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

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



CALENDAR OF OPERATIONS FOR OCTOBER In October, there are most seeds sown than in any other month of the year. Root crops should be put in largely, the advantage of such as carrots and parsnips being that when matured they can be stored in dry sand and supply vegetables when other varieties are scarce. Mangolds should be largely planted, both for winter feed, where their use is appreciated, and for supplying a nutrititive, juicy, and palatable food, in the hot. dry months of the autumn, when the grass is scorched and dried up. Other feeds for cows that should be put in are maize, and the ordinary Sorgham, or the larger growing variety, the amber cane.

Asparagus seed—Sow 4 inch deep, in rows 18 nches apart. Let the ground be well-matured. An ounce should sow 80 feet. Beans, French—Sow "Canadian Wonder" 2 inches deep, in rows 2 feet 6 inches, and seeds 3 inches apart. Thin plants to 6 inches, apart. Where ground is inclined to cake hard cover with one inch of soil and one inch of the round droppings of a horse; this allows the young

plant to free itself from the soil and not get broken off at the neck. 1 lb sows row 160 feet. Matures in 4 months.

Beet, silver—Sow 1 inch deep in rows 2 feet 6 inches and plants 6 inches spart. 1 oz. sows Allow plants to grow and keep breaking off the larger leaves. The mid rib is separated from the leaf, and under the name of chard, is boiled and served with white sauce. Borecole or kale, brocoli, brussels spouts, cabbage, cauliflower, and savoy, should all be sown g of an inch deep broadcast and trans-planted when 4 to 6 inches high to well manured

CALENDAR OF OPERATIONS FOR OCTOBER. In October, there are most seeds sown than in any other month of the year. Root crops should be put in largely, the advantage of such as carrots and parsnips being that when matured they can be stored in dry sand and supply vegetables when other varieties are scarce. Mangolds should be largely planted, both for winter feed, where their use is appreciated, and for supplying a nutrititive, juicy, and palatable food, in the hot, dry months of the autumn, when the grass is scorched and dried up. Other feeds for cows that should be put in are maize, and the ordinary Sorgham, or the larger growing variety, the amber cane.

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

CALENDAR OF OPERATIONS FOR OCTOBER. In October, there are most seeds sown than in any other month of the year. Root crops should be put inlargely, the advantage of such as carrots and parsnips being that when matured they can be stored in dry sand and supply vegetables when other varieties are scarce. Manyolds should be largely planted, ordinary Sorgham, or the larger growing variety, the amber cane. Asparagus seed—Sow 4 inch deep, in rows 18 inches apart. Let the ground be well-matured.

An ounce should sow 80 feet. Beans, French-Sow "Canadian Wonder" 2 inches deep, in rows 2 feet 6 inches, and seeds 3 in hes apart. Thin plants to 6 inches apart.
