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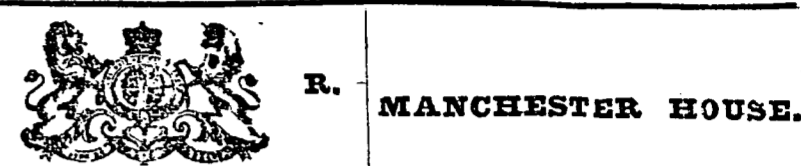

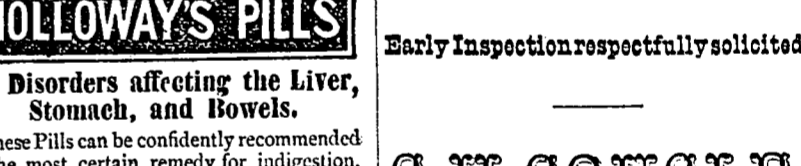

Farmers supplying milk to butter factories (as a rule, the privilege of taking home the separated milk free of charge. At some factories a charge of a farthing per gallon is made, but this is not universal. The separated milk, when taken home from the factory, is used to feed pigs and calves, but it is not generally known that, mixed with a little bran, it forms a splendid ration for milking cows.

Mr J. McFarlane, of Lyndhurst, Victoria, has made it a practice to feed separated milk to his cows, and he finds that it gives very satisfactory results. During the winter months, when the cows are kept in the shed all night, their night and morning rations consist of about a bucketful of bran that has been mixed with separated milk, so as to make a mash, and a sheaf of hay.
