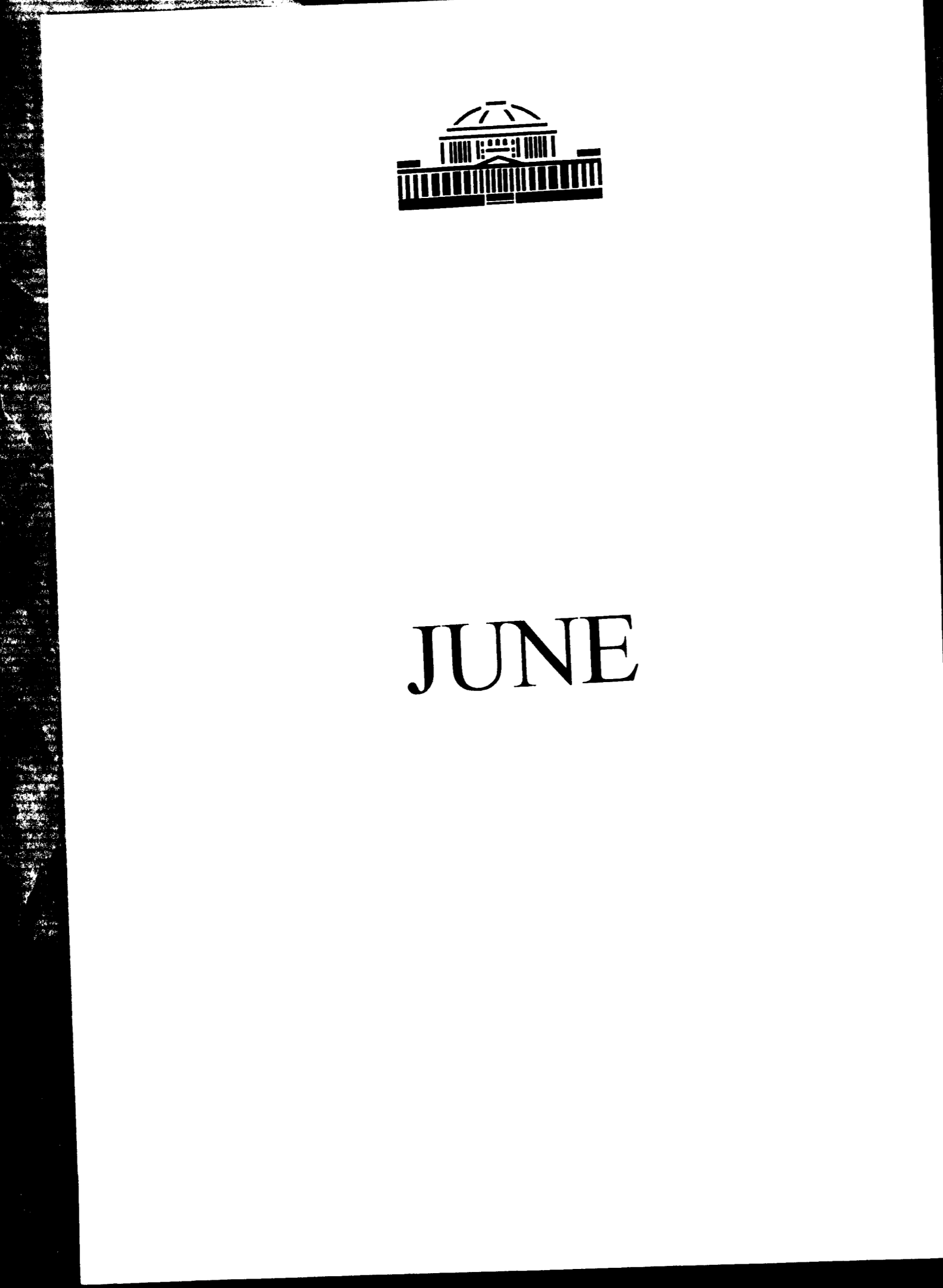

CLEVER MICROBES.

Many of man's most admired inventions are simply imitations of things which Nature has been doing for hundreds of thousands of years.

The telephone, for example, is "reborn" from the human ear and vocal cords. We hear sounds by means of the drum of the ear, a tightly stretched membrane which is set vibrating by the sound-waves which strike upon it.

The telephone transmitter, the part into which you speak, is a very perfect model of the ear. The drum is represented by the carbon disc, which vibrates as the speaker's voice affects it. The ear communicates sounds to the brain by means of nerves; the transmitter sends them over wires.

The receiver is that the part which you place to your ear—speaks to you in just the same way as your own vocal cords speak. In everyone's throat there is a pair of cords which are tightly stretched in the act of speaking. Air from the lungs is forced past their taut edges, and causes them to vibrate in such a way as to produce sounds.

The receiver of the electric current takes the place of air; but its effect is exactly the same. It sets up the vibrations which make the receiver speak. The camera is nothing more or less than a large model of the eye. Light passing through the lens of the eye is focused on the retina, which corresponds exactly to the ground-glass screen or the plate of the camera. Though the retina's chief use is to send on impressions to the brain, it is capable of retaining an image for some time. Light has the same effect on it as on a photographic plate. To test the truth of this you have only to look for a moment at some brightly-illuminated object, and then to cast the eyes up to the white ceiling; you will find that you can see the image of the object for quite a long time.

Again the idea for the mechanism of the pump, which works by means of valves so arranged that water can flow in one direction only, has been cribbed also.
