Percentage due to the herdsmen, £8 8s on fees and £1 on sale of goats.—Received. The herdsmen (Mr. D. A comparative statement of the (net) revenue of Victoria for the year ended 31st March 1892, shows a decrease of £614,760 as against the last quarter being £1,668,887 17s 10d. Agricultural Statistics for year ended 31st March last:—Number of cultivated holdings, 35,945 (decrease 68); land under tillage, 2,637,676 acres (increase 34,807a.); oats, 190,157a. (decrease 30,801a.); malting barley, 34,406a. (decrease 57,942a.); very high price in the London market. He selected his stud sheep with exceeding care, and the Carnarvon sheep were known all the world over. For many years the deceased gentleman occupied the position of president of the Ballarat Agricultural Society, and only resigned the position on account of failing health. If anything pertaining to pastoral and agricultural pursuits he took a lively interest, and did his best to promote both. He had amassed more than a competency, and was always ready to lend a helping hand to his less fortunate fellow creatures. He was of an exceeding benevolent disposition, as the many charitable institutions, and other deserving organizations, found to their advantage. His cheques were given liberally and regularly. He was the very soul of honor, and his public and private acts would always bear the light of day. The funeral will take place on Saturday (to-day), leaving "Carnarvon House" for the Carnarvon Cemetery at 3 o'clock. Mr. Russell (says the "Argus") was the son of a farmer of Fifehire, Scotland, and was born on the 20th of June, 1822. He sailed from Gravesend in August, 1842, and arrived at Hobart in the same year in the ship Calcutta. Thence he came to Victoria in 1845, and entered into pastoral pursuits. Carnarvon station was purchased, and has ever since been his place of residence. Subsequently he bought Laing's Station, near Skipton. The deceased visited the old country in 1852, 1862, and 1867. He was by no means exclusively immersed in his own concerns, being ever ready to promote charitable movements and assist in the development of such industries as he felt an interest in. For many years he was a member of the Ripon Shire Council, and was appointed a J.P. as far back as 1863. Actuated by charitable feelings, he organized a widows and orphans' fund for the district in which he resided, and this example was followed by other districts in the colony. He was always ready to befriend his poorer neighbours. He was repeatedly elected president of the Ballarat Agricultural Society, and great services he rendered to agriculturists have often been publicly acknowledged. One practical way in which he assisted the industry was by competing at shows; and he won numerous prizes. He was among the first to suggest that the members of the Ripon Shire Council should be paid for their services, and he paid great attention to stock-breeding, and particularly to merinoes. It is stated that he was one of the first pastoral settlers to take up his abode in the colony. He also supported various kinds of sports, having been a member of and a prominent officer-bearer in the Ballarat Yacht Club, and other sporting associations there. With connection with his Parliamentary career, he was returned for the South-Western Province at the biennial election for the Legislative Council under the old system on the 4th of September, 1880, in place of Mr. John Cumming, who retired. His opponent was Mr. J. H. Connor, M.L.C. The result of that occasion was:—For Mr. Russell, 1,187; for Mr. Connor, 840; Mr. Russell was not a prominent member of the Chamber; at least he did not speak very often. During the session of 1880-1 he supported the Land Tax Amendment Bill of the Hon. the Attorney-General, and the division of the Parliament of Members Bill whereby the remuneration of members of the Assembly alone was legislated. In the debate on this question he said that he would, in his opinion, not be called upon to do so, but that the Assembly should be paid. That was a question to be left to the electors of the Lower House. On the Reform Bill he advocated a reduction of the franchise of the Upper House, and suggested that for freeholders the qualification should be £20 per annum, and for leaseholders either £30 or £40 per annum. He desired to see the number of voters increased to 100,000, and the number of members to 42. In the compromise which took place on this question he supported the action of the Council's representatives. On one occasion, when the Treasury Bonds Bill 1880 was before the Chamber, he expressed rather advanced views on the question of municipal government. He said that the necessity for such measures might be obviated if, for instance, the ratepayers' local bodies were discontinued, and he further believed that the councils should undertake the construction of all roads and bridges without appealing to the Government for assistance. The deceased gentleman leaves three sons, Messrs. James, George, and Philip Leslie, the latter being a youth. The two first-named are the owners of the station at Ewall Station, near Hay, Riverina, and Mr. George Russell has generally resided with his father of late years, and both are so well respected as they are well known in the Ballarat district.

PARLIAMENTARY.

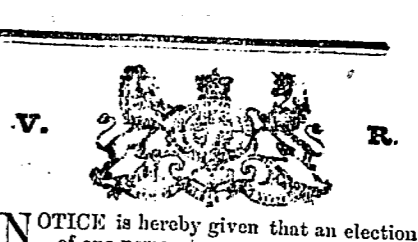
Sir Graham Berry's proposal for new duties greatly surprised members of the Assembly on Wednesday. He moved the House into Committee of the Whole, and when Mr. Gillies asked what he proposed to do, the reply was made that the intention would be divulged in Committee. The motion was carried, and then Sir Graham, referring to the recent heavy withdrawals from bond in anticipation of the increase of duties, said that it was absolutely necessary to protect the revenue. It would be plain to everyone, he said, that new taxation must be proposed in the Budget, and speculators should be prevented from repeating the advantage to follow the increases, which advantage should go to the Treasury. Consequently he proposed that the Commissioner of Customs should be authorized to protect the revenue in respect to the increase of duties as follows:—Import Duties.—Spices, from 12s to 15s per gallon; sparkling wine, from 8s to 12s per gallon; ale, beer, &c., in bottles, excepting lager beer, from 9d to 1s per gallon; tea, from 1d to 3d per lb. Excise Duties.—Spirits distilled in Victoria from malt, grain, grapes, or wine, from 8s to 10s per gallon, and from other articles, from 10s to 12s per gallon. The proposal to increase the duties could be discussed with an equanimity, according to a reasonable estimate, being in addition to the revenue to the amount of £200,000. This was based upon the calculation that there would not merely be a considerable diminution of imports, but also in the quantity of spirits consumed. When the Legislative Assembly resumed business yesterday afternoon (says Wednesday's "Argus") members could see nothing before them but a dull sitting, for until the Budget is unfolded there will be little to excite attention. Therefore they beguiled upwards of an hour by some amusement therefrom. No sooner had that work been disposed of, however, than Sir Graham Berry astonished the Chamber by proposing heavy increases of duty on spirits, wine, beer, and tea in order to check the withdrawals from bond, which had been after discussion he succeeded in having the necessary authority given to the Commissioner of Customs to protect the revenue. The next business was on the Registration of Firms Bill, which was read a second time, and passed through the remaining stages, and generally speaking the bill was cordially supported, because members favored the idea that the names of partners in each firm should be registered. But Mr. McFarlane, Mr. McLellan, Mr. Downes Carter, and others succeeded in having an amendment made which would render it unnecessary for the names of what are known as sleeping partners from being disclosed. Though at the outset there was promise of a dull sitting the proceedings in the Legislative Assembly on Wednesday night, proved to be very interesting. The change was as sudden as it was great. Ministers had been plodding through the monotonous routine necessary in connection with the introduction of a large number of bills when Mr. Wheeler attracted attention by asking the House to authorize the construction of a line of railway from Flemington-bridge to Pascoe-vales. Members could hardly believe that serious business was intended, but surely enough the Minister was serious. The reception given to the proposal was by no means favorable, and the debate being finished at half past 8 o'clock on the motion would very probably have been negatived. As it was, the Government whips thought it necessary to arrange for speakers lest a division might have been called for before half-past 8. They were by no means content that the Government could win. When private business was called on a discussion took place on a motion by Mr. Kirtan for a return relating to the retirement of serjeant-at-law, and when it ceased Mr. Richardson attempted to induce the House to prevent the Harbour Trust depositing silt in Port Phillip Bay. He did not succeed. The House adjourned at 11 o'clock.—"Argus."

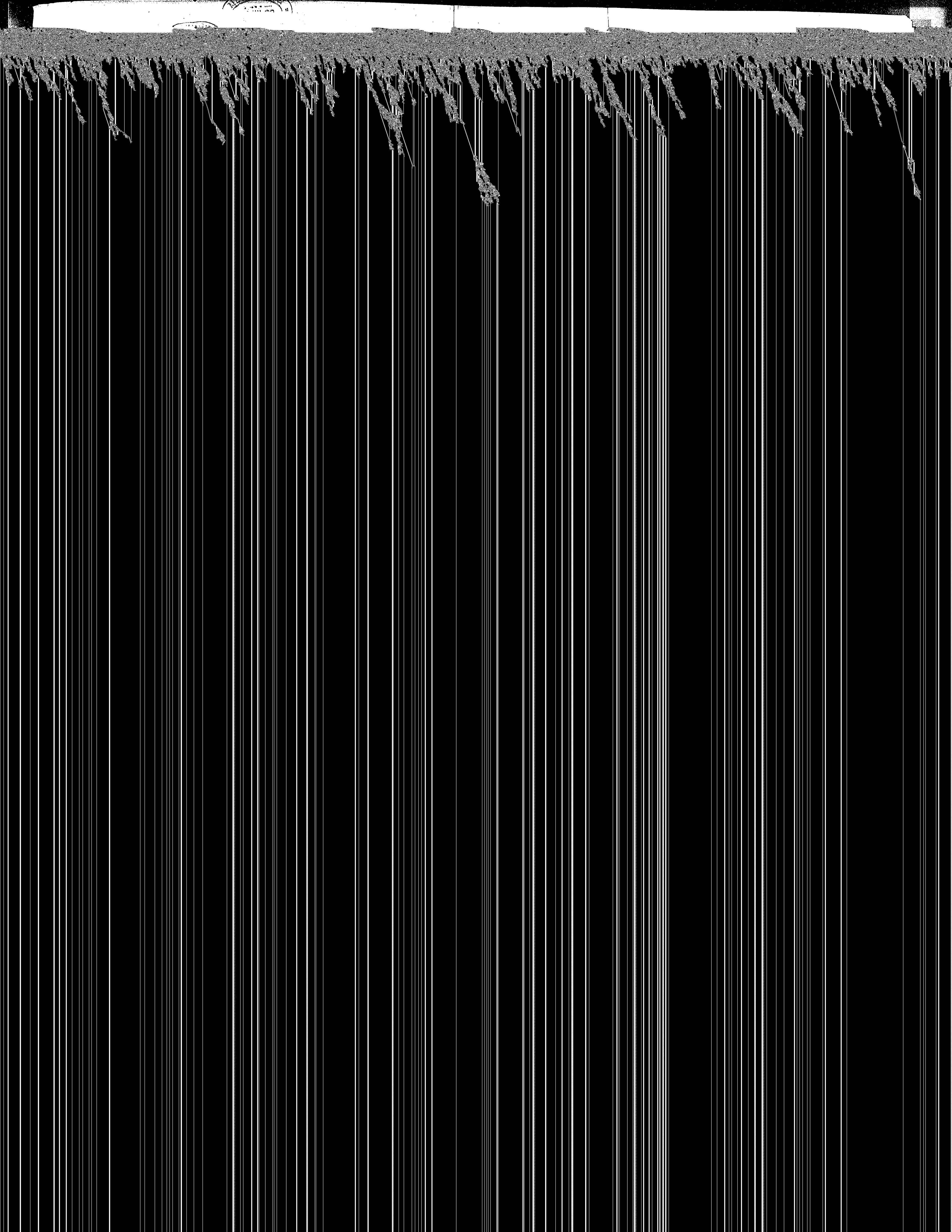
RIFLE SHOOTING.

The latest researches of the United States Department of Agriculture show (says the "English Mechanic") that the loose smut of oats and the striking smut of wheat may be prevented, and the country saved so enormous a sum as 162,000,000 dollars. Worth of oats alone, which were lost in America by these diseases, easily prevented if a simple process is adopted. This consists in treating the oats with a kettle of water at a temperature of 10 deg. Fahr. until all the grain is thoroughly wetted, and then plunging them in a second vessel, with the water heated to 132 deg. for fifteen minutes, allowing them to dry thoroughly, the corn is not to be sown immediately. For wheat the treatment is similar, but the water should be heated to a temperature of 143 deg., and the seed immersed only five minutes. Pessimus sulphide in the proportion of 1 lb to 23 gallons of water, in which the oats are soaked for seven hours, is also a good method. For wheat, a solution of 1 lb of copper sulphate to 24 gallons water, soaked twelve hours, and then for five to ten minutes in lime water, made by shaking 1 lb of lime in 1 gallon of water, is considered beneficial in preventing striking smut in wheat.

Three additional cases of small-pox have been discovered at Darlington, N.S.W. Three families, numbering 16, have been taken to the quarantine station. The steamer Catterthun, which arrived at Sydney on Saturday, from China, reports (says the "Argus") that while at Dille, the chief port of the island of Tonga, a story was current that the island of Sauguir had been destroyed by a volcanic eruption, and that the population, numbering 12,000 souls, had perished. After leaving this port the Catterthun passed through miles of drifting volcanic debris, which is supposed to have come from the scene of the catastrophe. There was a volcano called Mount Abu on the island, and in March, 1856, an eruption took place which destroyed the greater portion of the settlement and killed 2880 people. The island was under the control of the Portuguese Government, and was inhabited by a Malay people. Ball firing.—Recruits—150 yards, five rounds, kneeling; 150 yards, standing; 200 yards, kneeling; 200 yards, standing; targets, third class, six feet by four feet. 300 yards, five rounds, lying down; 300 yards, kneeling; 400 yards, lying down; 400 yards, kneeling; targets, second class, six feet by six feet. 500 yards, 10 rounds, lying down; targets, second class, six feet by six feet. Individual attack—500 to 200 yards, kneeling or standing, 10 rounds, targets, second class, six feet by six feet. Section volleys.—500 yards, five rounds, kneeling; 30 seconds single rank; 100 yards, kneeling, in 50 seconds; single rank. Note.—In individual attack targets same as for recruits. For section volleys, targets, head and shoulders 19" x 19", one pace apart, one for every two men, not less than four for the whole squad. Classification.—Recruits.—Those who make in the 60 rounds, 135 points shall be marksmen; 120 and less than 135 points shall be first-class shots; 85 and less than 120 shall be second-class shots; less than 85 points shall be indifferent shots. Trained soldiers.—Those who make in the 50 rounds 110 points shall be marksmen; 95 and less than 110 shall be first-class shots; 75 and less than 95 shall be second class shots; less than 75 shall be indifferent shots.

The relationship of Mr. M. Agnew General, to the Real Estate Bill formed the subject of a notice of the day in the Legislative Assembly yesterday (says Thursday's "Argus"). Mr. E. Murphy as follows:—The view of the recent investigation of the affairs of the Real Estate Bill, Victoria, together with a statement made therein by Jessie Woods, a member of the Hon. James Murray, General for Victoria, is in my opinion that the Government should consider the gravity of the charge and the amount of the sum charged may have the effect of the colony if not immediately relieved the Hon. J. Murray from his duties as a member of the Government to permit the opportunity to select the statement made in reference to the investigation and the charge contained in the statement.

The Solicitor-General made a statement in introducing the bill for acquisition of land for railway purposes in the Legislative Assembly yesterday (says Thursday's "Argus"). The measure was drawn more for the purpose of asserting a principle and showing that it ought to be employed rather than to do any particular line. An authority to a line Parliament could apply a principle or not as it chose. As the title indicates, it is a bill to enable to be obtained for railways without to the state, while, at the same time, owners who are compelled to part with land are to be compensated by localities to be served. To achieve this in regard to a particular line a measure would be formed having jurisdiction over such land, according to the certificate of the Board of Land and Water would be benefited, owners being in proportion to the advantage actually received. Each trust would be authorized to raise money by debenture to pay dispossessed owners. Provision is made for ascertaining whether a majority of the owners was in favor of the formation of a trust, and against the line proposed would not proceed with. A slightly different system will apply to urban lines. Instead of trusts being formed the municipal councils concerned will have to guarantee the state against loss for 20 years. One provision is devised to deal with the point raised in the case of "Harding's, The Board of Land and Water, and sets forth that enhanced value in value caused by the making of a railway shall be set off, not simply against damage by severance and otherwise, but also against the value of the land actually resumed for the purpose of railway. Another clause gives power to the Commissioners of Railways to charge special rates in the case of railways until they become remunerative. Members were unprepared to debate the bill that evening, and on motion of Mr. Webb it was adjourned until Tuesday.

A bill providing for amended legislation in relation to settlement in the miller country, has been drafted by Mr. Miller of Lands, and has received the sanction of his colleagues. It still proposes to allow a selector on a mallee farm to take up 480 acres as an agricultural allotment, whereas at present the area of selection is limited to 320 acres. The bill also raises the minimum rental from 10s to 12s, and also increased. The measure drafted by Crown lessees on the subject under conditions similar to those which existed before the practice was stopped by the recommendation of a select committee of the Assembly appointed a year ago to investigate the mallee question.
