Number of Tiles to the Acre—How to Lay

Of frequent occurrence are the queries: What is the cost of tile drainage and necessary frequency of tiles to secure

perfect drainage? What depth? Professor T. P. Roberts answered these questions not long ago in a letter to Rural New Yorker as follows:

In heavy clay land tile drains should be laid three feet deep and 40 feet apart. One thousand tiles will suffice for an acre. Two inch tiles will carry the wa-





FIG. 1-MAP OF DRAINED FIELD.

ter of 3,000 or 5,000 linear feet of drafn. When 5,000 feet are reached, a 3 inch tile should be used and will carry water up to 15,000 feet. Pipe tiles and no other should be used. At the New York station at Geneva last year they cost per 1,000 as follows: Two inch, \$10; 21% inch, \$15; 3 inch, \$20; 4 inch \$35; 6 inch, \$60. The cost of draining and filling the ditches varies from 30 to 60 cents per rod.

A few rules should be carefully observed in underdraining land. The work should be well done. Tarred building paper in strips 2 inches wide should encircle the joints for three-fourths of their upper circumferences. Avoid by every device, mains and submains-that is, do not join the drains, but make each one run parallel, or nearly so, to the others, even if the drains have to make wide circles or deep digging has to be resorted to in order to get through high knolls.

Fig. I shows the parallel system, while Fig. 2 shows a main drain, which in no sense is a drain, but a conduit for carrying off water. It will be seen that

EXCESS OF WOMEN.

They Outnumber Men In the New England States and In New York State:

The universal law governing such matters makes the female population of a long settled country or district higher than that of one newly settled or partly developed, and so in the New England states the number of women is in excess of the number of men, while in the western and Pacific states this is reversed. There are 50. 000 more women than men in the state of New York. There are 60 counties in the state of New York, and in only 26 of these do the male inhabitants outnumber the female. Oddly enough, and for no reason that is known, the excess of men is greatest in those counties which are nearest New York and Brooklyn, though in New York and Brooklyn the women outnumber the men.

The migratory disposition of men is much more pronounced than that of women, and to this peculiarity, in part, the New York Sun, authority for the feregoing statistics, traces the inequalities noticed. Attention is called to the fact that there is a higher male than female birth rate, and if other causes did not operate to reduce the disparity there would be in every community more men than women. The reason that this is not the case is that the ratio of deaths due to accidents and viclence is much higher among men than among women. The casualties of warfare fall almost exclusively on men. The victims of murders, shipwrecks and accidents are men chiefly. The majority of suicides are men. In this way the higher birth rate is offset by the higher death rate. It may be said in a general way, too, that the ordinary laws of health are more generally observed by women than by men.

Brief History of Canopied Beds. Beds of the middle ages were provided with hangings for the purpose of rendering life endurable. The apartments for sleeping in these primitive times were great high studded places, in which the wind had full play, finding a vent in the great open fireplace, which drew it from all quarters. What was originally a matter of necessity became later one of choice or a medium of artistic expression.

The germ of the idea became in the time of Queen Bess the great four poster, as big as an ordinary room and about as heavy as a house. A notable example of this sort is the great "Bed of Ware," which possesses historical interest from the mention of it in "Twelfth Night" when Sir Tohy

Belch says to Sir Andrew Aguecheek 'And as many lies as will lie in the sheet of paper, although the sheet were big enough for the bed of Ware in England, set 'em down." The dimensions of this bed are: Height, 7 feet 9 inches; length, 10 feet 9 inches. Another bed, that of Henry VIII at Windsor castle, was 11 feet square.

On the continent of Europe also this fashion obtained and developed into those luxuriant curtained affairs common in the latter part of the eighteenth century. Luxury could go no further, and while draped beds continued in favor in England and America for many years reasons of a sanitary nature decreed their retirement. But, like so many other radical reforms, this one lacked permanency, for Decorator and Furnisher assures us that the pendulum is swinging back again and canopied beds.

Mardi Gras.

The Mardi Gras is the festival preceding the first day of Lent, or Ash Wednesday. Most of the distinctive ceremonies now annually performed in New Orleans were originally introduced by the French popuestensibly placed under the control of a king of the carnival, the great Rex.

There are two principal pageants. The first, in the daytime, is the escort of the 'beloved Rex' through his favorite city. The other, or night pageant, is known as the "Mystick Krewe of Comus." This has a character altogether unique. The first display was in 1857. On Twelfth night (Jan. 6) the "Knights of Momus" have a more exclusively burlesque, and in which they satirize the follies of the age. The arrangements for these celebrations come within the control of quite an elaborate organization. The Mardi Gras is held on Shrove Tuesday, a day of pleasure in most the French and the Pancake Tuesday of former times in England.

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

Made Profitable. It is very desirable to have hens lay well in cold weather, when eggs bring a good price. To succeed in this is within the reach of all who keep fowls. It cannot be accomplished without effort, however, which must be kept up as long as stormy or cold weather contin-

I am inclined to think that a flock of mixed hens will produce more eggs than any one kind Not only does my own experience teach this, but observa tion among other poultry keepers as well. While some breeds may well be called general purpose fowls, the Leghorns are probably unexcelled for eggs. It is useless to look for large quantities of eggs from the heavier breeds. Where one wants both eggs and market fowls it is well to keep more than one breed. An entire fleek of uniform color is more pleasing to the eye, but a mixture is more satisfactory as an all around flock.

Last winter I had a flock of 35 hens, ranging from pullets to hens 4 years old. They were a mixed lot. Some Plymouth Rocks, some grade Langshans, a few Light Brahmas and a goodly proportion of Brown Leghorns and their grades. They had been laying well all summer, with scarcely any decrease in eggs production at molting time, as the pullets were then beginning to lay. At the beginning of cold weather their house was lined with building paper and six or eight inches of sand thrown on the earth floor. As long as the ground was bare they were allowed the run of the yard, but were kept shut in on cold and stormy days. The feed was a warm mash in the morning, with a teaspoonful of cayenne popper in it. This mash is very easily made.

At breakfast tine every morning the teakettle was filled with water and put over to heat. By the time breakfast was over the water was hot. It was put into a large pail and stirred with a mixture of Iran and middlings as thick as it could be. is very dry. Husking Corn by Machinery. There are corn huskers and fodder cutters with a capacity of 200 to 800 bushels of corn per day and requiring six to eight men to manage the same. An Indiana correspondent of The National Stockman who has had his shock corn handled by one of these machines capacity of from 200 to 800 bushels per day, owing to corn and time of year. With low whoeled trucks, two or three hands and teams will deliver the fodder to the machine, one man and team with two wagons will care for the husked corn, and one man with the aid of the 16 foot elevator will care for the chaffed

The machine has two snapping rollers that mash the stalk, and the four knives. tear it in pieces, so that there are no whole sections to hurt the months of stock. The hasks that are taken off by the husking rollers are not cut, but are elevated with the fodder, and the corn is elevated into the wagon without any hand work. GARDENING FOR THE MONTH OF JULY.

____0___

FRUIT GARDEN. Finish pruning as early as possible in the month, or before the sap begins to rise. Grafting may be commenced by the Thad a tought time, and for two or three weeks my life was despaired of. But youth and good was despaired of. Dress apple trees infested by the cotton blight with the kerosene solution. Fork over the ground occupied by strawberries and cover it with littery manure. KITCHEN GARDEN.

Sow crops of turnips, carrots and other roote, onions, leeks, spinach and salad plants; though, should the weather be so fine as to induce rapid growth, some of these might run to seed and require to be re-sown. Cucumbers may be planted on a hotbed, and tomatoes, egg-plants, capsicums and any others that are rather tender may be sown on it; also cucumbers, melons and other tender subjects. Another lot of early potatoes may be planted by the end of the month. Cabbage, cauliflower and lettuce may be transplanted. Spinach

and similar crops must be thinned in due The following seeds may be sown in Tuly :- Asparagus, broad beans, broccoli, cabbage, cress, carrots, leek, lettuce, mustard, onion, parsnip, peas, potatoes, radish, rhubarb.

FLOWER: GARDEN. Seeds of petunias, verbenas and others imilar in nature may be sown in heat, likewise the more tender annuals. The hardier annuals may be sown out-of-doors towards the end of the month. The prunning of trees and shrubs, the planting of hardy perennials, roses and other shrubs should be finished by the end of the month, pagated by means of either cuttings or in warm water until they burst, then placed in pots Tree dailias should be brought forward in heat. Buffalo grass may be planted. Old lawns may be replenished with old manure, bone dust, or superphosphates. Mixed grass seeds may be sown on spots that have become bare. Gladioli and autumn-flowering bulbs should be planted. Lapagerias may be propagated by layering.

PLANT HOUSES. Start plants of cucharis; achimenes, gloxinia, and others similar in character, in heat. Shift young and also older plants of all kinds as soon as they are in growth and their roots have penetrated the soil of their pots, including stove ferns and orchids. Cut down winter-flowering plants that are past their best. Seeds of begonia, gloxinia and other stove plants should be sown early in the month. Fumigate plant houses regularly, especially frames in which are such as cinerarias. Calceolarias should now be in their blooming pots. Tree carnations that have been in a warm place may now be propagated by means of slips.

A Celebrated English Authority's Opinion Upon Several Fertilizer Questions. Rural New Yorker asked the following questions of Sir J. R Lawes of Rothomsted, England: Some fertilizer firms hold that their goods are superior to other goods because they use nitrogen and phosphoric acid in varied forms,

thus giving to plants the foods they need as needed. For instance, phosphoric acid is given in bone flour, in bone superphosphate and guano-no rock. Nitrogen is given in nitrate of soda, sulphate of ammonia, tankage, etc. Do you think there is any decided advantage in this? Would it not be as well to use fine bone, sulphate of potash or unleached ashes or muriate of potash for most crops and enough nitrate of soda to give more nitrogen than the bone furnishes? The question is, Would not farmers do better to buy bone flour, nitrate of sods, etc., separately and spread them:

Dr. Lawes' reply was as follows: "I can quite understand a manure maker preferring to sell a compound manure, and he is able to make a large profit. The prices of nitrate of soda, bone flour and rock superphosphate are well known, and a farmer can mix them in the proportion he requires with much less cost than he can purchase the mixture. The same holds good in food. We have any amount of cattle cakes in the market. A man goes into the market, purchases various grains, eta, grinds them, calls the substance a cake and charges about £3 or £3 per ton above the cost of the raw substance. To call a thing a cake does not increase its feeding properties.

'I once wrote a paper on the subject, pointing out that cotton cake and linseed cake were the refuse of the production of oil, and that they would still be made even if farmers did not purchase them. So they sell exactly for the price that farmers think it worth while to pay for them and no more. I have known linseed cake to sell at £14 per ton, while cotton cake would only make £5, and now one sells for £7 and the other not much less.

"With reference to farmers purchasing their own manure, it may be said generally that for grain crops bone is hardly used at all; for wheat, if autumn sown, only nitrate of soda is used; for spring sown grain crops, mineral superphosphate and nitrate of soda. Fine ground bone is used upon some kinds of soil for turnips, and it is also used for pasture land. In my opinion bones act too slowly to be used for annual crops, but they are of great value as an ingredient in compound manures for sugar

cane, etc. "The food for plants and animals is precisely the same. For plants, what the soil does not supply the air does supply; for animals, what plants do not supply the air supplies. Instead of buying meat, vegetables, milk, etc., at the usual price, we may choose prepared foods containing precisely the same constituents and pay five times as much for them. We pay others a profit for mixing foods which we are unwilling to

A Word About Wheat,

There is much diversity of opinion as to the advisability of sowing this crop. It is known to be expensive, and through the cutton belt is uncertain, but to maintain the equilibrium of the farm, to work on the principle that a farmer should raise everything for home consumption, it is well to plant enough for the immediate family wants, even though the apparent cost is greater than the market quotations. In estimating the cost Southern Cultivator thinks that we are apt to lose sight of the benefit of the straw as food and bedding for stock and the residue of vegetable matter left in the land in the stubble and roots.

Wheat likes high, dry and strong red soils and a clean, fine, firm seed bed. To secure the latter the land should be theroughly plowed, rolled and harrowedseveral times, if necessary—and it is better to concentrate the manure and plan. In the former case, should disaster overtake the crop, the amount of seed lost is smaller, and the manure and thorough preparation contribute more certainly to the increase of any succeed-

Succession of Stock Food.

It is easy for a man to see that an ncre of ground divided into four parts, with one part each in 17e, orimson clover, corn and millet, would give a greater variety and succession of stock food than if the whole acre were planted to any one crop. With the field divided in this way, we have a succession of green crops that may be used for soiling before the pastures are fit for grazing and after they are dried up. That fact is very evident to any one that can see, and the same thing is true, though to a less degree, of a succession of plants in the pasture. It is a great mistake to seed pastures to one or two grasses. There might better be six or eight varieties, which would give a succession of food through the season almost like the four different crops on the acre of land.

Flue Curing of Tobacco. The usual practice in the southern part of Virginia and in North Carolina is to cure tobacco by means of flues, These consist of small ovens of brick a or 6 feet long, 18 inches wide and 15 inches high. The heat from the ovens is conducted around the outer edges of the barn in sheet iron pipes 10 or 12 inches in diameter, the pipe resting on the ground. The pipes from the two ovens are connected by means of a T and brought to the front of the barn and run outside so as to conduct all the smoke outside. The barns are generally built of logs, and the chinks closed with mud. Small openings are left in the roof for ventilation

GARDENING FOR THE MONTH OF JULY. ____0---

FRUIT GARDEN. Finish pruning as early as possible in the month, or before the sap begins to rise. Grafting may be commenced by the end of the month and should be finished before the sap rises. See that young, recently-planted trees are properly supported. Dress apple trees infested by the cotton blight with the kerosene solution. Fork over the ground occupied by strawberries and cover it with littery manure.

KITCHEN GARDEN. Sow crops of turnips, carrots and other roots, onions, lecks, spinach and salad plants; though, should the weather be so fine as to induce rapid growth, some of these might run to seed and require to be re-sown. Cucumbers may be planted on a hotbed, and tomatoes, egg-plants, capsicoms and any others that are rather tender may be sown on it; also cucumbers, melons and other tender subjects. Another lot of early potatoes may be planted by the end of the month. Cabbage, cauliflower and lettuce may be transplanted. Spinach and similar crops must be thinned in due

The following seeds may be sown in July :- Asparagus, broad beans, broccoli, cabbage, cress, carrots, leek, lettuce, mustard, onion, parsnip, peas, potatoes, radish, rhubarb

FLOWER GARDEN. Seeds of petunias, verbenas and others similar in nature may be sown in heat, likewise the more tender annuals. The hardier annuals may be sown out of doors towards the end of the month. The prunning of trees and shrubs, the planting of hardy perennials, roses and other shrubs should be finished by the end of the month. Chrysanthemums may be propagated by means of either cuttings or suckers. Seeds of cannas should be soaked in warm water until they burst, then placed in pots.
