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WORN-OUT LAND.

We sometimes hear of land being utterly run out, and this is just another way of saying that it has been cropped until it will bear crops no longer, as all the immediately available fertility has been used up. Analysis has shown that ordinary soils in the top nine inches of depth contain a sufficiency of the elements of fertility to grow a hundred crops or more. But, unfortunately, most of this is locked up in the mineral constituents of the soil, and it only becomes available very gradually, and the available material—that is, the soluble part—exists in a very small proportion indeed, and is easily reduced by the removal of crops. This is a state of matters that is very common in the older States of America. It is called "robber" farming, and one of the problems before the agricultural authorities is the question of getting up the fertility of the land once more, and of endeavouring to get the farmers to practise methods which will not rob the land. We have not got so bad as that here yet, because for the most part we have kept up the fertility by manures and feeding stuffs. Still, here and there we come across the case of a farm which has been badly treated, and something more is necessary. Perpetual cultivation, apart from cropping, wastes the humus or vegetable matter, and thus alters the nature of the texture of the soil. It becomes dense and sticky, and in this way the soil is reduced in value. Apart altogether from the question of returning the fertility by actual dressings, it is certain that liming would help such cases. We do not lime now so much as we used to do in the olden days, but it is quite as necessary, and, in fact, it would be a good plan if we went back to some of the old practices such as these once more. Liming improves the texture of the soil, while it is to a slight extent a manure in itself, and if in addition to this artificial means are applied and feeding adopted, and if possible, farmyard manure put on, the condition can be kept up.

Two breakfast cups wheatmeal, one breakfast cup plain flour, three teaspoons baking powder, three ounces butter or lard, two heaped dessertspoons sugar, one egg, large egg milk, salt to taste. Mix the wheatmeal, flour, sugar and baking powder, then rub in butter (or lard), beat the egg and milk together, and stir into stiff dough. Roll and cut into shapes, place on hot floured cloth sheet, and bake in quick oven.

SCOTCH SCONES.

Two breakfast cups flour, 2 heaped teaspoons baking powder, 2 heaped teaspoons sugar, one egg, large egg milk, salt to taste. Mix the flour, milk, and egg, and add the sugar and baking powder. Roll and cut into shapes, place on hot floured cloth sheet, and bake in quick oven.

GIRLY SCONES.

Three level breakfast cups flour, 3 heaped teaspoons baking powder, salt to taste. Mix with large cup of milk and water, half and half, divide the dough into half rolls, and cut four scones from each. Cook on hot gridle.
