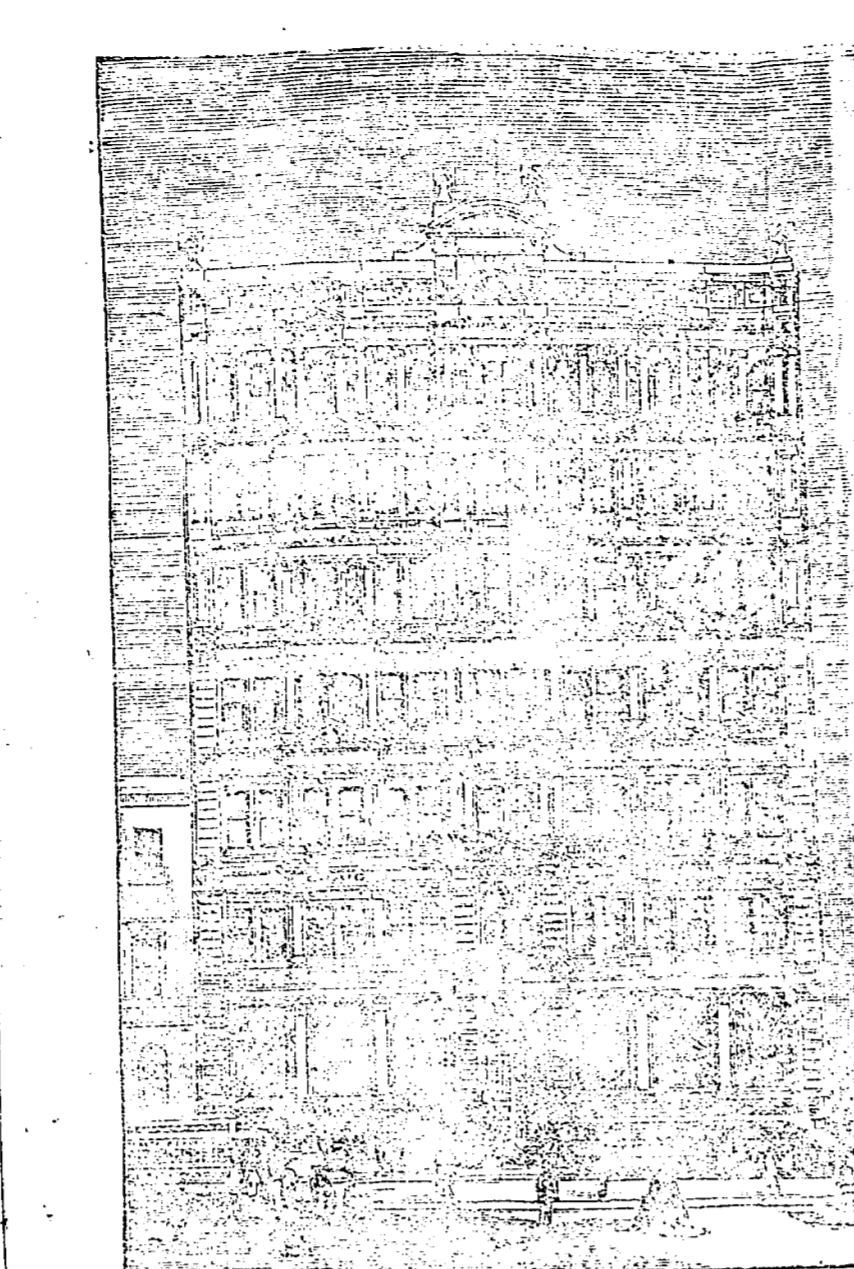

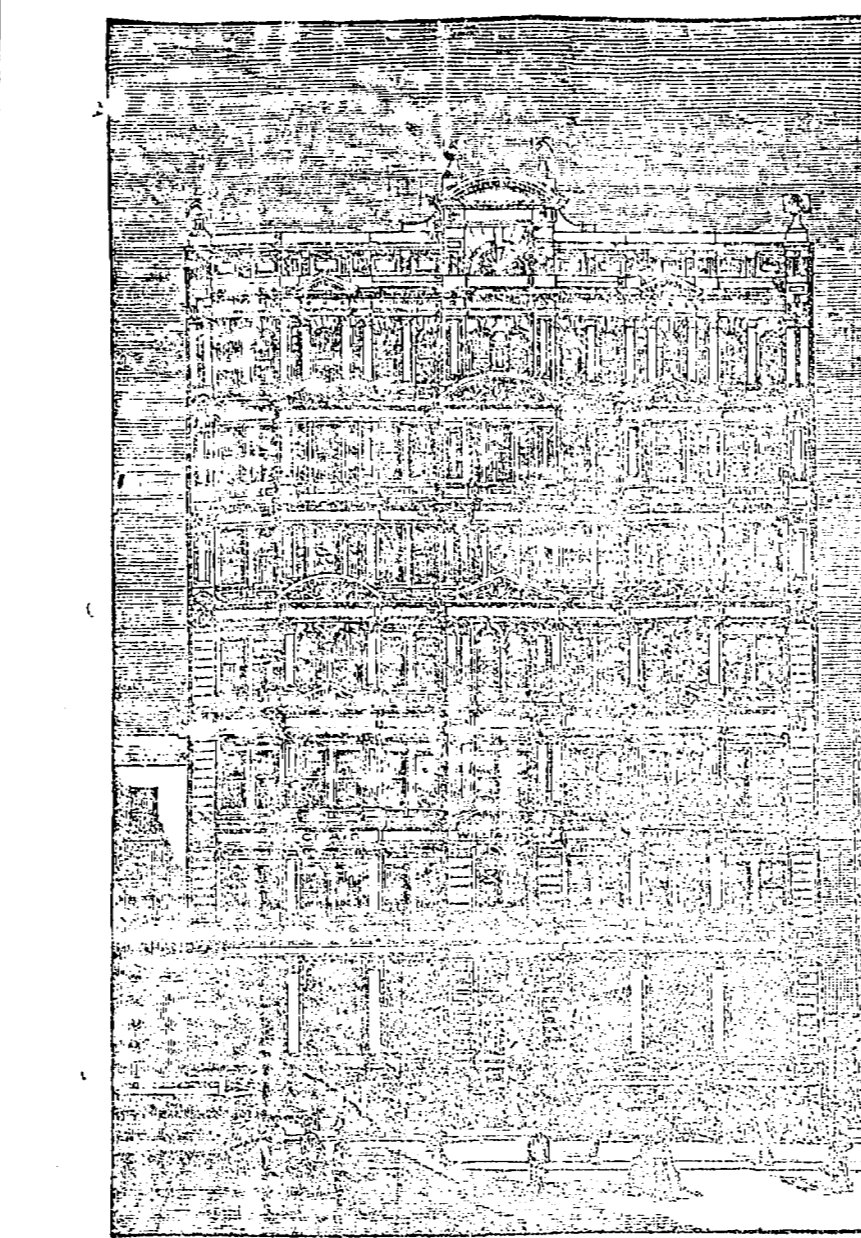
