BEAUFORT POLICE COURT.

MONDAY, 27TH APRIL, 1891. (Before Messrs. W. C. Thomas and J. W. Harris, J.A.P.)

P. DeBoere v. F. Ormiston. No appearance of defendant. Plaintiff deposed that he had received the amount owing (£1) since issue of summons, and applied for costs, for which an order was made.

George Bell, sworn, deposed: I am a grazier, residing at Bald Hill, Stockyard Hill district. The prisoner was in my employ a short time ago for about 8 days. Remembered arriving from Ballarat in Beaufort by the 5 p.m. train, on 13th inst. Had then in my possession seven £1 notes, as far as I can remember, was a bit on. Went to the George Hotel about ten minutes after. Remember only having one drink there. Shouted for the prisoner there, and took my money out. Took a bed for 2 or 3 hours, between 9 and 10 o'clock, Nicholson going to the room with me. Laid on the bed. Had the notes in my left-hand trousers pocket, and was holding my hand on them. Asked the prisoner to loose my boots and he pulled them off. Remember nothing further till I woke up between 12 and 1 o'clock. Found that my trousers had been taken off and were lying on the floor. Examined them and found that all the money but 5s 9d in silver was gone. Cannot tell what bank the notes were on. They were similar to those two produced (National notes) of a yellow color. Did not give the prisoner the money during that evening to take any money from me. Swore an information on the morning of the 14th against the prisoner.

Elizabeth Packham, sworn—Am a general servant employed at the George Hotel, Beaufort. Remember seeing last witness at the hotel on the evening of the 13th inst. Prisoner came in shortly afterwards. Saw the last witness with notes in his hand while in the bar in the presence of the prisoner. He engaged a room and went into the same as that occupied by the prisoner, who was a lodger at the hotel. Bell went to the room about 9 o'clock. The prisoner accompanied him. Prisoner came out in a short time to the bar. He again went into the bedroom. Saw that he did so. Did not remain long. When he came out prisoner said these would be a dynamite explosion in the morning with the host. Prisoner never mentioned last witness. He left and had not seen him again until 7th May. The prisoner was not quite sober. Gave no reason as to why he was going away, and he left some of his things in the room.

Harry Cambridge, sworn—Am a clerk employed by the Victorian Railways, stationed at Beaufort. Remember seeing the prisoner at the railway station about mid night on the 15th inst. He got a single ticket second class from Beaufort to Ballarat. He paid for it with £1 note (produced). Gave him the change. Edward McCracken deposed. Know prisoner, residing at Waterloo. Know prisoner, who boarded at my brother's hotel. Remember being in company with him at Schape's hotel about half-past 5 p.m. on the 13th inst. Went up in the evening when prisoner asked for two drinks. Mrs. Schape said "I won't give you any more money. He told me he had received £1 from Mr. Smith on the Saturday evening, but did not say what he had done with it. He said it was all gone then.

Wm. Smith, deposed: I am a butcher, carrying on business in my own name. Prisoner was employed by me grubbing and fencing for about 5 or 6 weeks. Remember paying prisoner £1 in silver on Saturday evening, 11th inst. On the 28th March had given him a £1 note—that was all had paid him. There is a balance owing to him yet, the contract not having been finished.

George McCracken, deposed: I am the licensee of the George Hotel, Beaufort. Was at my work on the evening of the 13th, and returned home about a quarter to 2 on the morning of the 14th. Remember going to the room occupied by the prisoner after I came home. He was sitting up in the bed and his trousers were lying on the floor. He examined his trousers in my presence, and made a complaint to me. The bedroom door was shut when I entered. I did not take any money out of Bell's pocket. He then said, "I told him he was charged with larceny from the person of George Bell, Beaufort, stealing seven £1 notes. Took him to the Ballarat City lockup and searched him. On him I found a £1 National Bank note, (produced) and 10s 6d in silver. Mr. Cohen came to the watch-house and stated in the prisoner's presence that he came to his hotel at 2 o'clock that morning. He had charged a National £1 note there, and spent altogether about 30s. I said to the prisoner: "Where did you get the note you changed at the railway station, Beaufort, the one you changed at Ballarat, and the one I found on you?" He said: "I got them from Mr. Smith, the butcher of Beaufort, for work I had done." On the way from the lockup to the court-house, he said, "I suppose this means six months." It was a voluntary statement. I had not cautioned prisoner. On the way up in the train this morning, I said, "One you changed at Ballarat, and the one I found on you?" He said: "Yes, I must have been mad." I had work enough to get me going all the winter about Beaufort.

Prisoner, who reserved his defence, committed for trial at the Supreme Court criminal sittings at Ballarat on 4th June next.

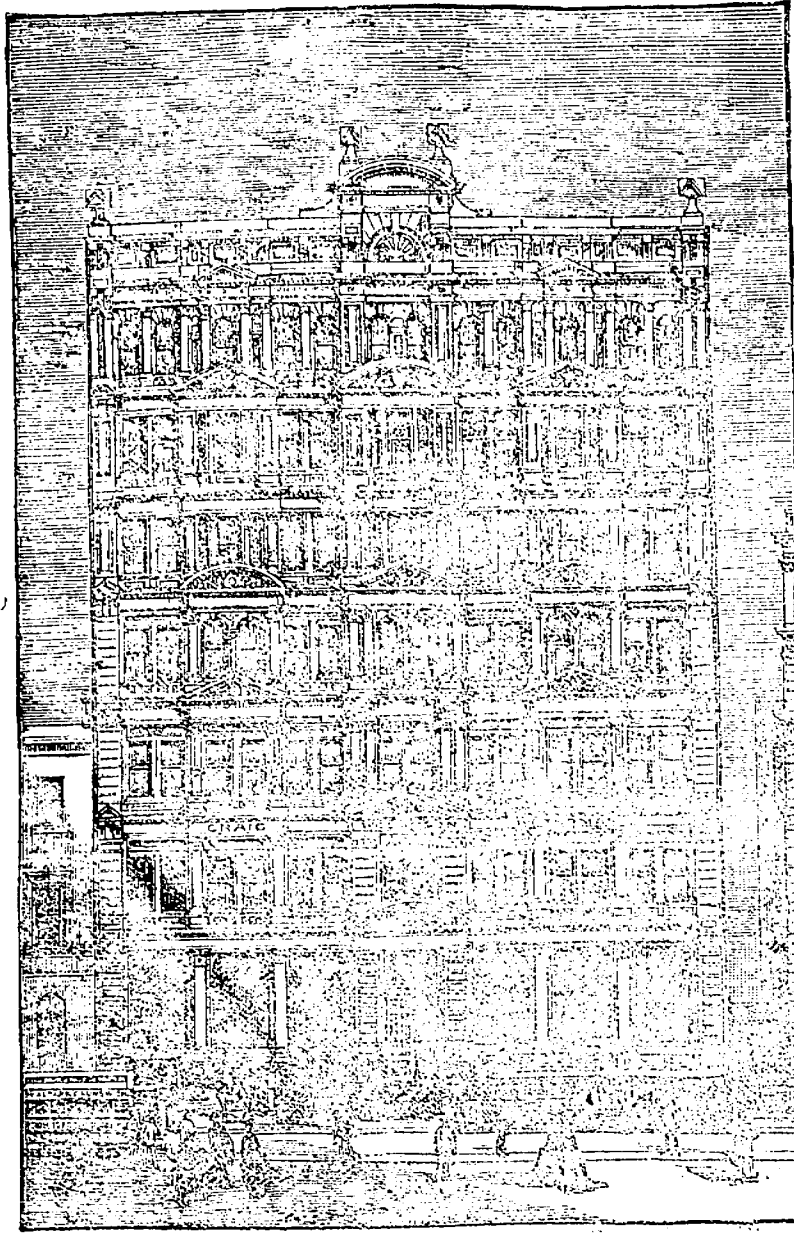

THE CENSUS.

On 25th May, 1836, the total population in this colony was 177 persons, of whom 142 were males and 35 females. The following figures show the population in successive decades—1841, 11,738 persons; 1851, 77,345; 1861, 540,332; 1871, 751,628; 1881, 862,346; 1891, 1,133,846. The increase during the last decade has thus been 271,500. Of the total present population, 489,185 persons are contained in Melbourne and the districts within the 10 mile radius, while the whole of the remainder of the colony contains the other 644,661 persons. In 1881 the numbers were for Melbourne and suburbs 289,947 persons, and for the remainder of the colony 519,399 persons.

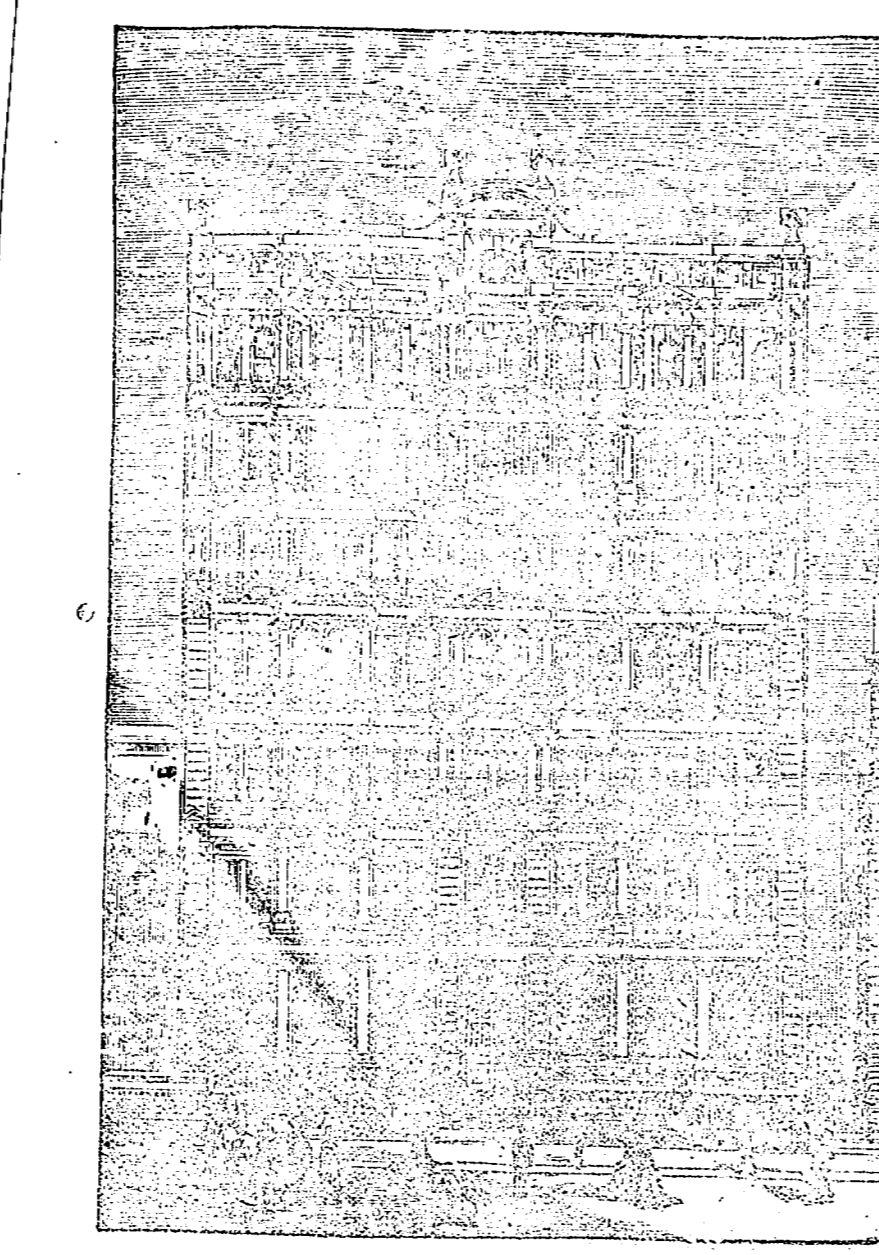

The hearing of the charge of public nuisance against Ah Shin, postponed from the 11th inst., was continued. The evidence of the informant's wife, which was not allowed to be taken on the first day, was given as under:— Ellen Ah Shin, sworn, deposed:— The wife of Ah Shin, who resides at the prisoner at my house in Street

On Wednesday, 25th March last, I went with my husband to the Chinese Camp, O.D. Lead. Stayed at Mrs. C. Williams' place. My husband went away, returning about six o'clock—ten times. Saw the prisoner at the camp that night between 9 and 10 o'clock. He said "Good evening", have you come I and he said "Yes", I said "Are you going to give me the things that belong to me?" and he said "Yes". We had some supper in Ah Sam's and prisoner, my husband and I went to Shier Gully to the hut I formerly occupied. It was my hut, and prisoner invited it. We went in, the prisoner opening the place with the key. I said "Are you going to give me the things?" He said "Yes, what is it you want?" I said "I want all that belongs to me". I pointed out three chairs, a sofa, table, camp oven, saucepan, kettle, teapot, some cups and saucers, and two knives and forks. These were my own property. I brought them in Beaufort. He put them out side and with his assistance we removed them to a shed. These receipts (produced) are for the things, excepting the tea and coffee. We went away after-wards, prisoner giving my husband a padlock to lock them up until he got a horse and dray next day to cart them away. He went home to the camp, and prisoner stayed at the house. Did not see prisoner at the camp the following morning. Heard him in the p.m. on the following Sunday, but did not see him. These articles were the same as he afterwards charged my husband with stealing.
