





Not being satisfied with the result of my experience with prooders of differant kinds, and with the impression that neither top nor bottom heat exclusively was the correct principle, I decided that I would make one which was nearer my idea of what a brooder should be. As I had no old boards or boxes, I

bought two large sized bootboxes very pheap, which were about four feet long, one foot deep and nearly two

One box I carefully knocked apart so as not to spilt the boards, and the other one was left open on one side. Then I covered it all over the outside with



A HOMEMADE BROODER. some old felt paper, such as is used unde carpets, and nailed the boards of the other box outside, so that I had

double walls all around.
I then bought enough 2 inch tin pipe (A) and two elbows to extend through the box and had a small cone shaped piece soldered at B to allow the lamp chimney to sit up in under; also one elbow and enough 4 inch pipe to extend within about four to six inches of the opposite end of the box (C) and fastened to the top of the box.

Two small cleats were nailed to each end inside (D), 11/4 and 8 inches above the bottom of the box to support the

Fig. 2 represents the front of brooder. which is made by nailing two boards together, with paper between, and is then split clear across a little above the center (E), the top part being nailed to the box and a pair of hinges fastened to hold lower part, which is the door. The mark F is a small hole about

shree inches each way to allow the chicks to pass in and out to the run. One or two small pieces of glass can be fastened in door G to give light to inside of brooder. A tray made of light boards forms the movable floor, which

can be cleaned in less time than it takes to tell it by opening the door and pulling out the tray and turning it over. When the chicks are first put in, the (ray rests upon the top cleats, and as they grow larger the tray can be lowered to allow them to pass under the 4 inch pipe. THE REMARKABLE CASE OF ALFRED SHAW.

A REPORTER of the South London Press recently paid a visit to 59 Paradise Street. Lambeth Walk, London, S.E., and sought out one of those interesting, not to say unfortunate, young men-Alfred Shaw by name-who, having chosen a military career, experienced the remorse of being compelled to abandon it from causes over which he had no control: Mr. Shaw stands fine feet nine inches in his boots, and is

"So I am—now," replied young Shaw, laconically. "But it's only during the. past two months that I have become myself again."

And then he told the story of how Her Majesty lost a young and promising soldier. He said :- "On December 9, 1895, at the age of 18, I enlisted in the No folk Regiment, passed the medical examinations with flying colours, and was sent to the regimental depôt at Norwich. I was settling down quite comfortably when I was overtaken by illness, and on January 8, 1896—barely a month after joining—was sent into the regimental hospital. I had caught a chill a week before. All of us recruits had been sent out on a route march of some 15 or 16 miles, with full kit. I had sweated pretty freely, and after we got back to barracks I felt a bit stiffish, which gradually grew worse and worse. In the hospital they said it was rheumatism and heart disease. Leading Authorities Tell When It Is Best to Pick This Fruit.

In reply to the query, "Can we safely pick apples early?" several well known pomologists responded through the colnms of The Rural New Yorker. T. H. Hoskins of Vermont said: Apples may be gathered and kept without withering at any time after the seeds are colored. Usually the fruit colors with the seeds. but sometimes not fully. The barrels of fruit should be headed, or otherwise well covered, to prevent shrinkage and kept in a cool place—the cooler the better. Before sending to market the apples should be reassorted, as there will mavoidably be some decay. The most careful handling, from the tree to the ear, pays largely in price to the seller. T. S. Gold of Connecticut thinks that the time of harvest is governed by the location and the character of the season. Last year many apples were lost by severe winds in August and September, but they were too green to pick. Ordinarily winter apples on the hills of northern Connecticut are safe on the trees till the middle of October, improving in color, quality and size, fully compensating for the few that are blown off, while in lighter soils there would be few left on the trees at that date. Extreme drought is likely to cause apples.

to loosen and drop early. J. S. Woodward, New York, said: As. quickly as the seeds are entirely black the apples are ripe, and the sooner they are picked thereafter and put into a place where they will be kept cool at an even temperature the better and longer they will keep. With summer and early fall apples it will pay to go over the trees more than once. If the larger and more mature apples are picked as soon as ripe and those less developed are allowed to hang on the trees, those left hanging will often more than double in size. Especially is this true of the Duchess of Oldenburg and the Sweet Bough, and largely so of the Maiden Blush. The larger yield from the trees will more than pay for the extra labor, to say nothing about avoiding the risk of

their being blown off by high winds. G. T. Powell assumed that nature always indicates the right time to gather her fruits, and in apples that is when the stem of the fruit will cleave from the branch where it has grown without breaking. The exceptionally dry season has matured all fruits from 10 to 15 days earlier. If stems adhere and break, the fruit will not be good, but will will if picked, for it is not sufficiently matured. The best keeping quality is obtained by picking apples as early as possible. The finest flavor is obtained by allowing them to reach the fullest maturity on the tree. In holding the apples put them in tight barrels or boxes. and keep in the coolest place that can be provided. Ventilation is not wise. The entire exclusion of air will give the smallest percentage of less from decay.

A Valuable Pear.

The Anjou pear deserves its populartty. It is not only a large, handsome fruit, but its flesh is melting and juicy, with sprightly vinous flavor. It keeps



BEURRE D'ANJOU PEAR. well into the winter holidays, when it commands a high price in the markets. More than this, it succeeds equally well as a standard or a dwarf and may be grown almost anywhere. The tree makes vigorous growth, developing an open, round head and bearing its fruit evenly distributed and of uniform size. It is classed with late autumn and early winter pears.

Vines Indoors.


