Opening Closed Roads. THE POWER OF SHIRE COUNCILS. JUDGMENT OF THE FULL COURT

PLAN FOR WIRE FENCE.

It Offers Advantages and Is No Infringement on Any Patent.
A smooth wire fence that so far as is known is no infringement on any of the patents, is the subject of a letter to The Ohio Farmer. It takes about six pounds of No. 9 wire to make a rod, to which add a pound (I have counted on galvaniked wire) of No. 11 wire for braces, which makes seven pounds per rod, and at 8 cents per pound costs 21 cents per rod. Cost of 80 rods would be as follows:

This is equal to a little over 861 cents per rod. In describing how to make the fence, the writer says:

I take eight No. 9 wires for strands.

These I draw with a ratchet. My stays are wood, sawed 11 inches square.





FIG. I—PUTTING ON BRACE WIRE. Through these I bore eight holes, or as many more as I may desire strand wires. I make the holes plenty large so they will thread easily. These stays I place four feet apart on a fence 4 feet high. The stays are held in place by a wire brace linked together, each section having a loop in one end just large enough to go over the end of the stay. These brace wires should be of exact length and must reach from lower end of stay to apper end of next, then down again, etc. This only does half of the bracing. I have another like chain and commence

at the top, then down.

To erect this fence I put in the top strand first, then thread on as many stays as it will require, then put in the lower strand and thread through lower holes, having the stays all together at far end of the fence. Next put on ratchet tension, then divide stays on strands, fasten brace wire to post at far end of fence and hook loops over end of stays, keeping them tight in the direction I am going. When I go to ratchet post I have ratchet for last section of brace wire and draw to proper tension, then staple to posts, springing up or down to suit elevations and depressions in ground, then thread in remaining wires, put on ten-

sion, and you have a fence. At Fig. 1 dots on the post represent the ratchets. The part marked A shows



TIG. II—BRACE CHAIN—MAKING IT. the mode of putting on brace wire on level ground. B shows the manner of putting on brace wire where there is an elevation and stays are thrown out of square. Fig. 2 shows brace chain linked together. Fig. 8 shows a bench for making brace wire chain. A is a square iron pin for making the square loop, and B is a lever with three-eighth inch iron pin in end for making the small loop.

Peanuts For Swine. A Virginia farmer, in a letter to The Country Gentleman, writes as follows: Whether farmers shall continue to grow the peanut for market will depend upon the future prices of the nuts in the great centers of trade. They cannot be grown with any profit to the farmer at any price below 8 cents a pound, and will eventually cease to be an article of trade unless prices advance considerably above present figures.

But there is one way in which farmers can always make peanuts a profitable crop to grow. In any section of the United States that is free from frost from June 1 to Oct. 1 the peanut can be grown, though a summer range of five months without frost is better. There is no product of the soil in any climate that will round out and fatten a pig sooner than the peanut. It is for this purpose that farmers everywhere, wherever the peanut will mature seed, may make this product immensely profitable. As a fattener of pork there is nothing better and nothing that is cheaper. It is as easily grown as beans or field peas, and the hogs will do the har-

vesting and pay you for it. About Oct, 1 turn the hogs into the lot and leave them. You will not wait long until they find the peanuts, and then they will root, eat and grow fat with astonishing rapidity. Nothing fattens a hog faster than peanuts, and grown in the way here described nothing makes cheaper food for them.







USEFUL HINTS.

To WASH CLOTHES IN PARAFFIN SOAP,-Out down alb. paraffin soap and put it into a boiler of water to melt. Rub the clothes well out of the soda water, in which they have been previously soaked, put them into the boiler and let them boil for half an hour; then put them into a tub with plenty of cold water; wash them thoroughly, then rinse in

To CLEAN EMBROIDERY.—Gold and silver fancy-work of this description may be most easily cleaned with spirits of wine, either alone, or diluted with an equal weight of water. The common practice of using alkaine or acidulous liquors is very injurious, and frequently destroys the beauty of the articles, instead of cleaning them. To RESTORE SCORCHED LINEN. -- Ingredients:

Two onions, joz. white soap, 2oz. of fuller's earth, half a pint of vinegar. Mode: Extract the juice of the onions by pounding and pressing them; out up the soap and fuller's earth, and boil all together. When cool, cover the scorched linen with this mixture, and let it dry. Wash the linen, and the scorches will disappear, if not so bad as to damage the texture.

BED-ROOM FLOORS.—Some mistresses make a practice of ordering the floors of bed-rooms to be frequently washed. I wish to guard both mistresses and servants against this practice. It is most dangerous to the health of the person who occupies the bed-room, to wash it or scour it, unless the weather be very fine or warm, in order to allow the window to be opened for thoroughly drying the room before night. The utmost that should be done, except in favourable circumstances, is to pass a damp cloth lightly over the floor.

How to Clean Decanters and CRUETJ .-The best way is to wash them out with a little pearlash and warm water, adding a spoonful or two of fresh slaked lime if necessary. To facilitate the action of the fluids against the sides of the glass, a few small cinders or pieces of raw potato may be used. A spoon-ful of strong oil of vitriol put into a dry bottle will, if allowed to run round its inner surface, rapidly remove any kind of dirt. It should then be drained, and afterwards rinsed with clean water. Where they have become furred by holding hard water, a little hydro-chloric

soid (spirits of salts) diluted with three times its weight of water will remove it. To WASH CLOTHES WITH PARAPPIR OIL. To every eight gallons of cold water put 11b. of soap, shred fine, one and a half tablespoonhour, take out each article separately, and wring them out. When all are finished, hang them out to dry. 

NEW GUINEA FEVER
