NEWSPAPER LAW.

1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the convrary, in writing, are considered as wishing to continue their subscriptions.

2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their newspapers, the publisher may continue to send them until arrears are paid...

3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their newspapers from the postoffice to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they settle their bills, and ordered the newspapers

to be discontinued.

4. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publishers, and the papers are sent to the former direction; the subscribers are responsible.

5. The court has decided that "refusing to take periodicals from the post-office or leaving them uncalled for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud."

6. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he has ordered it or not, is held in law to be a subscriber.

RE MINING LEASES.

It is notified for general information that applicants for Mining Leases are required, within seven days previous to lodging the application, to insert in a newspaper published in the district where the land is situated, or if no such newspaper, then in one published nearest the district, an advertisement or notice in the form marked "A" in the schedule relating to Mining Leases.





ELECTRICITY IN MEDICINE.

Somewhat Startling Though Very Simple Uses For Electric Lights.

Dr. W. C. Phillips recently illustrated before the New York Academy of Medicine some of the latest applications of electricity In the science of medicine. One piece of apparatus shown was a head illuminator. This consists of a small incandescent globe and an electric light of three candle power and about as big as a grape. It is adjusted to the end of a rubber tube, which in appear ance resembles a lead pencil, and through which the wires reach the globe. The instrument is placed in the mouth of the patient, who closes his lips. The lights in the room are turned out and the electric light of the illuminator turned on. The checks then become translucent, showing every vein and imperfection of the skin, and the light also shines through the upper part of the face. As reported by the New York Herald, Dr. Phillips has said in explanation of the device: "The beauty of the illuminator lies in the fact that it enables us to read certain conditions of the head which could only be learned heretofore by operations or probings. If the light shines through one side of the face and not the other, we know the dark side is affected.—It also throws a light through the bones of the face and discloses formations of the bone which under other circumstances could only be ascertained by drilling into the bones."

Dr. Phillips also exhibited a "searchlight," a curved piece of nickel made to fit over the head and come down between the brows. Between the brows was a lens which stood out like the glass in a bullseye lantern. It was connected by wires with a storage battery. A switch was turned, and a bright lightshone out from the apparatus like a star on the forehead of a ballet dan-

er.
"This light," said the physician, "shines into and down the throat of a patient who is being examined for throat troubles. This latter examination can also be performed by the insertion of a small electric light the de of a pea.

"There is another instrument consisting of a flexible tube with a small lamp at the end and connected with a battery. The pa-tient swallows this lamp, and when it reaches the stomach it shines through, so liseased organism can be plainly read from the outside. The circulation is visible, and an abnormal development stands out like mole on a person's cheek.

"All these implements and devices," added Dr. Phillips in conclusion, "are the results of study made by prominent physicians and surgeons.

Delicate Children.

Too often parents and guardians are at a loss to know what to do for their "delicate" children. One sees that a child is not strong; the looks pale; seems to be weak and so uickly exhausted upon every slight exerion; possibly the appetite is miserable, and either inability to sleep or too great an inclination to sleep is a prominent and dis tressing symptom. Oftentimes these sympoms are forerunners of a fever or some other grave disease, but Good Housekeeping angsts that more frequently they indicate the need of a change from indoor life to that of living in the open sir. The best mode of iving out of doors is to find some work to do there, although idle sauntering is better than keeping within doors. Medicines do little good where nothing but frailty is to be treated.



YOUNG PEOPLE'S MANNERS.

Parental Neglect of the Gracious Art of Good Breeding. In some homes the belief in the ability of youth to guide itself aright is carried to the extent of forbearing to teach the very rudiments of good manners. It is assumed that contact with their fellows and the self education resulting from social attrition will turn the young people out at length as finlahed ladies and gentlemen. Meanwhile they are allowed to be as objectionable as it pleases them to be, and no one lifts band or voice in warning, in correction, in teaching. The boys slouch into the room, their grubby hands in their pockets, their caps on their unkempt heads. Perhaps they whistle; perhaps they shout, two or three in chorus. They are not checked, not taught better manners, not interfered with in any

way.

The girls, maybe at the awkward age when it is difficult to make them well bred with the greatest pains one can take, come ramping in with their brothers, giving the impression of a babel of voices, a forest of heads, a maddening group of windmills whereof the sails are arms. If of the more studious kind, they "flunip" themselves down in an easy chair doubled up in a half hoop and bury themselves in a book laid on their crossed knees. They take no notice of their mother's guests, not even to say the usual formula, "How do you do?" or to answer "Quite well, thank you." If frivolous, they snicker and giggle and talk in whisper one to the other; if quarrelsome, shout and wrangle. In any case they show the most profound indifference to the forms of good breeding as established by long custom and the most unmitigated contempt for their mother's visitors.

How should they not? the papers are sent to the former direction, the subscribers are responsible. 5. The court has decided that "refusing to take periodicals from the post-office or leaving them uncalled for,

POULTRY FOODS.

Animal Meal-Combined Feeds-Bill of Fare For Laying Hens.

On the farm little if any of the feed for poultry is purchased. It is grown on the farm, and there is no need for the poultry feeds of commerce, such as the "combined feeds," "animal meal" and the like. But the suburban poultry grower, who represents a numerous class, is forced to reduce profits by expending money for feeds. He consequently is desirous of obtaining the most for his money and may be aided perhaps by the following:

Animal meal is made from fresh meat and fresh bones cooked, dried and ground into meal. It is useful and necessary to laying hens and growing chicks when there is a scarcity of meat scraps, old bones and oyster shells, and in winter when fowls cannot get insect food. It is added to the usual ration in small quantities, varying according to the season and character of the other food.

"Combined feeds" are mixtures of grains claimed to be put together in right proportions to furnish a perfectly balanced food. These feeds when bought from trustworthy sources are a convenience for amateurs, but poultrymen who understand their business often prefer to buy the grains separate and mix them as may be required.

Bonemeal, as the name suggests, is ground bone. The substances found in bones, whether dry and ground or green and cut, are excellent for poultry. The bonemeal has been found especially beneficial to growing chickens, a little mixed in the daily rations, say at the rate of a handful to a gallon of feed. The green or fresh bones, with meat and gristle, contain the most nutriment, and there are bone cutters on the market by which green bones may be easily reduced to a form suited to the poultry yard. These cutters are said to pay when the fowls number 150 or more. Some poultrymen feed a mixture known as excelsior meal. To make excelsior meal grind together 20 pounds of

corn, 15 pounds of oats, 10 pounds of barley and 10 pounds of wheat bran. Feed this meal in form of cakes made by mixing a quart of sour milk or buttermilk, a little salt and molasses and a cuart of water in which a large tablespoonful of saleratus has been dissolved. Thicken with the meal and Mr. A. F. Stevens of Wellesley gave his bill of fare for laying hens in an es-

say read before a Massachusetts farmers meeting. Here it is: Milk, wheat, corn. oats, meat, lime grass and vegetables. In the morning early he gives a good liberal feed of warm, soft mush mixed as follows: One-third corn and oats ground together in equal parts in bulk, one-third wheat middlings, one-sixth animal meal or beef scraps, and onesixth boiled vegetables—potatoes, mangles er carrots. If these can be mixed with milk, it will greatly increase their egg production. At noon he feeds fine cut clover, which he prepares a few hours previously by placing in a barrel and pouring hot water on it. Of this the fowls have all they will eat, along with a light feed of good wheat, barley, cracked corn and buckwheat. At night

they are fed whole corn. Always keep before the fowls fresh, clean water or milk, also ground bone or shells and green food in form of cabbages, turnips, beets, carrots, etc., during all seasons of the year when the fowls cannot obtain such foods out of doors in form of grass. A good plot or field of green rye makes a fine pasture, and no better poultry yard can be found than an orchard.

Nitrate of Sods. Numbered with chemical fertilizers that are attracting the attention of wide awake farmers is nitrate of sods. Here are some conclusions arrived at by Sempers in his manual on-manures in regard

o it:
1. The nitrate of soda is, in most cases, a reliable manure for cereals, roots and grasses, increasing the yield over other nitrogenous manures. 2. Many crops grown with nitrate of soda mature from one to two weeks earlier than when grown with other nitrogenous manures. 3. The best results are obtained by applying the nitrate to crops in fractional top dressings during the active stages of growth. 4. Crops grown with nitrate of soda generally have a higher feeding value than those grown with other forms of nitrogen. 5. Crops grown with nitrate of sods seem to resist the attacks of parasitic organisms better than those grown without its aid. 6. Nitrate of sods does not exhaust the

NEWSPAPER LAW.

1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary, in writing, are considered as wishing to continue their subscriptions.

2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their newspapers, the publisher may continue to send them until arrears are paid.

3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to. take their newspapers from the postoffice to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they settle their bills, and ordered the newspapers to be discontinued.

4. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publishers, and the papers are sent to the former direction, the subscribers are responsible.

5. The court has decided that "refusing to take periodicals from the post-office or leaving them uncalled for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud."

6. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he has ordered it or not, is held in law to be a subscriber.

Respecting the cutting up of large estates, the Hamilton Spectator says: -While the Government are sending emissaries to different parts of the colony to inspect and report upon properties offered for the purpose of prise in this district. The executors of the late Andrew Chirnside have already leased 2,500 acres of the Mount William Estate to farmers from the Wimmera and some of the local residents. The principle adopted is that of the share system, the tenant taking twothirds and the landlord one-third of the produce. In the event of the tenant being short of funds the landlords buy the wheat, deducting the price from the proceeds when the grain is harvested. In some instances also the landlords advance the horse feed, so that the tenant has only to provide the labor, implements. and horses. On the adjoining Edgarley Estate Mr Millear had also let 3,000 acres to farmers on the share system. 



edly genuine examples of fifteenth century work are extant. Mr. Percy Fitzgorald, in his "Book Fancier," refers to some duted A. D. 1379 and 1317, but it is only fair to add that specialists ignore their existence. Whatever the date of its origin there is no doubt concerning the popularity of the book plate today. London has an Ex-Libris society devoted to its study; so, too, has Berlin. Poulet Malassis and Henri Bouchot have devoted monographs to French Ex-Libris. Carlander has a portly treatise ipon Swedish examples, and a shoal of amphlets and magazine articles in Engsh, French and German make up quite & iterature of the subject.

The Hon. Leicester Warren, in his guide o the study of book plates, 1880, suggested their general classification and invented the curious nomenclature, "Chippendale," 'Bookpile' and the like, so puzzling to outsiders. Mr. Castle, in his recent "Handbook For Students of Ex-Libris," limits his study to English examples, while Walter Hamilton's late book has to do with French book plates. Both volumes are amusing,

As it happens that great names are oftenimes attached to less interesting designs,



Those belonging to Thomas Carlyle, Charles Dickens, the Hatfield library and Tennyson have only the accidental interest conferred by their owners. On the other hand, the plates Samuel Pepys mentions in his diara, July 21, 1668—"Went to my platemakera and there spent an hour about contriving my little plates for the books of the kings four yards"-are in themselves admirable, as the fine portrait plate superbly reproduced in Mr. Castle's book and the anchor device illustrated here prove. So, in a way, is Victor Hugo's. The plates of her majesty the queen and that of Mr. Henry Irv ing are designed in red and black.

The fine early examples of book plates iljustrated in the volumes alluded to, as well as the designs by Sir John Millais, H. Stacy Marks, E. A. Abbey, Caldecott or Walter Crane, among many others, show that if, as Mr. Andrew Lang has said, "of all conceivable topics book plates are the most infinitesimal," nevertheless a good many artists ind book collectors have found the infinitely little deserving a large expenditure of taste and ingenuity.

An Interesting Invention. A floating rope has been invented. Ac cording to The Industrial World, the inventor claims that his floating rope of one inch thickness will stand a strain of more than 1,000 pounds. The rope consists of a core of small round corks about three-quarters of an inch long, placed end to end, tround which is braided a network of cotton twine. This is surrounded by another ayer of strong cotton twine braided in neavy strands, which is about a quarter of in inch thick. The rope is very soft and pliable, and even after being tied into a small knot will return to its original shape It can be used in life lines, on light rafts and as a heaving line to tie heavy hawsers

Aluminium Horseshoes.

In the Russian army a number of horset were shod with one shoe of aluminium and three new iron shoes, in order to test the comparative durability of the new material. I'he result of the experiment, as stated by the fron monger, was that after six weeks wear on hard and stony ground, the aluminium shoes were found to have suffered but little attrition and were still serviceable, while the hoofs to which they were fitted were in a better condition than those shod. with iron. The weight of the new shoe is only one-third to one-quarter that of iron, and the material, being quite unchanged in character by use, is as valuable, weight for weight, when taken off, as when put on.

The Large Prey of a Spider. In commenting upon the astonishing strength of some of the spiders that build their webs in trees and other places, the St. Louis Globe-Democrat mentions that one of them was seen to have in captivity in that place a wild canary. The ends of the wings, tail and feet of the bird were bound togeth for by some sticky substance, to which were attached the threads of the spider, which was slowly but surely drawin, up the bird. by an ingenious pulley arrangement. The bird hung head downward, and was so securely bound with little threads that it could not struggle, and would soon have been a prey to its great ugly captor had not



THE NEW LAND ACT.

THE LAND ACT, 1898, which came into operation on July 1, 1899, practically abrogated all previous Land Acts, although the privileges of holders of titles under the 1869 and succeeding Acts are not interfered with, but, in fact, extended, the new Act granting concessions as to payment of arrears of rent and the option of converting their leases into perpetual

The unalienated Crown lands are divided into ten classes: 1—Good agricul-tural or grazing lands; 2—Agricultural and grazing lands; 3—Grazing lands; 4— Pastoral lands (large areas); 5—Swamp or reclaimed lands; 6—Lands (not including swamp or reclaimed lands)
which may be sold by auction; 7—
Auriferous lands; 8—State forest
reserves; 9—Timber reserves; 10— Water reserves.

Land Classification Boards are to be

established, for the purpose of altering the classification of unselected lands only. Any person (including married women), over 18 years of age, may select.

No person can hold under agricultural licence more than 200 acres of land in the first-class or 320 acres of second-class land, nor under grazing allotment licence more than 640 acres of third-class land. Under grazing area leases the limits are 200 acres first-class land, 640 second class. 1280 acres third class. In the Malles the limits of agricultural allotments are 640 acres in the first-class, and 1000 acres of second-class land.

Rights under existing pastoral and grazing leases, which expire on December 29, 1899, are preserved until that date. In all selections under the new Act, the area to be selected must include any land selected by the applicant under previous Acts, the land previously selected by him being regarded as third-class land irrespective of its quality. The proportions to be regarded in these calculations, except in the Mallee, are 200 acres first-class land, equal 320 acres of secondclass or 640 acres of third-class land. Thus, a holder of 320 acres under the 1869 Act can further select 100 acres firstclass land, 160 acres second-class, or 320 acres third-class land under the present Act. In the Mallee the classification of the land previously held must be ascer-

PASTORAL LANDS.

The holders of pastoral leases at the time of the passing of the Act (20th December, 1898) may, before December 29 1899 select a homestead of 640 acre of third-class land on payment of 10s per acre. Any previous homestead selection will be regarded as third-class land, while the right to select 320 acres of first or second-class land as a homestead is not curtailed. Extensions of the present leases beyond December 29, 1899, may be granted, the provisions as to selection of homesteads being, in such renewals of leases, those specified under the new Act.

New leases will be for a term expiring on December 29, 1909, for areas not lessthan 1280 acres or more than 40,000 acres, to the first person applying after the land is declared available. If more than one application be received on the same day before 2 p.m., the right to a lease shall be put up to public auction. Pastoral lessees must pay rent half-yearly, in advance; cannot assign or sub-let without written consent; must destroy vermin and noxious weeds, maintain improvements, and comply with the other usual conditions, including the erection of swing gates across tracks when New lessees will be entitled to select

homesteads of the same area as other selectors of agricultural allotments, and will be re-imbursed by incoming tenants up to 2s 6d per scre for all fences, wells, reservoirs, tanks and dams. All other improvements revert to the Crown.

Holders of "grazing areas" at the time of the passing of the Act have their privileges extended until December 29, 1899, and may in the meanwhile apply for new leases without competition. The applicant must be able to prove that he has faithfully occupied the land and used it as a grazing area, or has improved it to the extent of 5s per sere. If in arrear with his rent he may arrange for the payment of such arrears in instalments, spread over 6 years. He may surrender part of his grazing area lease in favor of his wife or an eligible child. In no case, however, will any renewed or lease surrendered in favor of another member of the family be granted for more than 200 acres of first-class land or 640 scres of second-class land, and then only when available in the existing area.

Power is given to the Minister, where lessees of grazing areas select agricultural or grazing alletments, to ante-date licences to 1st January or 1st July of any year in which continuous occupation can be shown

to have taken place.

Future leaves of grazing areas are limited to 200 acres of first class land, 640 acres second-class, or 1280 acres of third-class land in one or more "grazing areas," at rentals of threepence (3d) per acre for first-class land, twopence (2d) for second-class, and one penny (ld) for third-class land, with an additional rental of 4 per cent. on the capital value of all permanent and substantial improvements on the land when the lease is granted. When the leases expire incoming tenants must pay to the late leases the value of all fences, wells, reservoirs, tanks and dams made by him, the amount in no case to exceed what has been paid by the late lessee nor to be more than 10s, 7s 6d or 5s per acre for first, second, or third class land respectively. All other

improvements revert to the Crown. The leases contain the usual provisions for payment of rent, maintenance of improvements, power of forfeiture by the Orown fer breach of conditions, obligation by lessee to fence, power by Crown to resume on giving two years' notice, and payment for lessee's interest and improve-

ments.

These "grazing area" leases run to
29th December, 1920, and may be changed into perpetual leases or surrendered in favor of the lessee's wife or eligible child. Lessees have the right to select out of their grazing areas 200 acres of first-class or 320 acres of second-class land as an agricultural allotment, or a 'grazing allotment' of 640 acres of third class land

in one or adjacent blocks. Land not worth a penny per acre may be leased in blocks not exceeding 1280 acres as grazing areas, at rentsls fixed by the Department after valuation.

AGRICULTURAL ALLOTMENTS.

Lessees of such allotments in arrear with their rents on July 1, 1899, may apply for postponement of such arrears, without interest, until the expiry of the

Future occupiers and holders of converted licences can hold 200 acres of firstclass land at 1s per acre, or 320 acres of second - class land at 9d per sere annually, as residential, or non-residen-tial selections, for a period of 6 years, licensees being also required during that period to effect improvements on first-class land to the value of one pound per sore, and on second-class land fifteen shillings per sore in the case of residential licensees, while non-resident selectors are required to put on improvements valued at 6s 8d per acre during each of the six years a licence is held for first-class land, and for second-class land 5s per acre on improvements for each of the first three years of licence. At the end of six years, licensees will be entitled to Orown grants on the payment of the balance of purchase money, or leases extending over a further period of four-teen years. Residential licensees have, however, the privilege of paying 6d or 431 per acre, according to class, for their land from the time of taking up their tenure, lease being extended to 34 years.

GRAZING ALLOTMENTS

Grazing allotments can be obtained up 640 acres of third-class land for six years, at a rental of 6d per acre annually. with the usual conditions as to fencing, keeping free from vermin, resumption, etc. Improvements by residential selectors are required to the value of 10s per acre during the currency of the licence, and by non-resident selectors to the value of 3s 4d per acre per annum during the first three years. Residential licensees can, like those on agricultural allotments. pay half rates from the outset by extending their agreement to 40 years.

In both of these classes of selection the Department may consent to the licensee under residential licence leaving his block for a time, provided his wife or child reside on the block, or should he have no wife or child his father or mother, dependent on him for support.

Spinsters or widows, on marriage, after holding a residential licence over a year, may be relieved of the necessity for residing on their blocks, while leave of absence for three months in the year may be obtained from the district land officer on application by any licensee.

Perpetual lesses will be granted to licensees on application, rent being pay able at 3d per acre on first-class land, 21d land until 1909. At the end of that term the land will be re-valued, and the rent payable for the next ten years will be 25s per cent. or 3d in the £ sterling ou such valuation. Similar valuations will be made every ten years. Payment of any arrears of rent due when licences or eases are surrendered may be spread over a period not exceeding 20 years.

Residential licences may be converted into non-residential licences, and vice

Clauses providing for surrender of whole or part of grazing areas, substitutes for fencing, assignment of licences and leases are also provided. Where a forfeited block is selected.

payment for the value of any permanent improvements may be spread over a number of years, not exceeding six, and the rent charged will include interest at per cent. on the value.

Holders of licences for agricultural allotments desirous of establishing vine yards, hop gardens, or orchards can at any time obtain Orown grants, for not more than 20 acres, on payment of the balance of purchase money.

Liens may be given, after two years,

by licensees of agricultural or grazing allotments for half the value of the

improvements. As previously stated, all licensees or lessees may surrender their titles for perpetual leases, or any Crown lands available may be taken up in this way. Original or converted perpetual leases provide that, except for mallee and swamp or reclaimed lands, the estimated value of land until December, 1909 is £1 per sore for first class, 15s for second-class, and 10s for third-class. The rent charged is 25s per cent. or 3d in the & throughout, but the land is re-valued every ten years. Lessees must pay yearly in advance, destroy all vermin within two years, fence within six years, or sooner, if required, under the Fences Act 1890. Residence on the land, or within five miles thereof, for six months during the first year, and for eight months every year during the next five is required, unless he cultivate one-fourth of his area during the first two years, and one half before the end of the fourth year. In that case the residence covenant does not

Improvements are required during the first three years to the value of 10s, 7s 6d and be per sore, according to class, and further improvements to a similar amount before the end of the sixth year.

No transfer, assignment or mortgage is possible until after the expiry of six years; and the performance of all covenants. No person is allowed to hold under perpetual lease, by transfer or directly, more than 600 acres of first-class land, 960 acres of second-class, or 1920 acres of thirdclass land outside the mallee. Perpetual leases may be changed into

AURIFEROUS LANDS.

Annual licences to reside on and cultivate up to 20 acres will be issued at 1s per sere, with an annual licence fee of 2s 6d the minimum rent being 5s for blocks under 3 acres, and between 3 and 10 acres 1Cs. Licensees can only use the surface of the land, miners having free access to any portion not occupied by buildings. without compensation for surface or other damage. No right to the fee simple i



THE NEW LAND ACT. [Continued from Third Page.] AUCTION SALES.

The clauses relating to the sales of Orown lands by auction allow for the payment of survey fee and 121 per cent. (in lieu of 25 per cent. hitherto required) of the purchase money at the time of sale. the balance payable in 40 half-yearly payments at 4 per cent. instead of 12 quarterly payments at 6 per cent. as heretofore.

Swamp and reclaimed lands may be leased for 21 years, or under perpetual tease at 4 per cent, sold by public auction or leased under conditional purchase. Conditional purchase leases are for the

period of a term of years not exceeding 311 years and require residence, and improvements to the value of 10 per cent. during the first three years, and a further 10 per cent. before the end of the sixth

Village settlers may obtain perpetual leases, paying 4 per cent. per annum on the capital value, with certain concessions for improvements.

Occupants of lands under Section 99, Land Act 1890, for the last five years for garden sites, butter factories, inns, smithies, residences, stores, or similar buildings in thickly populated districts, and not within the boundaries of a city, town or township, may have their allotments put up to auction, all rents paid going towards purchase money.

Residents on forest lands for the last five years may obtain Crown grants for not more than 10 acres if improvements to the value of £2 per acre have been

FUTURE ARREARS OF RENTS. After 1st July, 1899, licence fees er rents in arrear for one year will be charged 5 per cent. per annum, where two years 6 per cent., three years 7 per cent., and if the rent remains unpaid for four years the licence or lease becomes absolutely forfeited.

Wattle lands lessees can select agricultural or grazing allotments out of their MALLEE LANDS.

Mallee lands are to be classified by a Board into two classes-one of lands having an unimproved value of £1 per acre or upwards, and the second of land with an unimproved value of less than £1:

All lands not included in mallee blocks or mallee allotments may be made available for selection in the same way as in the rest of the colony, the conditions and terms, except as to price, being exactly the same except that the area selectable is raised to 640 acres of first-class and 1000 acres of second-class land. These lands may be acquired either by licence, residential or non-residential, or

perpetual lease. All persons (including married women).

over 18 may select.

Holders of mallee allotments may before-30th November, 1903, select on their allotments the maximum allowed to mallee selectors. For second-class land, where the license is residential, the purchase money shall be 10s per acre; improvements, 10s. First-class land: Purchase money, £1 per acre; improvements, £1. For second-class nonresidential land, the purchase money is 10s; improvements, 10s. First-class: Purchase money, £1; improvements, £2:

For perpetual leases of mallee lands,. rents to 1st December. 1903, will not exceed 2d per acre. At that date it will be valued as in its natural state, and the usual rent-3d in the £-charged. No person is allowed to hold more than 1920 acres of mallee land under perpetual A special area of 2,000 acres known as

the "Little Desert," to the west of Dimboola, is set apart for occupation under lease in allotments of not more than 100 acres, under special conditions, which include fencing within 12 months, destruction of vermin within 3 years, improvements to the value of 4s per acre every year, only five years' currency of lease. All these conditions being complied with, lessees will be entitled to the Crown grant without further payment. Acquisition of Land.

Power is taken to acquire land from private owners, but before the contract is completed Parliament must approve. Such lands must be divided into allotments not exceeding £1,000 each in value. including all expenses of survey acquisition, clearing, draining, fencing, value of lands absorbed in roads and reserves, etc. Persons of the age of 21, not already the holders of land valued at £1000 (township land excepted), may obtain farm: allotments on conditional purchase; the payments being half-yearly for 314 years, and the interest 44 per cent. per annum—in the same way as the Savings Bank loans are made. Improvements to the value of 10s per acre, or 10 per cent. of the value, must be made before the end of the third year, and further improvements of a similar value before the end of the sixth year. Personal residence by lessee or his family is required for six years. At the end of six years the fee simple may be acquired on payment of balance due.

The foregoing embodies the main features of the new Act, but there are numerous interesting minor matters dealt with, information on which should, when required, be sought from the Department, or from the nearest land officer.
