

The "one big union" scheme is the product of the union "bosses," who have ever been itching for autocratic power. The short history of this merging merement shows that in the first place, the unakilled unions closed in together in the mistaken belief that by their numbers they would he is a positive to command control and composition to command control and com-pel compliance with their demands. Parading this outward demonstration of strength before other workers, the leaders of the "one big union" move-ment endeavoused to rope in the craft unions. And to some extent they have

To them local autonomy is anathema. They do not want contentment in industry. Their aim is to keep the workers agitated so that they (the union "bosses") may pose and figure in the limiting place. The
