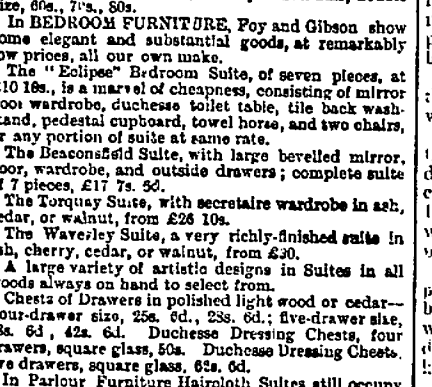

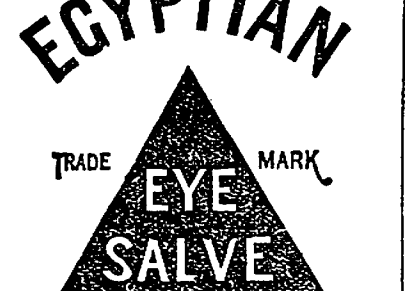

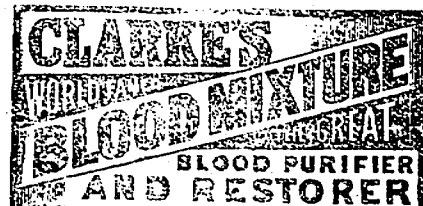

Mr Reginald Murray, the Government geologist, writes as follows on this subject:—

With respect to the expenditure from the prospecting vote in the way of grants in aid to companies, prospecting parties, &c., it cannot be said that the results have been in any way commensurate with the outlay. The total sum distributed in this way since 1886 has been (roughly) £260,000.

Some few new discoveries of gold (the workings of small extent have been made, and a few mining companies have been tied over a period of adversity into a condition of prosperity, but the amount returned to the Government (£3,367) speaks for itself as to the general success of the system, and justifies the assertion that the bulk of the money has been practically wasted.

It cannot even be claimed that any new fact or information of permanent value to the mining industry has resulted from the expenditure save in a few cases, such as that of the Grand Duke Company at Timor and some others. The money has been distributed and expended with little practical, and no scientific, result; in fact, had it never been voted it is probable that mining enterprises would have gone on just the same, or perhaps even better, without the enervating influence that the scramble for participation in the prospecting vote has undoubtedly exercised.

Mr J. Travis, the officer in charge of the Prospecting branch, deals with the matter in a similar strain.

Dr. Adam thought all would admit that the report was very gratifying. Had a trophy to be competed for Beaufort would undoubtedly have won it. The only match lost should have been the only one, the victory having been proved inferior teams; but when they met superior teams Beaufort had beaten them—for instance, Ararat at the winners of the last Spence trophy were beaten twice, which was a feather in Beaufort's cap. He was very sorry that Mr Spence had not continued his trophy, and that his (Dr. Adam's) small report was not considered high enough, but he could not see his way to go further. The eleven deserved every credit. After speaking in flattering terms of the trophy winners and others occupying prominent positions, Dr. Adam said he had not quite made up his mind as to what form his trophy should take, and perhaps the winner, Mr A. Tromp, would assist him with his advice.

Mr Sinclair, on behalf of the players, thanked Dr. Adam for his kind remarks. The deficit alluded to in the report was made up by 10s being subscribed amongst the members present.

A CHINESE BANQUET.

Mr George Kennan, who travelled through Siberia and China in 1887, has been lecturing on his adventures in the United States. He gives the following account of a Chinese dinner to which he had the honor to receive an invitation:—

The first course consisted of seaweed boiled. Then followed a course of shreds of cold meat in jelly; another of mushrooms; still another of salad onions; then thin slices of sausage apparently, followed by a dish composed of eggs. These were succeeded by crawfish tails, and the final course of cold dishes was evidently a long fringed salad. Between each course a servant filled small cups by each plate with hot rice brandy. The first of the hot courses served was meat dumplings, which Frost (my companion) believed to be dog, and objected to on that account. The rest of the dinner consisted of about a dozen courses, and was completed with nuts, sweetmeats, and champagne. Next day I was taken sick, and was very ill for three weeks, not entirely recovering for three months.

In anticipation of the proposed immediate imposition of a substantial stock tax by Victoria, a Queenslander writes as follows:—

There are now being done works erected or in course of erection at Burketown, Normantown, Torrens Creek, and Aligator Creek, which will have a united capacity of 9000 head a week, or 400,000 a year, sufficient to carry away all the northern cattle which have hitherto been the chief source of Victoria's supply. No cattle are now leaving the Gulf district, as all the owners here to sell locally, and practically there is no other source of supply, as New South Wales cannot provide for her own wants. From these facts it may be judged that the price of beef in Melbourne is very long, likely to reach a point at which a sharp outcry for the repeal of the tax will arise. This is very well as far as it goes, taking into account that it is purely a Queensland view of the question; but the Victorian producer need have little fear about his proving equal to the supply of Victoria, and the Victorian market is made up of the effect that farming settlement in Victoria would altogether abolish the industry of stock raising; but the fact that the former squatters runs in the northern districts, now that they are concentrated into a few large ones, is a good thing, and will produce a large surplus of 10,000,000 to 15,000,000 bushels of wheat annually, according to the season, but also in addition carry more stock than they did before. Previous to the Land Act of 1869 (the act under which settlement was so jealously promoted) the total area under cultivation in the colony was 1,000,000 acres, and the best of the best was 3,000,000 acres of to-day, while the 500,000 head of cattle of that time have increased to 1,000,000, and the sheep from 9,000,000 to 11,000,000. We annually

consume 200,000 head of cattle, and 2,000,000 sheep, which is not too large to be provided for by the colony, even from taking into account that the stock tax may be expected to largely stimulate the stock raising industry in conjunction with agricultural operations. The great success which Mr Dow's butter bonuses have had in conjunction with the dairying industry is a fact which has multiplied our supply of young stock, and it is a significant fact that we are at present sacrificing 1600 calves monthly under the stress of glutted markets. Under the protection of a substantial stock duty all these can be reared free from the cost of having them sent to a sudden flooding of our markets from the north, and at the rate the butter exportation is going on the 1000 calves a month may be expected very shortly to increase three or four-fold. With respect to the bearing of the stock tax question on the bearing of the meat to the consumer, it is a curious fact that the retail price of meat is just as high to-day when the producer is accepting ruinous prices for his stock, as it was some time ago when the large middlemen were paying 30s a cwt. for cattle and 15s a head for sheep. It is not true, then, that in the absence of a stock tax these gentlemen are the money makers at the expense of both the producer and the consumer.

In the extreme character of the situation with respect to rabbit invasion in the neighboring colony of New South Wales, Victoria cannot fail to find the matter of interest, especially at a time when the rabbits appear to be doing so well here from the fact that in two divisions of the adjoining colony alone an area of 5,000,000 acres (amounting to nearly the whole of the Victorian territory) is so badly overrun with this lamentable pest as to threaten absolute extinction of the settlers. It is estimated that in three years one pair of rabbits will produce 13,000,000, and the difficulty that faces every expedient for extermination consists in the extraordinary way the pests come in from other regions after a district has been cleared. The rapidity and extent of travel which rabbits possess is being taken into account in the notable features that has to be reckoned within any scheme for their extermination. In Victoria, with its limited territory and denser settlement as compared with New South Wales, the passing of the present act (whose fundamental principle is to keep his own area clear of the pest, with a corresponding obligation on the Crown with respect to its territory) was thought to have settled the vexed question, but it is by no means settled yet. The method adopted by the Government for getting rid of its responsibility is to let one party to the rabbit trade on liberal terms upon condition that the rabbit extermination clause is complied with. Where the hitch occurs, however, is the means adopted for having the compulsory clauses enforced, whether as regards tenants of Government lands or freeholders. The latter are blamed for being too lax, and in others for being arbitrary to the extent of making the act one of persecution. In any case it seems impossible to so administer the act as to bring about absolute extermination.

Theoretically it may be said that if every one destroys his rabbits, their prey will all be destroyed; but this unanimity in action so far has been found impracticable. The trouble is not to exterminate but to complain about being compelled to keep their own land clear; they do that willingly in their own interests; but the dishonest feature of the position is that after doing so their lands are invaded by the hordes which travel in from other parts of the colony, and to keep clear from the rabbits of others, and the only permanent solution of the problem seems to be wire netting fencing. In New South Wales, where every expedient, including scalp bonuses, has been resorted to, the conclusion has been reached that the only way of getting rid of the pest is by means of wire netting fencing. The number of implements in the market in every class connected with every operation of the farm, from the first turning of the soil through to the final sowing, is simply legion, and what the agriculturalist wishes very much to know is which is the best.
