From D. E. Stodart, Moramangy Skipton, returning plan of proposed exchange of roads, and stating he understood the council were prepared to exchange the north road...

From Municipal Association of Victoria, intimating that the executive committee had urged the Amending Local Government Bill...

From J. J. Nicholson, Snake Valley, asking if the council had any objection to his planting 5 or 7 pines, and enclosing them with guards in front of his premises...

Cr. Lewis drew attention to Mr Daly having promised to repair the Skipton pound at his own expense. It was only fair to allow him a few pounds. He moved that Mr Daly be informed that the council will allow him a sum not exceeding £7 to do the work.

Cr. Beggs remarked that Mr Kelly had not made use of it.

Cr. Kelly said he had. Cr. Lewis moved that as the ratepayers objected to the sale of the reserve when recommending its sale, the Government be made acquainted therewith. Seconded by Cr. Cameron, and carried.

The council rose at a quarter to 1 o'clock, p.m., the business having been transacted in about an hour and three quarters.

It has transpired that at the official opening of the Tower-bridge on Saturday last an anarchist was arrested on the route taken by the Prince of Wales and the other members of the Royal Family. He had in his possession a dagger that had evidently been recently sharpened.

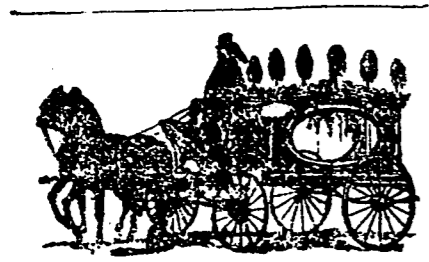

Many attempts, although not accurate, were fine samples of his powers as a kicker. I am glad that Beaufort can now see the advantage of playing to their place men. The manner in which they played over their opponents in the third quarter from man to man was a great witness and completely disorganized the Imperials. In the opening of the last quarter there was an anxious look on the countenance of the two generals. Ararat with two goals in the rear commencing with a determined attack. 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PROPOSED REDUCTION OF THE MUNICIPAL SUBSIDY.

A JOINT PROTEST FROM THE COUNCILS. A conference of delegates from municipal councils was held at the Town Hall on Wednesday for the purpose of protesting against the manner in which the municipal subsidy was distributed.

Mr. J. H. Gearing, chairman of the Municipal Endowment Conference, occupied the chair. Amongst those present were Messrs. Kirton, Keys, Vale, and Cameron. Mr. L.A. (The chairman explained the steps that had been taken to obtain a proper settlement of the matter. The Solicitor-General had been asked to give a legal opinion on the subject, but he had failed to do so. He had waited upon the Premier and Treasurer and other Ministers, but could get no satisfaction. The Treasurer said that he had taken money due to the rich municipalities and given it to the poorer ones, but an Act of Parliament fixed the distribution, and the Treasurer had no right to interfere with it. What they had now to decide was whether they should proceed and take action in the Supreme Court, or present a petition to Parliament. Mr. Williams, M.L.A., argued that an injustice had been done, and moved that Parliament be petitioned on the subject. Mr. Vale, M.L.A., seconded the motion, and Mr. Keys supported. Mr. Gearing (Fitzroy) said that the Premier had promised to see matters rectified, but there was apparently a stronger man in the Ministry than Sir James Patterson, namely, the Treasurer. (Laughter.) The motion was agreed to, and the conference ended.

THE FREE TRADE DEMOCRATIC ASSOCIATION. DRAFT PROGRAMME. The following are the proposals which the council of the Free Trade Democratic Association has decided to propose to meet in a convention on the 21st of August, for the purpose of determining the political programme of the free trade party.

TAXATION. We held protection to be an unjust and mischievous system, which has always proved injurious to the interests of the people, and destructive of their prosperity.

1. The abolition of the differential duties on spirits and sugar. 2. The abolition of duties falling on the material, machinery, tools, and requisites of any industry, especially those of the farming and mining industries.

3. The reduction or abolition of the most oppressive duties falling on finished articles. 4. The abolition of some of the duties on the raw materials of the manufacturing industries.

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LOCAL GOVERNMENT REFORM. The extension of local government, until it includes the whole of the colony, is the first and most important concern of the inhabitants of the colony.

GENERAL REFORMS. The abolition of the special privileges accorded to landlords in the recovery of rent due to them. Reform of the Insolvency law in the direction of better protection of the interests of small creditors, and the prevention of collusion between insolvent and creditors.

FEDERATION. We advocate the federation of the Australasian colonies on the basis of the absolute prohibition of inter-colonial duties, or other interferences with and hindrances of inter-colonial trade, leaving the question of a federal tariff to the Federal Parliament.

CALENDAR OF OPERATIONS FOR JULY.

The usual midwinter rains are soaking the ground, getting well down on the sub-soil and giving a welcome start to supply plant life with moisture in summer.

It is not always that a novelty of merit can be introduced in the way of vegetables and recommended in the market.

These tubers are called "Vegetable Whiteheads," owing to their delicate flavor, and are the finest tubers that they will be used for in feeding the "Gentlemen who pay the rent."

Plant the tubers about 2 inches deep in rows, leaving 12 inches between the sets and 2 feet between the rows.

Artichokes, Jerusalem-Tubers may be cut and planted in rows 2 inches deep, allowing 3 feet between the rows and sets.

Beans, Broad.—Sow 2 inches deep allowing 8 feet between the rows and 6 inches between the plants.

Carrots.—Sow 1/2 of an inch deep 1 foot between rows and 4 inches between the plants.

Cress.—Sow 1/2 of an inch deep in warm corner of the garden. 1 oz sows bed 4 feet square.

Onions.—Sow 1/2 of an inch deep in rows 1 foot apart, leaving 12 inches between the rows.

Spinage.—Sow 1/2 of an inch deep in rows 1 foot apart, leaving 12 inches between the rows.

Apply the kerosene emulsion with a hard brush to the Aphid langera or white woolly blight.

Where fine blooms are wanted on roses cut back to about 6 inches of the head.
