



CONCRETE FOR FARM USE. WORKING DIRECTIONS.

For cow-house flooring, dairy buildings, walls, homestead sheds, and other constructions generally, concrete is now coming into extensive use.

Gravel well graded in sizes is equal to good concrete as crushed stones. Bank run gravel, just as dug from the pit, seldom runs even, and rarely has the right proportion of sand and pebbles for making the best concrete.

Generally sand is clean, but if not it can easily be washed by playing a hose or flushing water upon this layer of sand placed on a tight jointed inclined wooden board.

The tools necessary for making concrete in moderate quantities are already at hand on the average farm or station.

All the materials (slightly more than the computed quantities) should be on hand before beginning the work.

One of the most effective ways of cleaning bamboo furniture is with stiff nail-brush, such as can be purchased at most stores for a few cents.

Mix together in a bottle equal parts of vinegar and paraffin, and keep for use.

Since crushed stone is more or less porous in dry, hot weather, it is advisable to keep the stone pile wet, or at least to water the stone well as it stands on wheelbarrows ready for the mixing board.

No great amount of knowledge and experience is necessary to do first class work in concrete. Success depends upon the care and thoroughness exercised in the selection of the materials, mixing of the ingredients, and protection of the freshly placed concrete.
