



A clouded brain, a thick tongue would not then be tolerated in the service of the Lord. It ought not to be now, either in the pulpit or in congress. God bless the man who says that. A Nazarite was separated from strong drink. Strength was the result as in the case of Samson no more than of Daniel Webster, who gave to his youthful training and temperance the credit for his wonderful strength of brain, which in later years he lost through strong drink.

"And thou shalt have joy and glad-ness, " " for he shall neither drink wine nor strong drink." Drink would have ruined all this. The blue ribbon movement saved not only Spurgeon's boys, but saved the great preacher to the cause of temperance. We need to work this temperance business among the youth. They can be taught to sing it and pray it and love it. Nothing can be more helpful than the turning of the attention of the youth in the public

John had more than abstinence from wine and strong drink. He was given to Christ from his youth. Let us bring our children to Christ. Surrender them to the Holy Spirit's guidance. Nothing can match it. A child well born and raised is half converted.

When I went to Boston Mr. Uniac was under the power of strong drink. He went to the war and drank fearfully. In the convalescent camp he was a wreck-head tied up and eyes black. He came to hear Gough, stopped drink and became the finest temperance orator in the world. One morning, weakened in body, he took some quinine bitters in which was alcohol. It rekindled the fire which consumed his every hope and landed him on the lee shore of perdition. Henry Wilson on the other hand shows how safe a man is that refuses to touch it. His father and family were drunkhis name. He refused to taste it with John Quincy Adams when asked to drink. "That." said he. "was my crucial-moment. I told him to excuse me, that my parents were drunkards and if I tasted it I would be gone." John Quincy Adams sent it from the table and praised him for abstaining. It saved him and he climbed to the position of power and influence





FARMHOUSE GROUNDS.

A Plan Which Furnishes Helpful Sugges tions For Improving a Place. The illustration here given is the plan of a farmyard remodeled and greatly improved. The plan was made by Professor Walters of the Kansas Agricultural college and originally illustrated and ex-

plained in The Field and Farm. The place as first arranged presented a very different appearance from the plan shown in the cut. The barn was located out next to the road where the walknow comes out. There were no trees or shrubs planted except the apple trees at the left. But as the circumstances of the occu-




PLAN OF FARM GROUNDS IMPROVED. pants improved they wanted something better, and they finally concluded to remodel according to this definite plan. It will be well to notice the points sought in making this plan. In the first place the barn was moved to the rear and placed so as to be nearly out of sight from the road. It is placed so far to the right of the drive that no unpleasing views are obtained by that means. Then it has enough trees planted between it and the road so that it is concealed almost completely from view. The cattle sheds at S and the yards at Y are also hidden. At the same time these trees make a fine background for the smaller decorations of the yard in front.

In the foreground are planted chiefly smaller shrubs, which do not hide the trees back of them. There is a large open space for a lawn in front of the house too. The vineyard and vegetable garden are located at E on the right and the orchard at the left. The walks from the house to the barn and to the road are sufficiently direct. The plan is in many ways a good one. In remodeling an old place the desired effects cannot be secured so well as though a good plan had been made in the first place. This plan will bear careful study and will no doubt furnish suggestions for those who want to make their places attractive.

Two Ways With Weeds.

Cultivators who have tried both ways know the several advantages of destroythe surface. The ground is then rendered mellow and clean with a tenth part of the labor required to destroy large weeds. The crop has not then been retarded in growth nearly to its entire fail-

The estimate is made that weeds after growing a fortnight and becoming a foot high contain by cubic measure 1,000 times as much substance in growth or more than when first making their ap-



CLEAN CULTURE AND NEGLECT. pearance at the surface, and with this great difference it is easily understood why they retard or destroy growth. The Country Gentleman takes as an illustration of the foregoing the turnip crop. If the weeds are not allowed entrance, the turnips will appear like those in Fig. 1. If the weeds are rampant, the turnips will make no headway and will resemble those in Fig. 2. Late in summer is the season when so many weeds steal a large growth.

In the Vegetable Garden. When there is plenty of ground, plant asparagus in rows three feet apart, the plants nine inches apart in the rows. You cannot afford to plant potatoes with deep eyes either for home use or for market.

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Retards Nature's Processes. Thomas defines disease, "Disease is any departure from a state of health." It is hoped that in the discussion of this question the writer may be able to show the thoughtful reader that alcohol produces bodily conditions which are fairly covered by the above definition, Careful scientific experiment and investigation have proved beyond the shadow of doubt that alcohol cannot be digested

by the human stomach. After doing its damaging work upon the mucous membranes of that organ it passes directly into the circulation in its crude form. Here it comes in contact with the oxygen which is taken into the blood through the respiration. The combination of this oxygen with the car-bon so largely contained in alcohol produces heat. Heat being correlated to force, the one who receives alcohol into the system is made temporarily to feel strong. Every power of his nature is stimulated to a high pitch. If only sufficient alcohol were received into the system and that in such a gradual manner that the carbon which it contains could be consumed in this burning when it is combined with the oxygen which is in the blood, comparatively little damage would result from its introduction

The amount of oxygen received into the system during 24 hours is said to be capable of consuming the carbon in six ounces of alcohol. In order that this amount of carbon be consumed by oxygen and the other poisonous elements in this substance eliminated from the system it must necessarily be taken in extremely small quantities reaching over the whole period of 24 hours.

Drinking men do not take alcohol in this way. Large quantities are drunk at a single sitting.

After the stimulating influence referred to above has been experienced, the next damaging result of this poison upon the system is to coagulate or harden the albuminous substance of the body. In these albuminous substances are the secret forces of physical life. To destroy them means disease and death.

If the reader will kindly take a glass and into it drain off the white of an egg and add thereto a small quantity of alcohol, he will have a beautiful illustration of the thought which I wish to give him. At once the white of the egg will assume much the same appearance that it would when first beginning to boil in

This same process is the one which I wish to indicate as taking place in the albuminous substance so abundant in the newly made tissues in the capillary circulation of the one who drinks alcohol in any form. The delicate atoms of our life which nature has wrought out of the substances taken into our systems through the digestive and assimilative organs are destroyed at their very birth. The atoms which are a little older grown and are ready to be cast off as worn out material, and hence foreign substances, are by this same deadly poison so hardened that nature has no power to eliminate them through the ordinary channate them through the ordinary channels—viz, the respiration and unconscious
perspiration; hence we see the twofold
and deadly power of this demon. It not

Drunkards of the Middle Ages. Professor Virchow of Berlin is too careful of his popularity to commit himself to any direct protest against the alcohol outrage and in reply to a leading question returned the evasive answer that "during the middle ages abundant physical vigor went hand in hand with love of drink (Trinklust) limited only by the resources of individual topers."

The last named limitation affected, however, at least nine-tenths of the mediæval beer worshipers, who, in stress of circumstances, often restricted their revels to "ember eyes and holy ales," and Dr. Egener of Breslau reminds the diplematic professor that the history of the middle ages records several cases of rather emphatic protests against the habitual use of intoxicating drinks. King Wencelaus of Bohemia was solemnly reprimanded by a delegation of his own subjects and at last forced to resign because he failed to keep his penchant for strong drink within the limits of common decency.—Union Signal.

Drunkenness Is a Disease, Intemperance is one of the greatest evals of the world. Man with chemistry in his hands has taken apart and recombined the elements of nature. He has produced alcohol and morphine and other intoxicants. It is right for society to guard against the abuse of these as far as possible, and for education and moral persuasion to do all they can to warn and persuade against the habit of drinking, and great blame may attach to those who form such a habit. But medical men are telling us now that drunkenness is a disease, and that in many cases the drunkard is powerless to resist the temp tation. He might have avoided it once as many a poor sufferer might have avoided consumption or fever. But once sick, the inebriate may be as powerless to cure himself as is the consumptive.-Banner of Gold.

How It Is.

In the streets of the town where I live I some his appeal for a penny or two is hardly to be resisted. He has lost both his legs above the resisted. 1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary, in writing, are considered as wishing to continue their subscriptions.

2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their newspapers, the publisher may continue to send them until arrears are paid.

3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their newspapers from the pestoffice to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they settle their bills, and ordered the newspapers to be discontinued.

4. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publishers, and the papers are sent to the former direction, the subscribers are responsible.

5. The court has decided that "refusing to take periodicals from the post-office or leaving them uncalled for, is prima facie evidence of intentional







FRUIT GARDEN. Finish pruning as early as possible in the month, or before the sap begins to riso. Grafting may be commenced by the end of the month and should be finished before the sap rises. See that young, recently planted trees are properly supported. Dress apple trees infested by the cotton blight with the kerosene solution. Fork over the ground occupied by strawberries and cover it with littery manure.

KITCHEN GARDEN.

Sow crops of turnips, carrots and other mots, onions, leeks, spinach and salad plants; though should the weather be so fine as to induce rapid growth, some of these might run to seed and require to be re-sown. Cucumbers may he planted on a hotbed, and tomatoes, egg-plants, capsicoms and any others that are rather tender may be sown on it; also marrows, melons and other tender subjects. Another lot of early potatoes may be planted by the end of the month. Cabbage, cauliflower and lettuce may be transplanted. Spinach and similar crops must be thinned in

The following seeds may be sown in July:-Asparagus, broad beans, broccoli, cabuage, cress, carrots, leek, lettuce, mustard, onion, parsnip, peas, potatoes, radish, rhubarb.

FLOWER GARDEN.

Seeds of petunias, verbenas and thers similar in nature may be sown in heat, likewise the more tender annuals. The hardier annuals may be sown outof-doors towards the end of the month. The pruning of trees and shrubs, the planting of hardy perennials, roses, and other shrubs should be finished by the end of the month. Chrysanthemums may be propagated by means of either cuttings of suckers. Seeds of cannas should be soaked in warm water until they burst, then placed in pots. Tree dahlias should be brought forward in heat. Buffalo grass may be planted. Old lawns may be re-plenished with old manure, bone-dust, or superphosphates. Mixed grass seeds may be sown on spots that have become bare. Gladioli and autumn-flowering bulbs should be planted. Lapagerias may be propagated by layering.

PLANT HOUSES.

Start plants of eucharis, arhimenes, glouinia, and others similar in character, in heat, Shift young and also older growth and their roots have penetrated the soil of their pots, including stove ferns and orchids. Cut down winterflowering plants that are past their best. Seeds of begonia, ploxonia and other stove plants should be sown early in the month. Fumigate plant houses regularly, especially frames in which are such as cinerarias. Calceolarias should now be in their blooming pots. Tree carnations, that have been in a warm-place may now be propagated by means of

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

The Alcoholic Vice in Alaska. A historian of the Mogul dynasty of northern India relates that Mohammed Baber Khan undertook to eradicate the onium habit of his subjects by the total destruction of poppy plants throughout his dominions, in the hope of thus saving at least the rising generation, since he had given up the attempt of reforming confirmed poison eaters. The alcohol vice, too, is apt to perpetuate itself from the smallest remaining germs, and radical measures alone can achieve deliverance from its evils. Some twenty years ago the American and British governments made a simultaneous effort to restrict the liquor traffic among the aborigines of Alaska and the adjoining territories, but the root of the stimulant curse was suffered to remain, and is now producing a crop of new sprouts in a rather unexpected manner.

"Our Indians have begun to make their own beer, or kwass, as they call it," says the Rev. O. R. McKinney, of Unga, Alaska, in a letter to a correspondent of the New York Voice, "and though it costs but little, it is nevertheless a deadly intoxicant. While sober they are a good, kind people, ready to be taught and ever eager for knowledge; but it seems they will drink almost anything that will stimulate. Only a few days ago news came to our village that a Russian priest up the bay had killed himself drinking bitters. Every Russian holiday is celebrated by the natives making an unusually large amount of kwass, and as a necessary result getting drunk, fighting and smashing things in general." In other words, the liquor traffic has started the flames that devour the poor aborigines, and they should not bear the exclusive blame if they should be unable to arrest the progress of the conflagration.

Health of Drinkers and Abstainers. The registrar general of Great Britain is authority for the statement that the highest rate of mortality among any class of men engaged in any regular branch of industry is found among persons engaged in the liquor trade. A table containing the comparative death rates of males engaged in 100 occupa-tions in England and Wales gives very convincing arguments. Men engaged as inn or hotel servants have the highest rate of mortality; clergymen, ministers and priests the lowest. Of persons engaged in the retail liquor trade the death rate is four times that of the clergy between the ages of twenty-five and forty.







Gardening for the Month of July. FRUIT GARDEN.

Finish pruning as early as possible in he month, or before the sap begins to rise. Grafting may be commenced by the end of the month and should be finished before the sap rises. See that young, recently planted trees are properly supported. Dress apple trees infested by the cotton blight with the kerosene solution. Fork over the ground occupied by strawberries and cover it with littery manure.

Cucumbers may be planted on a hothed, and tomatoes. egg-plants, capsicoms and any others that are rather tender may be sown on it; also marrows, melons and other tender subjects. Another lot of early potatoes may be planted by the end of the month. Cabbage, cauliflower and lettuce may be transplanted. Spinach and similar crops must be thinned in

The following seeds may be sown in July:-- Asparagus, broad beans, broccoli, cabinge, cress, carrots, leek, lettuce, mustard, onion, parsnip, peas, potatoes, radish, rhubarb.

FLOWER GARDEN.

Seeds of petunias, verbenas and others similar in nature may be sown in heat, likewise the more tender annuals. The hardier annuals may be sown outof-doors towards the end of the month. The pruning of trees and shrubs, the plan ing of hardy perennials, roscs, and other shrubs should be finished by the end of the month. Chrysutthemans may be propagated by means of either cuttings of suckers. Seeds of cannas should be soaked in warm water until they burst, then placed in pots. Tree t dahlias should be brought forward in heat. Buffalo grass may be planted. Old lawns may be re-plenished with old manure, bone-dust, or superphosphates. Mixed grass seeds may be sown on snots that have become bare. Gladioli and autumn-flowering bulbs should be planted. Lapagerias may be propagated

by layering.
PLANT Houses. Start plants of eucharis, arhimenes, glouinia, and others similar in character. in heat, Shift young and also older plants of all kinds as soon as they are in growth and their roots have penetrated the soil of their pote, including stove ferns and orchids. Cut down winterflowering plants that are past their best. Seeds of begonia, ploxonia and other stove plants should be sown early in the month. Fumigate plant houses regularly, especially frames in which are such as cinerarias. Calceolarias should now be in their blooming pots. Tree carnations, that have been in a warm place may now be propagated by means of
