A man may as well sit down in a meadow and expect a cow to come and be milked, as to sit down in his store and expect to get trade without adver-

The newspaper man needs it, and it helps him to pay his printers for setting up the thousand and one free notices he gives you and your town; but don't give it to the printer or job printing office that can give you no such return, nor brains in helping you to build up revenue derived from advertising and

subscriptions, but no ordinary newspaper in any ordinary town can exist without the auxiliary support derived from job printing. Therefore, if you want a good newspaper-one that can still further help you and your towngive it your job printing.
