From Secretary for Mines, acknowledging receipt of the board's resolution re having State forests, ariferous Crown lands, and goldfields and united commons placed under the control of the Minister of Mines.

KITCHEN GARDEN.

CHURCH OF ENGLAND TEA MEETING AND CONCERT AT MIDDLE CREEK.

The annual tea meeting and concert in connection with St. George's Church of England, Middle Creek, took place in the Public Hall on Wednesday evening, and proved a very enjoyable and successful gathering.

The Rev. R. Hosken presided over the concert, the hall being filled to overflowing. Notwithstanding the difficulty of singing to the accompaniment of a high-toned organ, the music was of a creditable order, and the audience were not slow in showing their appreciation.

The Chairman expressed his pleasure at seeing so large a gathering. He refrained from trespassing upon their time, as there was a lengthy programme, including two addresses.

The Rev. Mr. Adam would have been pleased to be here, had not sickness prevented it. Mr. Eastwood gave a good rendering of "The powder monkey," and was cordially received.

"The cows are in the clover," a song by Miss Lotellier, was also well received. Master J. McDonald gave songs in fine style "Sweet Marie" and "Clara Nolan's ball."

The Rev. H. Brice Barber, who had left the P.M. "Beehive" to attend and had promised to be back at 9.30, gave an interesting address and then returned to Beaufort.

After indulging in a few pleasant remarks upon "Doing good," Mr. Barber showed that it was their duty to do good; by good-doing they attained the highest character; and by doing good they also enjoyed the greatest happiness.

Many who professed to be Christians thought they fulfilled the whole round of christian duty by simply abstaining from doing wrong, but that was the negative side of the Christian duty, for Jesus Christ, by His life and teaching, insists upon an active service in doing good to others, and upon a general philanthropy, by feeding the hungry, helping the helpless, and lifting the fallen.

The parable of the Good Samaritan illustrated that good-doing was not to be confined to the family circle, or co-religionists, or nationality, but that they must do good to all.

The parable of the rich man and Lazarus was depicted as showing how forcibly and impressively Christ impresses upon them the duty of good-doing. Mr. Barber also showed how character was built up by their own acts, and the difference between those who appropriated all the activities of life to themselves and those who gave their time and strength to others.

Referring to the Belgian priest, who sacrificed his life and comfort and led by Christ over 2000 lepers, he said that no one could read of that without feeling in their inmost hearts the greatest admiration. To men of that order, spirit and philanthropy belonged the highest character and earth's aristocracy.

Men belonged to one common brotherhood, God being the father of all, and all men brothers. He urged them to do all the good they could by word and deed and thus attain the highest character, and earn the "Well done, good and faithful servant; enter thou into the joy of thy Lord." Mr. J. A. Jackson was heard to advantage in the song, "Shipwrecked."

Mrs. Foster sang a touching song, "I have no mother now." Mr. Campbell, of Arrat, fairly "brought down the house" with "That's English, quite English, you know," the Scotch and Irish pronunciation being really good. In response to a vociferous encore, Mr. Campbell gave two additional verses, characteristic of France and Australia.

Later in the evening, Mr. Campbell again met with an enthusiastic reception, the song, "Little Annie Rooney," also characteristic of nationality, pleasing immensely. As an encore he gave a Dutch verse, Mr. Hobbs sang "Out on the deep," and was very well received. Dr. Adam expressed the pleasure it gave him to come out and see old friends, and to assist his friend, Mr. Hosken, in carrying out the entertainment. They were all great federalists now. He thought there should be federation politically, and if it were good in this respect, so should it be socially, and amongst religious bodies they should show sympathy towards one another. He did not say that the colonies should exist in the closest of bonds—Victoria would still exist as Victoria and New South Wales as New South Wales—but at the same time they should exist in a loose bond of fellowship and so present a united front to the world. He thought it feasible for the churches to exist in the same way and suit all branches, by joining together and presenting a united front to the world in general. He was very glad to see the various churches here on terms of good fellowship, and he hoped they would remain so, and that they would always be ready to assist each other. He felt like a federalist, having already assisted that afternoon in opening a "Beehive" for the Primitive Methodist Church. He was an Australian—a Scotch, "ye ken"—yes, having good Scotch blood in his veins; and above all a Presbyterian. But he did not stand on that, but as a good churchman, no matter whether it was an Episcopalian, Methodist, or Presbyterian gathering, that was the proper feeling to cultivate; that there was to be less dissension. A TRIP TO TRAWALLA. (By a Visitor.)

With a few friends I had the pleasure some few days since of receiving an invitation to run out and see the workings of the Woadley sheep-shearing machine at the above station. We made an early start, as it is a drive of some 24 miles from Beaufort to Trawalla.

Once the great thoroughfare to the Wimmera country; but now (being superseded by the iron horse) the once busy road is all but deserted. It is a pleasant drive through a good country, and everything is at its very best at this season of the year. The crops and pastures, despite the long drought, were dotted with living green, and a country quiet everywhere.

We were met at the station by the Weatherboard near to our right, then the Lady's Mount, backed by the long range of the Mount Misery ranges. At the rear of the Eridonnie Estate, with its slopes and gullies running down to the banks of the lake, we found as we drove along but little change in the old homesteads. They all had a look of comfort, and the crops, though short, looked well, and with some promise of a good yield if only rain would come. We found at the Pico-hotel, Lake Burrumbidgee, old Mr. Hobbs, still hale and hearty with all his 80 years, very regretful that he could not be of our party. The will was still good. In some 40 minutes' drive from the lake we struck the boundary of the station. The change of country was at once apparent. We had been travelling for some miles through a good arable country, but the land we were now passing over was of a much poorer quality. It appeared to be a good sound pastoral land, equal to about a sheep to the acre, pleasantly undulating, with beautiful grassy slopes and breaks of shelter trees, stretching for miles across an open and verdant country.

On arriving at the woolshed we found Mr. Turner, the manager for Captain Bridges, busy with his shears, a fine active body of young man. Mr. Turner very patiently and attentively explained the whole detail of the working of the shed. The number of cutters fitted up was 24, and the whole was driven by a powerful engine under the charge of an expert machinist who kept everything appertaining to the machinery in order. All the shears appeared to be adepts at the work, and we timed several of them to their quickness; we found from 4 to 5 minutes as an average. They would shear a sheep as though he had been shaved. The cutters take everything off clean, leaving the old shears; the man averaged from 80 to 90 a day, according to the class of sheep shorn. About 46,000 sheep are carried on this station, all merinos, and the wool last year fetched the top price in the London market. The manager informed us that about 50 shearers and extra hands were employed during the shearing, in addition to the regular hands (about 40 men), who are employed at various works on the station all the year round. After a thorough inspection of everything at the wool sheds, we drove across the run to the homestead and noticed on our way that an immense amount of work had been done in planting, making dams for conserving water, &c. Captain Bridges, the owner, of Trawalla, is a resident proprietor, and a good type of an English gentleman living at home on his estate, and assisting in discharging the duties which the district requires from one of its leading men and wealthiest residents. The homestead is a good plain substantial house, but built for comfort and not for show. The situation is excellent, and the views of the scenery for miles round are charming. This is greatly enhanced by an artificial lake, which sparkles in the sunshine in one of the enclosures. There is a good fruit and kitchen garden, and sufficient flowers and lawns to make the surroundings homelike. The whole of the grounds, as with the station, are kept in good order, there being several men kept about the gardens, and we noticed with much pleasure in the manager's home, the old homestead, and the servants' quarters, were commodious and exceedingly comfortable. We received much kind hospitality from Captain and Mrs. Bridges, and had a most pleasant day's outing and an enjoyable drive home.—"Star."

Mr. Barber afterwards alluded to the display as surprising, seeing that the ladies had only been at work on the articles for about six weeks, and complimented them upon the amicable, successful and industrious manner in which they had worked. The object was to turn the work into cash, and nothing short of that would satisfy any of them. In asking Dr. Adam to kindly declare the "Beehive" open, Mr. Barber alluded to the high esteem in which Dr. Adam was held in Beaufort, and particularly by the Methodist denomination.

Dr. Adam remarked that he could not add the usual formula on this occasion, only three gentlemen being present, and feeling, no doubt, somewhat isolated and forlorn amongst such beautiful things and ladies. Having specified the friendliness these three felt towards the ladies, the doctor said that it gave him great pleasure to be present and assist in any way in a good cause. When Mr. Barber requested him to open the "Beehive" he suggested that the compliment be paid to some of their own leading lights; but he was assured that had been thought of, and Mr. W. C. Thomas asked, but as he was not able to come, he (Dr. Adam) was very pleased to take his place. He was really surprised and gratified to see such a good show of things got together in so short a space of time, as pointed out by Mr. Barber. On looking round he saw that the articles were useful. The great complaint in these affairs was that the unwary were inveigled into spending money in trifles in which there was not the money's worth, or, in other words, defrauded; but that complaint would not hold good here. Raffleing was not so common as of old—he did not know their intentions in this respect,—but as an element of sport and fun a little of it did no harm, although it was felt that harm was done by churches encouraging gambling in any shape or form, and that raffleing tends to that falling in some, although it may not in others. The Presbyterian General Assembly had reiterated a resolution that all raffleing should be done away with in church bazaars, as it was felt that the gambling mania had taken hold of the community to too great an extent. While there was a good deal of fun in raffleing, they had to recognise the harm it did to others, and not to themselves, and therefore it was better to do away with it. He need not say much more. The creek is far lower than it was at any time last year, and almost every inhabitant is now carting water, as most of the tanks are nearly empty.

My companion looked at the dog with envious admiration. "My humble friend," he said, "I'll give you £5,000 if you will eat that piece of meat, and I'll be afraid to eat it." But the dog who that happiness is made of. He declined the offer and trotted away.

It is astonishing how many different people use this expression, "I'm afraid to eat." As the writer says in his letters to the table before him, every one of them containing it. Yet the persons who wrote these letters do not know what it means. There was, therefore, no agreement among them. Why should there be, if they were acquainted?

No, there is nothing in it to wonder at. They were all afraid of the same thing, and express it in the most natural way, that's all. But what does it mean? Are people suspicious of poisoned food? During the past year American imports of raw wool, especially of Australian, have been very large.
