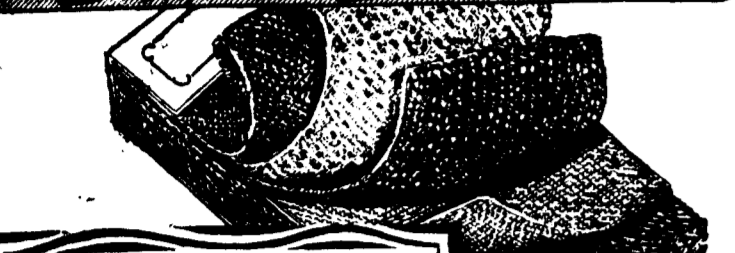

A WINDSOR LEGEND.

Among the many legends that circle around Windsor Castle is the story of the sleeping sentry. He was arrested for sleeping on duty, and saved himself from being "shot at dawn" by a timely discovery that he was a member of the royal household. The story is told that, as the sentry stood on duty, he heard a loud clatter of arms, but he felt, but that he would and immediately a statement started his alarm, who postponed sentence to allow inquiries to be made. As a result of these investigations, it was proved, by the testimony of several witnesses, that the sentry had actually struck thirteen or fourteen times, and the sentry got off with a scolding.

The first published account of this sleeping sentry was in 1729, the guardhouse name was John (Smith), and the incident occurred in the reign of William and Mary. The sentry who so miraculously escaped death lived to the age of 103.

A CORNER OF YOUR OWN.

The corner referred to in this article is a spot in the world where you are, for the time being, your own master—or mistress, as the case may be. It is a place where you are free to think what you like, do what you like, and look how you like.

An Englishman's home is said to be his castle. But, if you are that Englishman, enjoying the independence of a castle home, are you doing your duty by allotting space in your castle to others who have to live with you, and who are dependent upon you?

That is a bigger and more important question than you might think at first. It affects the parent and his children, the master and his servant, the mistress and her maid.

For, when we have established corners ourselves, we are apt to forget what we owe to those refugees, how many silent battles we have fought in them, and how necessary they may be for the happiness and development of others who are trying to climb up to us, or who are destined always to occupy a lesser place.

Naturally, we cannot all own houses. Nor do we all need houses. A room may suffice, for, even in a room, we can express our personal ideas and tastes. We look ourselves in, if need be, to enjoy our whims or work through our tempers, and make, in limited sense, a little world of our own.

It is often very easy for a shrewd individual to gather what kind of person occupies a room by the things that are in it and the atmosphere that pervades it.

Just as the rich director's country mansion betrays his personal characteristics and ideas, so does Smith's small bed-sitting-room betray the personal tastes and inner thoughts of the director's humble clerk, and both the mansion and the bed-sitting-room play their similar parts. The only difference is a difference in degree.

The director, in his country mansion, or town house, is surrounded by the visible expression of himself. He sees evidence of the handsome income he has amassed by his work and skill; the servants, the food, the furniture, conform to his ideas; and in the garden are found the particular kind of roses he happens to like.

Take away his elaborate corner, and because we are not yet wholly spiritual, he will find little pleasure in life or object in labour. Even in his office he has made a corner for himself, and the appointments of his room and the pictures on his walls are of his own choosing.

And now take Smith, in his modest room. On the mantelpiece is his favourite pipe. He may smoke till the air is thick if he likes.

Over his bed is a photographic enlargement of an ordinary seaside resort, which shows no special artistic merit, yet which holds for Smith special personal memories. He can stare at it for five minutes, if he wishes, and stare at that memory-haunted fire, without being called an idiot.

His small bookcase—his own, not a shared one—contains the books he enjoys reading. Outside, he may talk about the thrush and the lark and the skylark, striving to make his folk on their own level. Here, in his own corner, we find him surrounded by inexpensive editions of his favourite authors and discover what books Smith really and truly likes, whether he is naturally tidy or not, and whether he is sentimentally interested in relatives and friends. His photographic display, or the lack of it, will suggest this.

There are times when we all want to be alone and let off steam. We return home irritable, and have no private d to creep into until the mood passes. Or we are sorrowful through some grief that has come upon us, and we cannot pass the first tumults of our emotion in solitude.

Or we receive wonderful news—a dear friend's recovery from a serious illness, a recognition of our work, a competition prize of £1,000—all these are no quiet spot to rejoice or chuckle in.

The need for some corner of our own is part and parcel of every individual's fight for independence. Our people, servants, growing children trying to establish their own little corner, and friends, are among those who suffer most frequently. Yet there are many fortunate folk who, veritable dog-in-the-manger, fight against the independence of those below them, and who are annoyed if they do not have fingers in every pie!

Remember what your corner is to you, and you will have little difficulty in trying to devise corners for others.

KNOW YOUR GLANDS.

A few days ago a woman in a London police court was defended on the grounds of insanity in thyroid gland. This may seem to be merely an up-to-date variant of the old "thick party" excuse for crime, but a little knowledge of these strange "endocrine" glands of ours so newly brought into prominence makes one less so.

It is quite possible that within the next twenty years crime will be dealt with by the surgeon, prisons will be converted into hospitals, and the public executioner will turn anaesthetist. The average man believes that his thoughts, actions, and feelings are controlled by his mind. But it is possible to show that mind is itself under the "despotic sway" of the ductless glands, the thyroid, pineal, pituitary, and adrenal, which generate in the system's chemical fluids on which depend health, happiness, and sanity.

If the thyroid is active, life is "stepped up." If the thyroid is defective, brain and body are alike sluggish and stagnant. If the pituitary glands function well, the intellect is well developed, and productive. Fat, ugly, lazy, self-indulgent people can be made slim, beautiful, brisk, and self-controlled by the proper administration of pituitary extract.

Old age is not a "wearing out" process. It is a cessation of glandular activity. That crime, weakness, and immorality are similarly caused is strongly indicated.

At present the method of making up deficiencies in glandular products is rather crude. But enough has been done to show the way and to allow of prophecy. The Golden Age of mankind is said to be the Glandular Age, when salvation will be taken in tablet form.

CLUES THAT CONFUSE.

"Clues are frequently actually manufactured by the criminals for the express purpose of misleading the police," declared a prominent detective to the writer.

"Amongst burglars this practice has become quite common. What more easy, for instance, than for the midnight visitor to wear boots several sizes too large for him, taking care to leave footprints which will give an entirely wrong idea of his build.

Or the boots themselves are left behind, as though their owner left to go to a party to take them with him. They usually bear the maker's name; but it would be waste of time to look for the thief in that locality, since they have been purposely bought in a strange neighbourhood. When this device is practised a pair of rubber shoes are worn inside the boots, so that the loss of the boots causes the thief no inconvenience.

"Hints have been made to serve the same purpose. One left behind in a provincial jeweller's shop which had been rifled had the name of an East-end tradesman in it, and the crime was at first attributed to a London gang.

It was really the work of a local 'crook,' who, though his head was several sizes smaller than the boy, evidently had his share of brains. But for the treasury of a 'pal,' he would probably have escaped detection, for the police were looking for a much bigger man, and in the wrong place, too.

"Occasionally the 'faked' clue consists of a tool distinctive of a particular trade—a shoemaker's knife, for instance. The article thus left behind are never new; they are usually well-worn, though still serviceable.

"One elaborately-prepared clue was a handkerchief, apparently taken from the wearer's neck in order to tie together several articles, which were, however, left behind. The handkerchief was covered with short grey hairs, as if the owner was an oldish man who had recently had his hair cut. The real burglar was a young fellow of less than twenty-five.

"A few years ago one of these false clues very nearly sent an innocent man to gaol. A burglary was committed near London, and an addressed envelope, which no one could account for, was picked up on the premises. It had apparently been used for a jilpight, and only the name and part of the address could be deciphered. The police, however, found out the address and arrested him. But for the fact that he was able to prove an alibi, he would probably have been convicted. How the real thief obtained the envelope remains a mystery.

"One of the smartest 'faked' clues I remember came to light in a certain district. Three burglaries were successfully accomplished; and, from the traces left all three were apparently the work of a man with a wooden leg.

"It was only when a smart detective pointed out that in the first two cases the wooden leg was the left one, while in the third it was the right, that the local police gave up searching for a one-legged burglar. But for the change of legs the trick would never have been suspected.

"Stealing some property, when robbery is not the motive for a murder, is an old device; but sometimes valuable are left on the victim to create the opposite impression. There was such a case in America some years ago, when the finding of a costly watch and chain on a murdered man led to the crime being attributed to a stranger.

"Several innocent people were suspected, until it was discovered that the deceased had also had a large sum of money in his possession. This was missing. The trick served its purpose by directing the attention of the police to other quarters, while the real criminal quietly slipped away."—Answers.

TRAWALLA SOLDIER SETTLEMENT.

That most enthusiastic band of workers, the Sunshine Circle, on Tuesday, 16th inst., made a 112-mile journey to pay the debt on the Trawalla settlement by holding a fair at St. Andrew's Church, Ballarat. Having the soldier settlers in this way was at least one of the objectives of the fair; there being a second one, viz., to found and maintain a library at the settlement. The Rev. R. Barry, on behalf of the men on the settlement, thanked the Messrs Cooper and Mrs W. D. Thompson for organising this effort. Three years ago he had asked Mrs James Brown, of Cheston, to allow Divine service to be held at her home once a month. This she kindly consented to do, and for twelve months the services were held. Then it was felt that the settlers should have their own church, and with the assistance of a grant from the Presbytery a building was purchased and removed to Cheston. But within a very short time a great gale arose and the church was wrecked completely. It was a thing to weep over, but nothing was to be gained by weeping, and they set to work to try and rebuild the church. Mr Russell, of Carrington, gave them some £10 worth of timber, and other friends in the district also assisted, and the cost of rebuilding the church had been defrayed. There were, however, other urgent needs, amongst them being printing and the erection of porches, and he was hoping that the fair and other efforts would give them money to carry out this work. Some friends had suggested the establishment of a library for the soldiers and their families. Few people realised the hardships that the men had to go through. They had had to buy stock in a high market—some of them had had cows sold to them for £300 the head—but it was not cow country, and they had to sell the head and its progeny for £50. There were many men who left the settlements, both at Trawalla and Mount Huro, poorer than they had gone on to them. The men were trying their best to help themselves, and on their behalf he heartily thanked the promoters of the fair. The sum of £163 was realised.

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
