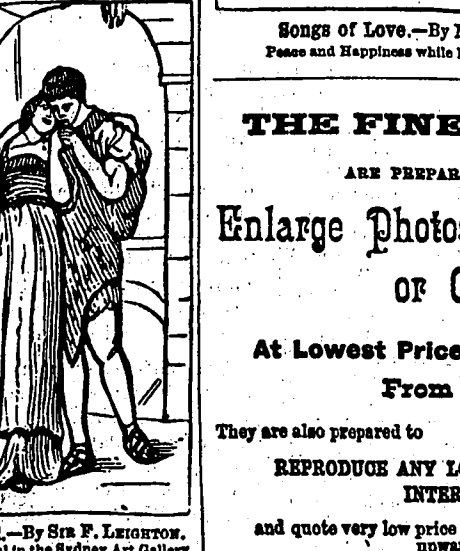

A mining electoral right to be issued at a nominal charge to each applicant, which should be of a permanent character, thus obviating the compiling of voting rolls, each voter to have exercised three months in the division where his vote is tendered. Change of residence to be endorsed on back of right on application to any electoral or mining registrar free of cost to holder."—Abridged from Ararat Advertiser.

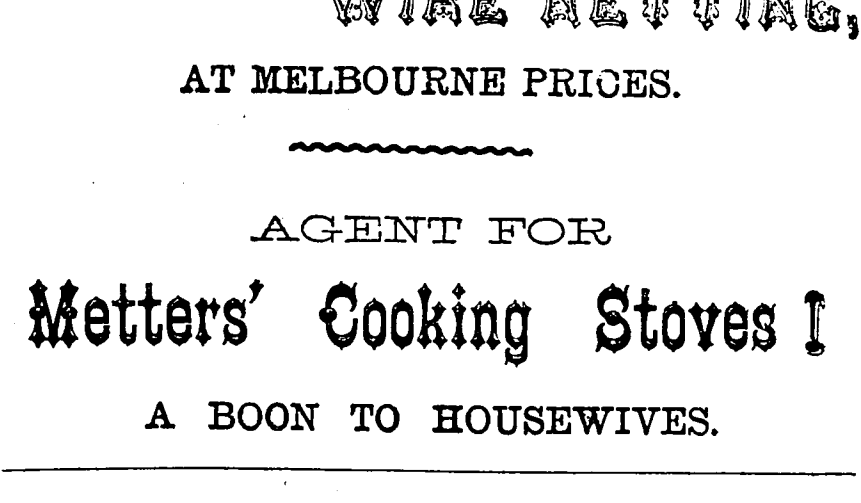

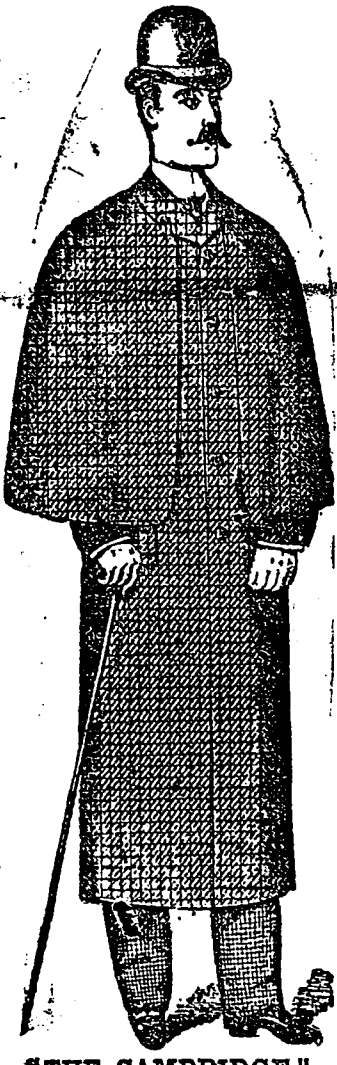

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to dry up might have been a very severe drought extending over several years, but it is strange that the natives made no mention of it. When some years after the rivers commenced to run, thousands in the country did not ascribe it to a general rainfall, but to the stock making the surface more solid, so that the water ran off instead of (as before) sinking into the ground. The termination of the journey is thus described:—"When we passed the salt lake the country began to improve. I thought we should never come to our station, the bullocks travel so slowly. At last Mr Thompson told me to look forward as far as I can see. We were at the end of a large plain or marsh. I looked, and saw our pretty little hut peeping through a cluster of trees. I cannot say how it was, but my heart beat with delight the first time I saw that place. I took it for a presentiment of good fortune, and Mary (the Shepherd's wife), who had now got over her fear of the natives, seemed to participate in my feelings, for she said, 'It's a bonny place, and my heart warms to it.'" The station taken up by those pioneer settlers was Trawalla, now a large freehold estate, the property of Captain Bridges, R.N.

The journey that occupied the pioneer 10 or 12 days of a wearisome march I lately did in a comfortable railway carriage in a little over four hours. At the wayside railway station I found a well-appointed buggy and pair of thoroughbred horses to take me to Trawalla-house. The four miles of perfect road were traversed in a very short time. The large new house lately built by Captain Bridges was in view for most of the way, but I did not see the old building, which was the first of the new. I saw the new and old well understood Scotch Mary's enthusiastic exclamation, "It's a bonny place." Though not of great height, the red gum trees along the course of the creek carry an ample foliage, and when the first hut was built the hill at the back was well wooded. On what was then a lone hillside one now sees a large well-arranged country house, with numerous and substantial built offices, surrounded by extensive flower gardens, lawns, and plantation of the finest European and Australian forest trees. But all is new, save the wide-spreading red gum trees in the little valley that were growing there centuries before the white man came to live on the hills.

The Trawalla "home station," to use an old bush phrase, is situated on the western bank of the Mount Ennu Creek, a stream that flows through some of the finest pastoral properties in Australia. Above Trawalla is Langi Kal, and below are Mount Ennu, Langi Will, Borriallan, Caranballan, Mount Elephant, Tereulun, and Worriwria. Many of these names are known far and wide as the home of some of the finest of our stud merino flocks. Trawalla is the native name of a waterhole in the creek at the station, in which there are several very large flat rocks of a light granite formation. A small part of the old hut is still standing, it having been built under the additions made by the successive owners of the property. The little house has a very decided "list," and, but for the surrounding buildings, would long since have fallen. Built over half a century ago, this remnant of the old pioneer life in the bush has a hoary antiquity in a new land like Victoria.

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Messrs Kirkland and Hamilton sold Trawalla to Mr Adolphus Goldsmith in 1841. What indeed that *haver* to settle in the Australian bush must have puzzled everyone who knew him. He was a good thing for the country; he brought to it the famous horse Comborough, by Tramp, who was a son of Whalbone. A better horse never looked through a bridle, and I never heard of one of his stock turning out badly. Mr Goldsmith kept both cattle and sheep on the run, and in 1853 he sold it to Mr John Simson, by whom the sheep were greatly improved. The horses on Trawalla were noted for their excellence for many a day after Mr Goldsmith had returned to Europe. Mr Simson held possession of Trawalla for nearly 20 years, and in that time the squating station was changed into a freehold. The late Mr John Wilson purchased the estate in 1872, and soon afterwards added to it an adjoining estate named Lillierie. On the death of Mr Wilson Trawalla became the property of his son-in-law, Captain Bridges.

Trawalla is probably the healthiest sheep pasture in Australia. From the time sheep were first grazed on this gently undulating country to the present day there has never been trouble with disease of any kind. Though not a very high-grassed land it is a fair pasture, and for wool-growing would scarcely be surpassed. A very large portion of the native timber has disappeared, and it needs a sound, robust sheep to withstand the cold blast that sweeps over this country in the winter. It is a little over "sheep-to-the-acre" country, and that is about the richest that experienced stockfarmers care for where merinos are bred. The natural water supply is excellent, the Mount Ennu Creek running through the property, while a branch through the Spring Creek winds through the eastern portion. In addition to these creeks there are numerous tanks, so that the eighty paddocks into which the estate is divided are well supplied with water. The sheep are well-bred, rams from some of the best flocks in Victoria having been used in the flock. Mr Goldsmith bought a lot of sheep from the Goulburn; but I do not know who bred them. He purchased rams from Messrs Riley and Baker, of the Wannon, whose sheep were from imported Saxons stock of the highest class. Mr John Simson bought rams from Mr J. L. Currie, of Larra, and the excellence of the stud sheep at Trawalla is mainly due to a very high-class ram from the Wannon flock. Captain Bridges has used rams from Ericidone and Carngahin, but his great success has been with a ram named Squatter, bred by Mr H. S. Smith, of Harland Rise, Tasmania. Squatter was by the famous Golden Sower, and he has proved the value of this famous strain by producing some very high-class rams from the Trawalla ewes.

(FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.)

As the report of the Locomotive Enquiry Board proves, the various "forecasts" given by certain of the metropolitan "daily" papers have been ludicrously incorrect. As already stated in your "Melbourne News," it was quite manifest to the unprejudiced observer, as well as to the railway expert, that the Board must condemn the management of the Locomotive Branch. Indeed, not one half of the scandalous extravagance, dangerous experiments and items of mis-management were brought forward by the Board.

Sir M. H. Davies has certainly not improved his case in the eyes of the public by his refusal to return from Adelaide to Melbourne when "pressed" to do so. It has, in fact, been broadly hinted—though probably without truth—that the Knight was not on board the Salier at all, and indeed, that he never went on the steamer at any time.

A statement has been made that the Railway Commissioners intend importing a mechanical engineer from America to take charge of the Newport Railway Workshops. If such is their intention they should hesitate before carrying it into execution.

Parliament will meet on the 27th inst., and the people's representatives will have an opportunity of criticising the doings of the Government during the recess. There is no doubt that the larger number of members will be present.

According to the New Zealand files to hand, the great and mighty press, although usually victorious in the long run, has some difficulties, not to say disastrous, passages in its history.

CALENDAR OF OPERATIONS FOR JUNE. In writing these monthly articles we are desirous both to assist those who have gardens and to state to those who have ground available but who grow neither vegetables nor fruit.

Almond.—Soft shell or Jonco. True—Where one tree only is to be planted, let it be the stone pippin, and for cooking, Keswick for soot and for eating, Emperor Alexander.

Cherries commence to be seen after being planted, and require to be removed when twelve or more years old. Early purple gage, Bedford's pippin, St. Michael, and navel are good sorts.

Peaches do not thrive in cold districts. Brig's red may be sown in a south aspect, and Royal George for the finest eating or cooking pear grown. Gansel's navel all to grow.

Onions.—Sow 2 inch deep, in rows 6 inch between the plants and 3 feet between the rows. 1 lb seed, 1 row, 12 feet, 12 rows, 120 plants.

Mustard.—Sow 2 inch deep, in rows 6 inch apart. For bulbing, thin out to 6 inches. For planting, 1 oz seed, 1 row, 12 feet, 12 rows, 120 plants.

The supplementary list for the Beaufort division of the electoral district of Ripon and Hampden are now open for inspection at the registrar's office, at the office of his deputy at Waterloo, and at every post Office within the division.

A draughts match has been arranged for Wednesday evening next at the Beaufort Mechanics' Institute between members of that and the Waterloo institution.

It is our painful duty this week to record the death of Miss Josephine Scharp, eldest daughter of Mrs Scharp of the Beaufort Hotel, which sad event happened on Wednesday evening.

Her illness started in a very simple manner, a lamp glass having broken in her hand about a month ago and blood poisoning setting in to the wounds thereby inflicted and extending throughout the system.

She also suffered for a time from erysipelas. Dr. Adam had been in constant attendance since the accident, and in addition the services of a trained nurse were procured from Ballarat, and despite all that medical skill and careful nursing could do, death resulted as stated. Deceased was 39 years of age, and was greatly respected by a wide circle of acquaintances, as evidenced by the large number of sympathising friends who followed her remains to the last resting-place in the Beaufort Cemetery yesterday, and the many beautiful wreaths of flowers which were laid on the coffin.

Farther Daley conducted the obsequies at the grave. Mr W. Baker, undertaker, carried out the mortuary arrangements.

Midnight, a pony numbered 12.3 hands high, amized the spectators at a hunt with the Melbourne bounds last week by going several miles over a number of barbed wire fences.

In the cricket match, Australians v the Players of England, the former won by six wickets. In their first innings the Players made 89; second innings, 76 for four wickets.

The Government has withdrawn the provisional warrant issued against Sir Matthew Davies in connection with the Mercantile Bank case in consequence of the assurance of the detectives that Mr Davies intends returning to the colony should the Grand Jury find a true bill against him.

A new regulation has been adopted by the P. and S. department in regard to the issue of duplicate postal notes. Hitherto any person who lost a postal note could obtain a duplicate on application to the department without any extra charge, but in future the department intends to deal with such clients on strictly commercial principles.

An extra charge of 6s for each note up to the value of 10s, and of 1s for each note up to the value of 5s will be made for the six months next to elapse from the month of issue of the original note before duplicates can be issued.

California, with its 254 days of sunshine in the year, is pre-eminently adapted for the culture of fruit—apricots, peaches, and plums producing 8s worth of fruit on each matured tree; and apples, cherries, figs, pears, and olives 20s.

On one estate of 3000 acres, having 2657 acres planted with fruit trees, the produce yielded a net profit of £42,488 in 1892, or £16 per acre, the planting having commenced fifteen years ago. The distance from market is 3000 miles, and the freight charge is £5 per ton of 2000 lb.

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PRESENTATION TO MR. R. PATTERSON.

The friends of Mr R. Patterson, eldest son of Mr J. Patterson, of Sillier's Gully, will doubtless be pleased to read the following concerning him, which we extract from the Warrigall Mirror of 6th inst.

Some interesting particulars as to the value of ensilage for dairying purposes were furnished by Mr R. Caldwell, M.L.A., at a recent meeting of the Woodstock branch of the Agricultural Bureau of South Australia. He stated that he had not been favorably impressed by reports of experiments conducted elsewhere, and that he started the inspection to be narrated with a prejudice against ensilage.
