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## NEWSPAPER LAW.

1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary, in writing, are considered as wishing to continue their subscriptions.

2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their newspapers, the publisher may continue to send them until arrears are paid.

3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their newspapers from the post-office to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they settle their bills, and ordered the newspapers to be discontinued.

4. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publishers, and the papers are sent to the former direction, the subscribers are responsible.

5. The court has decided that "refusing to take periodicals from the post-office or leaving them uncalled for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud."

6. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he has ordered it or not, is held in law to be a subscriber.

## RE MINING LEASES.

It is notified for general information that applicants for Mining Leases are required, within seven days previous to lodging the application, to insert in a newspaper published in the district where the land is situated, or if no such newspaper, then in one published nearest the district, an advertisement or notice in the form marked "A" in the schedule relating to Mining Leases.

Brusher's Company obtained 4oz. from a prospect in Thursday, and expect a yield of 20oz. for the week. Lyons delayed out 14oz. on Saturday from his quartz reef on the Dividing Range. Although a leader is being worked, there is a good body of stone, which is highly mineralized. The following are the reported local yields for the week ending Saturday last:—Vandersteel and party, 15oz. 13dwt.; Hancock and party, 5oz. 10dwt.; Lannon and party, 5oz. 12dwt.; Grafton, 4oz. 6dwt.; Wilson and party, 1oz. 5dwt.; and 12oz. Our Waterloo correspondent reports the following yields:—Last Chance, 8oz. 17dwt.; Brusher's Company, 12oz. 6dwt.; Try Again, 7oz. 5dwt.; Brothers' Home, 5oz. 10dwt.; Martin (purchased), 16oz. ALL NATIONS. The half-yearly meeting was held at Mr. W. D. Thompson's office, Exchange, on Monday afternoon; Mr. J. Trehowan, in the chair. The following reports were adopted:

Directors' Report.—This stated that a portable plant had been secured and a start made to continue sinking the shaft, but when work was resumed in the bottom, it was found necessary, owing to drift, to cut back the shaft and puddle it up. This has been successful, and will save putting in pumps for the present. Fair progress had been made with sinking, and in a very short time it was expected the mine would be bottomed.—J. TRETOWAN, chairman; W. D. THOMPSON, manager. Mine Manager's Report.—I took charge on 7th June. Your directors had secured a plant at Stawell, and the poppet-logs, engine, and winding gear have been taken down and re-erected on your mine, and are working well. The pumping gear, &c., is ready to be erected when required. On 24th July the shaft was down 40 feet, and your directors decided to cut it from water level—20 feet from surface—1 foot larger all round for puddling purposes. This had been done to a depth of 52 feet from surface to procure a dry bottom. This position had been puddled. Present depth shaft 62 feet.—H. G. HAYNES, mine manager. The balance-sheet showed a credit of £20 6s 6d in the bank. The retiring director, Mr. A. Lamb, was re-elected, and the filling of a second vacancy was left to the directors. Messrs T. Moran and D. T. Bohar were elected auditors.

Beaufort Agricultural Society.

A special general meeting of the Beaufort Agricultural Society, to receive the report from the sub-committee appointed to devise ways of holding a fair and sports gathering, in aid of the show-yard improvement fund, was held in the Shire Hall on Saturday afternoon. Mr. J. Eastwood (President) occupied the chair, and there were present—Messrs F. W. Rogers, R. Kirkpatrick, G. A. Dunnet, E. W. Hughes, G. Topper, D. F. Troy, D. Havnah, A. Parker, M. O'Brien, J. McKelvie, L. J. Berryman, J. B. Cochran, G. Davis, C. H. Taylor, Dr. G. A. Eadie. The secretary read the minutes of the sub-committee meeting. The President intimated that the reason of starting the movement now, instead of waiting till the annual meeting in October, was that it would be too late, as several gatherings were coming off in November, and the month they had in contemplation, and so it was thought better to hold it in October. It was unanimously decided by a show of hands to hold the Federation Fair and sports gathering. As the National Show fell on the date previously fixed, namely, the 18th October, it was decided to hold the gathering on Wednesday, 11th October, in the Beaufort Park. Resolved that the public's booth be sold by auction, with a reserve of £10; that the fruit and lolly stall be left in the hands of the ladies to manage for the Society; that a luncheon booth be managed and supervised by a committee of ladies; the intention being to get provisions donated, that there be no free admissions; that adults pay 1s and children under 14 years 6d; that vehicles be admitted free; that prizes to the extent of £10 be procured, the President remarking that no doubt the merchants would try and get as many trophies as possible so as to provide a decent programme. The matter of arranging the programme was left in the hands of a sports committee. As the Dramatic Club had previously announced its intention to hold an entertainment in aid of the Mechanics' Institute during October, it was unanimously agreed to forego the proposal to hold a concert and ball on the night of the sports; and the members considering that the

Mechanics' Institute was equally as deserving of support as the Agricultural Society. Considerable discussion arose as to whether two pipes or a brass band should be procured, and a compromise was effected by agreeing to have both; at a cost not to exceed £5 for the band and £3 for the pipe band.

The President appointing the various committees, it was also agreed that each committee should appoint a permanent chairman. Messrs. McKelvie, Havnah, Troy, Sinclair, Hughes, Cochran, and Kirkpatrick were appointed a sports and procession committee, with power to add. The secretary was instructed to convene a meeting of ladies willing to assist in carrying out the fair for Tuesday, 11th October, at 10 o'clock, and to be unable to attend, but willing to help, to be asked to send in their names. Collectors were appointed as follows:—Stockyard Hill—Messrs Havnah, Dunnet, Kirkpatrick, Rogers, Stewart, and W. Lynch. Eurambeen and Middle Creek—Messrs T. J. Eastwood, Taylor, Berryman, M. O'Brien, and Gordon. Beaufort—Messrs Topper, Cochran, Sinclair, Troy, Eastwood, Davis, and Trehowan; these collectors to also work Trawalla, Regan, and Waterloo.

A Broken-down System Renovated.

The President intimated that each committee would have a recognized head, who would make himself responsible for the bringing in of the contributions. All gifts would be acknowledged gratuitously in the local paper, and memorandum books would be handed to collectors. Having thoroughly thrashed out the question of the secretary's remuneration, it was unanimously decided that the collector should be paid a bonus for his services, such bonus not to exceed £5 5s, nor to be less than £3 3s. Mr. Berryman was informed by the President that the collectors, when canvassing, were to say that the object was to improve the show grounds. £50, or even £100, could be spent in putting the fence and sheds in good repair. The collectors could accept either money or goods.

It was decided that a separate account be opened at the Bank, to be called the Show Grounds Improvement Fund, and that this account be not interfered with in any way for ordinary shop purposes. The signatures on cheques to be the same as in the ordinary account. Returns are to be sent in by the collectors not later than the 1st of October. The following gifts were promised in the room:—J. B. Cochran, lamb; M. O'Brien, 6 bushels oats; L. J. Berryman, 10s 6d; R. Kirkpatrick, bag of wheat. The meeting closed with a vote of thanks to the chair.

Serious Gun Accident at Mount Cole.

A boy shot by his brother. A sad accident happened on Sunday to a boy about 14 years of age named William Liston, son of Mr. Thomas Liston, farmer, of Middle Creek. He was an elder brother had been shooting rabbits on Mount Cole, and on returning home, walking in single file, the elder brother, carrying a loaded gun, slipped on a rock and fell, with the unfortunate result that the weapon exploded, and the charge was lodged in William Liston's arm, side and face. He was only about three yards distant, but did not receive the full force of the charge, as it first struck the ground, and rebounded thence upward, entering the unfortunate's body under the ribs. There are several pellets in the lungs and liver, and possibly in other organs. The services of Dr. Eadie were procured from Beaufort, and as the sufferer required frequent treatment, the Doctor advised his removal to the Ballarat Hospital, where he was admitted in an unconscious condition. On Tuesday the boy was photographed by means of the Röntgen rays, with a view of locating the position of the pellets. An excellent skiagram was secured, but in view of the patient's condition it was decided inadvisable to attempt to remove any of the shot. The medical men have not abandoned hope of saving the boy's life, but he is in a serious condition. Later accounts state that the sufferer has made such advances that the doctors are now hopeful of his life.

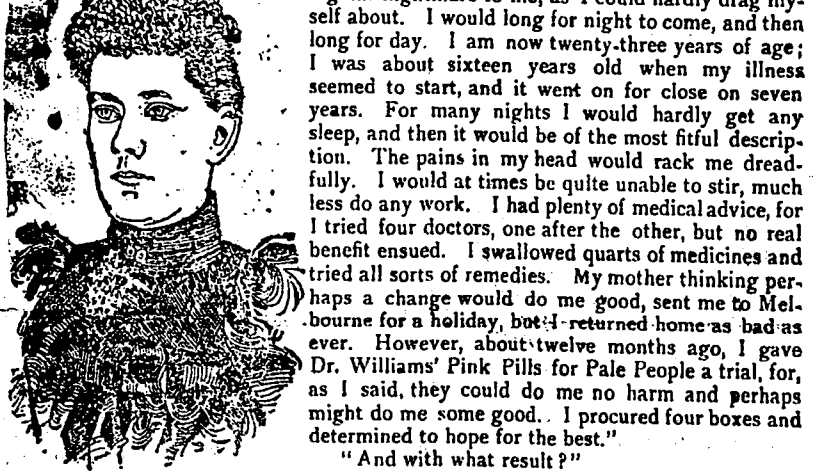

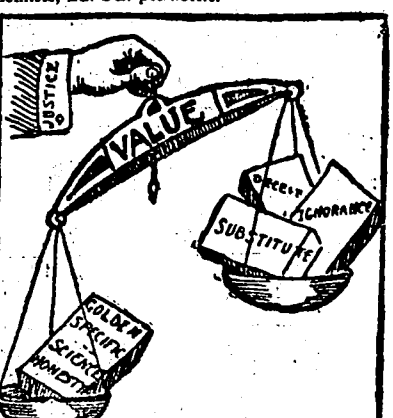

Russell moved that a letter be sent to Cr. Cushing sympathizing with him in his accident, and hoping that he would soon be back at the Council table again. Seconded by Cr. Douglas, and carried.

From Assistant Government Statist, asking for copy of voters' roll.—Attended to.

From Municipal Association of Victoria, forwarding copies of Municipal Elections Deposit Bill, Municipal Council Valuations Bill, Meat Supervision Bill, and Local Government Act Amendment Bill.—Re the first-named bill, Cr. Lewis moved that their parliamentary representatives be asked to oppose it. Seconded by Cr. Flynn, who thought it a very foolish thing for any person to bring forward, as it would cause any amount of inconvenience and expense. It would multiply the expense of elections, because any person qualified with the property qualification could enter the municipal arena and put the Council to expense, whilst even if he might not poll half a dozen votes, he had nothing to lose. Cr. Douglas endorsed Cr. Flynn's remarks. Carried.

The second and third bills were received. Re the last, Cr. Lewis did not think it was a good thing to give a vote whether rates were paid or not. There was trouble enough now to collect the rates. Of course all were placed on the electoral roll. He moved that their parliamentary representatives be asked to vote strongly against the bill. Seconded by Cr. Beggs. Cr. Russell thought it was rather hard lines, because sometimes people did not pay up through forgetting the date. Cr. Douglas thought that the more lenient they were the more likely they were to be imposed upon. As the rates were due in March, three or four months were allowed to pay by the 10th June, so that there was ample time. Still he was rather in favor of the bill brought forward. Cr. Lewis mentioned that in some shires ratepayers were compelled to pay by the 1st March, also they were used. Cr. Beggs said it would have to be the same in this shire if the bill were passed. A date would have to be fixed on which rates were to be paid for, so that it would be no better for ratepayers. The secretary said that as it was there were 25 per cent. defaulters on the 10th June. Cr. Beggs said that this shire was much more liberal than most shires. The motion was carried.

From Blake & Riggall, forwarding for approval draft of proposed conveyance of old road in parish of Lillitrie to Captain Bridges, R.N.—The engineer pointed out that the description was incorrect. Cr. Lewis thought that as it had been here a fortnight the engineer should have seen that it was right, as it

was very unfair to allow it to be hung up so long. The engineer replied that he could not alter the plan, and that this was the first opportunity of bringing it before the Council. Cr. Flynn moved that the matter be referred to the engineer, with power to act. Seconded by Cr. Cameron. The mover did not altogether agree with the remarks of Cr. Lewis, as he did not think the engineer had power to alter it without referring it to the Council. The delay was not nice for the people interested, but at the same time they were probably more to blame at the other end than at this. Cr. Lewis thought the engineer had quite enough power to refer the letter back. Cr. Flynn—That is a matter of opinion; let it stick at that. Cr. Russell did not think this discussion was proper. He had quoted this Council in Riverina, and hoped the new President would live up to the good character that the Council had. The motion was carried.

From Geo. R. Eald, forwarding copy of Dr. Barrett's lecture on "Proportional Representation."—To lie on table, on motion of Crs. Flynn and Russell.

From Geelong and Western District Fire Acclimatizing Society, offering trout fry at 30s and 40s per 1000.—Referred to North Riding members.

From Cuthbert, Morrow & Munt, forwarding for execution lease from Mr. H. F. Watkin, re use of land for disposal of nightsoil.—Three North Riding members empowered to sign the lease, on motion of Crs. Beggs and Lewis.

From Rev. W. Allen, Scarsdale, asking for a footbridge to be placed over the drain in front of the land held by the Wesleyan Church in Snake Valley.—To be complied with, on motion of Crs. Douglas and Russell.

From Susan Phillips, Beaufort, asking to be excused from paying her rates.—Referred to North Riding members.

From E. Newey, Waterloo, asking why he was unable to vote at Waterloo on 24th ult., having paid his rates before the 10th June.—The President said when Mr. Newey spoke to him about it he told him that the best thing he could do was to refer it to the Council. Cr. Flynn was the deputy returning officer, and said that Mr. Newey's name was not on the roll. Cr. Flynn asked if it was a certified roll. The President supposed so, but if it was not the secretary was at fault. Cr. Douglas said that was not the only mistake, as he knew of two cases where rates were not paid and the persons' names were not on the roll. The secretary (who had gone out of the room) produced the roll used at the Waterloo polling-booth. Cr. Flynn asked how the roll came to be here. The secretary said that he took it out of this envelope (produced). Cr. Flynn said that the secretary had no right to take it out.

The secretary asserted that he had the right. Cr. Flynn said that, with regard to the roll or not, Mr. Newey's name was on the roll or not, he was not in a position to say till he overhauled it. There was a very little voting at Waterloo during the day, and at about a quarter to 4 o'clock 20 men rushed into the polling-booth when nobody was there but himself. He turned up the voters' roll, and as deputy returning officer was an entirely disinterested party. The names of Thomas and William Newey were on the top of the page, and he did not see Edward Newey's name; but on overhauling the roll now he saw it on the bottom of the other page. He asked any councillor if under these circumstances it was not possible to miss it. He was sorry that it had occurred. In further explanation he would say that Edward Newey was not the only man who turned up and did not have a vote, although his rates were paid. Consequently he was not so particular as he otherwise might have been. The President said he did not accuse Cr. Flynn of being interested in the election in any way. But he thought an apology was due to Mr. Newey for not getting his vote. Cr. Flynn thought that if they apologized to Mr. Newey they would have to do so to others. Cr. Beggs said it had nothing to do with the Council, but the deputy returning officer. It was quite correct to print the name where it was. It was plain enough how the mistake occurred. The deputy returning officer regretted his error, which had nothing to do with the Council. Cr. Cameron moved that Cr. Flynn's explanation be accepted, and that they go on with the business. Seconded by Cr. Lewis, and carried.

From Korumburra Agricultural and Pastoral Society, soliciting co-operation in inducing the Government to bring in a Brands Registration Act.—Support of parliamentary representatives to be asked, on motion of Crs. Lewis and Flynn.

Balance-sheet of Beaufort, &c., United Goldfield and Farmers' Common, for year ending 31st July, showing receipts £134 16s 2d and expenditure £121 10s 8d, leaving a Cr. balance of £13 5s 4d. A. Parker and A. Cumming certified to having examined the books of accounts and to finding same well kept and correct in every particular.—Received.

From J. Humphreys, secretary Beaufort Agricultural Society, asking council to be proclaimed Wednesday, 11th October next, a public holiday for the North and West Ridings, being the occasion of a fair and sports gathering to be held under the auspices of the Society.—Granted, on motion of Crs. Flynn and Douglas.

From same, asking for use of Park on 11th Oct. for fair and sports gathering, with power to charge for admission.—Granted, on motion of Crs. Flynn and Beggs.

The President said that he had been asked to apply for the patronage of Crs. Beggs and Lewis.

From J. Halg and 14 ratepayers, Mt. Cole Flat, asking that about 10 chains of road be formed and drained, commencing at Liston's lane and continuing on in front of Mr. Clark's property on road leading to Division road near Mr. Geo. Waldron's Liston's lane.—Referred to the North Riding members.

From G. Waldron, Mt. Cole Flat, asking permission to erect a chain of wire-netted fencing and swing gate across road known as boundary road between Ararat and Ripon Shires.—To lie on the table for a month, and engineer to report, on motion of Crs. Lewis and Flynn; Mr. Waldron in the meantime to be asked to give a more accurate description.

From John Jess, Middle Creek, drawing attention to damage done by his crops through the late heavy rains in June and July, owing to the overflow of water from Mount Cole, as the creek was out deeper and wider in several places by men employed by the Council, and for which damage he would hold the Council responsible.—Engineer to report at next meeting, on motion of Crs. Beggs and Lewis.

From Cecil Baker, Beaufort, asking to be allowed time in which to pay his rates and dog tax.—Referred to North Riding members.

From M. McIntosh, Beaufort, claiming £5 for damages alleged to be done by Contractor Watkin to allot. 2AB, stand over for a month, so that Messrs McIntosh and Watkin may settle it between themselves, on motion of Crs. Flynn and Beggs.

From Thos. Kennedy, Linton, calling attention to bad state of road leading from Mr. Robt. Rankin's farm, Murtuchup, south towards the holding of Mr. Foran, near Linton.—Referred to East Riding members.

Flynn and Lewis; Cr. Russell stating that he knew the road written doing—Ballaratshire to be also written to and asked to co-operate, and whether it prefers the work done under its engineer or under Ripon's.

Cr. Douglas introduced Mr. Rebt. Currie, of Black Hill, who applied to have gates removed from across this same boundary road. The engineer pointed out that this was a matter for the Ballarat Shire to deal with, the gates being in that Shire. The matter was referred to the East Riding members to report at next meeting, on motion of Crs. Lewis and Flynn.

Cr. Flynn moved that permission be granted to Mr. F. Russell to clear a barked road near Broadbent's paddock, as applied for at last meeting, and to which no objection had been made. Seconded by Cr. Cameron, and carried.

The President mentioned as a grievance of the ratepayers that it was thought that men should be employed to clear out the water race between Mt. Cole and Beaufort, as it had not been done for a number of years. Cr. Beggs thought it was cleared out last year.

The council then adjourned for lunch. On resuming, Cr. Lewis moved, and Cr. Cameron seconded, that the first moiety of the President's allowance (£20) be passed for payment and added to the pay-sheet that day. Carried.

## NEWSPAPER LAW.

1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary, in writing, are considered as wishing to continue their subscriptions.  
2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their newspapers, the publisher may continue to send them until arrears are paid.  
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their newspapers from the post-office to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they settle their bills, and ordered the newspapers to be discontinued.  
4. If subscribers move to other places, without informing the publishers, and the papers are sent to the former address, the subscribers are responsible.  
5. The court has decided that "refusing to take periodicals from the post-office or leaving them uncalled for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud."  
6. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he has ordered it or not, is held in law to be a subscriber.

## RE MINING LEASES.

1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary, in writing, are considered as wishing to continue their subscriptions.  
2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their newspapers, the publisher may continue to send them until arrears are paid.  
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their newspapers from the post-office to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they settle their bills, and ordered the newspapers to be discontinued.  
4. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publishers, and the papers are sent to the former address, the subscribers are responsible.  
5. The court has decided that "refusing to take periodicals from the post-office or leaving them uncollected, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud."  
6. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he has ordered it or not, is held in law to be a subscriber.

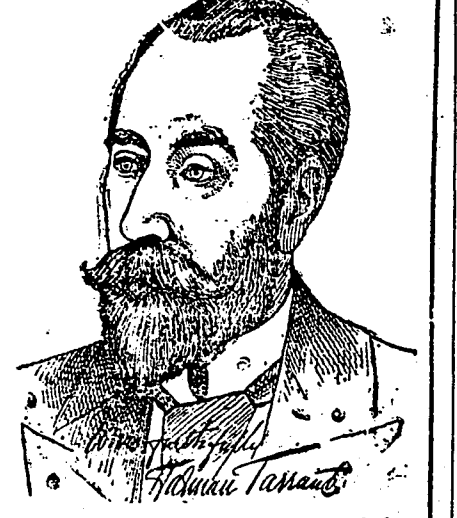

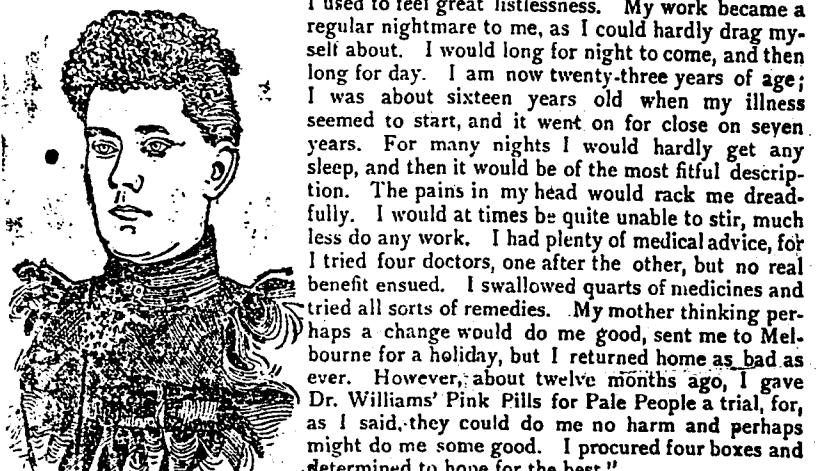

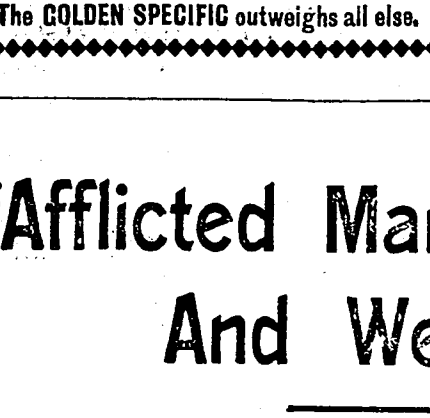
