Although the hall has been completed for some time and an entertainment has been held previously by special permission, there were a few minor additions and alterations to be made before it was finally passed by the Board of Health, which have now been done and approved of by the board. The hall is thoroughly up to date, the floor being one of the best.

Shearing operations have been completed on one of the holdings, but others are held up owing to unfavourable weather conditions for this class of work prevailing. The clip generally is good, and prices so far obtained are very satisfactory. Although the weather is unfavourable for shearing and clipping sheep, it is ideal for crops, which are now out in our old filling. Some very fine crops of wheat and oats are to be seen in this district.

RENT PAID IN ROSES.

King George recently applied to Parliament for permission to sell certain portions of his entailed Duchy of Lancaster estates.

The total rent-roll of these valuable properties is only about £50,000. It ought to be a very great deal more, but for the fact that previous sovereigns were in the habit of granting what were in effect perpetual leases at a nominal rent, plus a substantial cash payment by the original lessee.

It is for this reason that King George has to be content to-day with a nosegay of roses as rental for that portion of the Duchy estates on which stands St. Olave's Grammar School, near Tower Bridge; whereas what the lawyers term its "economic rent" has been calculated at about £3,000.

Similarly, a tablecloth, a fur coat, a horse and halter, a curry-comb, a nightcap, a pair of scarlet hose, a falcon, a cross-bow, and a pair of tongs figure every year in the Duchy accounts. Each article represents the rent paid, or supposed to be paid, for some manor, farm, or piece of land, the aggregate rental-value of all of which properties taken together would probably run into many thousands of pounds.

STACK MEASUREMENT.—To find the contents of an oblong stack with perpendicular ends, multiply the length by the average width (between bottom and eaves) and the product by the height from the ground to the eaves. For the top multiply the area at the eaves by half the height to the right. The weight may be ascertained very accurately by measuring the cubic contents of a truss, and from this calculating the height at the top.

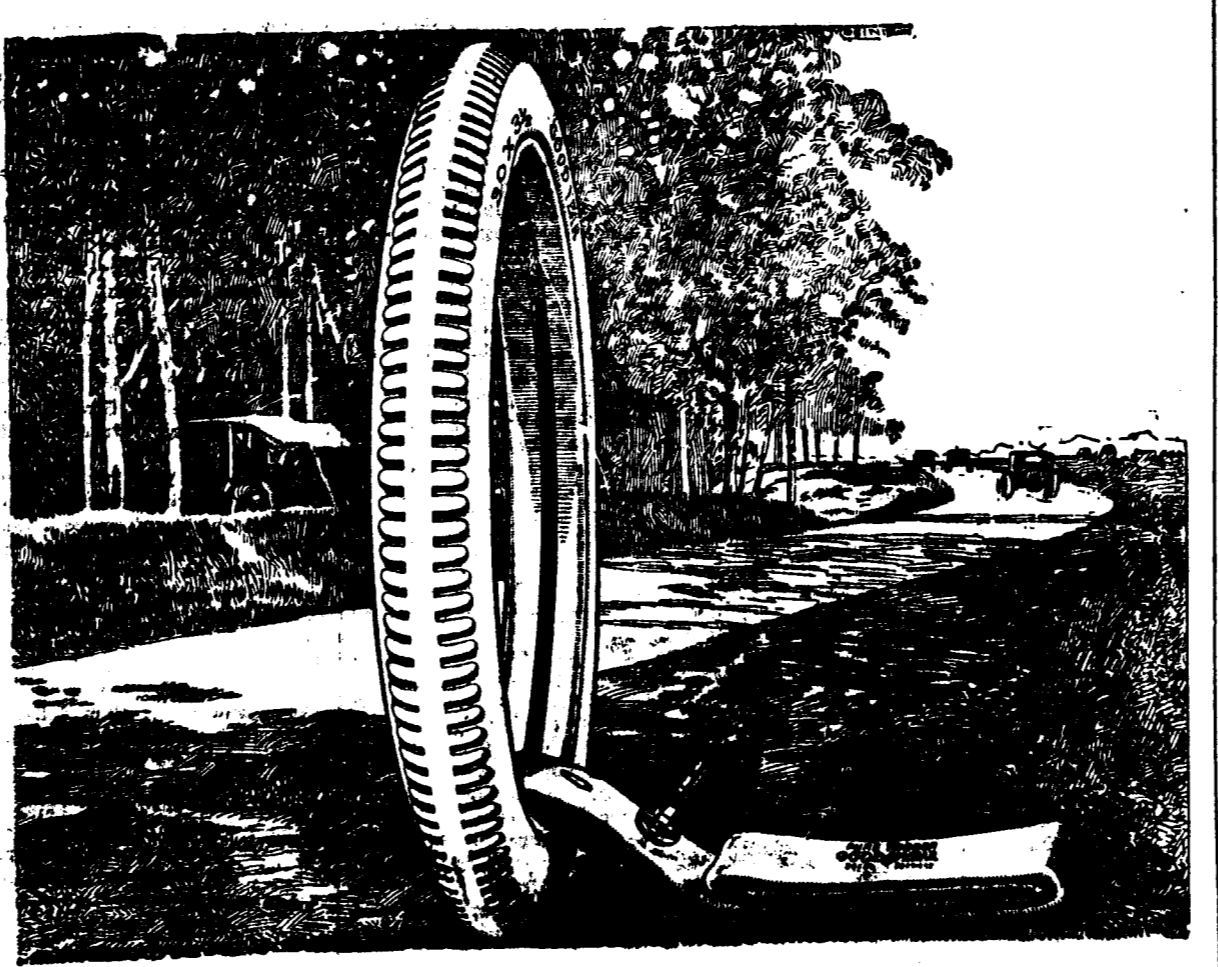
