

FEDERAL LOAN.

The Commonwealth Treasurer, Dr. Earle Page, has announced that he has decided to close the Five-year Conversich Loan on Monday, 3rd September, 1923. He had at first intended to close the Loan on 31st August, but will keep it open until 3rd September, because he has been advised that many Savings Bank d-positors, who desire to invest in the Loan, prefer to let their money remain in the Savings Bank for the full monthly interest period. Dr. Eurle Page said that 19,000 persons had already converted a little less than £18,000,000 into the 1948 and the 1928 loans, and that more than 100,000 persons, who hold £21,000,000, had not yet applied for conversion. The average amount converted is about £900; while the average amount unconverted is £200. These figures show clearly that the 100,000 who have not converted are nearly all small holders. The question naturally arises what these 10,000 persons intend to do? Do they really, wantcash crisit that they are not aware of the necessity of doing something to continue their investment.
