The Beaufort Common. PROPOSED ALIENATION FOR HOME STEADS. PROTEST BY COUNCILLORS. PUBLIC MEETING TO BE HELD.

At the monthly meeting of the Riponshire Council on Monday, Mr. Flynn drew attention to a letter of great importance to the North Riding ratepayers. It was not officially before them, but through the friend had been brought under his notice that morning. The letter (which was from the member for Ripon and Hampden, Mr. D. S. Oman, and was no doubt correct), stated that the Minister of Lands, Mr. Oman's request, intended to visit Beaufort for the purpose of ascertaining whether the present action of the Council is to be extended, or whether some of it will be made available for settlement. He desired that a committee of three from each side (Mr. Flynn did not know where the sides were) be appointed to lay the views of residents before him. He will reach Beaufort by the Atlantic Express on Friday, July 24th, making the inspection on the Saturday following (25th July). As a representative of the Shire on the management of the Beaufort Common, Mr. Flynn wished an expression from the Council on the matter. Personally, he thought it would be a very serious matter if the grass lands adjoining Beaufort, Main Lead, and Waterloo were thrown open for selection. In his opinion these lands at least should be kept for commonage. Then there was the other question—the rest of the land were taken, where would timber be got for building purposes? Some people thought that private landowners would conserve timber better than the Crown; but he knew that the mines would have to pay more for their timber.

Mr. Sinclair said that as one who had watched the common disappear by the eyes being picked out of it, it was not worth a penny piece, he thought the time had arrived when all the common should be allowed to go. They found that at Chute where commonage land was taken up it had been cleared of timber and put to some use. At the present time the forests were utterly useless. It would be more satisfactory to all concerned to have the people settled on the land, and now that the best of the common was taken they had better take the lot.

Mr. Lewis did not agree with Mr. Sinclair. For a township of the size of Beaufort the common was necessary. Mr. Sinclair guaranteed that if he ran stock on the common they would die. Mr. Lewis—May be, in a bad season. Mr. Flynn pointed out that last year a great lot of starving stock had been depastured on the common, and no doubt the cause of the death was the common; but that the grass had been cut now was no doubt the best of the land had been cut; but if they let the best of what was left, if they would find a lot would be left in the hands of the Crown, and useless for any purpose; and unless good judgment was used, there would be no such result that the land of adjoining landowners would not be worth having. It was well known that it had cost the Council from £10 to £200 annually for the suppression of rats in the common, but it had gradually been worked down, till the last few years Mr. Sinclair asked how it was that the best of the common had been picked out, and that when the Common managers objected the Government took no notice. Mr. Flynn said there was not the slightest doubt that if the common were thrown open there would be a rush for it.

Mr. Sinclair thought notices should be sent out as to the right of the Minister of Lands, so as to let people give evidence for themselves. Mr. Flynn said that 24 years ago, when there was a rush for the common, a resolution was made, which expired about August or September. They would now see whether the Minister would give a further extension or not. Mr. Sinclair—He wants to settle the people on the land. The chairman (Mr. Douglas) suggested that a public meeting be called. Mr. Flynn, in order to give the public a chance of putting their case, moved that a public meeting be called on Saturday week (18th inst.), and that the president be asked to preside. Seconded by Mr. Sinclair, and carried.

ALTERATION IN DATE. After receiving the above-mentioned letter, we are sending Mr. Oman to the Minister of Lands, to the following effect:—The Minister writes after date in respect of the common. 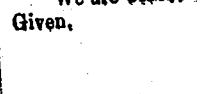

Important to Applicants for Mining Leases.

Applicants for leases within the district covered by The Riponshire Advocate are invited to peruse the following facts:—

The New Mining Regulations require that when a lease is marked out the applicant shall insert in a newspaper published in the district where the land is situated, or in any such newspaper, then in the one published nearest the district, an advertisement or notice in the form marked A in the schedule prescribed.

Ten days are allowed after marking out the lease, in which to lodge the application with the Warden or his clerk, and forward a duplicate to the Minister of Mines.

The word "district" in the Regulations has been defined by the Crown Solicitor to be a locality, and not a mining district, and the lease should therefore be advertised in the paper nearest the land for which application is to be made.

As TEN days (not seven as formerly) are given in which to complete the application, no valid excuse can now be urged for failure to advertise the lease in the district paper, though it has only a weekly, and not a daily issue.

This is borne out by the following memo from the Mines Department received by Mr. H. A. Adams, Grenville Standard, Linton:—"Sir, Reference is made to your communication, in which you honor to inform us that the Registrar of Mines has been instructed to advise intending applicants for mining leases, where opportunity offers [i.e. for tendering such advice], that the regulation relating to advertising their applications should be STRICTLY ADHERED TO.—I have the honor to be, etc. P. Cohen, for Sec. of Mines and Water Supply."
