THE DAIRY INDUSTRY IN VICTORIA.
ITS FUTURE PROSPECTS.
THE OLD STYLE AND THE NEW.
Mr David Wilson, the Government dairy expert, delivered a lecture at Geelong on Wednesday night on the "Dairy Industry." There was a large attendance, and Councillor H. T. Howard occupied the chair. In dealing with the subject, Mr Wilson said:—

An export which in three years or thereabouts expanded from 400 tons to 3,800, or from a value of £36,000 to £400,000, and an almost certain prospect of an export for this season of over 5,000 tons, valued at £500,000, speaks volumes for the system of manipulation and the prospects of the industry.

recommending a furrow be thrown up and the potato sets planted 4 inches below the bottom of the furrow, as the deep ground will be filled in. Crops will be obtained this way in drier weather which would not pay to lift with the ordinary cultivation. Try a few rows and prove it.
Buckley—Sow 4 inch deep, in rows 1 foot apart.
Tomato seed may still be planted, if of an inch deep, and transplanted. Better to get plants posted.
Turnip—Sow 4 of an inch deep, in rows 18 inch and plants 6 inch apart.
Gladiolus should be planted, these bulbs before all the flowers are open and placed in water the unopened flowers mature, keeping up a show for many days.
Raspberries are frequently die, showing a bluish film on the stems. Mr E. T. Peers, of Diamond Creek, has found this to be caused by a fungus, a variety of Curculio, which makes its way into the stem of the young wood on which it feeds. The fungus is caused by the grub which feeds on the surface. The grubs commence in September and October. By bending the cane it will show where the grub has weakened the wood. Split a few open to be satisfied the grub has done its work. No buds grow above where the grub is.

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BEAUFORT POLICE COURT.

MONDAY, 13TH NOVEMBER, 1893. (Before A. Andrews and C. J. Leadbeater, J.P.)

P. DeBaere v. Frolik, Lemshagen. Grand summons, L13 3s 8d. Defendant, sworn, stated he was a miller, working at Talbot, and his wife was living at Beaufort.

Complainant put in a letter from defendant's master stating he had had L12 10s per week, and that defendant had offered him 5s a week.

To the Bench—Had earned L20 since the order was made on 11th Sept, 1893, having lost about one week's time. Have three children. Pay 2s per week for the house, his wife and three children are living in. For the first three months had come home once a fortnight, when the mill was in full work.

Complainant said he had paid back debts off to the bakers and others. Gave it to his wife to pay. Thought the amount was about L5.

Mr. Leadbeater said the Bench were of opinion that defendant had not done what he could have had he tried, and that was to pay 10s per week. He would be very sorry to interfere with the liberty of anyone and take away his chance of earning a living, but at the same time he would never assist anyone to defraud his creditors.

Complainant said he would not take 10s per week now as it was refused before.

Mr. Andrews said the Bench were inclined to deal leniently with defendant, as it would do neither his wife and family nor Mr. DeBaere any good to send him to prison. He asked defendant what he would be able to pay.

Defendant said he could not see his way to pay more than 10s per week, and L1 that day.

The Bench made an order for L1 to be paid that day, and monthly instalments of L2, the first to be paid on 1st December, and afterwards on the 1st of every month until the sum of L13 3s 8d and 14s 6d costs are paid; in default two months' imprisonment.
