This warm air causes the rain to evaporate long before it has rain to evaporate long before it has done, except in favourable circumstance the chance of getting even into the to pase a damp cloth lightly over the thore lower levels of the atmosphere, say, as low down as ten thousand feet above the ground.

Sometimes these overhead showers are distinctly visible from below, as a sort of dark fringe to a still darke cloud. Often the fringe takes a twisted form, as though the cloud were moving forward and leaving the lower part of the shower behind.

In the same way, a snowstorm frequently occurs in the higher regions of the atmosphere without a single flake reaching ground level. The snow has melted, and the moisture has evaporated in mid-air.

These overhead snowstorms are not to be supposed as occurring only in the winter time, for at a very great height above the earth it is always "winter." Hence, an overhead snow storm may be seen, even in the height of summer, taking place five miles. or even less, above the earth.

The writer, during the winter, has observed snowstorms .raging at only a few thousand feet up, while merely a sprinkling of flakes have reached the ground.
