The Minister of Mines has circulated his bill to subsidise and enable mining companies to further develop gold mining, and for other purposes. The bill provides for the issue of Treasury bonds for £140,000, of which £75,000 may be advanced to companies for developing properties.

THE MINING ENCOURAGEMENT BILL.

The bill, if it is passed by Parliament, will come into operation on 1st January next, so as to enable women to take out rights prior to May, 1897, for which they will have to pay 6d.
